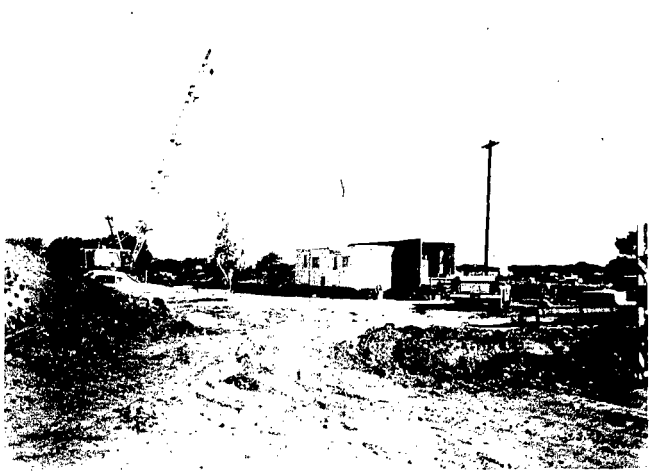

Peace Corps Volunteer Speaks at Kiwanis Meet

Kiwanians Monday were entertained and informed by former Peace Corps Volunteer Jack Ahart, a student at WSC.

Ahart served with the Peace Corps in Caracas, Venezuela, but received his training at Tucson, Ariz.

He described how part of his training was to go to a village in Central Mexico and spend some time as a lone volunteer working with Mexican peasants who could not speak English.

After being sent to Caracas, he worked as an instructor in baseball, basketball and track, teaching youngsters his own age how to teach the sport to others.

He said he could not get much attention in his classes until he proved to his students that he could out run and out perform them in the sports.

His class of 46 students was taught under the auspices of the YMCA but were held at the University of Caracas.

The Peace Corps is not charity, he said, and should not be considered such. Rather it is a way of helping others to help themselves.

Among his experiences in Caracas was an earthquake in which 138 persons were killed

in a large building that collapsed only about a block from him.

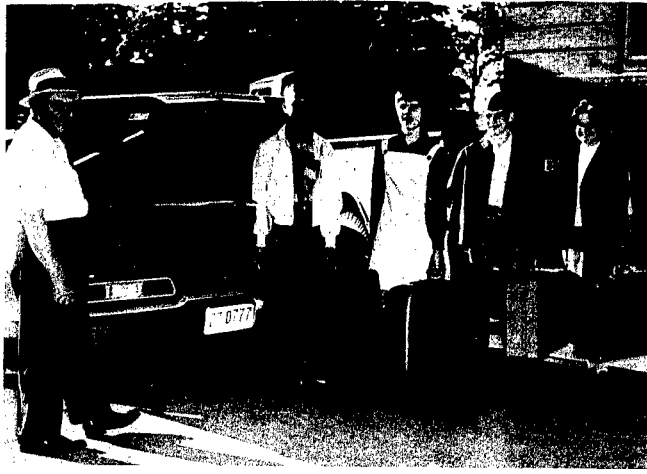
His pay as a Peace Corps volunteer was \$160 per month in cash while in foreign service, plus an additional \$75 per month that was banked and held for him in the U. S.

The \$160 was to pay his cost of living, including meals and housing, laundry, cleaning and entertainment. Medical expenses and official transportation were paid by the government of the U.S.

The support level on soybeans in Wayne County is \$2.40 per bushel. The level for corn is \$1.02 per bushel and for grain it is \$1.49 per hundredweight. The maturity date for the loans is July 31.

In most cases, upon request, warehouse storage loans may be extended for another year and farm storage loans may be continued under resale loan.

