

## WH Musical to Be Monday

A Christmas musical with some added music that works in well with the Christmas atmosphere will be presented Monday, Dec. 18, at 8 p.m. in the Wayne City Auditorium by the vocal and instrumental music departments of Wayne High School.

Donald Schumacher is director of the instrumental division, which in this case will be the concert band. Joseph Unzicker directs vocal music, his units in this program being the concert choir and chamber choir.

The two teachers have chosen some of the more beautiful and

difficult Christmas songs and added some of the most beautiful music not heard at Christmas ordinarily but blending in with the sounds of the season.

A concert choir will appear first in several numbers followed by the concert band. Music by the chamber choir will follow and then the concert choir will return for traditional carols.

Supt. Francis Haun invites the public to attend, reminding patrons that the concert is at the city auditorium, not the high school. There is no admission charge.

Wayne State College will graduate 113 students at winter commencement Thursday, Dec. 21, with 12 of the seniors receiving honors for academic achievement.

The senator received his Ph.D. degree last year from the University of Nebraska, and since 1962 has been associate professor of political science at the University of Omaha.

## Stores Open Four Nights This Week

The following week, Wayne will return to the regular schedule. Stores will be open Thursday nights only.

## Money Here for WCC Work

A check for \$166,000 was turned over to the board of the Wayne Country Club Friday. The money will enable WCC to build a clubhouse and add nine holes at the golf course north of town.

Tom Lambert, supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration office, presented the check to Roy Coryell, president of the WCC board. Other directors were on hand for the occasion.

The money comes in a loan from FHA in its program making recreation loans available to non-profit corporations in rural towns of up to 5,500 population. Previously, loans had been available only to towns of 2,500 or less.

Receipt of the money culminates a move that started four

years ago when the club purchased 80 acres south of the present course from the Miller family with the idea of developing the course into 18 holes. Two years ago the FHA plan for bigger towns made the possibility of a loan enter the picture.

Plans call for using the present clubhouse for storage and other purposes. Last June the members of the country club voted to accept the plans and conditions for an FHA loan, the board being authorized to make the necessary arrangements to get the money, adding an additional \$22,250 from club members to make it possible.

Gollehon & Schemmer, Inc., Omaha, has been signed to do

the architectural and engineering work. Addison & Addison, Wayne, are the association's legal counsel.

Coryell said final plans for the addition should be ready in two weeks and it is hoped bids and contracts can be made up so work can start this spring when weather permits.

According to Lambert, all plans and specifications are subject to final review by FHA. He added that money not now needed can be invested in interest-bearing securities to build more funds.

The federal government aids such projects to build up recreational facilities in communities which could not otherwise have them. Loans similar to the one at Wayne have been approved in several other parts of the state.

Recreational facilities should serve more than one town, and this one is considered as an area set-up, residents of the Carroll, Pilger, Winside and Hoskins communities being eligible to use them along with farmers and college students. In all, around 13,000 live in the area to be served.

Location of the new clubhouse is planned west and south of the present WCC building. It would be in the center of the 18-hole layout when the added nine holes are completed.

## Middle School Concert Gains Praise

A packed WHS auditorium was the setting for the first program by the middle school Thursday night. Bonita Vandegrift presented her string and vocal music classes and Joseph Unzicker directed the seventh and eighth grade choir in concert.

Over 200 pupils took part, middle school pupils being joined by those from the fourth grade. Teachers from all the classes involved assisted the two music teachers.

The orchestra has never been better. In fact, one music man in attendance from another school remarked that he had never heard such a young group of string musicians play before without anyone playing off-key.

Miss Vandegrift has had this group four years and it is one of her best. Unzicker is new here but he has shown an ability to get the most out of the young voices.

Applause was held until the end due to the nature of the program. Comments heard afterward indicated patrons are well-pleased with the music department set-up that starts in elementary school and runs through middle and high school in band, orchestra and choral work.

An unusual comment was the one that took note of the well-mannered group. From fourth

through eighth grade, the boys and girls conducted themselves as ladies and gentlemen, resulting in a minimum of congestion and distraction as groups entered and left the stage.

It was a chance to see the middle school pupils together in one group. Wayne-Carroll patrons can take heart in the performance, confident that with such an outstanding program after just four months of existence, middle school shows signs of being all that had been hoped for—and more.

## Set 4-H Calf Weighing Days

Weigh days for 4-H beef project calves have been set for Thursday and Friday, Dec. 28-29, at the Wayne Sales Co. auction building, County Agent Harold Ingalls reports.

The county agent said all individual calves will be tagged at this time for identification. Pen calves, in groups of five,

will not be weighed until Mar. 2, 1968.

Individual calves weighing not more than 550 pounds will be eligible for additional premiums at the county fair. However, a change in the county fair premium list has been made to allow a wider distribution of the money allotted for the rate-of-gain contest.

