Multiple sclerosis, or MS, strikes most frequently in persons age 20 to 40, and presents complex problems in psychological, social and economic areas.

Funds for the campaign will be turned in to the State National Bank Sunday. 



Zimmerman, Assistant Superintendent at the University of Nebraska Northeast Station at Concord.

Parallel terraces with steep backslopes and tile waterways using 120 and 180 foot intervals have been installed. These two terrace systems will be compared to conventional broadbase terraces with grassed waterways and straight-row tillage. All these systems will be compared to flelds where no conservation practices are used.

Crop yields on sloping land generally have not been as high as those on level land. Indications are that the new terrace system referred to as a land formation system can reduce soil and water losses substantially. It would allow a greater amount of rainfall to be saved for crop production. A further advantage is the stabilization of soil on the land where with a proper fertilization program crop yields could be increased considerably. In this new system the terraces or land formations can be shaped

Economic studies will be made of the comparative costs and returns associated with developneut, maintenance and operation of the four systems. Engineering information will be collected on the labor required and machine time and efficiency for each system. Agronomists will meassystem. Agronomists will measure fertilizer requirements, soil intake rate, soil moisture storage and water use efficiency, organic matter changes and crop yields. Various grass mixtures have been seeded to observe their effectiveness in stabilizing the steep terrace backslopes.



The figures quoted apply only to some popularity contests so far. The real money will be spent when the final decision is made by each party this summer at their conventions and the campaign starts in parmest for November's election. Now..the thought occurs to us: "WIYI is the Presidency worth so much?" Can it be that the presidency the world's toughest job brings so much satisfaction?

Can it be that the candidates feel they must sacrifice their money, time and at times, even their health or life for the good of the country... that they alone know the right answers to the problems of the U. S. and the world?

Does this spending also mean that only the richest of us can afford to run for and hold the office? Does It mean that no man, however intelligent he may be, 'oan run for the Presidency and still have a chance to win?

Now is the time to start writing the questions you want to ask of the Governor and his staff during the meeting. Word it exactly as you want it so you will be sure to get the answer.

Many a wrong or incomplete answer is given because the question was not properly asked.

Writing the questions is the only efficient way in which the meeting can operate. If all the questioners were experienced in such activity, perhaps the questions could be taken from the floor. We are not fluent in such matters, though, so the written form must be used.

Make your questions specific, brief and to the point. Leave out as many conditions and qualifications as possible. Don't be vague, obuse, clever or funny. Your humor or shadings of meaning may be lost in an attempt to discover your meaning.

Read carefully your question after you feel

ng may be too in an attempt to discover you meaning.

Read carefully your question after you feel certain you have it just like you want it. Try to put yourself in the position of the person to whom the question is directed. You may find that the question is not at all clear to another person. After you have satisfied yourself, hand the written question to a friend. See if he can determine exactly what it is you want answered. If another understands your query, chances are you have written a clear, concise question. Then take that written question with you to Monday night's meeting. You'll have a much better chance of getting an answer.