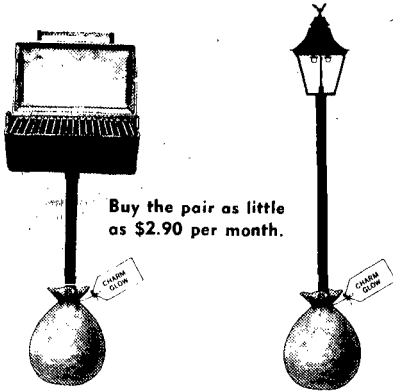

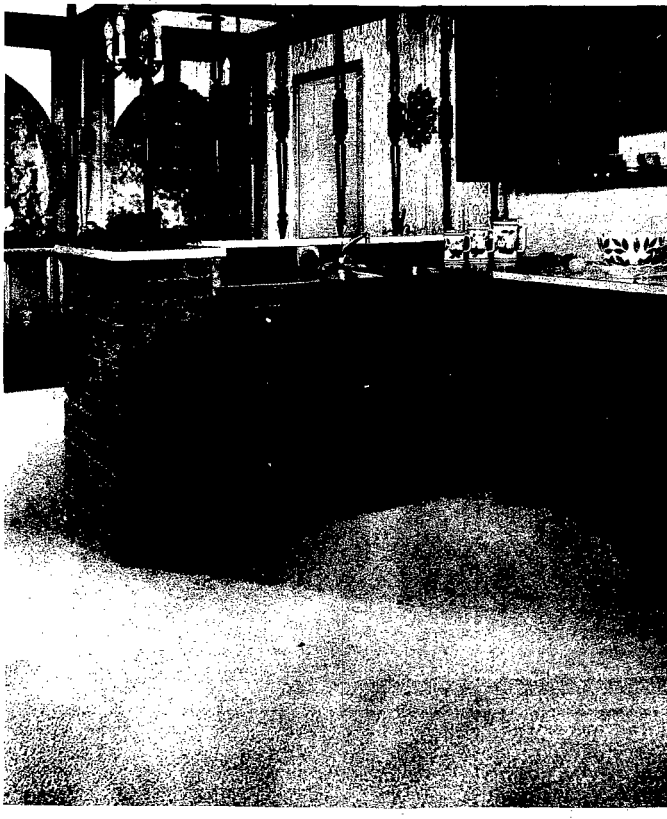

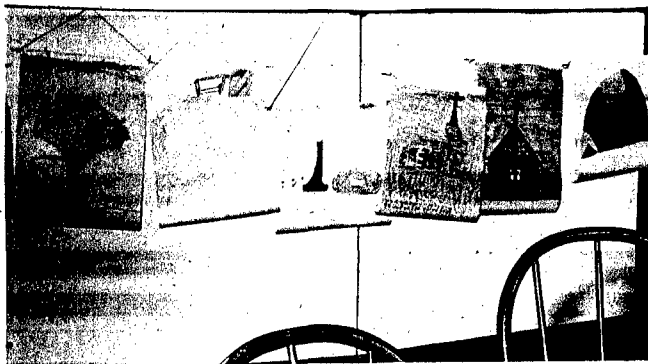

Telephone Brings News of Son's Return to U.S.

The telephone rang in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Kluge Sunday night. On the other end was their son, Kenneth J. Kluge. He had just arrived from Vietnam and called his parents as soon as he arrived in New York. RMI Kluge had been stationed 35 miles from Saigon during his one-year tour of duty. He was involved in communications and his radio equipment was placed on top of a five-story hotel in the city of My Tho.

After the Tet offensive on January and February when telephone services were disrupted, the radio was their only means of communication. The Viet Cong, Kluge said, fired several mortars and other shells at the hotel top in an unsuccessful attempt to stop the radio messages from going out.

Kluge left New York for Puerto Rico to rejoin his wife and two children who stayed there while he was in Vietnam. He will return to the States later in June and after visiting in Wayne and other places will be stationed in Maryland for a year.

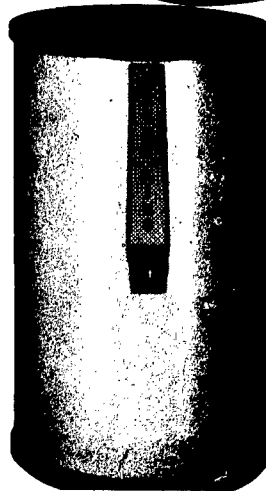

Most of the labels failed to warn that the product could damage some finishes and surfaces if spills and drips weren't wiped off.

Labels on aerosols carried required warnings for self-purified containers, and also cautioned the user to keep the can out of children's reach.

In general, the finger-pump cleaners were lower priced per ounce than the aerosols. Refills are available for finger pump containers.

If you really want to economize on window-cleaners, buy one finger-pump container, then fill it with a mixture of ammonia and water. This solution was found to do the window cleaning job just about as efficiently as any of the commercial cleaners tested.

The study concluded that with liquids and aerosols the convenience of a spray can or bottle, plus, sometimes a cleaner that smells better than your kitchen mix.

Cleaners in aerosol containers were judged more convenient to use than liquids with a finger-

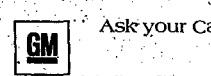

VA Reimburses \$250 on Burials

Up to \$250 for burial expenses
for eligible deceased veterans
will be paid by the Veterans
Administration if the claim is
filed within two years after the
veteran's burial or cremation,
according to C. W. Nixon, man-
ager of the VA regional office,
Lincoln.
Burial claims may be filed by
the undertaker, if he has not
been paid, or by the party who
paid the undertaker. Mr. Nixon
said the VA would reimburse up
to \$250 in expenses for the
permanent burial or cremation
of any veteran who was dis-
charged under conditions other
than dishonorable, if the veteran
served during wartime or after
Aug. 4, 1964.

He said that similar burial
expenses are also paid by the
VA for veterans of peacetime
service who were receiving ser-
vice-connected disability com-
pensation at the time of their
death, or who had been released
from service for disabilities in-
curred in line of duty.

Burial expenses for service-
man who died on active duty are
borne by the military, not the
VA.
Almost every deceased veteran
is eligible for an American flag
for his casket, Nixon said. Flags
are furnished undertakers on re-
quest, by any VA office or post
office.
