 longer contract with schools, except for honoring for one more year the contracts with some districts.  
 On the other hand, free high school tuition is expected to be up in spite of fewer free high pupils. This comes about because the state has increased the per-pupil payments to schools. Receipts are estimated at \$70,000 for 1967, an increase over a total figure of \$64,863 in the 1966-67 school year.  
 A new source of receipts is in matching funds for vocational education and industrial education. This accounts for \$12,500, compared to zero a year ago.  
 Increased staff costs are included in a \$35,000 budget increase. This is accounted for in new learning center teacher, librarian, middle school principal, art teacher and business education teacher.  
 Salary increases through increments and the starting salary raise add another \$1,000 to the budget. All instructional staff members get these raises.  
 Costs of operating the additional building will be \$11,000. This takes into account the new high school building. The face of the building is not being helped with an elementary school building.  
 No other factors are increased costs (up about 10 percent over a year) and loss of tuition from previously contracting districts. The former adds \$1,000 costs and the latter \$12,000.  
 Supt. Haun pointed out an effort is made to get the best staff members possible. He said "The budget can be adjusted for the 'least.' As the district continues to seek better and better staff members and curriculum, more has to be paid out. Administrative costs will go up from \$20,025 to \$23,025. This includes census, auditor, salary of administration and clerical workers, professional expenses, supplies and office, legal services, public relations and other expenses.  
 Elementary teachers' salaries will be down from \$110,110 to \$110,186. However, the new middle school teachers' salaries will go up to \$74,315, the same figure being the amount of increase over zero MS salaries last year. Senior high salaries will be up from \$141,000 to \$175,767, the amount covering new teachers and salary increases.  
 Library books and other library needs will be up from \$2,000 to \$6,400. This comes about as the board makes an effort to establish quality libraries in both the new high school and the middle school.  
 Two new buses are being purchased, accounting for \$13,000 needed for the coming term not needed last term. Bus transportation costs will go up \$2,000 due to new routes.  
 Other increases are relatively small but added

together make up a large sum. What happens in the unicameral will have a lot to do with how much of this cost is to be carried by district taxpayers on the local level and how much is covered by state aid. Until this fact is final, no figures can be arrived at for the tax levy.

 Unzicker succeeds Clayton Southwick in the vocal music post. Like Southwick, he is a graduate of Northern State College, Aberdeen, S.D.  
 The new vocal music teacher will have vocal music classes in two buildings, the middle school for grades seven and eight, and the high school for grades nine through twelve.

### Extension Offices Get Radio Link

County Extension Agent Harold Ingalls will soon have his office linked by radio with extension agents in 11 other counties and with Northeast Station, Concord, and the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.  
 Midwest Communications, Hastings, has received a contract from the NU board of regents to construct the stations. Total cost is estimated at almost \$41,360.  
 When completed, the station at Concord, the ag campus in Lincoln and the extension service offices in Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Holt, Antelope, Madison, Stanton, Cuming, Thurston, Dakota, Pierce and Knox counties will be connected by FM radio.  
 County agents will have instant access to information needed to answer specific questions through this system. It will also increase effectiveness of the extension staff in the counties served and will be the first network of its type in the nation.  
 It is hoped to have the equipment installed and functioning in the Lincoln area within 60 to 90 days. Following completion of the educational television tower near Concord, it is hoped equipment can be installed to activate the entire system in early 1968. The system, a pilot basis

