Kiwanis Honors Top Students At Banquet
Some 49 Wayne students from seventh grades through senior year, were honored for their scholastic achievement Friday night at the Birch rooms in the WSC Student Center where they were guests of the Wayne Kiwanis club. C. R. Holmes, Albion business man, was featured speaker, while Rev. John Craig, Carroll, was master of ceremonies. Youngsters honored will each receive a certificate from the Kiwanis club. Those ordered for the banquet did not arrive in time and a temporary certificate was issued at the banquet. The permanent certificates, however, did arrive just before the banquet, but too late to be filled in and presented. These will be completed and given to the youngsters at a later date. Vocal instructor Joseph Uncker provided musical entertainment by singing and playing the guitar. Claude Harder, member of the Kiwanis Boys and Girls committee presented the awards to the honor students. To be eligible for the award the students must be on the honor roll for three or four grade periods. The top seventh and eighth grade boy and girl from St. Mary's school and Wayne city schools were honored as well as 13 freshmen, 13 sophomores, three juniors and 12 seniors.

Mrs. Luverna Hilton, Senator Elmer Wallwey, Sen. Robert Kennedy and Richard Nixon ran far ahead of the pack in their respective races as official returns from Tuesday's primary election indicate. Mrs. Hilton, one of four in a race for nomination for Wayne county judge, received 1,050 votes while her nearest rival, Gordon Nuernberger, polled 640 votes. George Claycomb ran third with 590 while Robert Boeckenhauer had 250. Senator Wallwey, also in a four-cornered race, led in Wayne county voting with 936 tallies while R. R. Mitchell received 565, A. C. Butler had 435 votes, followed by Dakota county's J. J. Murphy with 377. Leading candidates for the Presidential nomination had lopsided margins with Richard Nixon polling 1,295, a two-to-one margin over second running Ronald Reagan's 310 in the Republican balloting. Harold Stassen received 13 votes while Nebraska's American Liberator had seven. On the Democratic ballot, Senator Robert Kennedy was an easy winner in Wayne county with 535 votes. He was followed by Senator Eugene McCarthy with 194. Despite his late entry into the race Vice President Hubert Humphrey had 63 votes. President Johnson, though he said he would not run, had 27 votes. Congressman Robert Danner, running unopposed on the Republican ticket, polled 1,562 votes, while Democrat Clair Callan, seeking nomination for the same seat had 719 tallies. Candidates for three seats on

the noxious weeds board were to be nominated from a slate of five. Top runner was Dwaine Rothwich with 1,660. Second was Henry Doring with 1,452 and third was Ernest Muhn with 1,074. Out of the running for the fall election were Alford Baden with 958 votes and (Leroy Vogel with 848. One candidate was to be nominated for director of educational service unit No. 1. Three candidates filed for the post, but Robert Bergt won handsily with 1,146 votes, while Warren Marotz received 859 and Wesley Wngett got 312. Two candidates filed for director, Wayne County Public Power district, subdivisions one, with only one post to fill. That race apparently was won by Stanley Hansen as he nosed out Keith Owens 247 to 214. Voting for delegates to the national conventions held up counting the votes as counting boards waded through the complicated procedure of tallying the votes. The required rotating of names on ballots makes the process of counting and recording votes for so many candidates, such as the delegates to the national convention, an arduous task. No counts are given here either, on election of delegates to county conventions for the Republican or Democratic parties. In most instances only enough names were included on the ballot to fill the vacancies and it is doubtful that write-ins would upset the vote.

Two Men Will Be Honored At Hospital Open House

Two certificates of award for special service to their fellow men will be given during open house (Thursday) at the Wayne Hospital. In addition to the displays, representatives of Blue Cross and Social Security will be at the hospital from 2-4 p.m. to talk with elderly persons about Medicare insurance. Hospital personnel will serve coffee, punch and cookies. Tours will be conducted to as many parts of the hospital as possible. Visitors are asked not to come before the 1 p.m. hour, however, so that normal hospital services may be adequately handled without interference.

The hospital has given awards to citizens for their outstanding contribution in time and service to the hospital. The awards to Rev. Shirck and Mr. Theophilus will be presented by the hospital board and medical staff. Hospital Administrator Charles Thomas said of Reverend Shirck, "He seems always to be on hand to help out at the hospital in time of accidents to comfort the injured and members of the injured family, answers the hospital phones when staff members are busy with emergency treatment and offers his comfort to the injured without regard to their religion. It is important to a small hospital to have such a man around, for the hospital is staffed only to treat the sick and injured. And Pastor Shirck has been doing this all the 11 years he has been in Wayne."

