Two Verdi Opera Acts Slated at WHS Auditorium

Wayne area residents will have an opportunity to see parts of two famous operas at 3 p.m. today (Thursday) when a cast from Nebraska University and Lorraine Morris Gibb appear at Wayne High school.

Act I of *Rigoletto* and Act II of *Othello*, both by Verdi, will be presented. Mrs. Gibb will appear in the *Othello* production.

A limited number of adult tickets will be available at the high school office, Supt. Francis Haun said, and may be ordered by phoning the school. Cost will be 50 cents each. Student tickets will be 25 cents.

The program will include costume changes for the cast. The production will be under the direction of Mr. Ziel.

One More Chance

Residents of Wayne have one more chance! That is, they have one more chance to obey the law regarding the dumping of grass and leaves in the street. Street Commissioner Vern Schulz points out that city ordinances prohibit dumping anything into the street. He said the grass cuttings and leaves are especially bad because when they dry up they tend to clog the storm sewers and then the city has added expense. Anyone who dumps grass clippings or leaves in the street can be fined. This is the final warning as Schulz said the street crews have to ask for enforcement in fairness to the city and all taxpayers.

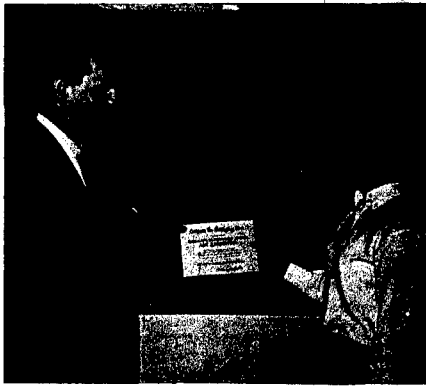
Dog Licensing Deadline Near

Wayne is in trouble. Wayne dog owners are in bigger trouble. May 10 is the deadline for licensing dogs. City Clerk Dan Sherry reported as of Wednesday morning of this week only 20 dogs have been licensed.

This means several hundred people are going to have to get licenses within the next eight days. Since there is a penalty for anyone getting a dog license after that date, a lot of people will be paying fines unless they can get into the clerk's office and take care of this matter before the deadline.

Sherry reports several people have been bitten by dogs lately. One of the latest is a small boy. Since the dog has not been located as of this writing, a thorough check is being made to find the animal because the boy may have to take rabies shots if the dog is not found.

The mayor authorized police to pick up and dispose of unlicensed dogs roaming about. Police are getting a lot of complaints about dogs running loose and they are willing to go along with the mayor in the campaign to get rid of the dogs that are getting out of hand and biting people.

Loren Park Named to Serve on New State Teacher Standards Commission

Loren Park, principal of Wayne middle school, has been named by Gov. Norbert Tiemann to serve one year on the new Professional Practices commission, representing administrators.

The committee will study and make recommendations to the state board of education ways for standards for the teaching profession.

Teaching was legally named a profession by the last session of the state legislature.

Duties of the new commission will include recommending standards for:

- 1-Ethical and professional performance,
- 2-Competency,
- 3-Preparation for and continuance in professional service, and
- 4-Standards for contractual obligations.

Park is one of 12 educators and administrators named in Nebraska to serve on the commission. Board members will represent elementary, secondary, administrative and higher education posts.

This is the first time teaching has received the legal status of a profession in Nebraska, and this board will help set the standards of the profession in the state.

According to the law, LB 457, the commission may warn and reprimand members of the teaching profession who do not perform up to the standards which will be set by the commission.

The commission, at the request of the state board of education, may make investigations, hold hearings and make recommendations concerning alleged violations of standards of professional ethics and practices.

Included in the commission's powers will be the power of subpoena of witnesses.

No salary goes with the job. Only actual expenses incurred shall be reimbursed.

Problems Facing Catholic Church

Vocations and education are the problems facing the Catholic Church today, according to Auxiliary Archbishop Daniel Sheehan. Rev. Sheehan, in an address to the St. Mary's Men's Club Friday evening, April 26, told the group of the Catholic Church's views concerning these current problems, and what is being done to meet them.

Education is a problem of vital concern to the church, according to Sheehan, because of the shortage of teachers, and the ever-increasing cost of education in other areas. He explained that in order to combat this problem, there has been considerable consolidation in the rural areas and also redistricting in the urban areas to allow for the shift of parishioners from one area of the city to another.

