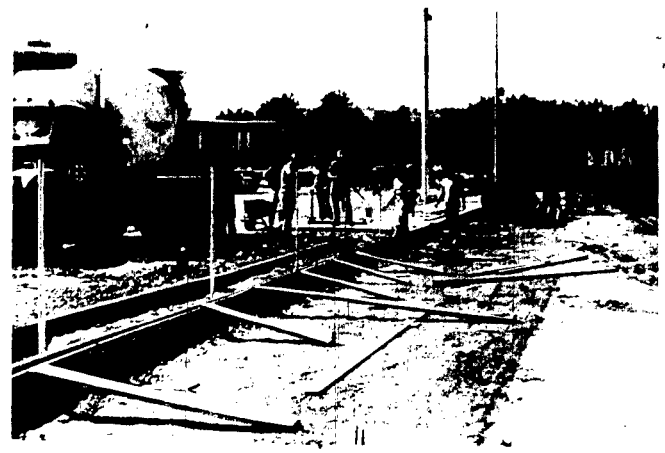

Denney Wants 'A Push of the Pencil' To Forestall Farmers' Profitless Year

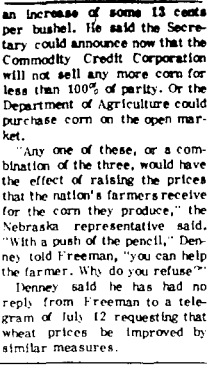
Congressman Robert Denney said he insists Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman "start pushing the pencil and help stop the migration of the farmers to over-crowded cities."

He said he has sent the Secretary a telegram, stating that Freeman may take steps to assist farmers by raising the prices they will receive for the 1968 corn crop.

"It now appears," Denney said, "that the farmers of the United States will produce another tremendous corn crop, but the prices they receive are so low that these farmers are again faced with a nearly profitless year."

The Congressman said he told Freeman that the Secretary has the authority to raise the support price of corn to 90% of parity, an increase of some 13 cents per bushel. He said the Secretary could announce now that the Commodity Credit Corporation will not sell any more corn for less than 100% of parity. Or the Department of Agriculture could purchase corn on the open market.

Warm Season Grasses Thrive During Hot, Below-Normal Rainfall Periods

Many pastures in Wayne County are very short but in the picture above it is obvious that Otto Hafke of Winside has a lot of grass left. This is a pasture which he has planted to warm season grasses. He planted this pasture to switchgrass, big bluestem and Indiangrass. These grasses are adapted to warm weather and will grow well even in years of under normal rainfall. These pastures are liked very well by all livestock and tests indicate that the cattle gain as well or better than on broome

or other cool season grasses. It takes two years to establish a warm season pasture. The third summer it can stand moderate use. This type of seeding works well with the current farm programs, where this land can be put in the feed-grain program. By this method one can receive income from the land while the grass is becoming established. The SCS recommends this type of pasture to farmers who have some rougher land they do not wish to farm because of severe

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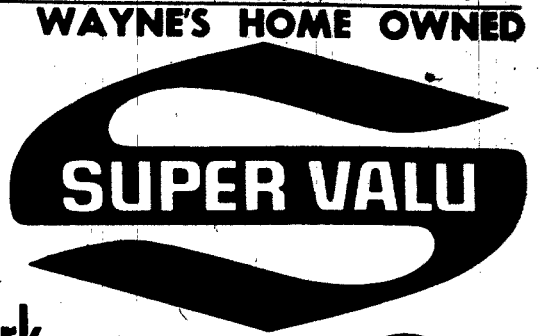

Tiemann Says Government Will Cost More Next Year

Nebraska's legislators have been told they will face the old problems of rising government costs and how to meet them when the Unicameral convenes in regular session next year.

The forwarding came from representatives of state agencies under Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann's control during a precedent-setting legislative-executive branch assembly in the Capitol.

The session was called "meaningful" and "helpful" by some legislative leaders but one senator viewed it in a different light.

"This was part of the governor's softening up program to condition the legislature and the people for another big spending spree," said Sen. Clifton Batchelder of Omaha.

Sen. Elvin Adamson of Valentine, speaker of the 1967 Unicameral, said the presentations by department heads helped to create an "open, free dialogue" with the legislature.

"This is a good thing because the senators need to understand more fully some of the problems that develop between regular sessions of the legislature," he said.

Sen. Jules W. Burbach of Crofton, chairman of the tax study committee, said the assembly was "meaningful from the standpoint of preparing us for what the administration has in mind in the future."

He said this has the advantage of giving the lawmakers time to discuss the governor's program with their constituents before the legislature goes into regular session.

Scottsbluff Sen. Terry Carpenter commended the governor for arranging the briefing. But he said similar meetings in the future should provide for more "give and take" between the lawmakers and the administrators.

He also suggested the proceedings be carried on the state's educational television network. New Welfare Approach

A public assistance system

based on the concept that needy persons are basically honest will be initiated this fall in Nebraska, state Welfare Director Harold W. Rogers has announced.

Rogers said the system will require welfare recipients to sign a sworn statement that they will qualify for assistance.

Presently state and local officials conduct detailed investigations into the circumstances and family background of persons on welfare rolls to be sure they are eligible.

Rogers said this approach, in effect since 1935, results in too much paperwork, red tape and staff time to justify its continuance.

"While this lengthy process appears to have built-in safeguards against fraud, it has the real effect of bogging down welfare officials and keeping people on the dole rather than getting them off," he said.

"Case workers spend all their time verifying the eligibility of recipients rather than helping them become productive individuals."

