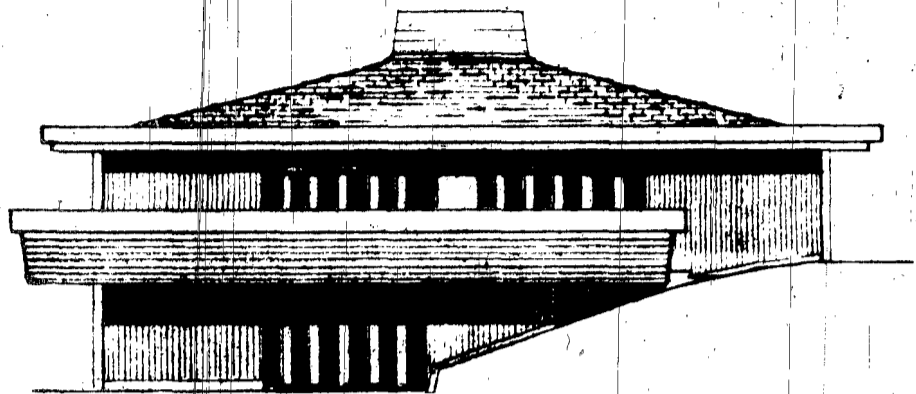

Country Club Members Approve Loan For Club House and Nine More Holes

Wayne Country club members Monday night gave approval to an FHA loan to expand and build additional club house facilities and add another nine holes to the present course.

The new nine holes will be built south of the existing course on land already owned by the club, while the new clubhouse is tentatively planned for construction west and south of the present building.

Ninety-one of 125 eligible voters were represented at Monday night's meeting and voted unanimously to approve the plan.

The loan of \$166,000 will be a government-guaranteed loan, FHA representative Tom Lambert said, with the money coming from a private lending agency.

The reason the FHA ar-

ranges such loans, Lambert said, is to provide attractions designed to keep young persons on the farm or in the rural areas. In the next few years, a greater demand will be put on the farmer to furnish foods for the world. At present, about two-thirds of the farmers in Nebraska are over 55 years of age and young people continue to leave the farm.

If we are to continue to keep young people on the farm, he explained, some recreational attractions must be provided. The financing of golf courses is one such step in this direction.

Members of the club will pay \$22,250 of the cost of the project development. Members also will pay annual dues and fees to support the facility. In addition, income will be re-

ceived from fees charged non-members using the recreation area.

The loan is one of about 20 such loans already approved in the state. Others include Broken Bow, Wood River, Central City, Beemer, Blue Hill and Polk County, Lambert said.

The course will serve Wayne, Carroll, Winslow, Hoskins and Pilger as well as surrounding farm areas. Approximately 10,000 persons live in the area, plus the college enrollment of over 2,500.

"I am pleased and surprised at the overwhelming approval given the project by the membership," club president Roy E. Coryell said Tuesday.

"The board of directors will take immediate action to complete the loan and begin construction," he added. "We see this new

project as a definite boost to Northeast Nebraska and as a boost to rural areas development. Such endeavors bring new jobs to rural communities and provide much needed recreational facilities. These facilities also help encourage young people to remain in their home towns, attract industry and promote tourism.

Officers of the club are Coryell, Arnie Reeg, vice-president, and Don Echtenkamp, secretary.

In other actions 87 persons voted to change articles of incorporation to update them for today's needs.

The vote here, too, was unanimous. Reason for the discrepancy in votes was because four persons arrived at the meeting too late to vote on the articles but in time to vote for the loan.

All 14 Counties Back New NE Vo-Tech School at Polls

Northeast Nebraska voters Tuesday gave overwhelming approval for a vocational technical school in a 14-county area, voting almost 5-1 in favor of the facility. Wayne county favored the move by almost 8-1.

The vote was made without knowing where the school will be located. This

decision will be left by a board of governors who will determine site, size and number of buildings and what curriculum and equipment will be needed.

The legislature has appropriated \$100,000 for this biennium for each of the first five area schools established. This figure is to cover initial expenses of the school's founding.

The Northeast school is the third such school approved in Nebraska. Others are at North Platte and Hastings.

