With small turnouts reported at all points, those attending city and school district caucuses came up with the same candidates for both parties in all but two races in the primary election to be held here Apr. 2. City Clerk Dan Sherry reports both parties nominated the same candidates for school board, and for city councilmen from the first and third wards. This leaves only the mayor's post and councilman from the second ward up for contest.

Mayor William Koerber was named to run again by the Citizens Party while the Popular Party named Alfred Koplin as its candidate. In the second ward, Citizens Party named Robert McLean, incumbent, to run again as councilman while Popular Party named Wes Pfleger as candidate.

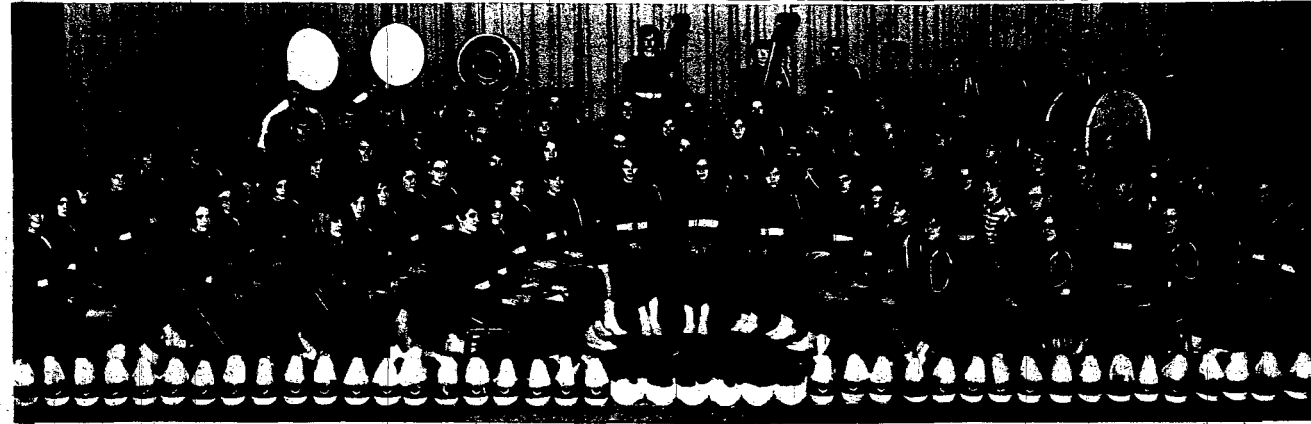
Plan Bingo Games

Offer Veteran Help Prior to Discharge

Chris Bargholz, Wayne County service officer, reports the VA has expanded its program to give servicemen information on veterans' benefits before they actually get out of the armed forces. Briefing and counseling will be offered at military separation points and the Offutt AFB Hospital, Omaha.

According to Bargholz, the VA is extending pre-separation briefing and counseling to servicemen in 176 military hospitals and 257 separation points. About 100 servicemen a month will be affected in Nebraska.

Last year, VA took veterans' benefit briefing and counseling service to Vietnam, briefing 230,000 servicemen around the world in all. The expanded program will reach even more servicemen.

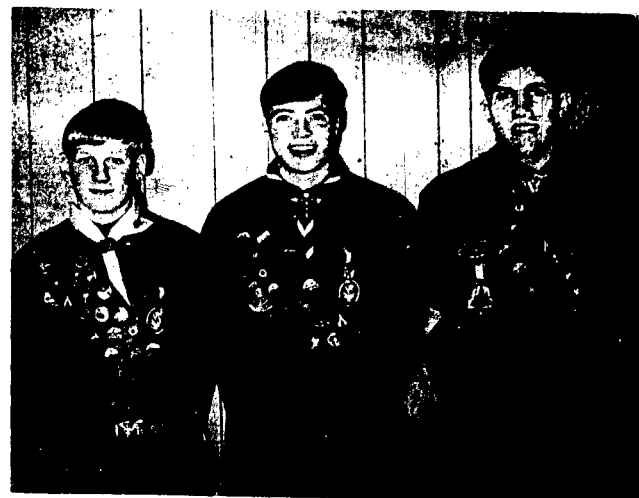

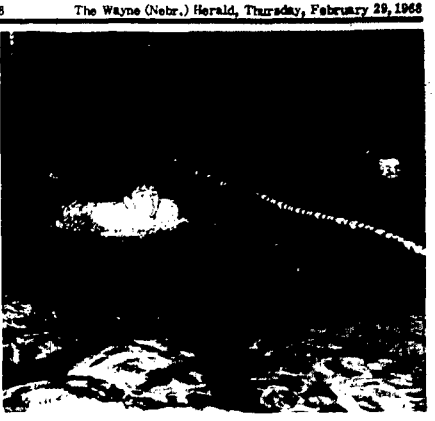

power plant in the 3,500 to 5,000 kilowatt class.