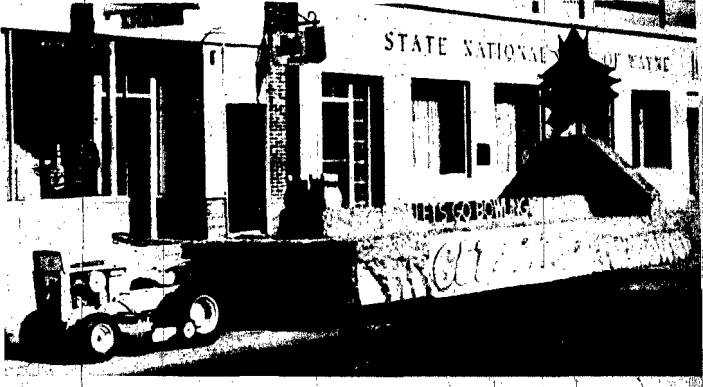

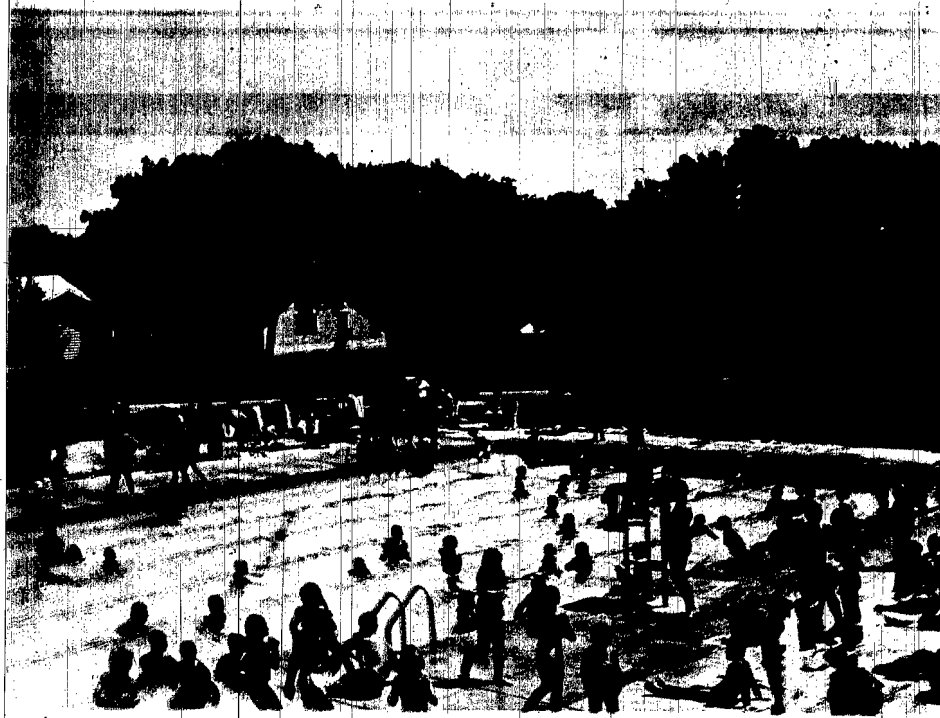

## Surprise Developments in Experiment

A surprise development in cattle fattening experiments at Northeast Station, Concord, has been reported by Walt Tolman, beef researcher. He finds it has been harder to keep fattening steers on feed with eight pounds of alfalfa haylage daily than it has with four pounds daily.

"We had expected some trouble in keeping these steers getting a low level of roughage equivalent to two pounds of hay on feed," said Tolman. "Actually, since the first 70 days of bringing cattle to a full grain feed, steers with a low haylage feed have been more regular in corn consumption and have outgained those getting twice as much roughage."

There is also a heifer-fattening experiment comparing three levels of alfalfa hay: 1 pound, 3 pounds and 4 pounds daily. The high level of hay was most successful with them

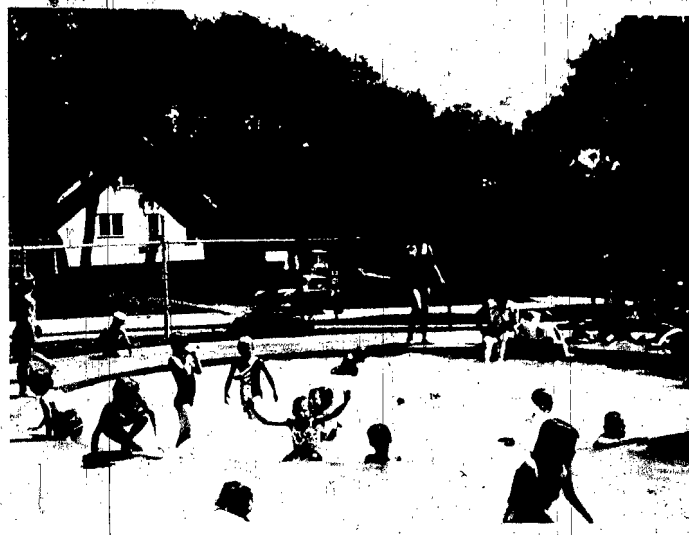
## Concord's Title Receives Boost

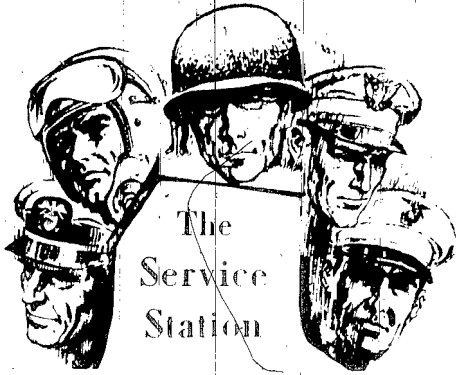

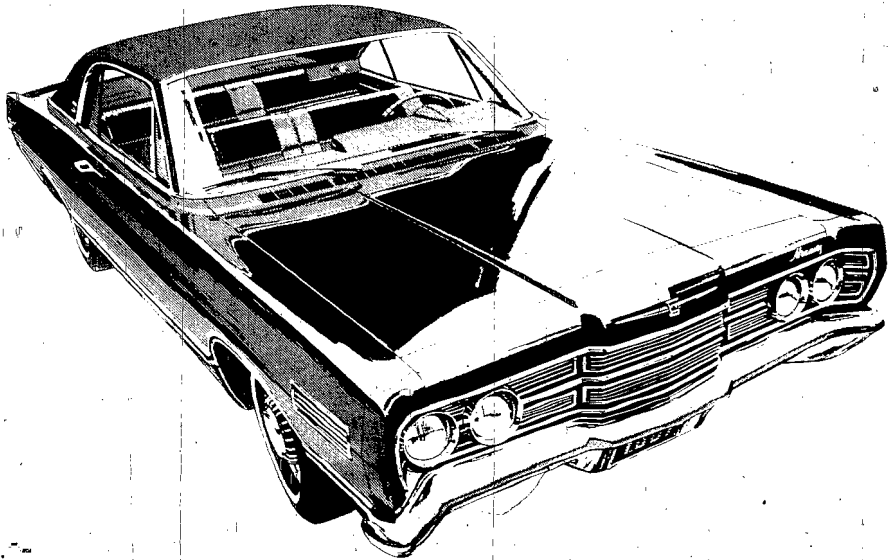