Ingalls outlines the plan thus: For a purple award (rate-of-gain), \$2 will be added to the regular premium; blue award, \$1 added; and red award, 50 cents added.

The weighing crew has asked that calves be brought in between 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. each weigh day. Those seeking further information can contact the county agent.

A summary of the 1968 con-

test shows the average daily gain of 36 steers was 2.08 pounds. A dozen heifers averages 1.53 pounds gain per day. Two steers exceeded three pounds daily gain (3.3 and 3.2) while the best gain recorded by a heifer was 1.9 pounds daily.

All of those involved in beef cattle improvement pretty much agree that rate-of-gain is the best measure of economic performance. Fortunately, Ingalls says, the ability for good doing is inherited, hence finding which animals do best and where they come from are important.

Contrary to popular opinion, high-gaining animals can be and often are show winners. Ingalls said livestock shows would be highly impractical if the two were not tied together.

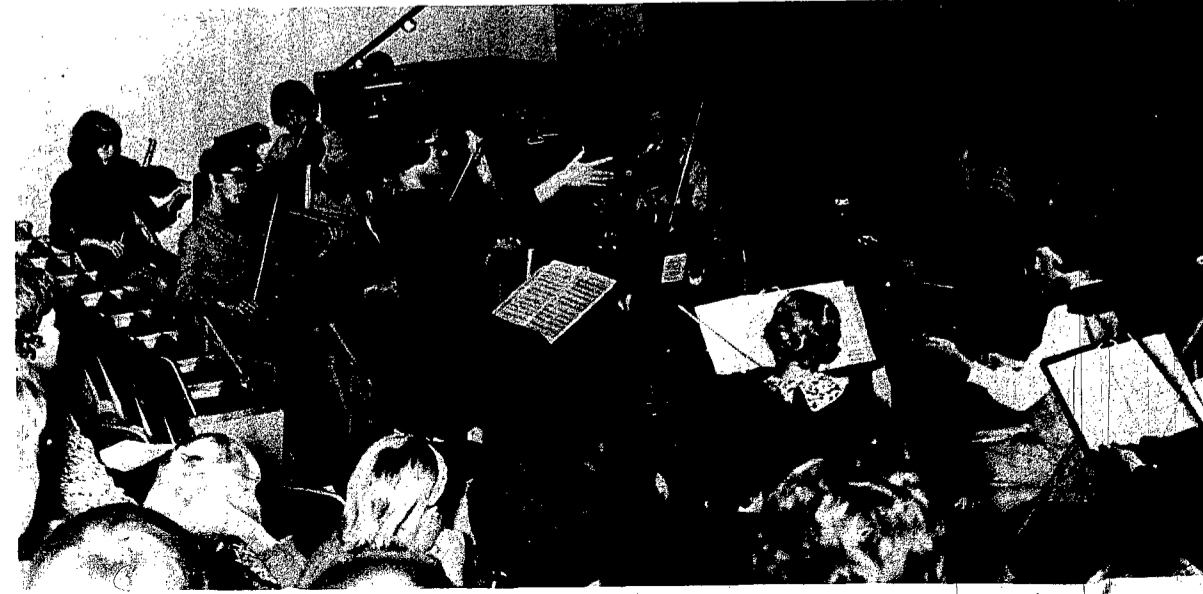

## Tractor, Two Cars in Laurel Crashes

A tractor and two cars were involved in accidents at a site 4 1/2 miles southeast of Laurel on Highway 15 Friday evening. Involved were a Concord man, a Wayne woman and a Laurel woman who teaches in Wayne.

Trooper G. N. Kinney, who was assisted in investigating by Trooper Van Winkle, reported Dwight Johnson, son of the Art Johnsons, Concord, was headed southeast on a tractor. Mrs. Earl Jones, Wayne, was headed in the same direction.

Mrs. Jones told the troopers she did not see the tractor until she was upon it, vision at that time (5:15) being bad due to dusk. She swerved but her car caught the big left rear tractor tire, the impact sending the tractor into the ditch on the right, overturning and throwing the driver off.

The Wayne woman stopped to check the tractor driver and flagged down an unidentified motorist for possible help. About two minutes had gone by. Coming from the southeast then was Vera Ebmeier, Laurel.

Miss Ebmeier told the patrolmen she saw the car of the motorists who stopped but did not see the Jones car in time. Her car hit the Jones vehicle, knocking it into the ditch to the south, the ditch being deep and wide and the Jones car traveling quite a distance before coming to a stop.

Also traveling quite a distance was the big wheel of the tractor. It came off and rolled along the highway for almost a quarter of a mile before falling over.

