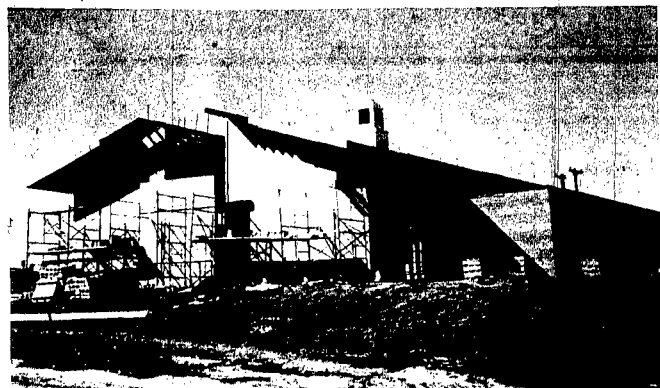

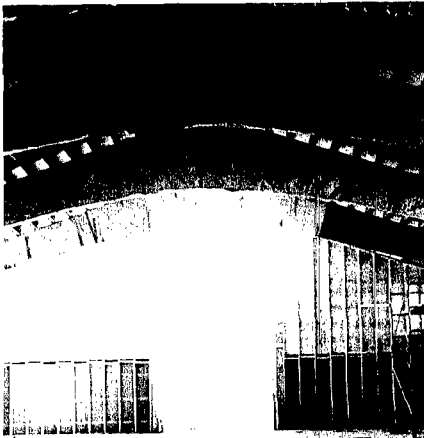

Wakefield Church Builds on New Site

Construction is well under way on the combined worship and educational units of the Wakefield Evangelical Covenant Church. Located in the Wayne County portion of Wakefield on East Eighth Street, the new building will feature a sanctuary having a seating capacity for 270; 14 classrooms, fellowship hall, and a pastor's study. Air conditioning is being installed throughout the building with the exception of the Sunday School rooms.

Plans are to have the building enclosed before the first snow falls, allowing workmen to continue with interior work during the winter. Estimated completion date, according to Pastor Fred Jansson, will be around Feb. 15. Members of the church are planning to hold dedication services in May.

Cost of the building as estimated at this time, excluding furnishings, will be over \$160,000.

