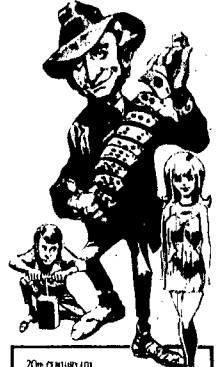

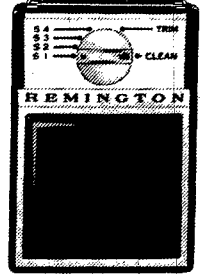

**Postmasters Expect**

**Little Bundles of Joy**

Postmasters at Allen, Carroll, Concord, Dixon, Hoskins, Wakefield, Wayne and Winside are expecting little bundles of joy. These little bundles are made up of Christmas cards, tied into bundles to separate those that are going out-of-town and

those that are local.

The postal officials point out that if cards are put in such bundles they can be identified as local or out-of-town with free labels obtainable at the post offices. Then they will bring joy to the recipients and joy to the mail handlers.

What's more, this system will speed the handling of mail in each post office, enabling cards

to go out on the first dispatch and get to the addressees faster. Mailing early, often, legibly and with zip codes will also help. Return addresses should be used.

Dec. 11 is the deadline for mailing airmail overseas if you want the mail to get to the addressee by Christmas.

Finally, everyone can help one more way - by mailing several times a day rather than waiting until just before closing. Postal workers too often have big loads of mail to "work" in the afternoon when they could have had much of it earlier in the day if mailing had been done earlier. In Wayne, carrier route patrons are asked not to leave big bundles of cards for carriers to pick up but to mail them at the post office.

**Raise-Age for Aid Offered Dependents**

The maximum age limit for sons and daughters of veterans entitled to VA educational financial assistance has been raised from 23 to 26, according to Chris Bargholz, Wayne County veterans service officer.

Veterans who have died or who are permanently and totally disabled as a result of service-connected injury or illness may receive up to \$130 a month for 36 months of full-time college or vocational study. Lesser grants are paid for part-time study.

Generally, this is open to those 18-26 but it may be offered after the age of 26 in some cases and before the age of 18 in some others. Those handicapped physically or mentally may get spe-

cialized training. Bargholz can offer information on this program, applying, schools approved for the courses and other matters. Information may also be received by writing VA Regional Office, Lincoln.

The first occurred at the infamous Seventh and Main intersection. Sherman Eddy, Dixon, was eastbound, stopped at a stop sign, saw no one coming and

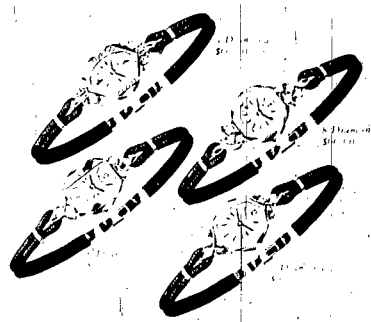
pulled onto Main to turn left. He turned in front of the southbound car of Duane Fulton, Creighton.

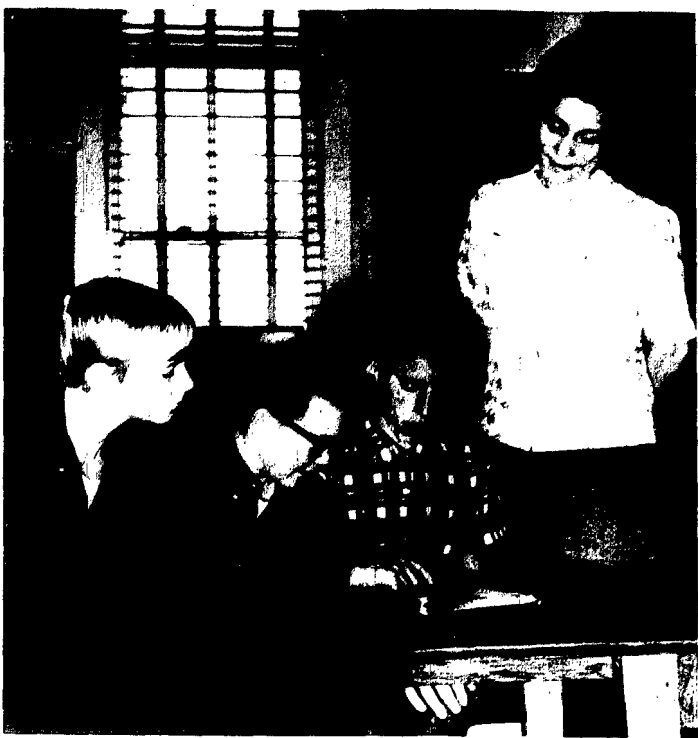
# 'Teacher Agrees to Sweep School Room and Build Fires' - in 1892

"Teacher agrees to sweep school room and build fires when necessary free of charge," was a standard part of teachers' contracts at District 71, northwest of Wayne around the turn of the century. Facts of the district's beginning 75 years ago Friday, Dec. 8, came out this week.

Mrs. John Heam, teacher, was shown the record book that had been found among some other books of the school five miles west and three miles north of Wayne. In going through the book, Mr. and Mrs. Heam found that

the district was organized 75 years ago this week.

First entry in the book reads like this: "Disember (sic) the 8 1892. School meeting called at W. R. Mick's Thursday 8-1892. Meeting called to order by W. R. Mick. Elected Ben Cox for Chairman District 71 Range 27-3 Sect. 30. Elected School officers Mr. Fred Hoefeldt Treasure, Mr. W. R. Mick Director, Mr. Benjamin Cox Moderator. School House voted on and carried to be built on south west corn of

Section 29.