## Winside High Pupil Overturns in Pickup

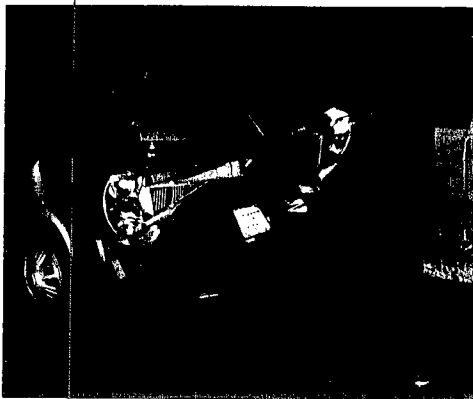

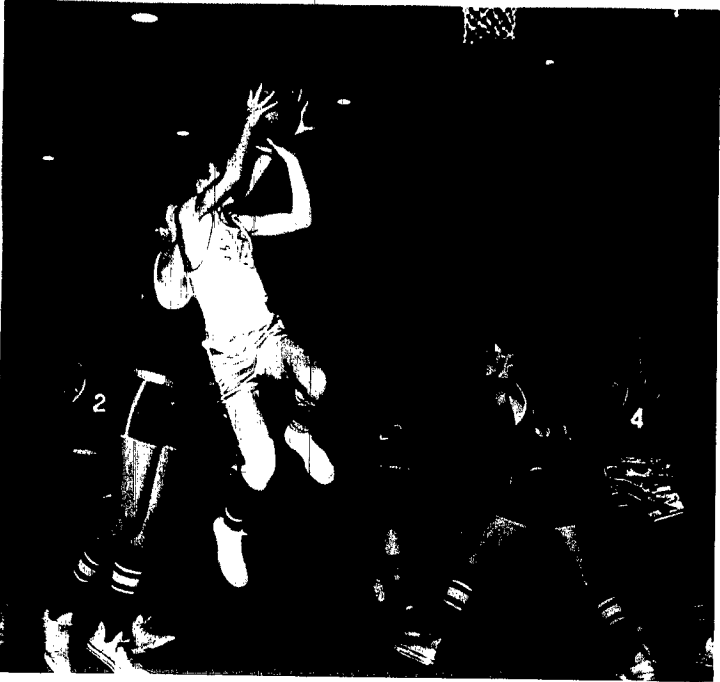

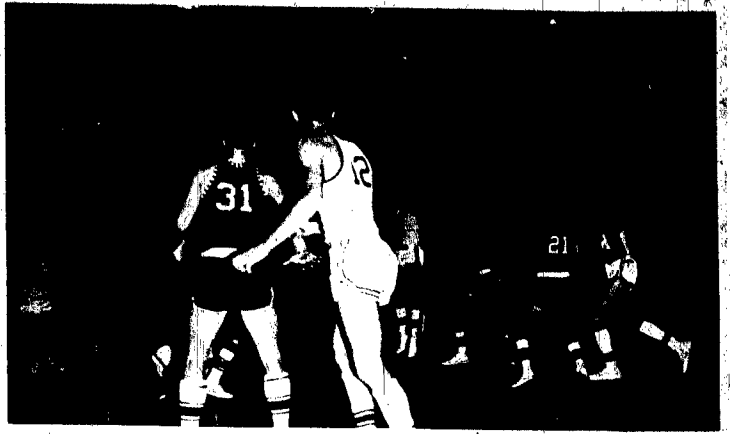
**Cage Action Light This Week in Area**

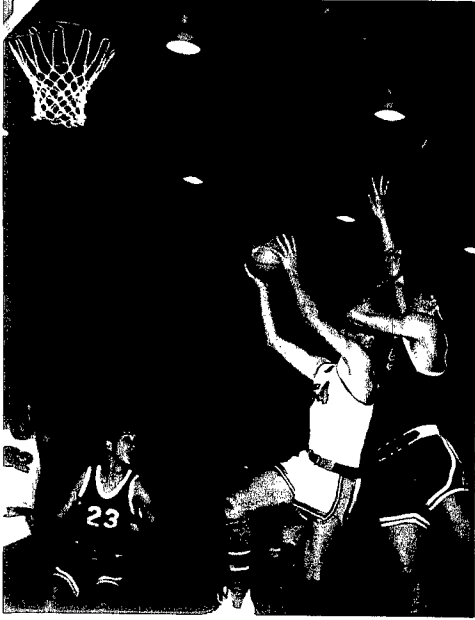

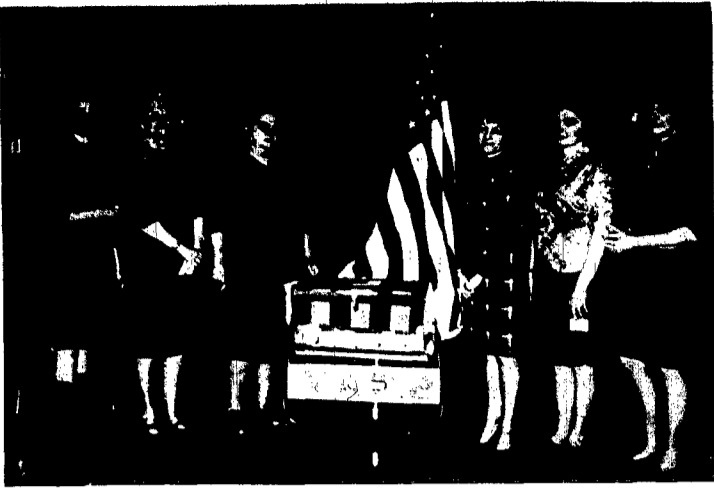

A TEN-HORSE HITCH was used in 1926 by Fry Jones, Carroll, who farmed on shares with C. H. Morris at the time. Morris took the picture (on the right) while the team was in action. The horses were pulling two 10-foot disks and covered about 50 acres a day. Most farmers used four- or five-team hitches with 10-foot disks. Jones said he used 10 head with a 40-foot harrow and eight sections