Federal funds are available on a 50-50 matching basis for construction of buildings for the school.

A levy of from one to one and one half mills is estimated to be sufficient to operate the school. State law has set the maximum amount at two mills. Based on the 1966 evaluation of the 14 counties, \$444 million a one and one-quarter mill levy would provide over half a million dollars for the school.

The rest of the money to operate the school would come from tuitions. Plans are to provide lower tuition rates for students coming from within the area taxed for school. Pupils from outside the area probably will pay considerably more tuition.

The school could furnish night and extension courses as well as full-time day

courses. Many of the students at Milford trade school are adults holding down full-time jobs and going to school in the evening.

Colfax and Dakota counties could be permitted to join the school district. Dakota county board members earlier voted not to join because of bond issues for new high school and swimming pool.

Colfax county board voted to be included in the plan but the application was received too late to be included in the original petition. Both counties now may petition to join the district.

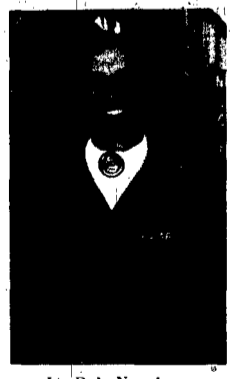

Council Talks Warning Plan; Plus Sewers, Streets, Alleys

A new disaster plan for Wayne was discussed at length at Tuesday night's city council meeting. All city departments, cooperating with the county sheriff's office, telephone company and Civil Defense officials met June 22 to work out details of the plan for presentation.

A complete report on the plan will be included in Monday's Wayne Herald because time will not permit its inclusion in this issue.

Warning sirens, a part of the plan, were recommended by Mayor William Koeber to be placed in two more areas of town. One was suggested in the area near the new high school building and another near the water tower at Ninth and Main. Council felt this plan would give ample warning to all areas of town in case of tornado or other natural disasters.

Cost of the sirens was estimated at about \$750 each plus installation.

Runway work at the airport has been delayed by the excessively heavy rains the past month, but work will move ahead again as soon as the ground has dried enough to permit work to resume.

Progress on the city power plant has been slowed

for lack of some materials, and a shortage of qualified workers, contractors for the power plant piping told the council. Mr. Hunt, of H and H Engineers, said he now has solved both problems and expects to have his part of the work completed by Aug. 1.

Sanitary sewer work in District 30 in Wriedt's subdivision in the east part of town is nearly completed and crews expect to start in the area near Fair-

grounds avenue soon.

The trenching contractor expects to start water main work in Wriedt's subdivision about July 12.

The council also heard a report that surveys had been completed on lots 7-8 in Block 4, Roosevelt park. These lots, formerly owned by the county, were deeded to the city for inclusion in the park area at the south end of Nebraska street. The lots could provide a parking

Wayne to Host Centennial Exhibit Caravan Thursday

The Nebraska Centennial Exhibits Caravan will be in Wayne from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday, June 29. The three-unit caravan, which is supervised by the Nebraska Centennial Commission, plans to stop at least once in every county in the state. Wayne will be the forty-seventh county in which the display has been shown.

The caravan consists of three vans, two of which are devoted to historical information and one that contains paintings by some of the world's most famous artists.

The first van deals with prehistoric Nebraska, the settlement of the major Indian tribes, explorations (such as Lewis and Clark), famous western trails, early pioneer settlement, his-

tory of territorial enactment, disposition of the forces in the Civil War; resettlement of the Indians and the pony express.

In the second van information on how Nebraska gained its statehood, the state capital, development of towns, cattle raising and agriculture is found. The third van contains 28 paintings (valued at over \$100,000) that have been borrowed from the famous Jocelyn Art Museum.

The historical caravans being brought to Wayne as a result of a suggestion made by Wayne resident Richard Lesh. Lesh had seen the caravan in Lincoln and thought it worthy of consideration. There will be no admission charge. It will be located between Logan and Main on Second Street.