Elizabeth Hayes was the first teacher, her term being for four months starting in March, 1893. Her salary was \$30 a month.

Other teachers in later years

received salaries ranging from \$23 to \$35 a month. Among these were Frances Hench, Mary A. Seace, Sara Caroley, Myrtle Ford, Ella Williams, Emma Richardson, W. J. Robinson, Ella

Huck, Clara Whitney, Mamie Hughes and Sylvia Kelley.

First pupils were Henry Hoefeldt, John Hoefeldt, Minnie Hoefeldt, Laella Mick, Sadie Mick, Ethel Mick, Blanche Frye, Netta Frye, Josie Frye, Bertie Perfect and Elva Mundhenke. There were 13 in all, just two more than there were 75 years later.

Among pupils listed for other years, only the Hefti family is still represented. Martha, Elsie and Clarence Hefti were listed among pupils in the early 1900's and J. R. Hefti was moderator.

Rodney Hefti is an eighth grade pupil at District 71 now. He is the only pupil who had relatives listed in that early book. J. R. Hefti was his grandfather and the other Heftis were relatives too.

There are several pupils listed in early years of the school who are still in the Wayne area. Included are Oscar Swanson, Howard and Ross James and Pearl Stone Griffith.

District records show some of the expenditures. Material to build the school cost \$519. Labor came to \$145. This put the total cost at \$664. An additional \$40 was spent on books.

Among the expenses in those first years were these entries: Glass, 35 cents; nails, 5 cents; seven window shades, \$1.75. Coal was a big item, the district usually buying around three dollars worth at a time.

No formal observance of the 75th anniversary of the district Friday is planned. However, Mrs. Ream said the children have shown so much interest in the history of the district and more information may be forthcoming so there could be an observance of some type after the holidays.

## Student Producers, Actors, Others Shine in WSC One-Act Productions

Given a chance at directing, three Wayne State College students showed considerable talent in that field. They have already been acclaimed for work on the stage. Their laurels Sunday, Monday and Tuesday night were shared with fellow students who did an outstanding job backstage in props, settings, makeup, lighting and other facets of theatre.

Dr. Helen Russell gives the students a chance to direct on their own each year. In three years of seeing these one-act "Tonight at Eight" student-directed presentations, it seems to this writer this year's out-

put was uniformly best yet.

Gerry Melis directed "Snowangel," a bit of adult entertainment with just two cast members. Lynn Froid in her first stage role portrayed a prostitute and Bob Pierson was a young man, handsome enough to appeal to a hardened woman who had seen all kinds.

Miss Froid had the most lines and was in a constant high-strung and sarcastic role which she handled extremely well. Pierson, who has appeared in other productions at WSC, was again top notch, his best moments coming as he recalled the past

with another girl and suddenly switched from concern for his own needs to understanding the girl's own longings.

An offbeat and strange production was "Objective Case," directed by Susan Cook, a real favorite on the stage who proved she rates with Melis as a capable director of challenging productions. The importance of the direction in both plays cannot be over-emphasized.

Brad Ford and Priscilla Shortenhaus directed their lines at the audience instead of to each other. Each one often had to stand minutes at a time with an expressive face while the other spoke to the audience. Both were unusually capable in using facial expressions, an ability they

possess in far greater measure than most student actors.

Two lesser parts were played by Edd Fox and Chris Boger as an old man and an old woman. Makeup jobs here, especially for Fox, showed painstaking efforts of students to do things the best possible, one of the reasons WSC plays are so enjoyable. Fox was hunchbacked, quivered and quaked and adapted the voice of an old man. Miss Boger's trembling voice of an old woman (with a moustache yet) was good.

Perhaps Ron Wachholtz faced the biggest challenge as a director in getting his cast to speak in an Irish brogue. As far as could be determined, they sounded Irish, yet spoke distinctly enough so there was never a doubt about what was being said or implied.

Steve Millnitz and Linda Garvin had the lead roles, Millnitz appealing to all the Irish saints for help in getting out of a predicament and Miss Garvin sympathizing, condemning and finally stealing. Millnitz is another first-rate actor with considerable ability to use facial expressions for maximum effect. Miss Garvin improves with each role and showed a variety of talent in

an unsympathetic role.

Sandra Spellman, Arne Nelson, Rita Mines and Fred Wigington all had minor roles, but here again each one had been dressed and made up as if their roles might be the most important of all.

But almost stealing the show was Roger Bengtson, who spoke with an Irish brogue, even while gurgling down drinks, staggered about the room and in general was splendid as a Dubliner just home from a pub. He will bear watching in future WSC productions.

The "In-the-round" productions with audience on three sides have an intimacy about them the bigger productions lack. This year the audience seemed completely enthralled with the action in all three plays, a circumstance that is a credit to the students and Dr. Russell for the material was not as good in some cases as other plays have been in the past, but the determination by students involved to excel made the plays better entertainment than anyone had a right to expect.

Included in the credits should be: Ken Dugan and Blake Oleson as technical directors; Beverly Fuller, Mary Welke, Debbie McClure, stage managers; Bruce Pease, Mike Reese, Fred Wigington, stage crew; Linda Mines, Larry Larsen, Jan Bard, Sharon Cleveland, Marjorie Prechette, Kathy Miesfelt, properties; Arne Nelson, Linda Knoebel, Georgia Wachholtz, Connie Schmuecker, Claudia Thomas, Judy Zohner, publicity; and Linda Knoebel and Georgia Wachholtz, house managers.

Next production will be "The Fantasticks," an international award-winning musical in February. "My Sister Eileen" had been scheduled but a musical was substituted after the season started.
