# Town Hall Meeting Tonight

Governor Tlemann and eight members of his staff and various state departments are scheduled to arrive in Wayne about 5:30 p.m. today by air to conduct one of the Governor's Town Hall-type meetings.

The meeting, scheduled for 8 p.m. in the city auditorium, is open to the public. It is sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce.

Purpose of the meeting is to allow residents of the area to question the Governor and his group and receive direct answers from the departments involved.

At the outset of the meeting all answers must be written and handed to persons who will collect them from the floor. No question will be unanswered—or at least no one will refuse to answer a question, the governor said.

Pencil and paper will be furnished at the meeting. However, it would be wise to bring the questions already written so they may be worded more carefully than a hastily written piece at the

meeting. A precise question is more likely to receive a precise answer.

After an hour and a half of answering written questions, the governor will accept verbal questions from the floor.

Written questions will be run through a screening committee to avoid duplication.

The Wayne meeting also is scheduled to be video-taped by the FTV Mobile unit for replay later over the state-wide FTV network.

Following his arrival in Wayne, the governor will hold a planning session dinner with members of the sponsoring group so the ground rules and procedure of the meeting will be established.

Don Reed will serve as moderator for the discussion, with the governor receiving all questions, then directing them to members of the departments involved, where such action is applicable.

A screening committee of Arnold Marr, Willis Johnson and

Ivan Beeks has been named. More may be added later.

This meeting provides the chance many residents have wanted—that of personally questioning the governor or members of his staff or department heads regarding policies, practices and plans.

State officers will not refuse to answer any questions, according to Governor Tlemann's ground rules for the meeting.

Accompanying the governor will be Robert Barnett, counsel to the governor; Elmer Schlaphoff, director of agriculture; James Monroe, director, department of economic development; Donald Duncan, director, department of institutions; Larry Johns, director, department of motor vehicles; John Ioesack, director, department of roads; Warren Fairchild, executive director, soil and water conservation commission; Kent Kalb, income tax division.

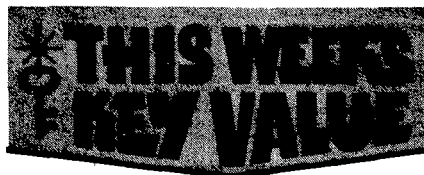

### Weather No Factor

#### For Good Haylage

Good haylage may be easier to make than good hay, Walt Tolman of Northeast Station said. Weather is less of a problem with haylage because it does not need to dry as long and because uniform moisture is not as important in a silo as in hay bales or stacks.

Excellent haylage can be made from alfalfa which is wilted to between about 35 and 60% dry mat-

ter, with no preservative needed. Even wetter material ensiles well if a dry feed like ground sorghum, or a preservative, is added. This makes possible longer days of harvest and quicker storage after a rain with haylage.

The first week of June is considered by many stockmen, the ideal time to make first cutting alfalfa haylage in Northeast Nebraska, Tolman said. Alfalfa cut at bud or early bloom stage is high in protein and mineral and can be used to replace purchased feed supplements in cattle rations. Usually cuttings are spaced about one month apart, so early first cutting often makes possible one more crop in a season or a good fall growth to be grazed with stalk fields.

Alfalfa haylage will be preserved in a plastic covered pile at Northeast Station again this year, Tolman plans. It is important to chop haylage fine,

handle it to save leaves, pack it well and store it protected from the air, he reminded. Sealed permanent silos are ideal for haylage preservation, but trenches, bunkers or even piles will do if special care is taken to exclude air. A plastic cover of 8 mil weight may better protect haylage through the summer than 6 mil or 4 mil weight.

The cost of the cover and the extra spoilage loss may equal the annual cost of sealed storage, but the investment is less and with some equipment filling and feeding are faster with a trench, bunker or pile. Both systems have their place. "Sometimes we store excess silage in a pile and later transfer and feed it through a sealed silo here at the Station," Tolman remarked.

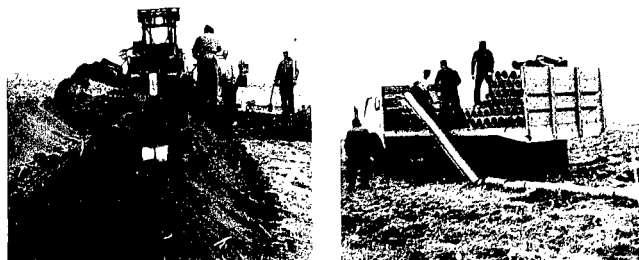

You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Talk with any golfer, picnicker, fisherman, gardener, loafer or homeowner and you'll get about the same comment. "The weatherman is out of his head."

above-described conditions, but even so, he takes his lumps from the wind. He has already fought a hot winter that started plants too early, a cold spring that held them back, dry weather that stunted growth and wet weather that drowned the plants. Now he has the wind to contend with.

