

## Wayne School Openings Scheduled for September 3

Wayne schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 3, Supt. F. R. Haun announced Wednesday, with all elementary students reporting for their regular class sessions at 8:50 a.m.

School buses will run their regular routes that day for pick-up of rural children.

New students may register with the school principal prior to going to their classrooms. Room assignments will be posted in West Elementary School for grades kindergarten through fourth.

Middle School pupils, grades five through eight, should report to that school at 8:50 a.m. Students not registered in the Middle School prior to this year may report to the Middle School office Tuesday morning.

Home room assignments will be listed so pupils may report for instructions and class schedules.

Classes for high school students will also begin Sept. 3 but will be scheduled by grade for the first day, divided into four sessions:

12th grade—8:45 a.m.-10:15 a.m.  
11th grade—10:15 a.m.-11:45 a.m.  
10th grade—1:15 p.m.-2:30 p.m.  
9th grade—2:30 p.m.-4:00 p.m.

Beginning Wednesday, Sept. 4, all classes will meet on regular schedule. Pupils who are not enrolled now will be asked to pre-register on Aug. 27 or 28 with the building principal.

Ninth grade pupils who will be enrolling in the Wayne school, Dist. 17, (non-resident student) are asked to bring health records the first day. All non-resident students must bring free high school admission cards the first day.

Cards will be collected during the enrollment session of each student. Parents with questions regarding procedure should call the school office.

Football players have been notified that practice will start Aug. 26.

Routes of school buses will be mailed to parents during the week of Aug. 25. Routes will be reversed in direction from last year, Haun said.

School lunches will be served the first day of school. Price of a single meal is 40 cents or five-day tickets may be purchased for \$1.75.

Teachers' workshop will start Thursday, Aug. 29 and run through Saturday, Aug. 31. No school activities will be held on Labor Day, Sept. 2.

## WSC Librarian Hurt In One-Car Mishap

Wilma Furchert received severe neck lacerations when she was thrown from a car in a one-car accident Tuesday night about five miles southeast of Laurel on Highway 15. She was treated in Laurel and brought to the Wayne Hospital.

State Trooper Tom Nichols said Miss Furchert was riding with Jennie Peck, 63, Stuart, when the car went out of control on slick wet paving, slid off the roadway, across the shoulder and ditch and through a fence into a farm field. Miss Furchert was thrown from the car in the process.

The driver was unhurt and relatively small damage was done to the car, Trooper Nichols said.

Miss Furchert is a librarian at Wayne State College and lives in the faculty apartments. Her home is in Norfolk.

## Arts, Crafts Awards

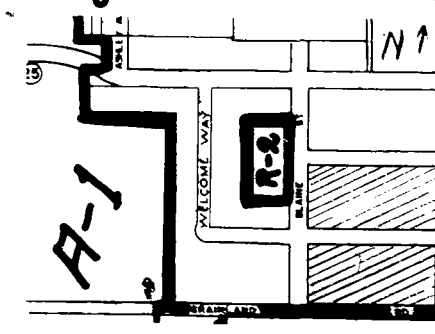
Special awards in arts and crafts classes at the Wayne County fair Friday were won by five women.

## Planning Board Recommends Zoning Change in Southwest Part of Wayne

Voting on a rezoning request to change an R-1 district to R-2 brought about a deadlock in the voting, but planning commission members Monday night came up with a plan to rezone a considerably larger area than was requested.

Fritz Ellis had appeared to ask that a portion of his property at Second and Blaine streets be rezoned to permit multiple dwellings.

He supported his request with a letter signed by 10 property owners in the area who said they would consent to the change. No one appeared to speak in opposition.

Voting on Ellis' request was two noes, two ayes and three abstentions. Two members of the nine-man commission were absent.

On the motion to deny Ellis' specific request Kemble and Meyer voted in favor of the motion, Netherland and Foote voted against the motion and Tiltze, Dahl and Mosley abstained.

Some members expressed a reluctance to approve "spot zoning," pointing out it is difficult to stop spot zoning once it is begun, and spot zoning could destroy plans made by the commission for orderly development of the city.

Instead the board voted to rezone a larger area which would include the Ellis property but also all property between Blaine and Douglas from Grandland highway to Second street. A portion of the proposed area includes property on the east side of Douglas (See shaded portion of map).

