

Extension Agronomist Has Name for Honors Ball Champs Weeds That Grow in This Territory

You can call weeds what you like but Area Extension Agrono-mist Gene Schwartz from the University of Nebraska North-east Station, Concord, skys per-haps the best terminology for weeds is a "robber". They rob crops of valuable moisture, plant food and in some instances sun-shine. "What is more essential to maximum crop yields than a little extra water during the grow-lag season, especially for the dryland farmer?" he asks. Weeds in directly rob Mr. Farmer's pocketbook by causing a reduction in crop yields, Re-search shows that three glant foxt all plants per foot of row can reduce corn yields by nine double in scap yields, especial-by weeds in the row and weeds that compete with your crop for the first 30 days after emergence. If controlling weeds by cultural practices such as crop rotation or mechanical means such as the parrow, rotary hoe or cultiva-rise for blem, thenyou should periaps consider using the com-marial herbicides if you are well only on certain barbicides are avail-alle on the market for we con-trol. Some are selective herbi-cides to be used only on certain crops and others work well only on certain weeds. Therefore you need to always carrefully read to always carefully read

the label before applying the herbicide and follow instructions. Numerous chemical herbicide treatments were applied to corn, grain sorghum and sogbeans at the Station again this year. Dr. Laren Robison, Extension Weed Specialist from the University of Nebraska College of Agri-culture at Lincoin assisted North-east Station agronomists in establishing the plots which con-sisted of many new chemicals and some combinations. Farmers are encouraged to observe the plots during the growing season. If you are in doubt as to the your farm, garden or lawn con-bact your local county agent or the Concord.