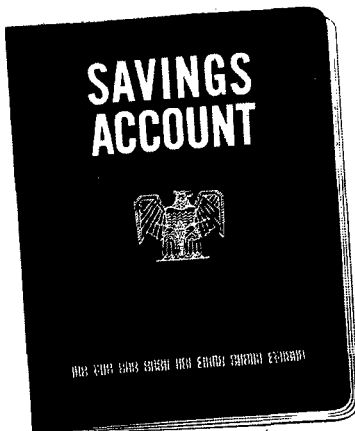

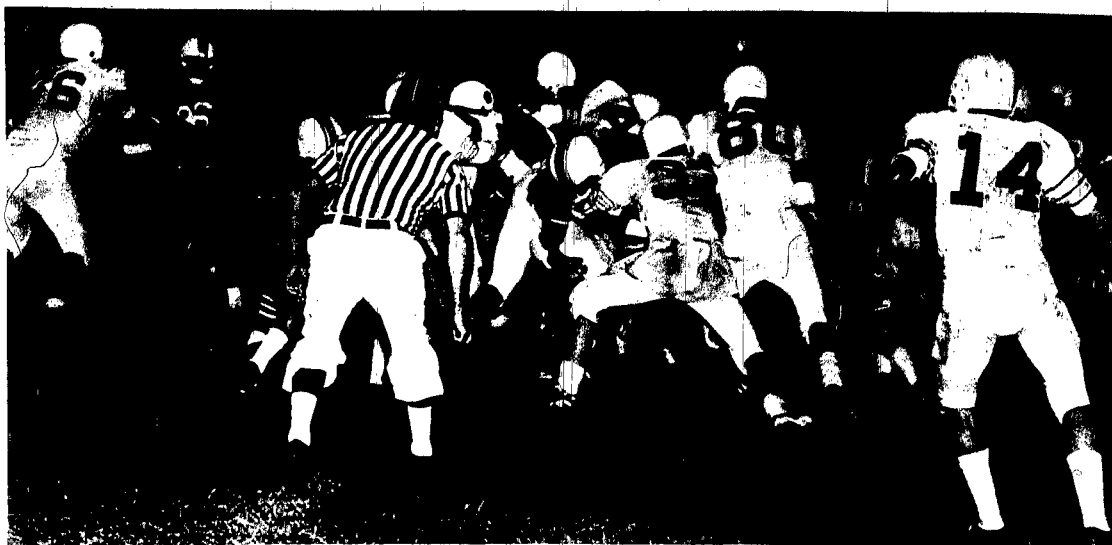

Strong defense frustrates host --

Wayne Raps Neligh 27-2

Wayne Blue Devils embarrassed host Neligh 27-2 for their third win of the season and their second victory in Husker Conference play.

Wayne wasted little time in posting the first score of the game as Randy Robins returned a Neligh punt 45 yards for a touchdown with 9:39 remaining in the first quarter. Randy Helgren's pass to Doug Maurer provided the extra point to give Wayne a 7-0 advantage.

Neligh controlled the ball for only six more plays before Wayne took over and scored on a 15 yard run by Helgren, capping a drive that started on the 50 yard line. Jerry Titze's extra point was good, giving Wayne a 14-0 lead with 10:16 left in the second quarter.

Not content to rest on past

laurels, Wayne allowed Neligh only one play after the kickoff. DeWayne DeTurk intercepted Neligh's pass on the Warriors' 35. Gambling on a fourth and nine situation, Dave Tietgen connected on a pass to Maurer for 31 yards to move the ball to about two yards from the goal.

DeTurk went off tackle on the next play and Titze kicked the extra point to give Wayne a comfortable 21-0 lead with 8:21 left in the second stanza.

Wayne also had a second-quarter touchdown nullified by a penalty.

The Blue Devil's final touchdown came in the third quarter on a 47 yard drive capped by Tietgen going over from the one. Neligh finally blocked a Wayne PAT with only :08 left.

Neligh, frustrated on the

ground and in the air, gained their lone two points on a safety late in the fourth quarter when a bad pass from center went over Harry Lindner's head and out of the end zone on an attempted punt with only 1:15 left to play.

Leading Wayne's rushing offense was DeTurk with 80 yards, followed by Dan Sutherland with 65 and Helgren with 51. Leading in pass receptions was Titze with 38 yards and Maurer with 31.

The winner's outstanding defense, which limited Neligh to 17 yards rushing and 86 yards passing, was spearheaded by Steve Mrsny with six tackles and two assists; Vaughn Korth with five tackles, two assists; Bernie Binger with five tackles; Sutherland with four tackles and four assists; and Lindner with

WHS Slaps Hartington

The Winside Wildcats downed Hartington High 12-0 on their home field Friday night to up their Lewis and Clark Conference win-loss record to two and one.

Opening the first period of play, Hartington took the kickoff, only to be stopped cold by an alert Winside defense. Kevin Thompson intercepted a pass on the 40 yard line and ran it back to Hartington's 30.

Gaining two first downs and moving to the three, Winside was faced with a fourth and goal situation. Taking the gamble, Kirt Schellenberg powered over the goal line from his right side to put Winside in front 6-0 with 8:47 left.

Hartington exploded early in the second quarter for what looked like a long touchdown run. Darald Hively broke loose for a 61 yard gain before finally being hauled down by Keith Wacker.

With the ball on Winside's 19, Fritz Weible broke through the offensive line to throw Hartington's quarterback for a 15 yard loss on the 34.

Playing tough defensive ball, the Wildcats finally forced the visitors to give up the ball on Winside's 17. After moving to the 20, Winside's hard-running Wacker broke through over his right tackle and sprinted for a 64 yard run before being pulled down from behind. The very next play Kirt Schellenberg broke loose for 15 more yards to move to within one yard to pay dirt. Quarterback Bob Jackson struggled over the goal to give Winside a 12-0 advantage with 2:28 left in the first half.

Hartington stalled Winside's first offensive move in the second half, forcing a kick deep in Winside territory. Roger Christensen broke through Winside's line and blocked the kick. Hartington came up with the loose ball on the 16.

Although in dangerous territory, Hartington couldn't mount an offensive as they saw first Gaylen Stevens throw them for a seven yard loss and then Greg Troutman throw them for an 11 yard loss. Winside took over on their own 19.