and stood on an 11th horse. He was able to harrow 100 acres a day in this manner. He could plow 10 acres a day, using 10 head of horses and two gang plows. The team on the left weighed 1,800 pounds. Jones can still name each horse in this hitch. Mrs. Morris and son, Harold, farm the place where this picture was taken and they own the picture.

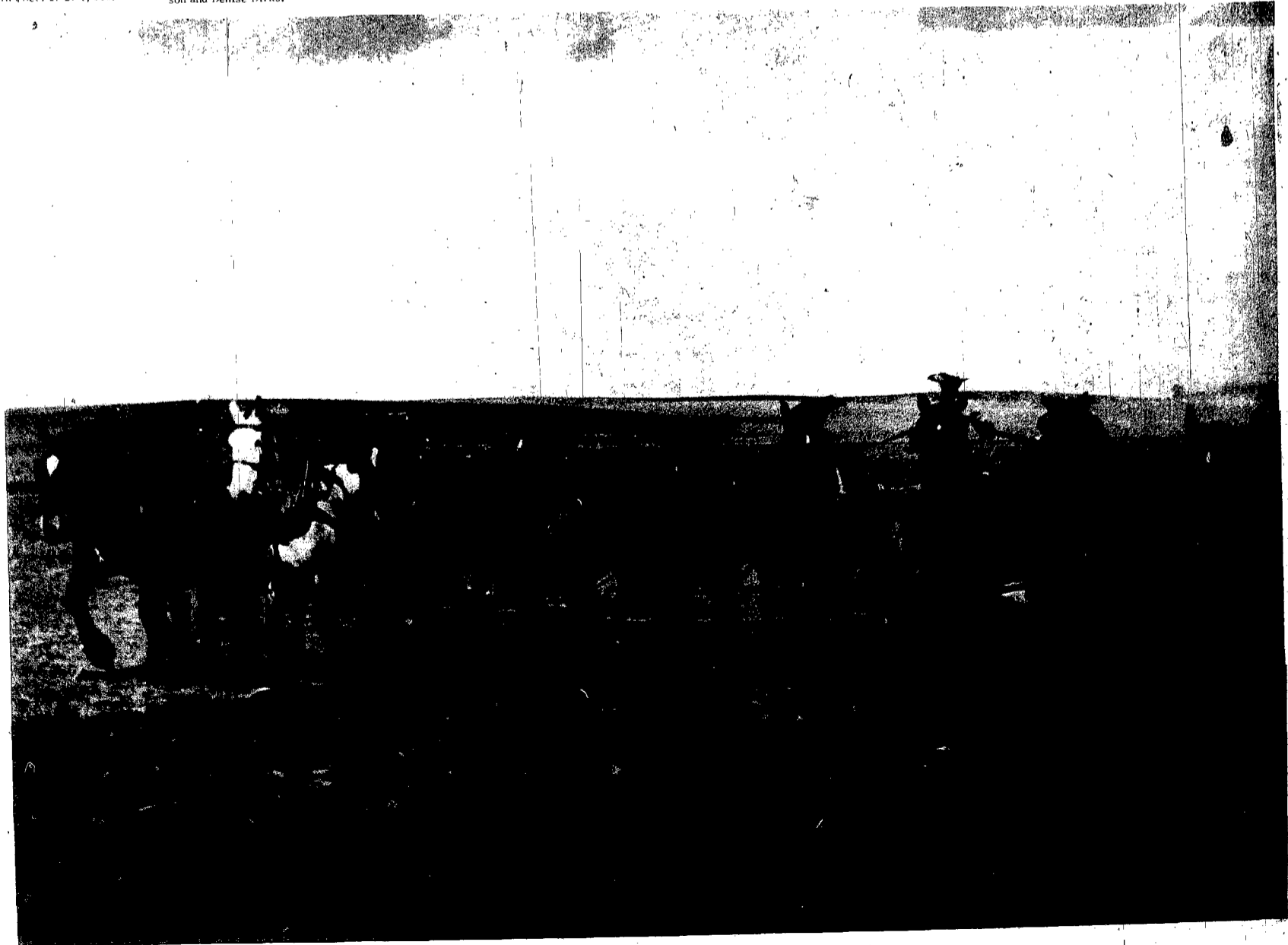

Coach Dick Nelson's Wayne High Blue Devils chalked up their first victory of the basketball season Friday night at Rice Auditorium by winning a 52-51 decision over Plainview. The final one-point margin was typical of the entire game as the teams were never separated by more than five points.