The tulips were toppled, the irises are being irritated and the roses will be rumpled—all because of the strong winds. If it keeps up, mums will be mangled, peonies pounded and the glads ground down. The only consolation left will be seed catalogs and plans for next year.

And the poor loafer—he takes it worst of all! While winter changed into spring he planned all sorts of excuses to evade chores listed for him by the little woman. The kids could mow the lawn, the wife could wash windows and change the combination screen-storm window set-up and cleaning the garage could always wait for a bad-weather day. Oh! Loafer-boy could slip away and snooze in the warm spring sun and get back just too late to be of any help.

Now...the wind has changed all that. It's too cold to nap in the beneficent rays of Old Sol, Mama is busy with the windows and nagging at Pop to give her a hand, the kids are busy with year-end school chores and the grass keeps growing higher and higher. Not that Pop would do those chores if the wind went down, but at least he could sneak away and sleep while the work was being done and he wouldn't have to stay awake and see the long list of chores waiting for him.

## Watch the Red Markers

This is a time of the year to see red...the red SMV sign, that is. With the increased numbers of farm tractors and implements on the road this time of year, it becomes increasingly important to look for the bright Slow Moving Vehicle emblems that are placed on the rear of tractors, sprayers, fertilizer spreaders and other items of farm machinery.

Farmers, working early and late, are on the move on county roads, highways and byways. Many men farm parcels of land several miles apart and must use the roadways to travel from field to field.

On the dirt and gravel roads we are more likely to see the farm vehicles than on the highway, and though we are traveling more slowly there (Speed Limit 50 mph for cars) we also are on

roads that have sharper hills and curves, and afford poorer visibility.

Too, the county roads rarely afford us a good surface for quick stops for fast moving vehicles as does the highway.

The driver can help himself—and the farmer—by driving with great caution and being on the lookout for the SMV sign. A life-saving emblem if there ever was one.

On the other hand, the farm vehicle can be so equipped to aid in this program. Boosting that SMV emblem as high as possible gives the motorist earlier warning that slow-moving traffic is ahead. Thus the farmer can help himself—and the driver—by placing the sign as high as possible so it may be seen over the tops of hills.

# 65 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

Wayne Herald, May 21, 1903

Sunday was an exciting day for Emerson. At 3 in the morning the train crew of a passing freight discovered a building on fire. They blew their engine whistle, someone started a bell going and woke the people at the hotels who gave the alarm. Soon the whole town was aroused. For a time it looked as though the business part of the town was doomed, as Emerson has no water works, but by energetic and active work the flames were soon brought under control. The residence of Herbert Assman and the blacksmith shop of Frank Doyle were burned. The Assman family did not wake up until the house was filled with smoke and when they got out to the street their little boy, aged 1, was missing. The father rushed back but was unable to find the child and only escaped with his life after being severely burned. After daylight the charred remains of the boy were found in the ruins and it is supposed he must have crawled under the bed. The fire was evidently of incendiary origin and B., a notorious character about town is suspected. (Note: The real name was used 65 years ago). He has been heard to make threats that he would burn out certain parties. There was talk of a rope and a telegraph pole for B. and people gathered in excited groups. B.

was locked in the village jail but the village authorities being afraid the enraged people would take sovereignty hustled him quietly off to Pender. M. S. Merrill is at his home in this city with a big gash cut in his head and with other bruises on his body, the result of trying to stop a runaway team on lower Main street last Monday morning. Dora Larson, a daughter of J. P. Larson was driving near the railroad, when the team became frightened by a train. The team ran west by the Capital saloon, and seeing the danger of the young lady, Mr. Merrill made an endeavor to stop the frightened animals. He was knocked down and the bugs ran over him, and was unconscious for some time. The team was finally stopped by Chauncey Sewell.

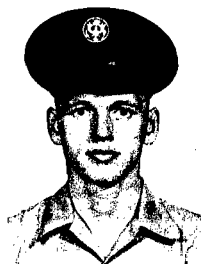

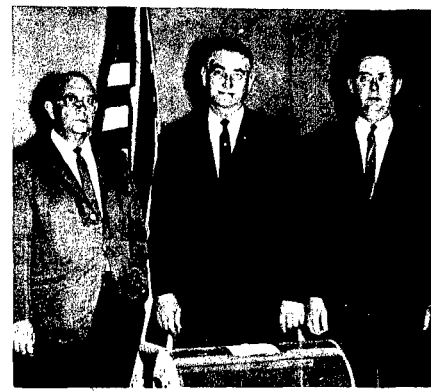