Plans and specifications were submitted by the engineer for the new intersection arrangement at the Seventh and Sherman. It calls for taking out the jog, eliminating two dips and installing two storm sewer intakes. Plans will be submitted to the state highway department.

The plan for the Seventh and Main intersection was held up because prices were late in arriving on traffic signals. These are now in and the estimated cost and the plans have been sent to the state department of roads.

Wayne has a city bus. However, it is not for general use but for the recreation department in transporting youngsters to other towns for competitive events. The bus was given to the recreation board without cost to the city and was donated with the specific request from the donors that it be used for recreation purposes. Ted Armbruster and Norris Weible reported on the bus on behalf of the recreation board. After hearing the plan, the city council accepted the gift of the bus.

Water and paving problems continue to plague the city. Attorney Kenneth Olds appeared representing Russell Johnson regarding diversion of water in the northwest part of the city, water running from that area onto Johnson property. The city was asked to check the problem of excessive run-off and take appropriate steps to control the water. The council authorized the engineer to investigate the problem and make a report at the next meeting.

Paving on Fairacres Road continues to deteriorate. The matter has been referred to committee and the entire situation will be studied in the hopes of

coming up with a solution to the concrete breaking up.

Two more restricted areas for parking were set up. One is on the north side of Twelfth between Pearl and Main from Main Street west to the alley and the other is on the north side of Eighth between Logan and Main from Main Street east to the alley.

It appeared for a while the state might not get permission to build a building it has almost completed at the east edge of Wayne, as the council rejected a state request for rezoning the spot from A-1 to I-1 (farm to light industrial). However, the city council heard and approved amendments to zoning ordinances, including special use in A-1 zones for highway maintenance buildings, power substations and other such uses. This gives city approval to the building now being finished but does not rezone the area, merely setting aside special use for that particular spot.

A new addition to the town is planned, McBright's First Subdivision. It is a triangular piece of land bordered on the south by the railroad and the north by the highway with a small plot of ground between it and the present city limits. Ordinance 659 confirming dedication and platting of the subdivision was passed.

Dedication of the new paved runway at the airport was discussed. It will be held Sunday, May 26, with the engineer and airport committee setting up a program.

Sheriff Donald Weible was named county civil defense director. In a joint resolution with the county, the council approved the selection of Weible for the post and approved city and county joint action on civil defense measures.

Councilman Wittig reported the Explorer Scouts are looking for projects where they can help out. A sand-base tennis court or a park at the airport were suggested as possibilities. The council approved having a committee meeting among park, airport, Explorer and Lions representatives to correlate plans for a projected park at the airport.

Finally, the council passed a resolution accepting the engineer's certification of construction in Water District No. 1. The council authorized a resolution setting itself up as a board of adjustment for equalizing and adjusting proposed assessments against properties directly affected by this improvement.

Bees started whittling away at the lead and by the end of the third period it was 58-50 in favor of Wayne.

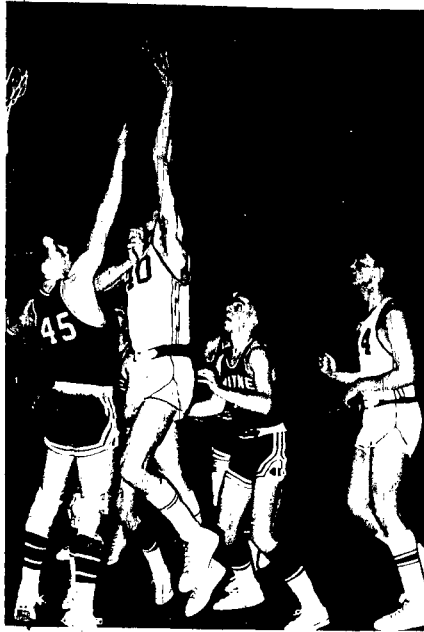

Allen's Freshmen are one of seven teams in an invitational tournament at Emerson High School starting Thursday. Three games will be played opening night and two games each night after that.