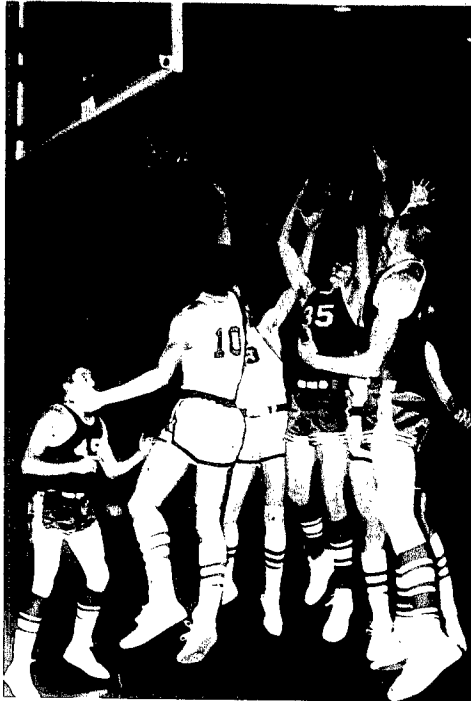
18 seconds remaining in the game.

who do not have their commodities stored in approved warehouses will be given an opportunity to do so and to participate in the programs.

Growers with original warehouse-storage loans will have three options. They may (1) redeem the commodity under program procedures, (2) deliver the commodity at the regular loan maturity date, or (3) have the loan extended by filing a notice with ASCS county office not later than the original loan maturity date.

On extended loans, the Government will pay the warehouseman all charges which have accrued against the commodity represented by the warehouse receipt from the date of deposit to the original maturity date of the loan. The first year's warehouse charges are an obligation of the producer, however, so any such charges paid by CCC for the account of the producer will be collected from the producer in the event he elects to redeem the warehouse receipt during the loan extension period.

The Government will pay all warehouse storage charges which accumulate against the commodity after the original loan maturity date. If the producer pre-pays these charges, he will be repaid by the county office upon liquidation of the loan or the anniversary date of the resale loan. If not prepaid, the Government will make payments directly to the warehouseman, covering the period during which the commodity remains under the extended loan.

Producers who wish to redeem extended warehouse loan commodities may do so by paying the Commodity Credit Corporation (1) the face amount of the

loan plus interest from the date of disbursement of the original loan to the date of redemption, plus (2) any warehouse charges paid by CCC through the original maturity date.

If the producer does not redeem the commodity during the extended loan period, the loan will be liquidated according to present procedures, and the county office will reimburse the producer for any storage charges he prepaid for the period of the extension.

Should it become necessary to reconcentrate commodities under extended loans, producers affected would be advised of the options available to them before the commodity is moved.

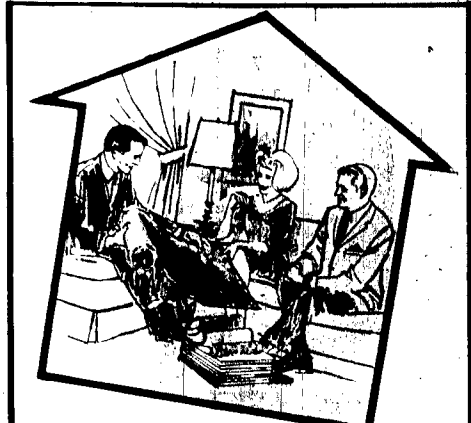

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## Answer Queries on Farm Storage Loans

In response to a number of questions about the extension of warehouse-storage loans beyond the original maturity date for certain 1967 crops, Chairman John H. Mohr, of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, today explained some of the details of the program.

The extension (resale) of loans will be available on eligible 1967-crop wheat, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, oats, and barley. The resale 1967 crops may be stored either in commercial warehouses in all areas, or on farms where the ASC State committee determines that the crop can be safely stored on farms. The Nebraska ASC State Committee has determined that the crops can be safely stored on farms, the same as in past years.

An extension has also been announced for 1964, 1965, and 1966 feed grain resale loan crops stored on farms.

