A Boy Died Last Week

A boy died in an automobile accident last week, He was not unlike the high school boys in Wayne, Wakefield, Winside and Allen, liis chance to become a man is gone forever. No one will know because the boy is dead and even his living friends will not tell where the liquor came from. Who are these ghouls who will sell liquor to minors or procure liquor for minors, knowing that if an accident occurs such as the one that took this boy's life, they kare to blame? How can they be made to cease and desists so other lives are not lost needlessly?

Most of these shrubs are "bare rood" stock packed with a little peat moss and when the plant starts to grow there is nothing peat moss and when the plant starts to grow there is nothing in the package to nourish the roots. Before byding those plants, shrubs and trees you should read a few words of caution by an expert in the field. Too often the salesmen and workers in the retail outlets for nursery stock are inexperienced in the handling and care of the plants and therefore they do not give them the proper care or From here it can be brought out for display as needed in such quantities as can be sold within a few days. Inspectors of the Bureau of Plant Industry check nursery stock continually for insect pests, plants and therefore they do not give them the proper care or protection, according to C. J. Waistrom, chief of the bureau of plant industry, Department of Agriculture. Waistrom advises buyers to be alert in their purchasing of flowering plants, shrubs and trees. For years Nebraska law has required all nursery stock offered to the public to be in-spected and certified as appar-ently free of injurious insect spected and certified as appar-ently free of injurious insect pests and plant diseases. Most

Most states have similar requirements for there is perhaps no easier way to spread an insect pest or plant disease than through the movement of nursery stock. Walstrom said that Nebraska law also provides that each nurlaw also provides that each nu-sery salasman out soliciting orders for nursery stock must carry a Nebraska agents permit. Permits are issued by the De-partment of Agriculture only to agents of bonafide nurseries. "This permit protects the home owner from the salesman who takes an order with a down pay-ment but may never deliver on the order," according to Wal-strom.