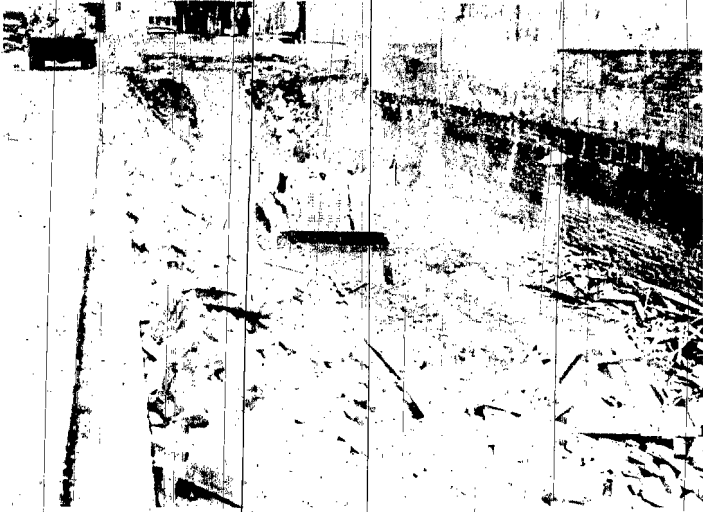

College to Hold Orientation Day

Wayne State's incoming freshmen will be introduced to college life in a series of July orientation days—or by another term, Program Headstart.

Director of Admissions Jim Hummel started the orientation plan last summer and found it so successful that it is being repeated, with a few modifications to make it more convenient for both students and parents.

Days for orientation are July 6, 10, 11, 18 and 22. Registration is scheduled for 10 a.m. each day in the Peterson Fine Arts Center, followed by a brief welcome at 10:15 in Ramsey Theater; then small-group discussions for the freshmen with selected collegians at 11; and at the

same time a parent meeting with Dean of Students Donald Merfman.

After lunch in the Student Center, there will be freshman meetings with the faculty of each academic division and a chance to register for fall classes. Hours of the campus close the program at 3:30.

Following last year's orientation series, Hummel sent questionnaires to all students and parents who attended, asking for opinions on what they thought of the program.

An overwhelming percentage of those replying thought the orientation worthwhile. Some had suggestions to make the schedule more convenient, and Hummel has adopted many of these ideas. Result: this year's orientation will be shorter, with fewer speakers, but longer time allowed for registration.

