Wayne's Planning Commission Felday night turned thambs down on a proposal by Suburban Bullders, Inc., of Omaha to change zoning requirements in the II-2 (multiple dwelling) areas of Wayne to allow less lot space per family and permit three stories in the 35-foot height limit.

stories in the 35-foot height limit. A lot area change from 3,000 square feet per family to 1,800 square feet had been requested by Suburban Builders for an apartment house they proposed to build at the corner of Twelfard and Pearl streets. In addition, they wanted to be allowed to put three stories in the 35-foot-height limit instead of the two and one-half stories prescribed in zoning regulations.

The vote to deny the request was 6-1 with one member absentaining and one member absent. The original motion was made by Leland Foote, who followed his motion with the statement, "It is my opinion that others before us have spent many hours considering this very problem and it would be too lasty for us to change the requirements at this time." this time

to change the requirements at this time."

The motion was seconded by Kenneth Dahl. Voting in favor of the motion to deny the request were Armand Hiscox, Barold Kemble, Tony Netherda, Keith Mosely, Poote and Dahl. Bernie Meyer voted against the motion and Emil Meyer abstained. Dan Titze, the ninth member of the commission, was absent.

A petition bearing the names of 91 persons protesting any change in the zoning regulations at the outset of the meeting. At least two letters opposing the change also were received.

City Planner Dick Wornlak explained that by permitting this change at this location, zoning in all the R-2 districts would be changed and a high density of population could syring up in the areas. In addition, he said, this change could almost double population density in other areas and would cause widespread traffic, water, sewer and school problems.

He also pointed out that the present plan was developed using as a basis best use of public utilities, lay of the land, ten-denctes for development in spe-

as a basis best use of public at thittes, lay of the land, tendencies for development in specific directions and the way the people want the commission to develop the town. Higher density population areas would burden the taxpayers of the city with the need for larger capacity water mains, sewer lines and access roads.

Kemble explained that four-and six-inch mains are now in use on the WSC campus and plans are in the making to request changes to 10-inch and 12-inch lines to handle the additional load.

Bernie Meyer disagreed with Wozniak, saying not many children live in apartments, because when gougles have children they move out to larger quarters. Suburban Builders listed four reasons for wanting the zoning changed:

I—The 3,000 square foot requirements is impractical for investors.





OAS Doing 'Good Job' Allen Tells

The Organization of American States is generally doing a good job achieving a true partnership of nations, a veteran State De-partment official told the Foreign Affairs Institute on Latin Amer-ican Monday at Wayne State College.

College.

Dr. Ward Allen, deputy assistant secretary of state who has specialized in Latin America for most of his 23 years with State, opened the three-week institute with a talk tracing the history

The third period from 1949 to 1960 was not fruitful for the OAS, he said, as U.S. attention was focused more on Europe. Since then inter-American cooperation has grown with the U.S. sponsored Alliance for Progress and a revised OAS charter recently ratified by the United States.

siles were removed from Cuba.
The OAS, known by its present
name since 1948, has been in
existence in several forms since
1890, he said. Originally it was

1890, he said. Originally it was commerce oriented under U.S. leadership but with Latin American nations striving to thwart U.S. intervention. This first period lasted until 1933 when the Good Neighbor policy fostered by Secretary of State Cordell Hull changed the tone of relations, Dr. Allen said. Cooperation flourished, especially against the Axis threat in World War II.

States.

"Recently the United States record has been very good," Dr. Allen said. "The wonder is not that there is so much anti-U.S. feeling, but that there is so little."

A major problem for the United States, with its size and power, is the avoidance of intervention in Latin America, he said. Almost any action—and sometimes are lack of action—is intervention.