The western end of the area will abut a small R-2 district where the Moller apartments stand. The eastern end of the area will adjoin another R-2 district and eliminate another "spot" in the zoning plan.

The rezoning was presented to the city council Tuesday night.

Ellis' request was for rezoning the middle and north fifty feet of lot 18, Taylor and Wacob's Addition, a portion of the block 100 feet by 150 feet.

## Fire Station Bids Rejected; Order New Plans Be Drawn

Wayne's city council Tuesday night turned down all bids on the new fire station addition and ordered the engineer to re-draw plans and advertise new bids.

The action came after previous bids ran well above engineer estimates for the addition and firemen asked the contract not be let on the basis of the two bids received for the job.

Only two contractors, submitted bids, both above the estimate of \$27,000. Otte Construction's bid was \$35,500 while Valok Construction bid \$37,380.

At a meeting with bidders, firemen, the engineer and building committee of the council were able to pare the building to where it would cost \$29,000, but so many changes had been made in the plans the engineer said it would be better to re-draw plans and re-advertise for bids.

"Many of the contractors did not bid because they were too busy," Magdanz said, "but bids later this fall should be more numerous and at a lower price."

Ivan Creighton and Lee Swinney, representing the firemen, asked that the building have four overhead doors instead of two and approved other modifications to reduce the cost of the building. The 56 x 40 addition is planned to be built on the west side of the present firehall.

Also discussed was a request by Carhart Lumber Company for the city to pave an additional portion of Meadow Lane in Westwood Addition where a house is occupied but the owner has no paved access to his drive. Carhart Lumber will pay for the paving.

Paving was stopped short of the intended mark because the run-off waters would aggravate erosion at the end of the paving. The city engineer was ordered to come up with a plan for reducing water erosion at the end of the paving and have it ready for the next council meeting in two weeks.

## Cattle Feeding Tests Described

Beef research techniques and findings were discussed by Walt Tolman, beef nutritionist at Northeast Station, at the weekly meeting of the Kiwanis Monday.

Tolman said soils and crop nutrients differ here from other parts of the state and this is the big reason the Northeast Station was established.

After reviewing establishment of the experimental farm by private individuals and the University of Nebraska's staffing the facility, Tolman told of specific experiments at the station.

He pointed out that researchers there have found that too much corn or too high a protein level often result in poor looking cattle, especially in the early phases of a feeding period and the net result is added cost for the gain achieved.

Corn here often carries 10 percent protein instead of the usual eight and one-half percent, Tolman said, and allows for the use of less corn and more roughage in the ration, thus reducing costs.

Danger of nitrate poisoning in 1968 crops will be discussed at a meeting coming soon at NE Station, Tolman announced. He said field samples have shown some very high concentrations in some fields.

A parcel of property at the golf course was approved for sale back to the country club to give a little more room for the new club house.

Report of the planning committee's action on the request of Fred Ellis for rezoning from R-1 to R-2 a small portion of land at Second and Blaine was received. The council approved the commission's plan to enlarge on the request and include several square blocks of the area rather than spot zoning.

Commission chairman Tom Netherland was directed to hold a public hearing on the action at the commission's first meeting in September.

The meeting will be advertised in The Wayne Herald, stating the time, place and subject of the meeting, along with a description of the properties involved.

Another story in this issue contains details of the commission's action on the request at their Monday night meeting.

Stop lights were approved for the corner of Second and Pearl after the street committee recommended such action and Bill Mellor said a set of lights on hand could be used at the corner.

"The light itself is good," Mellor explained, but added, "the controllers are the problem. However, as long as we have Norb Brugger to keep them running we should have little trouble."

Mellor's crew was given the go-ahead signal to put the lights up as soon as it is convenient.

Announcement was made of the purchase of the property at 208 West Third for \$15,000. Councilmen earlier had said the property could be used several ways, including providing land for possible future hospital expansion, or a parking lot for public use. In the meantime the house could be occupied by the auditorium custodian.

A 10-day notice to property owners to put in sidewalks along the south side of Seventh street west from the high school to Oak View drive was ordered. Councilman Jack Kingston said the job should be completed before school starts Sept. 3.