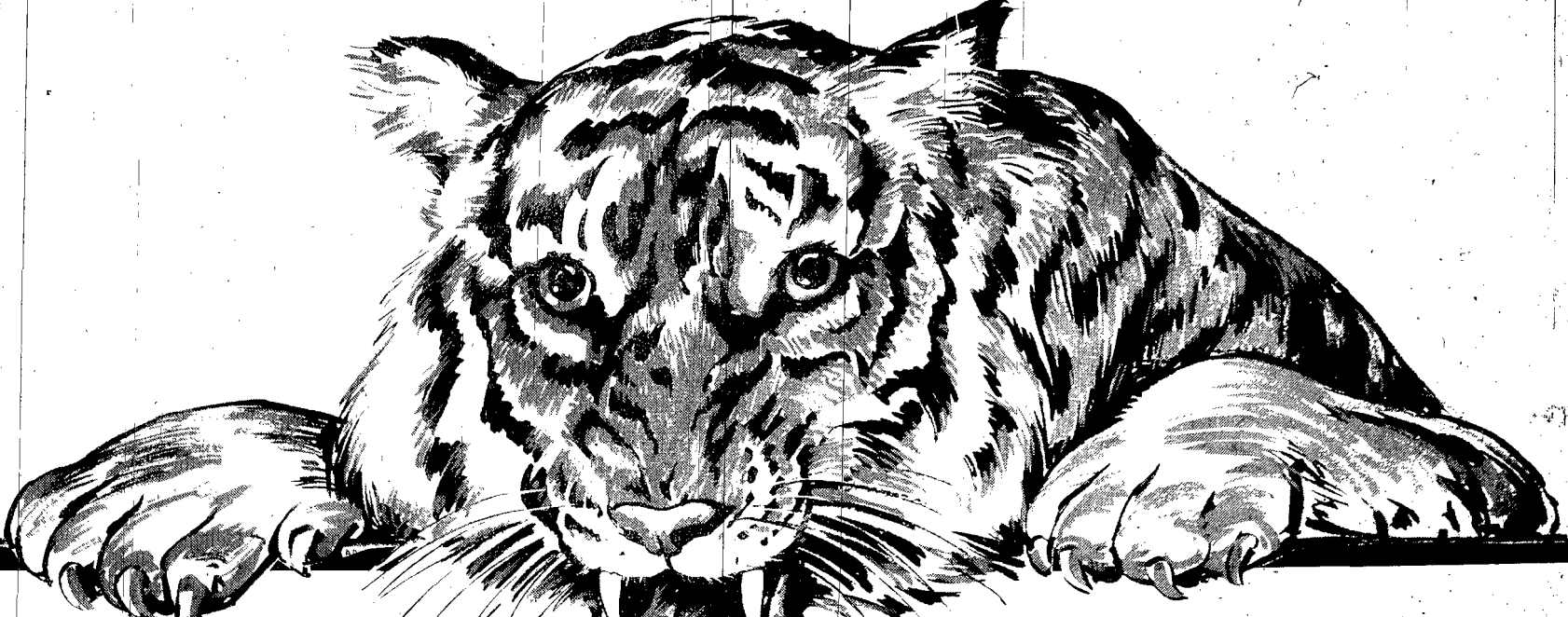

area for users of the new park.

A frost-proof hydrant to provide water for the park will be installed next week.

The council also authorized the city attorney to contact the corn flaking company, Feeders Elevator, to get land for added street purposes in the portion of town along the south side of the railroad on the south end of Window street. The street presently comes over the track from the north, then moves diagonally southwest. It is this area in which the city needs wider right of way.

Alleys have brought much comment to the city council from home owners who have complained about lack of maintenance. City street crew members have been unable to get into some alleys because of heavy rain. The council now is considering the purchase of a second hand road patrol for alley maintenance and snow removal.

In the parks and airport departments, Bob McLean reported a definite need for hangar space to house three or four more planes at the airport. The council is considering the construction of another hangar to provide these needs. Funds for such construction are available, interest free, from the state. Repayment of the loan is to be from hangar rentals.

A group appeared at the council in protest against assessments in Sanitary sewer District 67-2, between Fourth and Seventh on Sherman street. The council took no action, however, and will discuss the problem at the next meeting.

In other action, Andy Manes appeared to object to the sewage lift station on city property adjacent to Manes' lots on east Fifth street. Manes said he felt the station's location would detract from the value of the lots. The council took the objection under advisement but no further action was taken.

Sales throughout the state were \$5,386,970 in May and \$34,230,166 for the first five months of 1967 for 46.7 per cent of the sales goal.

VA Change Rules for Outpatient Treatment

A new plan for outpatient care for veterans by private doctors will become effective July 1.

Under the new plan a veteran will be issued an identification card—if he requires this type of treatment—and he will be permitted to select the doctor of his choice for treatment of the medical condition stated on his card.

Tests in three states showed this new system reduced administrative costs of providing treatment and a slight decrease in the number of visits per veteran was recorded.

Under the old system the doctor had more paper work in connection with the treatment. Now he just files an itemized statement on his own letterhead just as when he is paid by a private patient.

Veterans currently authorized fee basis care under the old program will receive identification cards and instruction July 1.

Replace Social Security Cards

Have you lost your social security card but think that you know what your number is? Don't rely on memory. Ask your social security office for form SS-5 and get a replacement of your lost card.

For the convenience of people who work, the Norfolk Social Security Office will be open from 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturdays in addition to the regular hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during each weekday.

Robert L. Swan, Field Representative of the Norfolk Social Security Office, will be in the Wayne Courthouse on Monday, July 3 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Swan suggests that people who wish an appointment write to the Norfolk office (Box 884). Allen Summer School Now in Full Swing

Summer school is in full swing in Allen Consolidated school. In the grades 1 and 3 there are 13 children enrolled, with six first graders and seven third graders. Both groups are in the SRA program. Nearly every one checks out a book a day for home reading. A star is presented to the student next day when he discusses his book.

The youngsters also are studying math and individual corrective English. All have physical education. Mrs. Audrey Isom is teacher.

Grades 4 and 5 have an enrollment of 17 students. About an hour a day is

spent on remedial work and review to reinforce basic math skills.

