One of the company's truck drivers, Norman An-derson, discovered the fire when he entered the build-ing belween 5:30 and six a.m., Thursday! He then used a fire extinguisher to used a fire extinguisher to put out the fire which was still smoldering. Employment Rate Up During Month of June



In the opting of 1817, Brigham Young, the Mor-mon leader, selected some 150 persons to make the first trip across the Plains and mountains. Before they

left, Young established a farm to provide food supplies for later wagon trains of Mormon emi-grants. This farm was known as Nummer Quarters or as Brigham Young's Farm. Information on this early Nebraska farming venture is scarce, but the library of the Nebraska state Historical Nociety contains enough references to allow the reconstruction of the general set-up of Summer Quarters. Young selected an area roughly thirteen miles morth of Winter Quarters. Twenty years before, troops from Fort Atkin-son had cultivated land in this area. The plot Young selected for the farm in-cluded some of this pre-viously cultivated land

this area. The plot Young selected for the farm in-cluded some of this pre-viously cultivated land. Summer Quarters was lo-cated near the later town of DeSoto between the pre-sent towns of Fort Calhoun and Hair. Operations on the farm began toward the end of March, 1847. Young ap-pointed his adopted son, John D. Lee, totake charge of the project. Lee wrote in his journal of building houses, providing forage for cattle, building bridges and breaking farm ground. The Mormons made use of bricks left froph the nearby buildings of Fort Mikinson, which had been abundoned in 1827. . .ee and Young original-by planned to farm some 2000 acres, but there is no evidence that these plans ever fully materialized. Lee wrote on April 16 that 175 acres, apparently for gardening, were divided among 23 persons, with Lee taking 70 acres,

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