"They have had almost a year to get this job done," he added.

Light Plant Superintendent Norbert Brugger reported the new crankshaft for the engine under repair at the light plant would be shipped to Buffalo, N.Y., soon to be equipped with vibration dampeners and lubrication pump gears. The Buffalo plant expects to ship the shaft to Wayne "early in September," Brugger said.

Once the shaft is received here it will require an additional six weeks or more to get it installed and the engine running, Brugger estimated.

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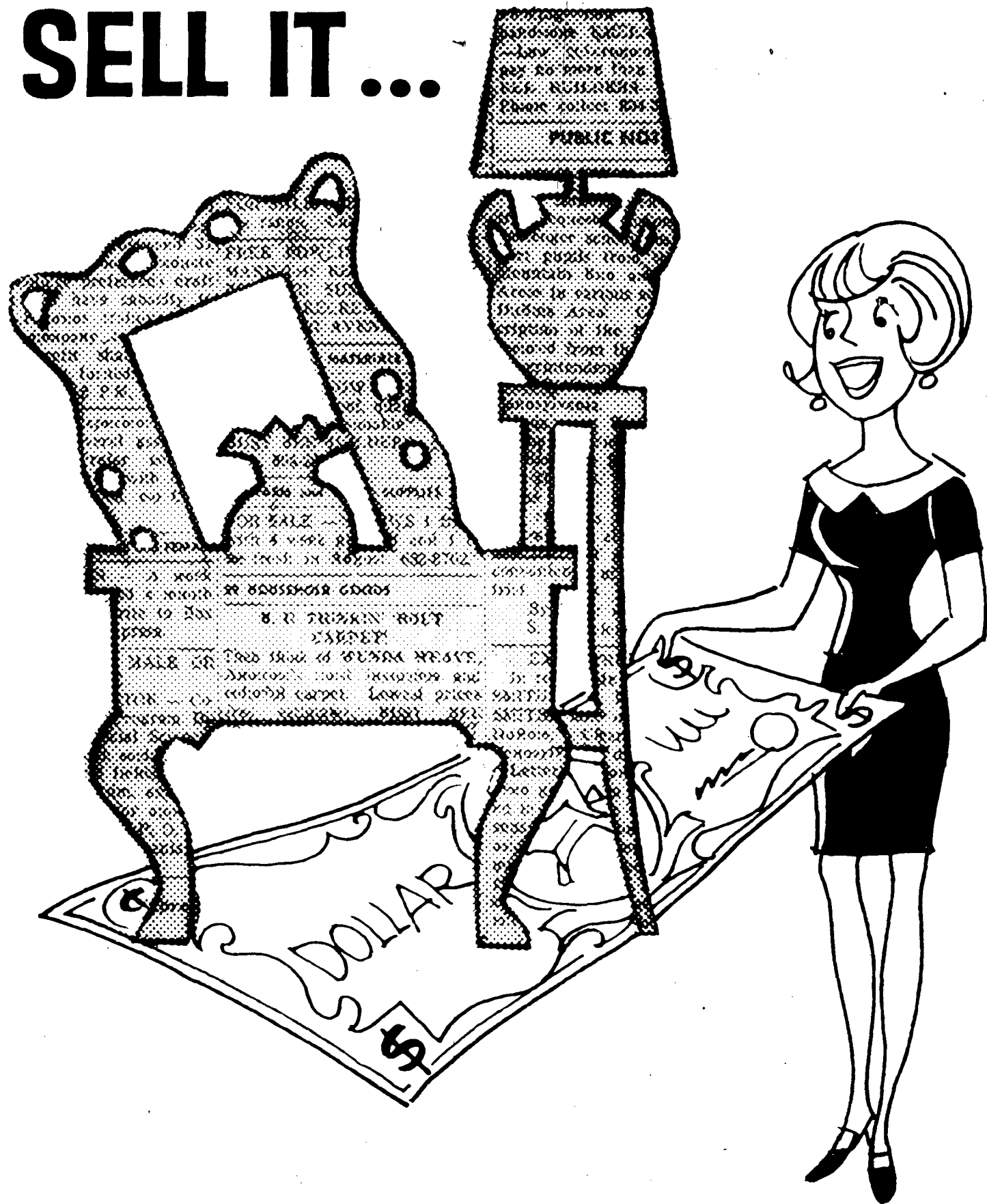