Comprehensive reading skills are necessary to understand verbal problems. One hour a day the pupils use the educational development laboratory controlled reader. This aid is used to develop proper eye movement, increase speed in reading and develop comprehension skills of recall, associating interpretation and evaluation.

The SRA reading lab also is used. In this program each child reads on his own level and progresses as he is ready.

Skills in speaking, writing, listening and spelling are developed through use of corrective English workbooks. Mrs. Mae Renter is the teacher.

Grades 6-7-8 numbers 11 students from Ponce, Waterbury, Allen, Laurel and Dixon. Each student is helped in each subject area and progresses at his own rate of achievement.

Composition, spelling and grammar are covered in language arts. They also study math and reading, using the SRA reading program. A book report is required each two weeks. Mrs. Ann Meyer is the teacher.

Wesley Wingett teaches world and American history, while science is taught by Mrs. Cecilia Wilch. Eleven students are enrolled. Seven are in general science and four are working mainly in biology. Much of their work is spent with the microscope and hand lens.

Mrs. Wilch has six students in her English class. Don Pack is general superintendent of the summer school which will end July 28 with parent-teacher conferences.

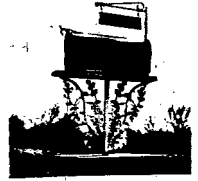

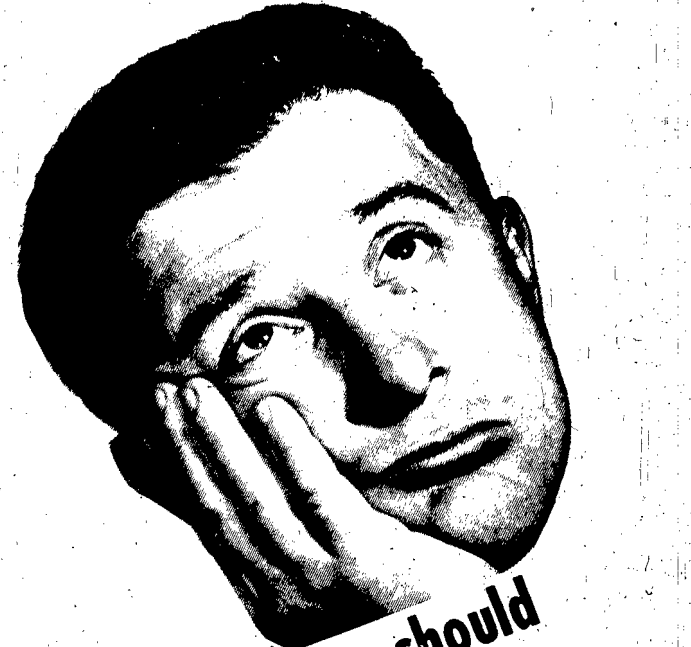
Gaeta was conspicuous in Wayne State statistics all four years. He led in batting in his first and fourth seasons and compiled a healthy college

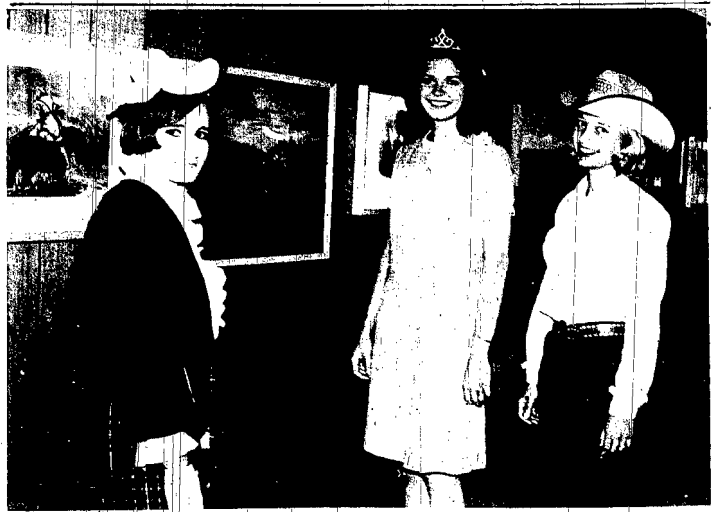

Capitol News --- Nebraska at Standstill On Reclamation Projects

LINCOLN—Legislative leaders have expressed concern over an apparent stalemate in authorization of reclamation projects for Nebraska and announced plans to remedy the problem.

