After a wedding trip to Missouri the couple will reside in Lincoln.

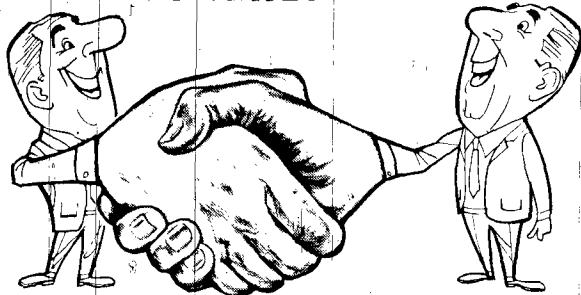

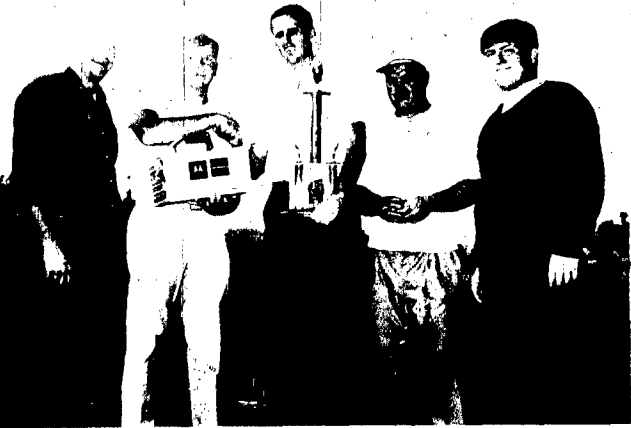

### Hoskins Racers Win At Albion, Norfolk

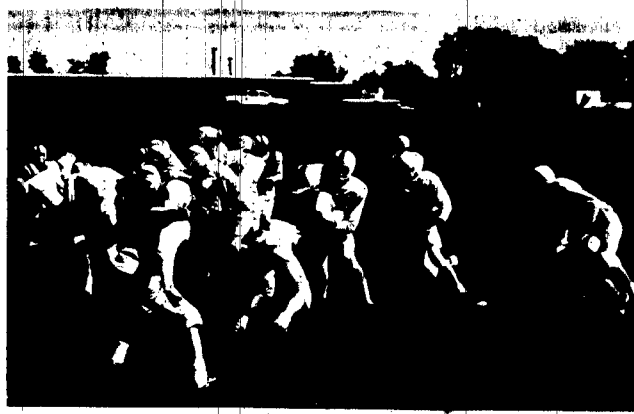

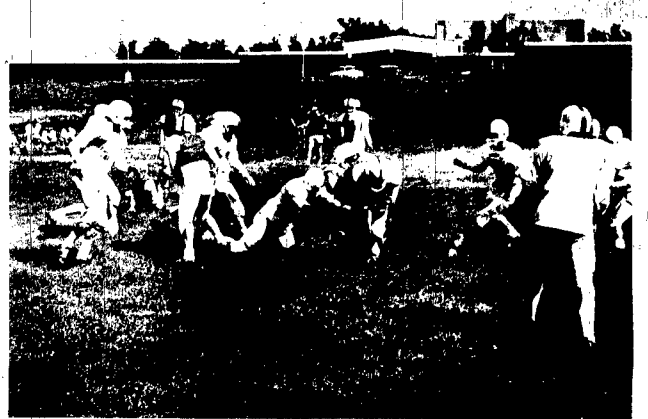