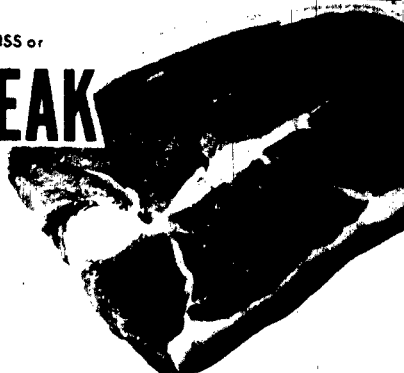

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## A Good Fair

Another Wayne County Fair is gone... and by general consensus was conceded to be one of the best in a long time.

One hard-headed implement dealer said he felt the fair was one of the best county fairs he has ever seen—and he has seen many of them.

Why is it better than many other county fairs? Mostly because a group of interested persons really care whether it is good, and work hard to make it so. The fair is well supported by farmers and those in farmer-aided businesses as well as by other businessmen. The free barbecue is one example.

A close look at the many persons who work on the fair board, who contribute labor and money for the fair shows a good cross-section of our community.

The few days before the fair one can find businessmen, farmers, high school youngsters and day laborers contributing their time and efforts to make the fairgrounds look better.

The Diner (county fair at Concord is another example) of interested men and women working hard to keep the fair good, interesting and active.

All fairs take work. The better fairs take more work, and the work pays off in greater interest in the fair.

As the number of county fairs continues to dwindle, however, it becomes increasingly evident that soon the state will be going to district fairs and Wayne is ideally located to provide a district fair for Northeast Nebraska.

About halfway between Norfolk and St. Louis City, it has ideal availability, good large grounds, better-than-average facilities, and a good reputation.

This is not the time to let down or rest on lau-

rels of past fairs. We know the fair board will continue to do its usual good job, but the board members need to know that the rest of the county will support the fair each year. This way, as natural attrition eats away at less successful fairs, Wayne County can be in an advantageous position to offer a going business for the site of a district fair.

## On Mistakes

When the fair ends we sit down for a few moments, heave a big sigh of relief and get ready for the next chore.

One thing always nags at us, however, and that is the possibility that we have made errors in names, placings or some other phase of the reporting of the fair.

Usually we have a pretty good record. In the hubbub of Friday's day-long 4-H baby beef show we recorded, photographed and watched many youngsters with their fat cattle, trying in every instance to avoid error. Two errors did creep in, both of which were quite avoidable, and in both cases involved persons the reporter knew personally.

We mistakenly identified Eddie Bull as Jack Sievers in the 4-H showmanship picture and in the open horse class we identified Gordon Davis as Gordon Jenkins.

Mistakes like this are always embarrassing to us and to the person wrongly identified. However, when we look at the record as a whole we have a good batting average. If we erred on only two of the many names we handled during the rush of the Thursday and Friday fair activity we must be hitting about .998 for the two days.

# Suggests Governor Have Game Commission Voice

LINCOLN—A special study committee has recommended the governor be given a voice on the State Game Commission, and that the agency's director be appointed for four instead of six years.

It also proposed the Legislature set a new ceiling on hunting and fishing permit fees at double the present level, with the commission given flexibility to adjust the rates according to revenue needs.

The Nebraska Management Analysis Study Committee, better known as the "Little Hoover" commission, outlined the suggestions in a 50-page report on ways to streamline state government.

Phillip A. Gass, executive director, said the Game Commission study showed there is a need for improved communication between the governor's office and the commission.

Presently the commission is a completely autonomous body, even though members are appointed by the governor with the consent of the Legislature.

The committee said the governor should have a personal representative on the commission, with this designee authorized to act as chairman and vote, in case of a deadlock of regular members.

Objectives and current thought of the governor's office would be injected without creating radical change of directions that might occur if the commission were directly respon-

sible to wishes of the governor," the committee said.

"Activities of the commission should be buffered from political change, but at the same time they should not be completely analogous to executive direction."

The committee said appointment of a commission director for six years is "unwieldy" and that a four-year term would be an improvement.

