School Funds Allocated The Nebraska Education De-partment has announced that \$3,881,004 will be allocated this year to eligible schools from the state temporary school fund. The fund is financed by rental receipts from the 1.5 million acres of state-owned achool land. Last year's appropriation was \$3,600,087. Dr. Floyd A. Miller, state education commissioner, said \$785,861 will be divided among the 85 counties with school land on the basis of what the property would have yielded to the schools had it been on the tax rolls. Another \$773,660 will be dis-ributed equally among the 1,915 operating public school districts in the state, or \$404 per school. The remainder of the fund. Dr. Miller said, will be allo-cated according to the number of school-age coersons between

Dr. Miller said, will be allo-cated according to the number of school-age persons between five and 20 years old in a county. The stare for each school-age person is \$5.64, compared with \$5.77 last year. Dr. Miller said the 1967 school census showed there were 410,902 school-age persons.

there were 410,902 school-age persons. The temporary school fund presently is the only state aid that goes to Nebraska school districts. It covers less than four percent of a school's per pupil cost.

pupil cost. However, beginning in Decem-ber, millions of dollars in state assistance will be pumped into the schools through the new aid to education law.

Be sure they are checked and recharged reg-ularly-and don't walt until a fire emergency to read the directions on how to operate them. Another good fire-fighting tool you should have available is a garden hose. 