They said construction of flood-control facilities is seriously behind schedule in some areas of the state.

"The future of reclamation water resource programs in many counties appears to be at the crossroads," commented Sen. Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff.

"Recent savage flooding underscored the need to move ahead as rapidly as possible in conserving and preserving what is this state's most valuable resource, namely, water."

Carpenter plans to seek \$1 million in state tax funds for land easements to clear the way for quicker federal approval of reclamation projects.

According to the Scottsbluff legislator, the Federal Government has been reluctant to appropriate money to Nebraska because state action is behind schedule.

A 1965 survey of the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission showed that only \$5 million of the \$17.5 million in planned flood-control construction has been allocated to Nebraska. Many projects have been on the drawing boards for years.

Chairman Maurice A. Kremer of the Agriculture Committee said there is an "urgent need" for an accelerated water conservation program.

"Flooding has caused anywhere from \$50 million to \$100 million in crop and soil damage. This must not be allowed to happen again," he declared.

One help, Kremer said, would be congressional funding of the \$106 million Mid-State Irrigation project.

"With Mid-State, these high waters could be put to good use instead of destroying the countryside. We could preserve the water for release during dry spells," the Aurora lawmaker said.

The Mid-State project, which has been before Congress for more than 10 years, is one of the largest development plans ever proposed in Nebraska. It would cover 550,000 acres in area on the north side of the Platte River from west of Kearney to the Silver Creek vicinity.

Plans call for construction of 23 dams and reservoirs, four hydroelectric plants for pumping requirements and distribution canals.

Kremer said an important reason for the project is the need to stabilize underground water supplies. He said it would also help to attract new industry to Nebraska.

Carpenter said unless the legislature acts to find an accelerated flood-control plan, a severe curtailment in the entire reclamation program may be inevitable.

He said ambitious goals for multi-purpose development of river basins to meet water resource demands could be detailed "in one way or another."

Nebraska cannot progress economically without more water resource conservation and development, Carpenter added.

There has probably never been a period in this state's reclamation history when there has been such a great need for well-planned, multi-purpose projects, the veteran legislator said.

to conform with other property values.

The rift developed when Tiemann advised Carpenter he had vetoed the bill, passed 34 to 5 by the Legislature two weeks ago.

Carpenter said the action made him "hopping mad" and called it the "most discourteous thing that has ever happened" to him during his senatorial career.

The bill was sought by railroad interests. It was co-sponsored by Sen. Jules W. Burbach of Crofton and recommended for passage by the Revenue Committee.

Specifically, LB 674 would have permitted each county to assess railroad property at the same level as other property instead of the current statewide assessment.

Carpenter said the purpose was to give railroads a fair tax shake. He said they are assessed at 35 percent of actual value across the state while property values are often way below this.

Tiemann, in his veto message, said the bill was bad legislation because it would repeal the state law requiring all property to be assessed at 35 percent of actual value for tax purposes.

He said non-discrimination of railroad property is already guaranteed by existing law and therefore LB 674 was "duplicative and unnecessary."

"The State Board of Equalization and Assessment...has the power to increase or decrease the assessed valuation of any county or tax district," the governor said.

Tiemann said it is important that Nebraska continue to tax property at 35 percent of actual value even though the state itself no longer levies a property tax.

"Hundreds of other governmental entities levy taxes in two or more counties. As a consequence, it is doubtful that we will ever be able to eliminate the equalization function at the state level," he said.

It was only the second veto by Tiemann since taking office last Jan. 5. In May he rebuffed a measure which would have permitted Douglas and Lancaster County election commissioners to resign and file for elective office before their terms expired.

Amendment Sent to People Nebraska's Legislature has taken a big step toward the consolidation of major power agencies under a single management board.

Receiving 36 to 8 final approval was a constitutional amendment which should authorize creation, by special law, of public corporations for the generation, transmission and sale of electricity.