A problem developed earlier this year regarding the six-year appointment of director Mel O. Steen. The commission had thought his term was up July 1 but it later discovered the appointment ran through April, 1970.

The study committee made no mention of the mixup but its suggestion on hunting and fishing permit fees is certain to trigger a controversy of another kind.

By doubling the ceiling on fee rates and authorizing the commission to determine actual charges, there would be no need for continual requests to the Legislature for permit increases, the committee said.

"The Legislature would still have control in the ceiling established," the report said.

The 1967 Legislature, after considerable wrangling, boosted hunting and fishing license fees by an average of 75 cents. The current rates are: resident hunting, \$4; resident fishing, \$3.50; resident hunting-fishing combination, \$7; non-resi-

dent hunting, \$25; non-resident fishing (five-day), \$2.50, and non-resident fishing (one year), \$6.

Other key committee recommendations involving the Game Commission included appointment of an assistant director for administration, re-evaluation of the state's tourism promotion program, and construction of a new headquarters building in Lincoln.

The committee also released its findings on the State Agriculture Department, with these major changes proposed:

—Consolidation and simplification of licensing and permit activities.

—Discontinuance of the state-federal egg market news service, which is financed on a cost-sharing basis.

—Contract with cities which perform their own sanitation inspections of public accommodations to conduct a simultaneous state check and thus avoid duplication of effort.

—Combine the bureau of dairies, foods and drugs with the bureau of animal industry.

—Eliminate state tax fund grants to the Nebraska Dairy-men's, Crop Improvement, Western Organized Agriculture, Livestock Breeders and Feeders, and Home Economics Associations, and the State Horticultural Society.

"The establishment of miscellaneous agencies which are not integrated into the over-all state government organization is a questionable practice," the committee said. "Discontinuing general fund appropriations for these agencies would provide an immediate annual savings of \$7,800."

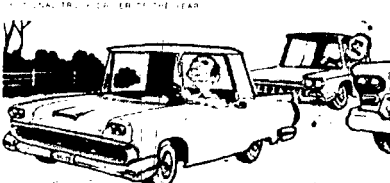

Agriculture, the unit that operates and manages the state fair.

On another front, the study group recommended creation of a network of multi-purpose water districts under the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission.

This proposal, the committee said, could result in a yearly savings of \$1 million through cessation of direct state aid to various water districts.

The sweeping recommendations, along with other suggestions to be released later, will be presented to legislators for consideration and possible implementation.

Department Proposed. State Tax Commissioner Murrell B. McNeil believes there would be no major transition problems involved in replacing his agency with a proposed department of revenue.

"We are geared pretty much along departmental lines now so this would be a natural evolution," McNeil said.

The "Little Hoover" commission has recommended creation of a department of revenue to supplant the tax commissioner's office.

McNeil said the trend in modern government is away from the commission form of administration and toward a departmental structure.

The purpose, he added, is to streamline the processes for receiving state revenues as well as provide for uniform book-keeping methods.

"There are a lot of state revenues that come from non-tax sources so it is only logical that one department or agency be given the overall responsibility in this area," said McNeil.

Presently many state agencies collect and remit their own revenues derived from license fees, permit charges and other non-tax items.

McNeil said the 1965 Legislature laid the groundwork for a central receiving agency when it made his office responsible for the collection of motor fuel, cigarette and bingo taxes.

"We could take on the extra duties involved in collecting other forms of revenue without adding a whole lot of new staff," he said. "In fact, the added cost would not be great at all."

## County Agent's Column

### Feeder Cattle Price Outlook

Grain-fed cattle prices can be expected to decline \$2-3 per hundred weight between now and the last of December.

Although prices of grain-fed cattle have been moving higher this summer, after five months of stability, this favorable trend may not continue much longer, according to Dr. Everett E. Peterson, Extension Agricultural Economist at the University of Nebraska.

Peterson explained, strong consumer demands should permit the marketing of cattle at fairly steady prices through September, but the main increase in beef supplies, expected to come during the last three months of the year, will force the price downward.

He based the increased market supply on the July 1, USDA report which shows Nebraska ranked second, in 32 states reported, with 1,070,000 head on feed—a gain of two and one-half per cent. Iowa ranked first with 2.3 million head on feed.