"In previous years, resale programs have been made available only for crops which were stored on farms," the Chairman said, "so these farm-storage resale loans are fairly well understood in areas where they have been in operation." However, the extended warehouse-storage loans for certain 1967 crops are a new feature, so there may be need to clarify this phase of the program.

Producers eligible for price support on the 1967 crops of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats and barley, and soybeans will also be eligible for these extended loans. They will include those who (1) already have warehouse-storage loans, (2) may wish to convert farm-storage loans to "resale" warehouse-storage loans at maturity, or (3) have eligible commodities not under loan.

All eligible producers will be notified of the availability of the resale program at least 30 days before the original maturity date of the loans. Before that date the county office must be notified by the producer of his intention to participate. Producers

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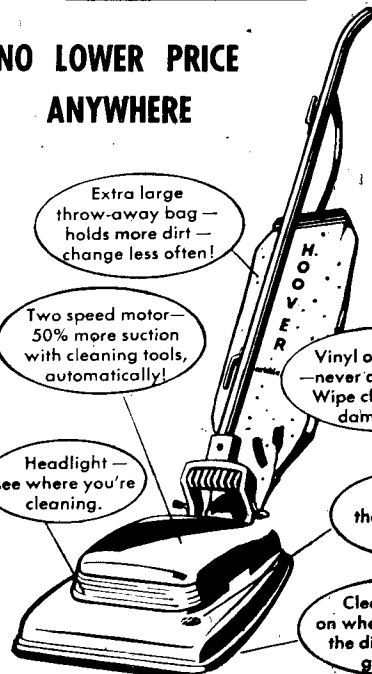

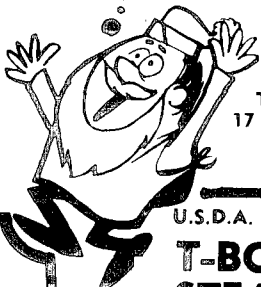

You may not agree with an editorial, but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Needed: A New Landfill

The City of Wayne is looking for another landfill location. The one being used now will be filled by the middle of this coming year and a search is on now for another site located within five miles of town.

Anyone who has been out to the landfill should be aware of the advantages this type of work has to both the city and the land-owner. Properly operated, a landfill returns land to usefulness and creates a better appearance when it is complete.

Of course, Wayne is fortunate in having Henry "Heinie" Victor to take charge of the landfill.

His work is so expert and his handling of the operation is so complete, the Wayne landfill has been cited by the state as a model after which other cities could pattern landfills.

No there you are, farmers, near or far. Here is a chance to get those eyesores filled. Here is a chance to have the city take over work for you that would cost you money if you had to pay for it.

Not every location is suitable for landfill operations. For those that are, the city has an answer in the form of Heinie Victor and his thorough workmanship. Is there any chance of the next landfill for Wayne being on your farm?—EG.

## West-Central Here To Stay

It is good news indeed to know West-Central Airlines has earned the confidence of Wayne business leaders and Wayne State College representatives enough so that money has been put up giving Wayne a director on the board and assuring the airline service continuing to this area.

If you will recall, WCA came here with the agreement to give Wayne a chance to prove it would use the airline. Then came delays at the airport, delays in lighting, winterizing of planes and other setbacks. WCA lived up to its bargain and more, staying long after its promised 45 days.

Now the air service is to continue. Wayne will have three flights a day from Wayne to Omaha-Lincoln and from Omaha-Lincoln to Wayne. Week-ends there will be two flights a day. All have been scheduled to connect with the regional and national airlines serving Omaha.

What is also important is the fact Omaha is getting a hearing regarding new airline service. It is a foregone conclusion that the metropolitan area will soon have competing airlines offering more service to more places and possibly competi-

tives rates that are even more economical than they are now.

The airlines are monopolizing the transportation business. Having connections can mean a great deal to a community the size of Wayne and whereas in the past the city has had to apologize for its train service, it can now boast about its airline service.

Wayne, through Omaha, is connected with the world by airline. It is a reassuring vote of confidence on the part of WCA to have the firm give the city this chance to prove it merits service and it is just as reassuring on the part of Wayne to find the money to provide a directorship on the West-Central Airlines board.

With lights available, night flights resume. Down-in-the-morning and back-at-night flights to Omaha are possible. This is a service some had dreams of gaining but others feared was just wishful thinking.

Where do we go from here? Up, obviously, via WCA. The entire area should share this new service with Wayne. It's an extremely fine Christmas present portending a happy new year.—EG.

## When A Bargain Is Not

A bargain is not always a bargain just because it costs less money. By now, it would appear that Wayne County residents would be alert to the fact you don't get something for nothing and very seldom get something for next-to-nothing. However, bilking the public is still a matter of several billion dollars in business each year.

Grab any pulp magazine. It will have offers that are almost unbelievable. You know what—they ARE unbelievable.

One Wayne businessman told of an offer he heard about for an item he needed. It was priced much cheaper than a similar item here so he went against his better judgment and went somewhere else to buy.