Hartington mounted another offensive in the middle of the final stanza which took them to their own 43, but Winside's Halfback Doug Deck picked off a pass and Winside was able to run out the clock.



Wayne Freshmen Rap Norfolk 18-13

Wayne Freshmen upped their season record to two wins and no losses by knocking off visiting Norfolk 18 to 13 Thursday afternoon. They had rolled over Pierce a week earlier 38-0.

Wayne exploded early in the first quarter when Lonnie Biltorf took a handoff from Todd Bornhoff on Wayne's 40 yard line the second time they had the ball to go out front 6 to 0.

In the second quarter it was again Biltorf taking the ball into the endzone on a pass from

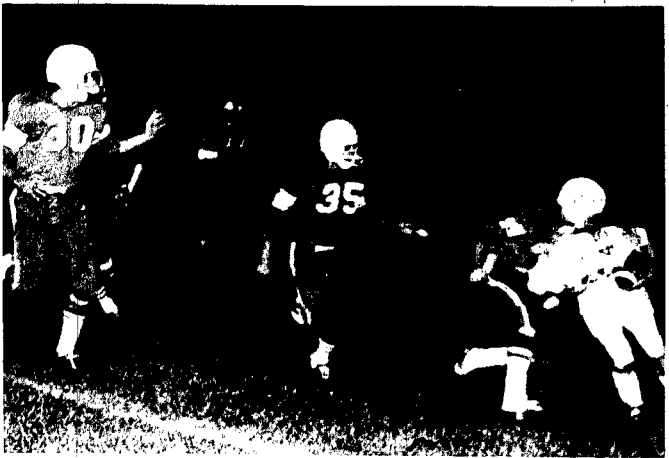
Donnie Hansen. Again the point after try failed. Norfolk threatened to score just before halftime when they ran back Wayne's kick to within 35 yards of the goal. Attempting a pass on the first play, Norfolk saw their chance at scoring disappear when Biltorf intercepted.

After both teams played scoreless ball in the third quarter, Wayne opened up with another touchdown pass play, this time from Biltorf to Hansen, which

covered about 67 yards to make it 18 to 0.

Recovering Norfolk's fumble on the kickoff, Wayne gambled and lost on the fourth down and handed the ball over to Norfolk on the opponents' 35. Norfolk took just a short time before they went all the way from about their own 40 to break their scoring drought. The extra point made it 18-7.

One of Wayne's several penalties in the game proved costly after they took Norfolk's kick. Wayne was moved back to their own seven on a personal foul. The next play they fumbled and Norfolk recovered on the 10. Wayne held Norfolk the first three times they tried to move, but on the fourth down the quarterback rifled a pass into the endzone and Norfolk sliced the lead to 18-13. But with only a few seconds left in the game neither team had a chance to mount an offensive.

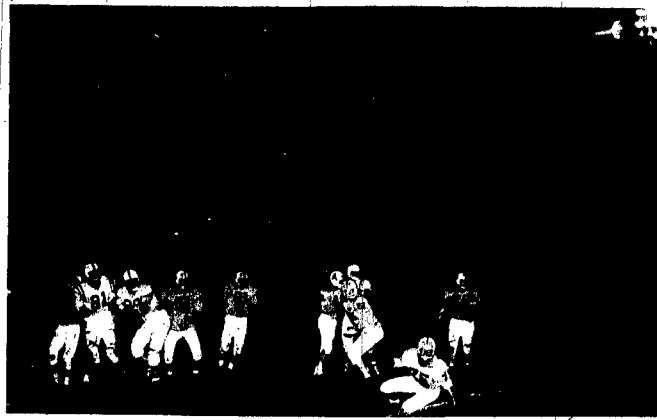

Allen Ekes Out 14-12 Win Over Ponca

Allen's Eagles proved spoilers for the Ponca Indians' homecoming Friday night when they eked out a 14 to 12 victory over the hosts.

The winning edge was provided by two extra point kicks by Freshman John Warner.

Rick Hank cast himself in the role of self-appointed spoiler as he grabbed five interceptions for what must be an Allen record

for one game. Hank ran back the interceptions for a total of 62 yards.