The shortage of priests is also becoming critical. Rev. Sheehan said, and in order to ease this situation, the Vatican made provisions for married men to become deacons of the church in some areas of the world. These deacons will take over most of the duties of the priests, he stated, but will remain under the supervision of a priest.

Mrs. Wittler will be the guest of the Women's division of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce and is one of nearly 100 women from Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas chosen as outstanding leaders in their communities.

Cub Scouts will take part in pinewood derby, the rolling contest, space derby and tag-of-war. Events for Boy Scouts will include constructing model camp sites, log sawing contest, hot relay, first aid relay and tug of war.

Offering Cash

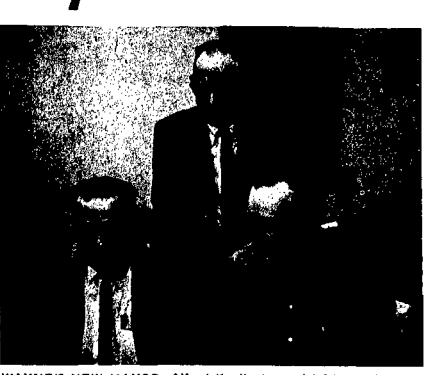

Major Electrical Projects for City Gain Council Approval

Two major electrical changes have been authorized by the Wayne City Council. The city governing board met Tuesday night with the new council member and mayor taking office during the course of the business session.

Alfred Koplin is new mayor, taking over from Dr. William Koeber. New councilman is Martin Willers, who succeeds Bob McLean. Holding over on the council are Jack Kingston, Wilmer Marra, E. G. Smith, Don Wittig and R. H. Banister.

The outgoing council approved plans and specifications for Engine No. 6 for the power plant. Bids will be asked for a dual-fuel unit similar to the one installed recently.

Main difference in the newest engine will be generating capacity. The one just added has 3,500 kva capacity. Plans call for the new one to be from 3,500 to 5,000 kva.

The new council authorized the engineer to proceed with plans and specifications on a changeover of the city distribution system from 2,400 volts to 4,160 volts.

This will increase the quality of service in all areas of the city without the necessity of changing the complete wiring system. Some lines are now carrying too heavy a load and with the changeover a fourth wire will be added and wiring to the transformers will be revised, making it possible for the present distribution system to handle the increased voltage.

Mayor Koplin listed appointments for offices for the coming year. There are no changes in the appointed officials, including chief of police, physician, clerk, sanitation commissioner, treasurer, attorney, water commissioner, street commissioner, engineer, plant superintendent and zoning official.

Five men were named to the planning commission, Bernard Meyer, Emil Meyer, Paul Rogge, Keith Mosley and Leland Foote. They take the place of Alan

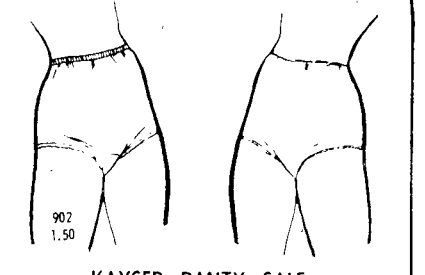

ton, 3.

