## Cause of Fire at Winside Early Thursday Unknown

A fire of undetermined origin caused extensive damage at the Schmode-Weible Transfer Company in Winside early Thursday morning. Fortunately, no windows or doors were open to ventilate the blaze and it smothered itself out.

One of the company's truck drivers, Norman Anderson, discovered the fire when he entered the building between 5:30 and six a.m. Thursday. He then used a fire extinguisher to put out the fire which was still smoldering. Manager Bruce Wiley had been in the building at 7:30 the night before and reported that everything appeared to be all right.

According to co-owner Alvin Schmode, several tools and some other equipment were destroyed by the fire. In addition, a portion of the ceiling and part of the building's framework were ruined.

Smoke damaged most of the trucks and tractors

parked in the building and the paint on one of the trucks was scorched off as a result of the intense heat. A fire on the same truck was partially burned. A damage estimate of the fire has not been made.

## Gary Munson on Road to Recovery

Gary Munson, Wayne, is well on the road to recovery following his surgery for skin grafting in Omaha July 10. As you will recall, Gary was one of the Boy Scouts who was struck by lightning on June 19, 1964.

The operation was considered a success although it turned out to be more complicated than first expected. According to Dr. Albert Black (an Omaha skin and plastic surgery specialist), the scar tissue was deeper than anticipated and therefore more skin

had to be transplanted. The skin which was grafted came from Gary's stomach.

Since the scar tissue had tightened his elbow joint, a Z-cut was made in Gary's left arm cord so he will be able to straighten his arm for the first time in over three years. No definite date has been set, but more surgery will be required to complete the grafting operation. It will probably be done at the beginning of next summer.

Gary can eat all he wants at the hospital and is under no restrictions except to remain on his back and hold his arm perfectly still at all times. ## Co-op Buys Oil Company July 15

This issue of The Wayne Herald carries a full-page announcement of the sale of Meyer Oil company to Farmers' Co-op of Wayne.

Effective date of the sale is July 15. Monday morning (today) Co-op will have its offices at the Meyer Oil Mobil station and will conduct its business and sale from there, Manager Don Brockman said.

The feed warehouse will remain in its present location for an indefinite period, Brockman explained, although a full-time man will be on duty there to help customers load out.

All personnel will remain at the Mobil station and Keith Ellis will remain on the tank wagon service.

Louis Meyer told The Herald his plans at this stage are still indefinite.

## Wayne Centennial Plans Progressing

Floats from half a dozen Northeast Nebraska towns have been entered in Wayne's Centennial Day parade August 11, according to Parade Chairman Cletus Sharer. In addition, bands from five towns have reported they plan to participate in the big festivity.

The Wayne County Historical Society is one group which will have a float in the parade. It will also have an antique booth hosted by Charles Curb, Wayne, and demonstrations on cigar-making and corn cob jelly-making will also be given. Dorothy Kabisch will host a style show during the celebration.

Commercial floats for the parade are already under construction or in the planning stage. Wayne merchants are urged to get started on their floats since the Big Day is less than a month away.

## Vo-Tech Governors Set Levy, Begin Site Search

Levies were set and officers elected in an organizational meeting of the board of governors of the new NE Vo-Tech school, held Thursday evening in Norfolk.

The levy of 1.5 mills is expected to return about \$700,000 based on new valuations of \$466,000,000 for the 14-county area. The levy is limited by law to a maximum of 2 mills. Voters approved establishment of the school by an overwhelming majority in an election June 27.

In addition to the money raised from the tax levy on the 14 counties, the state has voted \$100,000 for each of the first five such area schools established.

Heading the new organization will be F. Don MacLay, superintendent of schools in Norfolk. Vice president is Alan Cramer, Wayne publisher; secretary is Dennis Poeschl, Stanton insurance man.

Other members of the board include Craig Williams, Allen; H. C. Larson, Decatur; Gerhard Albers, Beemer; John Watson, O'Neill; Stephen Finn, Neligh; Ronald Aschoff,

Osmond; J. Keith Cook, Laurel.

