The band plans to appear at several county fairs and other area events throughout the summer.

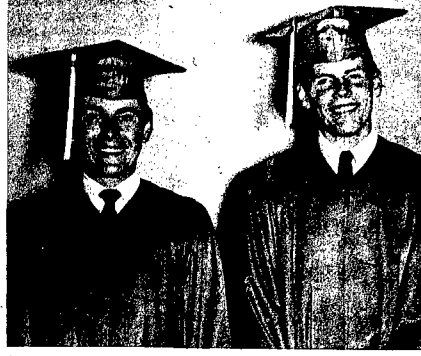
Gets Doctorate

Conservation Air Tour of Humbug Watershed Scheduled for June 10

An air tour of the Humbug watershed will be sponsored on June 10th by the Humbug Conservancy District. Jack Chase, board chairman, reported that tours will be conducted from the Wayne Airport and will continue all day long.

The tour will highlight conservation from Wayne to and through the Humbug, following the watercourse from its beginning west of Winside to the Elkhorn River. The return trip route will be over the two floodwater retarding structures on the Pilger watershed which proved very effective during last spring's heavy rains.

Members of the board noted that this will be a good opportunity for both city people and residents of the watershed to observe the gully problem as well as good conservation work. Mr. Chase also said that a survey crew from the State Soil Conservation Commission is presently working in the area to gather data for structure plans.

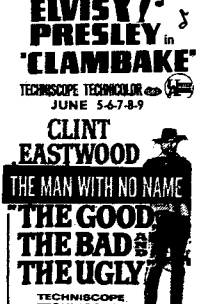

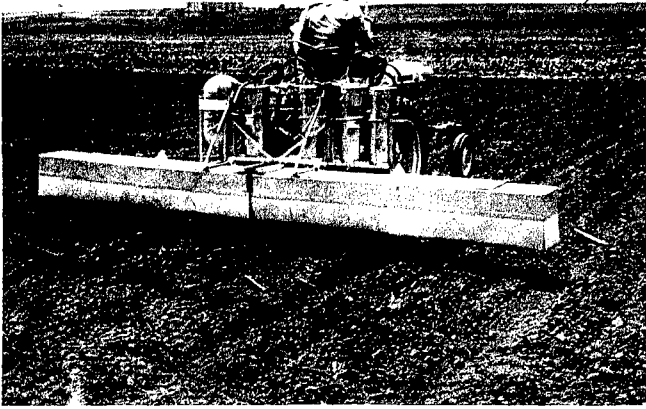

Extension Agronomist Has Name for Weeds That Grow in This Territory

You can call weeds what you like but Area Extension Agronomist Gene Schwartz from the University of Nebraska Northeast Station, Concord, says perhaps the best terminology for weeds is a "robber". They rob crops of valuable moisture, plant food and in some instances sunshine. "What is more essential to maximum crop yields than a little extra water during the growing season, especially for the dryland farmer?" he asks.

Weeds indirectly rob Mr. Farmer's pocketbook by causing a reduction in crop yields. Research shows that three giant foxtail plants per foot of row can reduce corn yields by nine bushels per acre and soybean yield by six bushels per acre. Other weeds cause similar reduction in crop yields, especially weeds in the row and weeds that compete with your crop for the first 30 days after emergence.

If controlling weeds by cultural practices such as crop rotation or mechanical means such as the harrow, rotary hoe or cultivator, is a problem, then you should perhaps consider using the commercial herbicides if you are not already doing so. Numerous chemical herbicides are available on the market for weed control. Some are selective herbicides to be used only on certain crops and others work well only on certain weeds. Therefore you need to always carefully read the label before applying the herbicide and follow instructions. Numerous chemical herbicide treatments were applied to corn, grain sorghum and soybeans at the Station again this year. Dr. Laren Robison, Extension Weed Specialist from the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture at Lincoln assisted Northeast Station agronomists in establishing the plots which consisted of many new chemicals and some combinations. Farmers are encouraged to observe the plots during the growing season. If you are in doubt as to the use of a chemical herbicide on your farm, garden or lawn contact your local county agent or the agronomists at the station at Concord.

Recipients of the grants may attend any public college, university, vocational or technical schools, exclusively owned and controlled by the State of Nebraska or one of its governmental subdivisions.

The initial processing of the applications is done by the local Farmers Home Administration Committees (USDA). A state advisory committee reviews all of the applications and makes final recommendations to the Director of Agriculture.