The first thing the bargain-offering outfit tried to do was to get him to accept a substitute because the item he wanted to buy at a low price was "not too reliable." The local man declined. Then the price started coming down. Still the local man resisted, insisting he wanted that bargain he had heard about.

This went on and on, the price on a substitute item coming down until it was only about twice the price the Wayne man had heard the bargain item was selling for. (You can imagine how high the price was on the substitute item to finally get down to where it was only twice the cost of the other.)

Well, our friend is stubborn. He absolutely insisted he would not buy until he could have that item he heard about being so cheap. Finally, he got his way with the admonition that he was not going to be happy with it at that price. To make a long story longer, he found he was not happy with it at that price and wouldn't have been at any other price. It was not worth much. It was no bargain.

Beware of this type of thing. When something is priced unreasonably low it is often a lead and you can be told that the item is no longer available or you can be led to take a substitute that often has a price higher than you would

ever have paid at home.

Then there's this matter of standing behind what is sold. Wayne merchants know you. More important, you know them. They sell the clothing, appliances, furniture, tools, cars, equipment, lumber, repairs, flowers, groceries, drugs, gifts, jewelry, shoes, musical instruments, television sets and other items with the idea that you may want to buy again and if you are satisfied today you may be back tomorrow for more purchases. They want you to be satisfied and they will make sure you are.

Go some place where you are a stranger. They do not know if you will be back or not. Some of them do not care what you're stuck with tomorrow as long as they make the sale today. What you do tomorrow and where you buy is of no concern. They are after the fast buck. If you're dissatisfied, you may have to stay that way.

A true bargain is one where you receive more for your money than you expect to receive. Sometimes it can be an expensive item sold at a low price. Sometimes it can be a cheaper item that is all but given away. In any case, if you do not pay more than what the purchase is worth, you have not been taken. You have a bargain.

Trust your hometown merchant to be a guide. He is here today. He will be here tomorrow. He handles brand names you know, brands built on reputations of longstanding.

A sucker is born every minute. Millions of people are making their livings looking for these suckers. Don't be one. Be sure before you buy by being sure you get what you're paying for. Wayne businessmen can help you be sure you are not added to any sucker lists.

Learning how the bill-artists work can be a costly lesson. You won't flunk the course if you don't take the test. Buy with your eyes open, your mind alert and your confidence placed with those you know you can trust—your fellow residents of this city.—CEG.

I am enclosing an item from the Columbus Daily Telegram concerning the Congressional reapportioning which I thought might be of interest to your readers.

In addition to the information given in the article, I have just figured out that in the First District the area south of the Platte have 428,293 population compared to the area north of the Platte which is northeast Nebraska, have 201,801 population. This is 1966 population figures developed by the University of Nebraska. This gives the city of Lincoln with a population of 175,414, almost a leadpipe situation on electing a congressman for southeast Nebraska. I am suggesting that we put Boone County back into District One and take out Polk, York, Fillmore and Thayer counties and put them in District Three, and put Otoe and contiguous areas into District Two. This will give northeast Nebraska a much better representation in Congress than we now have. Senator Warner's plan would just about eliminate northeast Nebraska as a political power in Congress.

## Nebraska

Mari Sandoz

One of the most prominent of Nebraska's feminine literary figures is Mari Sandoz. The Nebraska State Historical Society contains some biographical information and a rather large amount of manuscript material dealing with this author.

Born in 1896, Mari Sandoz grew up in the Nebraska Panhandle. As a girl, she heard stories from Indians, fur traders, homesteaders, cattlemen and, of course, from her father Jules. She started school when she was about nine and was teaching a country school herself when she was 16. In 1921 she entered the University of Nebraska and studied there for several years. During this time, she worked at the State Historical Society and for the Lincoln Journal.

She also worked on her book Old Jules, the biography of her father. When it was finally completed, she began sending it to publishers, but none was willing to accept it. In 1933 after the novel had been rejected nine times, she left Lincoln and returned to the Sandhills to work on a novel.

In 1935 after being offered work at the State Historical Society, Miss Sandoz returned to Lincoln and once again attempted to publish Old Jules. On the fourteenth submission it was accepted and published. The book won a \$5000 prize as the best nonfiction book of 1935. In 1937 Slogum House, the novel she began in the Sandhills, was published, followed by Capital

City in 1939.

In 1935, her widely acclaimed biography, Crazy Horse: The Strange Man of the Oglalas, had also appeared in print as the second of her Great Plains series. Old Jules, Crazy Horse, Cheyenne Autumn (1952), The Buffalo Hunters (1954), The Cattlemen (1958) and The Beaver Men (1964) formed a series about the Great Plains, "examining modern man's occupancy in the region from the stone axe to the A-bomb and jet propulsion." At the time of her death, Miss Sandoz had not added the concluding book which was to deal with the discovery of oil in the Plains. She wrote three other historical books, including The Battle of the Little Bighorn, a controversial account of the death of General George A. Custer. She wrote eight novels and a large number of articles, both fiction and nonfiction.