The governors voted to receive letters of invitation from all communities in the 14-county district which are interested in locating the school in their area.

No deadline has been set for receiving the letters, but the board plans to start reviewing any letters received at their next meeting July 27. Such letters should be addressed to Dennis Poeschl, Stanton, Nebr.

The governors requested that no communities make personal appearances to petition for the school at the meetings.

Name of the new school will be Nebraska Vocational-Technical School No. 3.

One of the first big jobs of the governors will be to decide a site and get a physical plant into operation. Then will come curriculum and staff to be selected.

The northeast school is the third such school approved in Nebraska. Others are at North Platte and Hastings.

Federal funds are available on a 50-50 matching basis for construction of

buildings for the school. The rest of the money to operate the school would come from tuitions. Plans are to provide lower tuition rates for students coming from within the area taxed for school. Pupils from outside the area probably will pay considerably more tuition.

The school could furnish night and extension courses as well as full-time day courses. Many of the students at Milford trade school are adults holding down full-time jobs and going to school in the evening.

Colfax and Dakota counties could be permitted to join the school district. Dakota county board members earlier voted not to join because of bond issues for new high school and swimming pool.

Colfax county board voted to be included in the plan but the application was received too late to be included in the original petition. Both counties now may petition to join the district.

Counties in the area include Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Thurston, Wheeler, Boyd, Antelope, Burt, Cuming, Holt, Knox, Madison, Pierce, and Stanton.

## WSC's Aerospace Students Travel

Wayne State's aerospace workshop students flew to McConnell Air Force Base near Wichita, Kansas, Wednesday and discovered they had gone quite a way to Vietnam. It seemed that way because at McConnell pilots are trained to fly several of the jet fighters and helicopters operating in the Vietnam War.

McConnell, the class learned, is a Tactical Air Command base where the personnel are obviously playing for keeps in the war. This is the attitude which rang with assurance in the talks by first, a helicopter pilot explaining the rescue mission, then a colonel explaining the Air Force missile capability and finally a Thunderchief F-105 pilot (a major) who just came back from more than 100 combat missions in Vietnam.

The major, seated in the cockpit of a Thunderchief, explained the plane's complex instrumentation to small groups of the students. Another officer took other groups around the sleek plane to point out technical features, including the vast variety of weapons systems it could carry.

The missile colonel kept the class spellbound for an hour with an illustrated lecture showing underground missile installations, missile launchings and many other fascinating details. Though he peppered his comments with a good bit of wit, there was no question as to his professional attitude: nothing less than 100 per cent performance from the missile-men would do. The 34 workshopers and

three faculty members also visited the Cessna airplane plant near McConnell and saw part of the vast system needed to produce even a small airplane. A Strategic Air Command C-97 from Offutt AFB, Omaha, flew the class to and from McConnell.

Two more trips are on the workshop agenda. The class will also visit the SAGE air defense base at Sioux City and SAC headquarters at Offutt AFB in Omaha. Two Air Force Reserve officers, Col. Gail Miller, Oklahoma City and Lt. Col. Oscar Aarness, Lincoln, came to Wayne Friday to serve as instructors for the workshop. Both have been here in previous years.

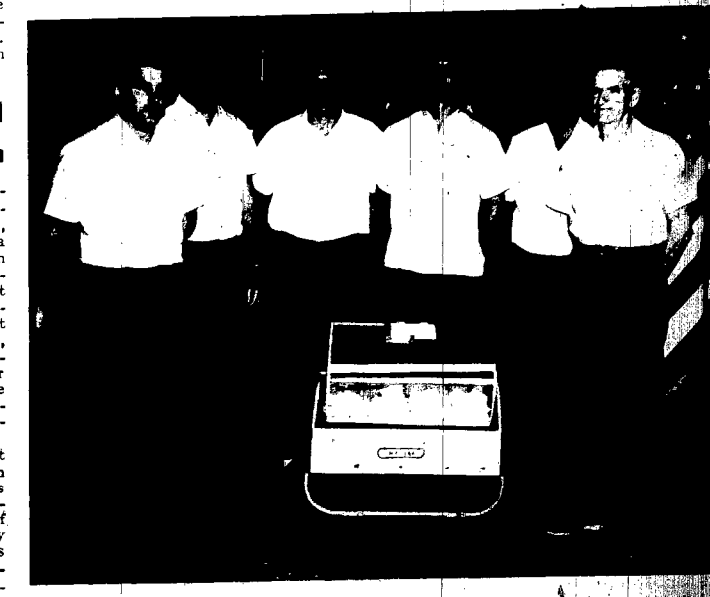
## Local Man Connected With KVTU Program

