Wayne's Planning Commission Friday night turned thumbs down on a proposal by Suburban Builders, Inc., of Omaha to change zoning requirements in the R-2 (multiple dwelling) areas of Wayne to allow less lot space per family and permit three stories in the 35-foot height limit.

The vote to deny the request was 6-1 with one member abstaining and one member absent. The original motion was made by Leland Foote, who followed his motion with the statement, "It is my opinion that others before us have spent many hours considering this very problem and it would be too costly for us to change the requirements at this time."

The motion was seconded by Kenneth Dahl. Voting in favor of the motion to deny the request were Armand Hilscox, Harold Kemble, Tony Netherda, Keith Mosely, Foote and Dahl.

A petition bearing the names of 91 persons protesting any change in the zoning regulations was submitted to the commission at the outset of the meeting. At least two letters opposing the change also were received.

City Planner Dick Wozniak explained that by permitting this change at this location, zoning in all the R-2 districts would be changed and a high density of population could spring up in the areas.

Bernie Meyer disagreed with Wozniak, saying not many children live in apartments, because when couples have children they move out to larger quarters. Suburban Builders listed four reasons for wanting the zoning changed:

1-The 3,000 square foot requirements is impractical for investors.
2-The houses would have a half basement and two stories, not three stories.
3-Norfolk and Fremont have only a 1,500 square foot requirement.

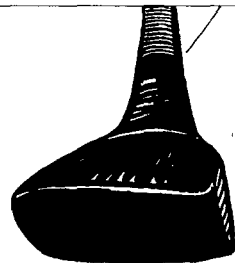

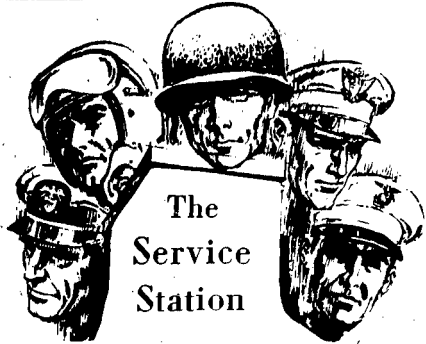

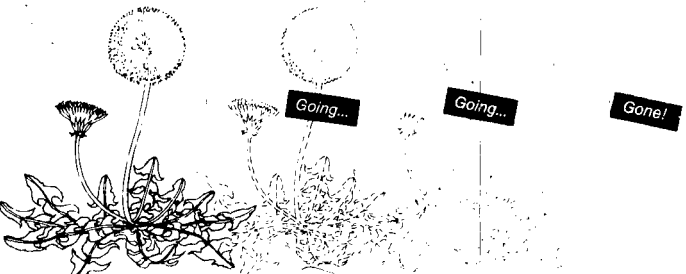
340 4-H Members Dixon County Record
