WSC Students to Arrive in Few Days for New Term

Wayne State begins its 1967-68 year next week with the first wave of students arriving Tuesday. Freshmen are scheduled to come that day and to register Wednesday. Upperclassmen will arrive Wednesday and register Thursday. Classes begin Friday.

College officials expect enrollment to reach 2,700, perhaps 2,800, judging by the number of freshmen accepted.

All dormitories are reserved to capacity or near it, a condition that might limit enrollment of potential students who cannot find or do not want off-campus housing.

The faculty will have 26 newcomers. Fifteen of last year's faculty are not returning, and many of them left to continue graduate study.

This will be one of the rare years in the past decade that Wayne will not open a new building. However, plans call for a new science building and an addition to the library during the next biennium.

Rest of Schools Start Next Week

All schools in the area except the Wayne-Carroll and rural schools opened this week. The rest of them open this coming week. Supt. Charles Porter said rural schools will start Monday, Sept. 4. It is Labor Day so pupils see SCHOOLS pg. 2

Grow Sorghum in Many Varieties

Wednesday, Sept. 13, a field day will be held at Northeast Station, Concord. Among the features in the seven steps will be 43 commercial grain sorghum hybrids.

Grain sorghum variety evaluations are part of the University of Nebraska agronomy department's outstate testing program with entries entered in tests on a fee basis used to defray expenses. Corn, grain sorghum and forage sorghum are all tested under this plan.

Other four highlights include: A look at corn rootworm chemical effects, differences in effectiveness of chemical controls being quite evident; soybean variety trials, 16 entries, major differences in performance evident;

Weed control involving corn, sorghum and sorghum; row spacing and plant population; corn, sorghum and beans; nitrogen.

Driver's License Renewal System Will Be Different

Driver's license time is here again but this year a different system is in effect due to a new state law. County Treasurer Leona Balde suggests that driver's licenses be presented for renewal at her office instead of by mail due to the fact each license will have a different rate fee and this has to be computed at the office.

In past years it has been possible to mail licenses in because everyone paid the same amount. This time with the new system going into effect where renewal will come from the driver's next birthday, the treasurer and her staff will have to figure out how much each driver will pay, sobring old licenses to the office will help a lot.

New Runway at Airport Open to Air Traffic Friday

After being closed to traffic for four months, the Wayne airport opens for limited service Friday, Sept. 1. The surfaced runway is ready but the lights are not installed yet so no night landings or take-offs can be allowed.

Manager Don Johnson said the airport closed May 1. The June rains had delayed work a month and work was delayed at other times for various reasons throughout the construction season.

The new runway surfacing is 2,800 feet long, 50 feet wide and 11 inches thick. Also provided is a taxi strip from the hangar area to the runway.

School Nurse Needed; Bus Service Indefinite

A school nurse is needed for District 17 schools, according to Supt. Francis Haun. Applications are now being taken from registered nurses in the area. Bus service is still "up in the air" in the district.

The school nurse will serve Carroll Elementary, St. Mary's Catholic, Wayne Elementary, Wayne Middle School and Wayne High School. The position comes under the Title I program of the federal government and calls for a 40-hour week.

As for buses, the first of the week two new ones had not arrived. The school board has been notified that one will be here this week and one will be here the early part of September.

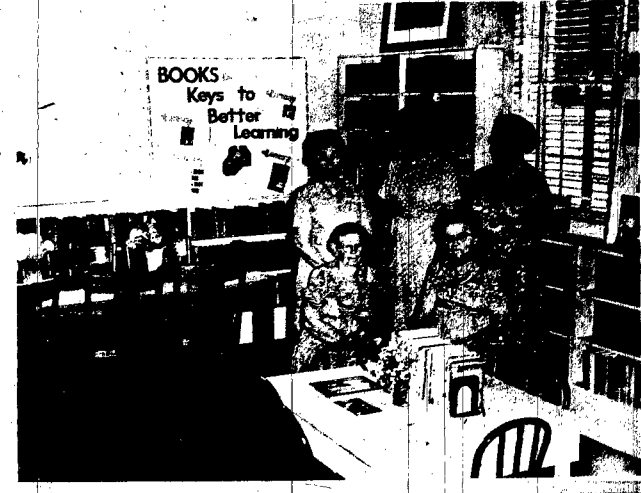

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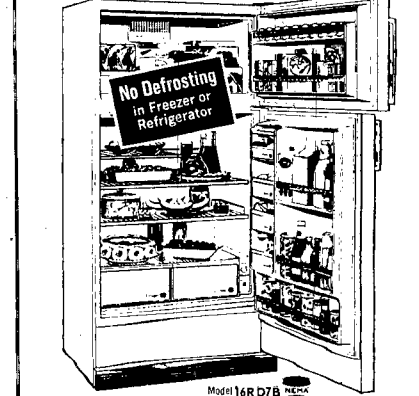



are unable to care for the yard work, snow removal and other such tasks. Further details on what low-rent housing project means, will be given from time to time. More information is promised as early as next Monday's edition of The Herald.

Sewer projects came in for a variety of reports. Councilman Banister reported Sewer District 30 has not been accepted yet so no one can have connections made although many are ready. He said compaction tests show the line has not been thoroughly compacted. The council may ask the contractor to recompact the line before accepting it, being afraid a more paying trouble similar to that encountered on Miracles Road otherwise.

On the other hand, Sanitary Sewer District 31 on the grounds Road is complete. Property owners can now have connections made.

The council approved plans and specifications for storm sewer between Fourth and Seventh Streets and Sherman. Bids will be advertised for at once and construction is expected to fall.

Water line work is going on also. The extension to the Wriest Addition is complete, the engineer reports. Pipes are in place for a 12-inch line from the east when new city wells are put down.

Street improvement work considered included Street Improvement Districts 54 and 55 on East Sixth from Dearborn to Cecil Wriest's Second Addition and in the Wriest Addition.

Plans and specifications were approved for two alley improvements. One would be for the exit from the hospital between Third and Fourth Streets and the other calls for paving the alley south from Wayne Elementary as an added exit for one-way traffic.

Councilman Wittig reported most of the sidewalks proposed in the school areas are now laid. The council passed a motion instructing the attorney to instigate proceedings for the placement of sidewalks on both sides of Oak Drive west of the school property.

According to Councilman McLean, contractors have completed runway surfacing at the airport, and the seeding and lighting will be finished soon. A dedication service is planned soon but the airport is to be open for daylight use starting Sept. 1. Concrete work around the refueling area of the gas pumps will be undertaken soon.

Fred Hunt of H & S Engineering Co., met with the council. He said his part of the contract on the piping for the new power plant was finished except for some painting. Test runs on the new unit should be made yet this week, the council was told.

Two new traffic changes were added to city laws. One calls for no parking on the south side of Ninth Street from Windsor to Pine Heights Road. The other calls for a stop sign for traffic entering Third Street from Wilcliff on the south.

While talking of streets, the matter of snow removal at this winter was discussed. City Clerk Sherry reports it was agreed the city is well-prepared for the removal of snow from city streets this winter.

Two communications matters came up. One is the proposed communications system for the county, city and hospital as far as ambulance service is concerned. The need has been resolved by buying a minimum of equipment and using remote units. Present county equipment with a remote unit at the hospital will be used to give city and county lawmen a direct hospital direct contact.

A citizen's band radio unit will be purchased for the Wayne Police Department. This will give the police contact with CB units in the area for storm warning alerts, tornadoes, blizzards and other emergencies.