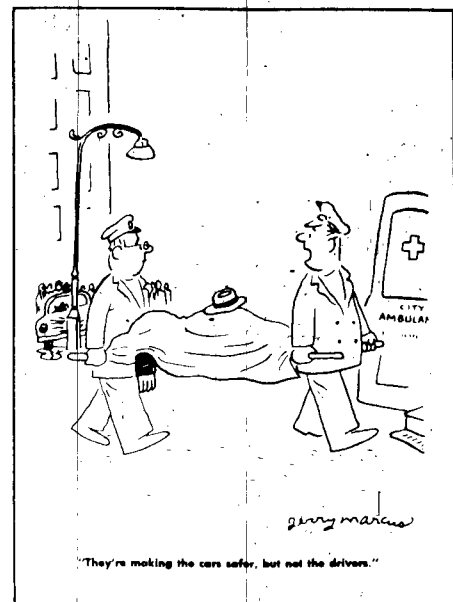

Henry Herrold, who formerly conducted a boarding house in town, has rented the John Lewis store room adjoining the latter's harness shop and will open up a restaurant.

The following taken from the Sioux City Tribune, relates to a character familiar to Wayne people: Cripple Creek, Col.—Professor Hans Albert, a native of Germany and a violin virtuosa, has been adjudged insane. The past two weeks he has been under the influence of liquor and would roam the streets muttering and gesticulating and reciting poems. (In 1967 we know—he was born 60 years too soon).

It would be greatly to the convenience of people, as well as add immensely to the appearance of the city, if during the Chautauqua season every business house along the street could leave its blinds up and the lights on throughout each evening. Nothing is more attractive than well gotten up show windows, and when goods are so displayed under a flood of light the effect is greatly heightened. 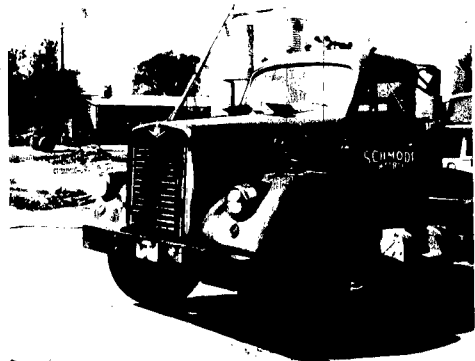
Survivors include a

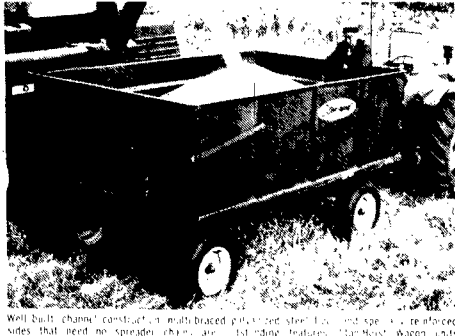
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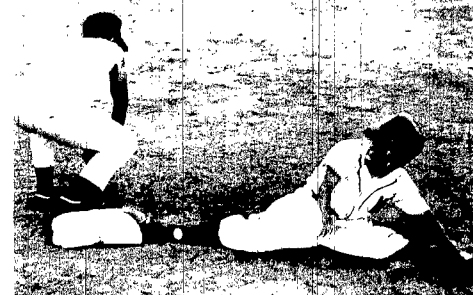