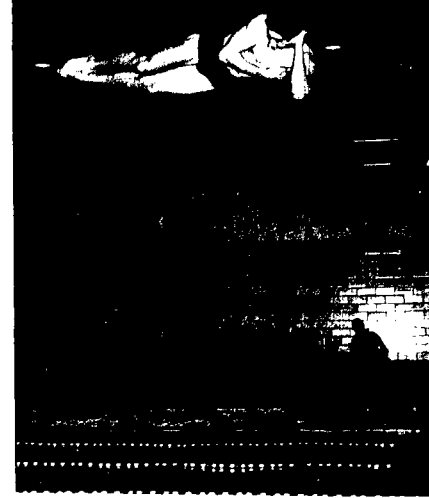
The Eagles play Emerson Sacred Heart at 4 p.m. Thursday. The other upper bracket game pits Winnabago against Winer at 7:15.

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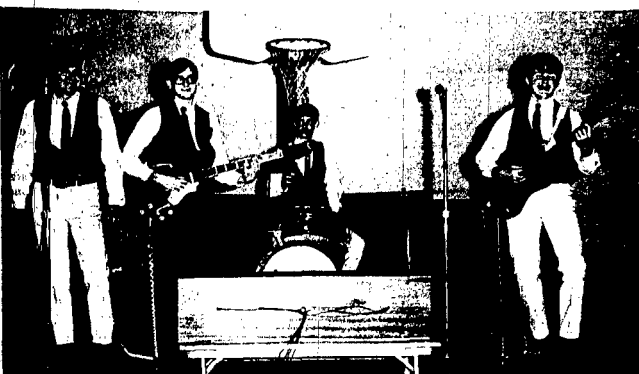

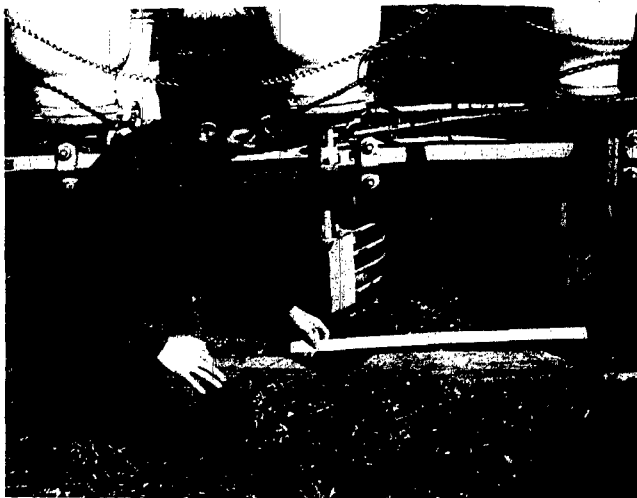

Time Drawing Near for Deciding on Whether to Go to Narrow Row Fields

Are area farmers going en masse to narrow-row farming this year? Gene Schwartz, area conservationist at Northeast Station, Concord, says those who do plan to go to narrow rows should start making plans now. Some are considering 30-inch rows and others are going to 20-inch rows. They need to know what planting rates are needed and what yield increases can be expected. Most of all, they need to start getting their equipment ready.

The latest information on planting narrow-row corn, soybeans and grain sorghum will be presented by Schwartz at the Northeast Nebraska Experimental Farm Association annual meeting in Wakefield Tuesday, Mar. 12, starting at 9:30 a.m. Schwartz will also present some recent results on alfalfa fertilization. Also on the program for that morning are: A report on nitrogen and phosphate rate and placement studies at Northeast

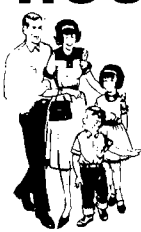

Nominations should be submitted to fair managers in each county by June 1.

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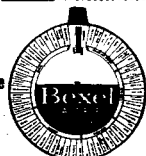

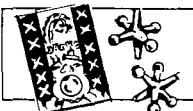