The total 32 state report shows 9,304,000 cattle on feed. This is an increase of seven per cent compared with July 1, 1967. The number of steers being fed total-

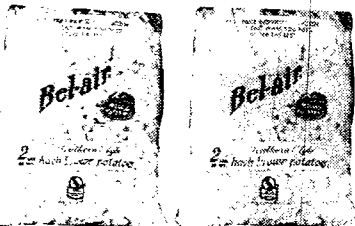

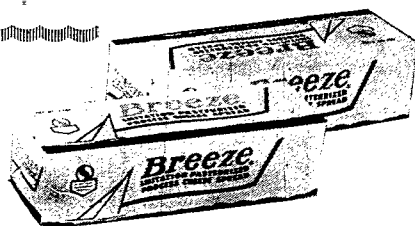

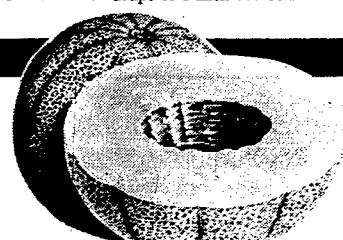

## Early Education in Dixon County

The early settlers in Nebraska were concerned with the education of their children. In March, 1855, the first territorial legislature passed the Free Public School Act which created the office of the Territorial Superintendent of Public Instruction and provided for the election of county superintendents.

County superintendents were authorized to divide the county into districts and levy a tax of not less than three nor more than five mills on all property in the county and to distribute the proceeds among the districts on the basis of the white children between the ages of five and twenty-one in the district.

Little is known about the early schools in Dixon County since records are lacking. Frequently, pioneer children would gather in the home of an educated neighbor to receive instruction. In some cases the early churches assumed responsibility for educating the children in the community.

In 1869 there were 10 public schools in Dixon County with 229 children enrolled. By 1895 the number of districts had increased to 78 with over 100 teachers employed and 3,464 children enrolled. Figures for 1967 show 28 districts and 122 instructors. The assessed valuation of property in Dixon County in 1859 was \$4,800; in 1957 it was \$19,958,493.

The cable, 100 feet long, is strung about 12 and one half feet above the street and firemen direct the stream of water at it in an attempt to push the barrel past the opposing team and against the stop, thus winning the bout.



## Navy Officers Test Set for December 14

Vice Admiral Charles K. Duncan, Chief of Naval Personnel, has announced that the 23rd annual national competitive examination for the regular Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) will be given on December 14, 1968.

The regular NROTC program prepares a young man for a Navy or Marine Corps Commission while he is studying at one of 53 civilian colleges. All tuition, fees, uniforms, and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives \$50 per month

substance allowance for more than four years.

During the summers between academic years, the student participates in at-sea training periods as a Midshipman. After successfully completing a baccalaureate level college course and all military requirements, he is commissioned in the regular Navy or Marine Corps.

Eligible high school seniors and graduates should submit their applications before November 15, 1968. Application forms are available from high school counselors and Navy recruiting stations, or from the Chief of Naval Personnel (PERS-3641), Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C. 20370.

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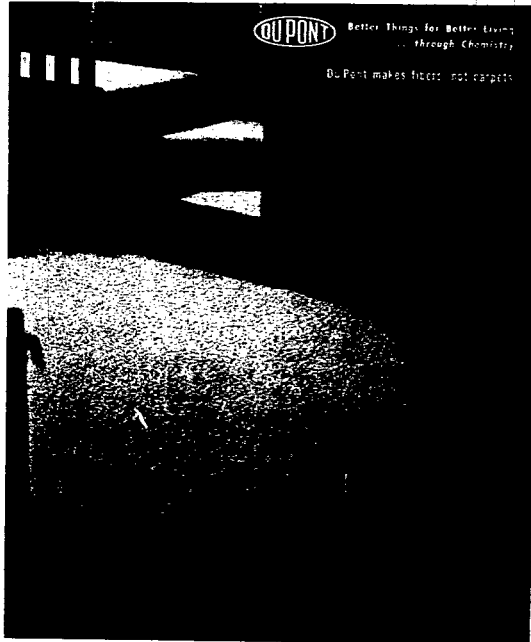