Allen exploded for the first score in the game on their first play after they forced Ponca to kick deep in their own territory. Hank took a handoff from Quarterback Craig Schultz on Allen's 42 yard line and connected on a touchdown pass to Bobby Mitchell.

Neither team could mount a lasting offense in the second quarter and Allen took a 7-0 lead into the halftime period.

Apparently refreshed by the break, Allen's Al Smith intercepted an Indian pass on the opponents' 48 and raced into the end zone to put his team in front 14-0.

Allen saw their lead crumble in the fourth quarter when Ponca exploded for two touchdowns on two pass completions from Aubrey Voss to Mike Knerl, one for 69 yards and one for 52 yards.

The game couldn't have ended more confusing.

With only a few seconds to go in the final stanza, Ponca attempted to mount an offensive from about the 50-yard line. A pass went clear down to the 10 yard line where one official called an interference penalty. The clock ran out and Allen players and fans started swarming across the field.

But another official said the clock couldn't run out on a penalty call and the ball was brought back to the line of scrimmage. On the next play Rick Hank spearheaded his fifth pass from the Indians and Allen ended on top 14-12.

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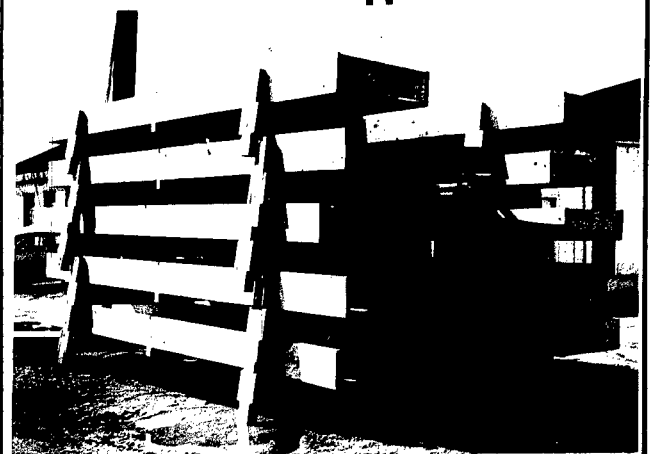

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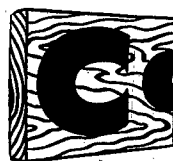

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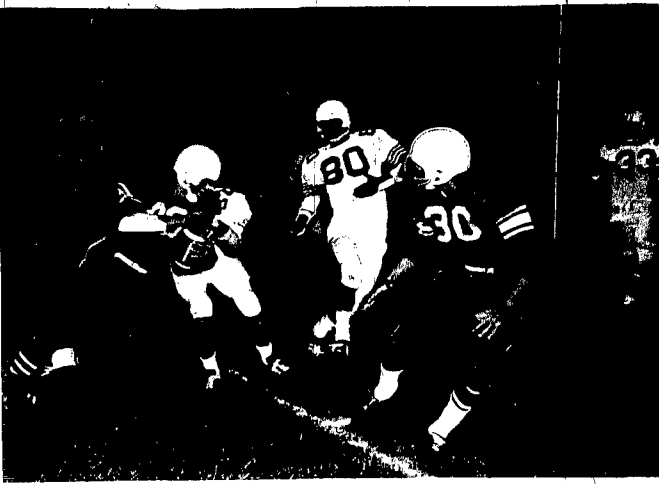

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POINT AFTER. Jerry Titze ran the extra point. Neligh, Les Echtenkamp (30) is leading interference for Titze.

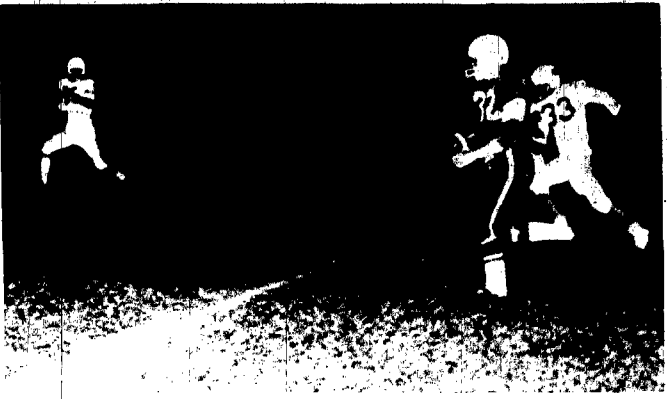
Pender Stings Wakefield 22-7 Friday

May Have Accelerated Classes at WHS

A program for educating selected students at an accelerated pace is being considered by officials of the Wayne City schools and Educational Service Unit 1.

