Milo Pest 'Under Control'
The severe infestation of greenbugs in Nebraska milofields is about over, a thiversity of Nebraska insect specialist said today.

Robert F. Roselle, extension entomologist, said a small wasp, along with other natural control forces, has brought nearly all greenbugs in central and western counties should be largely wiped out soon.

The minute brachonid wasp lays an egg in the bodies of greenbugs aphids), and the wasplarva which develops inside kills the bugs, Roselle explained. Dead aphid cling to the leaves, turning brown as they die. When about four of 10 aphids turn and right brown, the infestation is usually brought under complete control in a few days, he added.

Weather or other undetermined factors this season apparently delayed the development of the natural enemy wasps until the greenbug population had grown to near-disastrous proportions in some areas, Roselle commented.

Other natural enemies, especially lady beetles, lace wing larvae and a predactious magged also have increased in numbers and predactious magged also have increased in numbers and are stemming the greenbug on slaught, the NU specialist said. In addition to millo, which greenbugs had not attacked in significant numbers in Nebraska in the past, greenbug of silage without restrictions and fed to dairy cattle.





This French name translates as "River of the Elk's Horn."