The proposition will now go before the people at the November, 1968, general election.

It is the product of a June 24, 1966, State Supreme Court decision striking down the controversial 1965 power merger act on the grounds it was class legislation.

The law, most sweeping power legislation enacted since Nebraska became a total public power state in the early 1930's, sought to join the operations of Consumers, Platte Valley and Loup River public power districts.

What is Happening?

The time was when the buyer could only expect to have a one-year warranty on an appliance. Not so today. The warranty period in many cases has been extended several years. This is due to the increased confidence manufacturers have in the quality and performance ability of their products.

The consumer needs to be aware that the warranty period and what it covers varies from manufacturer to manufacturer, and even from appliance to appliance of a manufacturer. This makes it more important than ever to check the warranty before making the purchase. Check for the following:

(1) Length of time of guarantee or warranty for free replacement parts.
(2) Length of time that service is free of replacement of parts.
(3) The place of delivery where free repairs and service are available.

When the purchase is made, the date, the dealer's signature, the buyer's name and the serial number of the appliance should be placed on the guarantee to insure its validity.

Last but not least keep the warranty in a safe place easily available when needed.

County Agent's Column

Watch for Rootworms

Corn rootworm eggs appear to be later than normal in hatching in Nebraska this year. Small rootworms usually can be found in early June. Today, there is no evidence of injury, but small rootworms should be feeding within the next week.

Fields that have been treated at planting time, as well as fields that have not been treated, should be watched closely the next 10 days. The heavy and continuous rains may have rendered early treatments ineffective. Pelting rainfall can easily wash rootworm control granules off the rows, and excessive moisture tends to break down the chemicals faster.

Wet fields have delayed cultivation treatments this year, but treatments applied the next 10 days should be effective in reduction of rootworm damage. Trials by University of Nebraska entomologists indicate that granules applied up to lay-by time have been very valuable in rootworm control.

After corn is too tall for conventional tillage equipment, there is little that can be done to effectively control rootworms—so watch fields close the next two weeks or up to lay-by time.

Fast-Gaining—More Profit
Fast gaining cattle put on pounds cheaper than slow gainers! Research at many agricultural experiment stations show fast gainers are more efficient feed converters—which means more pounds for less feed. The result? A cheaper feed bill, plus the added advantage that you'll market them sooner than the slow gainers.

Feed efficiency isn't the only advantage of feeding rapid gainers. Finishing cattle out sooner also cuts down on maintenance requirements, overhead labor and interest.

Growth rate is controlled largely (40-50) per cent by genetics, but environment plays a bigger role (50-60) per cent.

Environment factors that affect growth rate include nutrition, temperature, humidity, parasites, disease, and amount of shrink involved in moving the animals.

To illustrate the importance of rate of gain, let's look at typical time and feed requirements for 600 pounds of gain from 450 to 1050 pounds:
Average daily gain 2.5 lbs., in 240 days, feed requirements 4500 lbs.; 2.0 lbs., 300 days, 5000 lbs.; 1.5 lbs., 400 days, 5700 lbs.

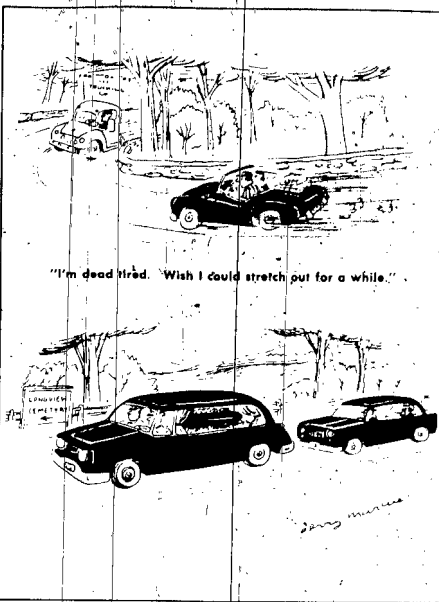

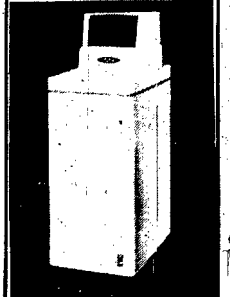