The program would select a class of middle school students, either from Fifth and Sixth grades or from Seventh and Eighth grades to take part in the experimental program.

At present WHS officials have not definitely decided to take the step because many questions have not been answered. State aid is set up for such classes, but no one knows just how much money will be available, nor how many schools will be in the program.

Basically the classes would be determined like this: School staff members would recommend 40-50 students for initial testing by guidance counselors from Educational Service Unit 1.

Such guidance testing would

cut this number to about 30. Then a state psychologist would test the remaining 30 to determine their capabilities and place about 24 of them in this class.

These students then would be placed in a special class where their studies would be of greater breadth and depth.

Harry Mills, head of Educational Service Unit 1 here in Northeast Nebraska, said the students would receive both verbal and written testing to determine if they were to be placed in the special class.

F. I. Ihum, Superintendent of the Wayne schools, said he is concerned about future years for the classes. While he is interested in starting the class, he expressed doubts about being able to continue it for these students the rest of the way through high school.

"What do we do with these

children in their senior year?" he said. "Should they be given college work that year?" These questions remain to be answered.

The program of testing is one of the services rendered by the Educational Service Unit in conjunction with others where special classes are taught for mentally retarded, corrective measures taken for speech defects, testing made for sight and hearing and guidance counseling given—all only at the request of the participating school.

Mills said that a conservative rule of thumb used by educators says five per cent of any average group of students will have hearing problems or speech problems, will be gifted or retarded. However, his tests show the figure to be nearer 10 per cent in any category, with speech defects running as high as 32 per cent in some areas.

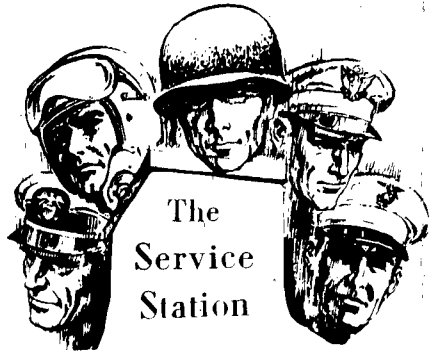

War Orphans School Payments Deductible

The Veterans Administration has news for the taxpaying parents and guardians of an estimated 42,000 dependents going to school under the War Orphans Educational Assistance Act.

Payments to "war orphans" are now regarded as scholarships and are not to be counted for income tax purposes in determining whether the dependent received more than half of his support from the taxpayer.

Under the law, "war orphans" (children of veterans who died or are permanently and totally disabled as a result of military service) are entitled to monthly benefits of \$130 for full-time enrollment, smaller amounts for part time.

C. W. Nixon, manager, VA Regional Office, Lincoln, said a recent Internal Revenue Service ruling calling such payments "scholarships," reverses an earlier finding. Previously these educational allowances were regarded as being contributed by the student when determining who furnished more than half of the student's support for income tax purposes.

The new ruling concludes that Congress intended that such payments be gratuitous in nature and therefore they are scholarships, Nixon said. Since the ruling is retroactive, parents and guardians are advised to apply

to their local district IRS director for the best method of filing for a refund.

Generally, eligible young men and women between 18 and 26 are entitled to up to 36 months of schooling under the Act. Nixon said that since this program began in 1956, more than 120,000 sons and daughters of veterans have received assistance from the VA.

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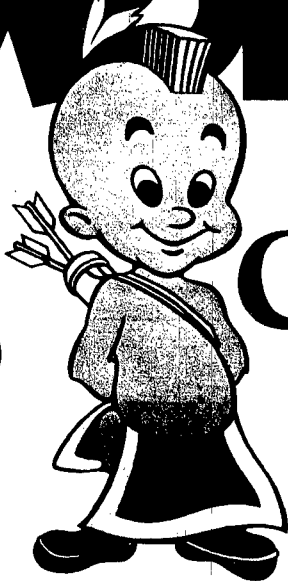
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