Of Dave Theophilus, Thomas said, "He comes in every day to shave and help comfort patients, and has done this for more than six and one-half years. He has worn out three electric shavers and provides his own pre-shave lotion. The Women's Auxiliary has provided him with two shavers and the William Splitgerber family one shaver. It requires a delicate touch to shave a person who has been hospitalized for some time, for the skin becomes tender and easily irritated. Town Hall Meeting Here To Be Televised on ETV

A mobile unit of the Educational television network will video tape Gov. Norbert Tiemann's Monday Town Hall meeting in Wayne. Plans are to tape the whole meeting and edit it for state-wide viewing at a later date. Governor Tiemann will be in Wayne Monday evening to answer questions from citizens or have his staff members answer the questions. State officers will not refuse to answer any questions, according to Governor Tiemann's ground rules for the meeting. According to the governor will be Robert Barnett, counsel to the governor; Elmer Schlaepfer, director of agriculture; James V. Moore, director, department of economic development; Donald Duncan, director, department of institutions; Larry Johns, director, department of motor vehicles; John Hossack, director, department of roads; Warren Fairchild, executive director, soil and water conservation commission, Kent Kalb, income tax division. Written questions will be accepted during the first hour and one half of the meeting. All questions should be directed to specific members of the group. Verbal questions will be answered only during the latter part of the meeting. Pencil and paper will be available at the meeting, but persons are urged to have their questions already written when they come to the meeting, making sure their questions are clear and concise. An editorial in this issue of The Wayne Herald points out some ways to make certain questions are asked properly. Questions will be taken from the floor, screened by a committee to avoid duplication, then submitted to the panel for answer. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. in the City Auditorium. It is sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce. This is an excellent opportunity for residents of Northeast Nebraska to take their questions directly to the persons on the state level who can give them the answers. This type meeting has been drawing large crowds throughout the state and a good turnout is expected here. The Wayne meeting also is the only meeting scheduled for state-wide televising.

Council OK's \$2,084,000 Budget for '15-Month' Year

The city council, moving from a May 1 fiscal year to an Aug. 1 fiscal year, Tuesday night approved a 15-month budget estimate of \$2,084,000. The longer period was needed to meet a new law calling for cities to use the Aug. 1 date for fiscal years. This added an extra three months to the "year". The total is \$360,500 more than last year's 12-month budget. Besides normal operational expenses, the budget includes 11 blocks of paving, a \$60,000 storm sewer project and some smaller sanitary sewer work. The fact that the money is in the budget does not necessarily mean that the money will be spent. It means that the money may be spent if it is necessary. In other actions the council approved taking a ward population count to determine whether ward boundaries must be changed to comply with the one man-one vote rule. The city attorney was au-

thorized to draw up the necessary papers to create a paving district on Fairacres Road. The city engineer displayed a large map of storm sewer district 68-1 and said he expects to have the plans completed by the next meeting. The district starts in Westwood Addition and runs along Tenth Street east to Windom Street through Wriedt's First Addition. Fire hall plans and specifications for the new building approved by the voters at the city election will be ready at the June 11 meeting, the engineer also announced, and added that 22 sets of specifications have been sent to suppliers interested in bidding on the new generation unit No. Six. A representative of Suburban Builders, an Omaha firm, addressed the council regarding plans to build a 20-unit apartment house at 12th and Pearl. Loren W. Parkinson, president of the firm, said his building

would cost about \$250,000. Single bedroom units would rent for \$100 per month and two-bedroom apartments for \$125. A resolution accepting plans and specifications for a new city ambulance were approved and the clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for the unit. Approval of an alarm to warn firemen when their oxygen tank supply is getting low also was granted. The alarm fits on oxygen tanks carried by firemen into smoke-filled buildings. When the supply is down to only four minutes, the alarm sounds telling the fireman he must leave to replenish his oxygen. Use of helicopters as part of the entertainment at the airport runway dedication scheduled for Sunday, May 26 also was approved. A request by Fritz Ellis for alley closure between First and Second streets east of Blaine was referred to the streets and alleys committee.

Peace Corps Member Shown in Paraguay

Thomas Dorsey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Dorsey, Wayne, has sent back the first photographs of his work and surroundings in San Ignacio, Paraguay, where he has been stationed for almost two years.

Northeast Swine Group Now Largest

Bob Fritschen, area swine specialist at Northeast Station, Concord, has revealed that the Northeast Swine Association now has over 200 members, making it the largest area swine group in Nebraska. The 1968 membership represents more than a 100 per cent increase from last year. It is one of 14 area groups in the state and serves swine producers in Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Thurston and Dakota counties. John Kramer of Dakota County was presented a \$25 cash award at the recent meeting for selling most memberships in February. (Lumpy Dump) Mills, Wakefield,

contributed the prize. Among other items coming up at the meeting was the report on the producer investment effort in the area and state. It was noted that on a percentage basis Nebraska leads all states in producer cooperation and in total number of hogs checked off for the program is second only to Iowa. Directors urged area pork producers to become familiar with the producer-investment program. All market places in Northeast Nebraska are cooperating on a request basis and producers are urged to ask their marketing agents to deduct the "nickel for profit" from slaughter hogs to be sent to the National Pork Producers Council. Aug. 12 is the date for the annual market hog show in Laurel where commercial producers will see hogs evaluated alive and then receive free carcass information. Details will be made available in June by Paul Everingham, chairman of the hog show committee.

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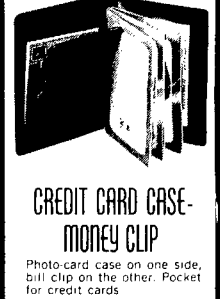


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