Rogers said the new system, which will be tried on an experimental basis in a few counties at the outset, will include random check from time to time on the statements submitted by the welfare recipients. He said this should keep them alert to the fact that fraud will not be tolerated.

"What this amounts to is an affidavit system to determine eligibility, with spot checks similar to those used by the internal revenue service for income tax purposes," Rogers said.

"The system will replace the costly, demanding and inefficient investigations now used by public welfare almost universally around the country. It should free scarce staff to try to keep people off the assistance rolls instead of making certain they stay on."

Rogers said Nebraska must begin to create a public welfare

system that places emphasis on individual human dignity and rehabilitation.

"Use of the affidavit approach assumes that people are basically honest and should get help when they need it," he said.

Rogers said he does not expect the system to result in more welfare recipients. He also said he does not expect an increase in fraud. He said Iowa now has such a system and has found that it works well.

Streamlined Government

Nebraska's "Little Hoover" Commission has recommended the state departments of health and welfare establish regional offices to improve efficiency and cut operating costs.

The commission, comprised of 42 businessmen appointed by Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann, also suggested a thorough internal reorganization of the agencies.

Philip A. Gass of Omaha, executive director, said the proposals would save the state \$424,458 a year if carried out.

The commission has been conducting a comprehensive study of state government management practices since last April, with the objective to consolidate overlapping functions.

Gass said recommendations covering other agencies would be released later. They also will be designed to save taxpayer dollars.

The commission said that because Lincoln is located in Eastern Nebraska, a "number of economies and better services would result" from setting up regional offices throughout the state.

"Travel time would be greatly reduced because regional personnel would live where offices are located," it said.

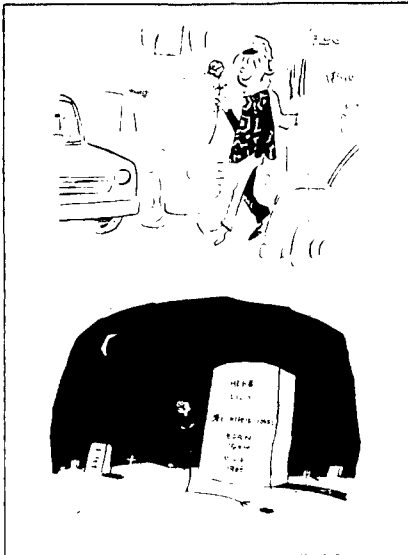
Regionalization of the health department should include creation of five outstate mental health clinics and two satellite clinics, the study unit said.

"If the welfare department is regionalized, child care centers should be established," it added.

"Now such activity is limited to Douglas, Lancaster and Scotts Bluff counties."

New Watershed High Reached

Nebraska reached a new high in small watershed construction last year, the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission reports.



More than 265,000 pedestrians became casualties in 1967.

The commission said \$1,217,000 was spent for projects in 1967, more than double the amount spent the previous year. It said 15 projects in 20 counties covering more than 1.5 million acres were placed under various stages of construction.

on a dry matter basis. For dairy cows or stock cows, it will be necessary to add grain or other roughage to the ration to reduce the total amount of nitrate to five tenths or below.

For young growing animals there is always the possibility that nitrate above two tenths to three per cent may depress the growth rate so that utilization of high nitrate feeds becomes impractical from a cost stand point.

Another factor that makes it difficult is the individual animal susceptibility, which differs greatly from animal to animal.

Ag Chemicals Special Storage

Store agricultural chemicals in a locked building or cabinet away from stored feed, fertilizer, and machinery. The ever-increasing use of chemicals brings a need for cautions in handling the materials.

Smoking should not be permitted in or around the building where chemicals are stored.

Three hazards associated with agricultural chemicals are:

1. The flammable or explosive nature of some chemicals or their solvents.

2. Toxic fumes, vapors, dusts and liquids of certain chemicals.

3. Possible after effects of spilling or dispersing chemicals on vegetation, crops or farmyards, or into wells and other water supplies.

A new bulletin just released by the United States Department of Agriculture outlines "Safe Use and Storage of Flammable Liquids and Gases on the Farm" (Farmers Bulletin No. 2156).

Nitrate May Be a Problem

What is the safe nitrate level in feeds such as drouth damaged oats?

How can I utilize oats when a laboratory test shows it to be high in nitrate?

The answers to these questions are difficult, because consideration must be given to the class of animals that will consume hay or drouth-damaged forage.

Steers or heifers on feed could utilize high nitrate roughage with least likelihood of nitrate toxicity, because the grain would reduce the volume of nitrate to a safe level which is usually less than five tenths of one per cent

training or enter other programs which combine school and job training, he said. The exact type of training is selected by the veteran after he is counseled by VA specialists.

While in training, and for two months after rehabilitation, eligible veterans may receive a subsistence allowance in addition to disability compensation and payment of tuition, fees and other training costs.

Nixon said allowances vary with the type of training and the number of dependents.

Seriously disabled World War II veterans who have any questions concerning their entitlement to vocational rehabilitation training should contact the VA Regional Office in Lincoln, he said.

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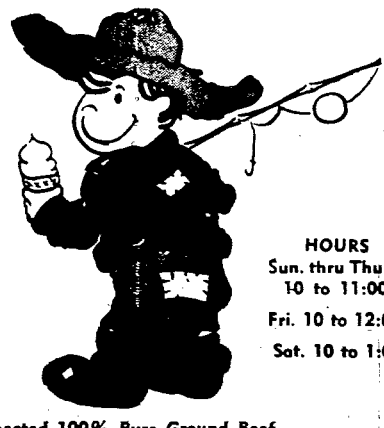
