



The postal officials point out that if cards are put in such bundles they can be identified as local or out-of-town with free labels obtainable at the post offices. Then they will bring joy to the recipients and joy to the mail handlers.

What's more, this system will speed the handling of mail in each post office, enabling cards

to go out on the first dispatch and get to the addresses faster. Mailing early, often, legibly and with zip codes will also help. Roturn addresses should be used. Dec. 11 is the deadline for mailing airmail oversess if you want the mail to get to the addressee by Christmas.

Finally, everyone can help one more way—by mailing several times a day rather than waiting until just before closing. Postal workers too often have big loads of mail to "work" in the afternoon when they could have had much of it earlier in the day if mailing had been done earlier. In Wayne, carrier route patrons are asked not to leave big bundles of cards for carriers to pick up but to mail them at the post office.

### Redistricting in Nebraska Calls for Special Session

Congressional redistricting, and its political ramifications, swiftly moved to the fore in Nebraska following a decision by a three-judge federal court voiding present alignment.

Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann announced a special session of the legislature, the fourth in the past decade, will be held in January to cope with the problem. The governor said a preliminary study by his office shows the reapportionment woes could be remedied by removing 50,000 inhabitants from Rep. Robert V. Denney's district.

inhabitants from Rep. Robert V.
Denney's district.

He said 20,000 of these would have to be placed in Rep. Glenn tunningham's district and 30,000 in Rep. Dave Martin's district.

The chairman of the legislative committee which could hold public hearings on the controversy declared he would attempt to gerry mander the districts togive the Republican Party a ballot box advantage.

Sen. Terry Carpenter of the Government Committee said he expects the majority of his colleagues to join in the effort at the special session of the Unicameral.

cameral.

"This is a Republican legislature and we're going to take care of the Republican Party," (arpenter said.

"I'm going to do everything within my sphere of influence to see that the districts are arranged so the Grand Old Party (GOP) gets the best deal."

Senators are elected on a non-

(GOP) gets the best deal."
Senators are elected on a nonpartisan ticket. There are, however, 36 Republicans compared
with only 12 Democrats in the
current legislature. One lawmaker, Arnold Ruhnke of Plymouth,

er, Arnold Ruhnke of Plymouth, belongs to neither party.
Carpenter, a registered Republican, said Nebraska Democrats forced the state to redraw the congressional district boundaries "and now they are going to pay dearly for it."
Sen. Jules W. Burbach of Crofton, who ran unsuccessfully for the Democratic nomination for governor last year, said he hopes the redistricting can be accomplished "with a minimum

Judge Donald Lay of the U.S.

Judge Donald Lay of the U.S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals and U.S. District Judges Robert Van Pelt and Richard E. Robinson convened as a special court to hear the case.

"It is clear that...the three congressional districts now existing in Nebraska do not now provide and never have in the past provided substantial equality in population," the panel's decision said.

The present district boundaries were set up by the 1961 legislature after Nebraska's U.S. House representation was cut