Among the honors bestowed upon Miss Sandoz were a Doctor of Letters degree by the University of Nebraska (1950) and the Levi Strauss Award (1964). She also received a National Achievement Award of the Westerners for having more books than any other author on the list of One Hundred Best Books of the West (1955).

Miss Sandoz died of bone cancer in New York City in 1966.

The moving picture show aggregation that struck town last Thursday, came to grief in more ways than one. Their show was not at all patronized and the hotel people attached some of their paraphernalia to square their board bill. Two of their actors, young ladies, who were expected to join them here Thursday only got as far as the Norfolk jail. Their parents sent the sheriff to escort them back to their home in Fremont. Another young girl with the show men, was also escorted to the train Friday morning by Marshal Hills and sent back to her home at Wayne. (Winslow Tribune).

It is reported that the Hoskins headlight has suspended publication.

The state treasurer has made his semi-annual apportionment of school money to the different counties. The portion coming to Wayne county is \$2676.26. The number of scholars in the public schools of the county is given as 3748.

Remember the rural carrier on your route Christmas. That is one holiday during the year that the post office department does not allow him to observe. While all the rest of humanity is celebrating the day of Peace on earth, good will to men, the rural carrier and postmaster is making everyone happy by handing out and delivering gifts and remembrances of the day. The Wayne Telephone Exchange increases its number of subscribers 55 in the country and 25 in the city the past year. The total number of phones on the line now is 595.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wayne and Altona Telephone company was held here Tuesday. John Liveringhouse is president, Henry Frevert treasurer, J. A. Gasper secretary and Wm. Erxleben, Frank Erxleben and Sam Liveringhouse trustees. There are 37 shares of stock and a dividend of \$5 per share was declared. The company has 42 phones.

The Wayne Telephone Exchange will within a week have completed a line 15 miles southwest. The new line extends into Brenna precinct and the Baird neighborhood and will have 17 patrons. The Mt. Hope Telephone Co. is planning on an extension of their line which will add seven new patrons.

Bro. Jones of the Ponca Journal is advertising this week that he is also handling cut flowers in connection with his printing plant. We presume the next wrinkle Bro. Jones will add will be caskets and tombstones.

A six-column head across the front page read: "Start the New Year Right by Making a Resolution to Boost for a Population of 5,000 for Wayne in 1908."

We have had an unusual large number of visitors this fall. Many school people drop in to see methods of class room work and methods in general classes, also in the model school. All general exercises of the school are always open to visitors and we are glad to have them come in. (Normal College Notes).

A report was given on the district court, including an assault and rape case involving a 14-year-old girl. The names of the girl and the alleged attacker were printed. Another case involved a man who was charged with assault to commit great bodily injury. He allegedly had attacked another man with a buggy wrench but claimed he did it in self defense, believing the other man had a knife he would attack him with.

Johnson, Fleetwood & Johnson had Christmas suggestions, including rockers from \$1 to \$30; rugs of the latest patterns in Navajo, Smyrna, Moquette and Administer from \$1.25 to \$5; and linoleums, painted or inlaid, from \$6 cents to \$1 per yard.

A. V. Kenney has word from the Yankton Southern Railroad that there will be no delays in the affairs of that company on account of the financial flurry and that work is fast progressing considering the undertaking. (Stanton Register).

Wayne grain report (corrected every Thursday morning) showed markets advancing. Prices were: Wheat, 89 cents; flax, 94 cents; oats, 43 cents; corn, 45 cents; barley, 77 cents; and rye, 59 cents.

Dear Editor:

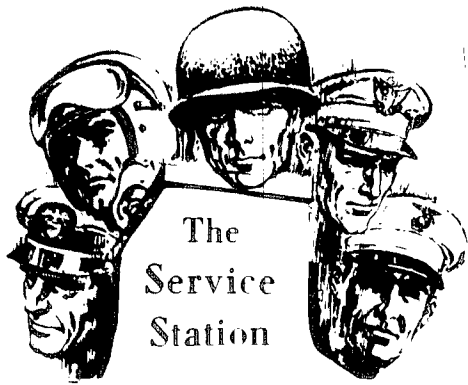
Thanks to SWAY so much for the ten dollars and the kind thought behind it, I hardly feel worthy of the gesture.

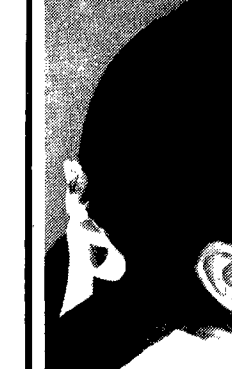