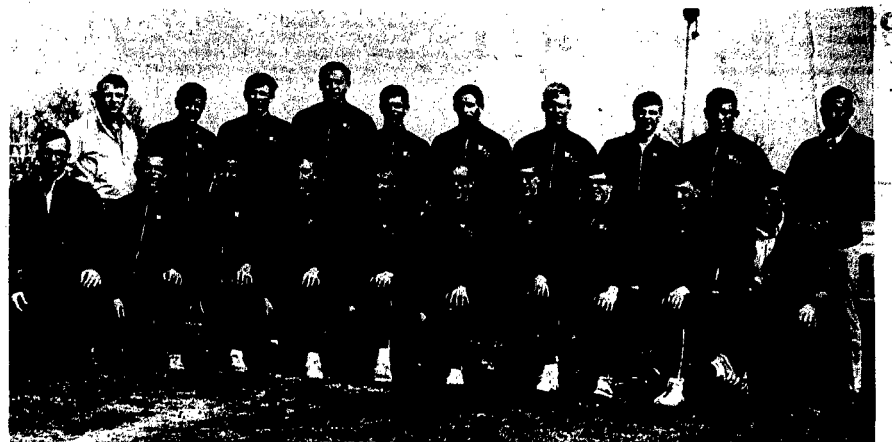

Binger Sets New Vaulting Mark As WHS Tops Meet

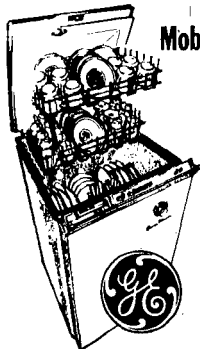

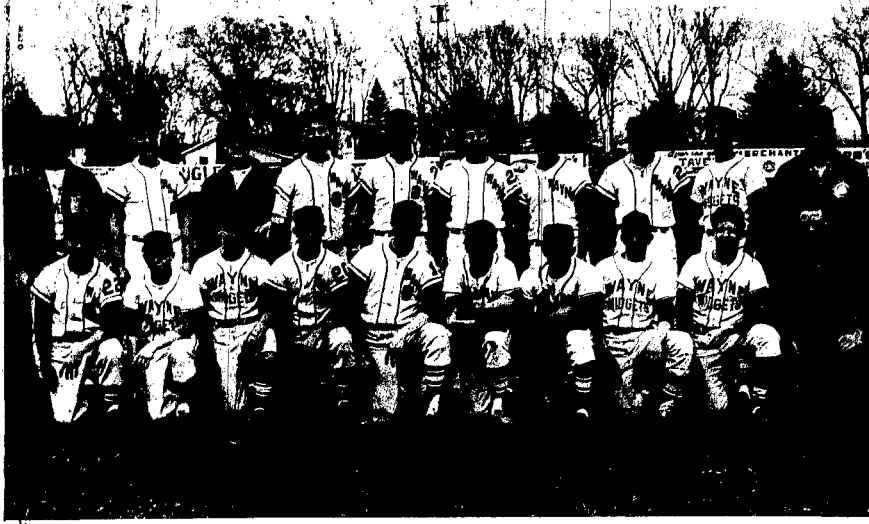

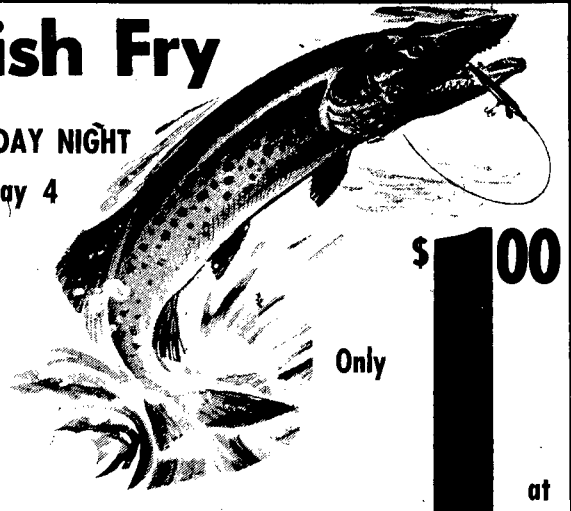

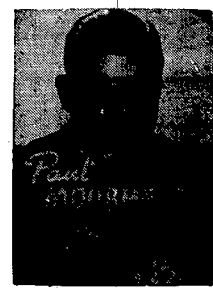
Wednesday afternoon will see an open class horse show, a teen dance in the evening and free acts. A carnival will be on the grounds each day.

Northeast Nebraska homemakers will have an opportunity to learn new ways to save steps and time in meal preparation when the mobile exhibit "Homemaking Unlimited" tours the area.
Homemakers are given free instruction in practical ways of removing barriers within the home which hinder household activities. For example, reorganization of kitchen utensils and equipment into efficient work centers can save miles of walking over a year's time—as much as 67 miles of walking per year in the preparation of just one meal a day.
The mobile unit is brought to this area by the Nebraska Heart Association and the University of Nebraska School of Home Economics.
Margaret Stahly, area extension agent at the NE Station, Concord, is in charge of making local arrangements in Northeast Nebraska.
Any homemaking is invited to tour the unit free of charge. It is specifically designed to help persons with limitations such as heart disease, high blood pressure, arthritis, multiple sclerosis, stroke, amputation or below normal physical energies.
All homemakers, however, can benefit by a tour of the exhibit, for it contains many ideas any-

one can use to simplify home activities and conserve energy.

Randolph—May 3, 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 2-4 p.m., First State Bank.

Hoskins—May 8, 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 1-4 p.m., fire hall.
Allen—May 9, 1-5 p.m., north side of bank.
With such a varied schedule most any interested homemaker should be able to arrange to visit the exhibit at one of the towns near her home.
