Task Force and Firemen Consider PPD Building

Members of the Chamber of Commerce task force Tuesday night met with Wayne Volunteer Firemen to explore possibilities of adapting the Wayne County Public Power District headquarters to a fire station in conjunction with a city building to house the clerk's office and a meeting room for the council.

Bob Merchant and Kurt Otte, both task force members, discussed the PPD building and ways it could be remodeled or additions built on to make it more usable.

At the outset of the discussion, however, Merchant told the firemen that the task force was not there to sell an idea or a building. He pointed out also that the task force did not plan to take any of the authority of the city council.

All we want to do is explore the various avenues and give the council a choice of several plans along with the pros and cons of each."

Last year Wayne voters turned down a \$75,000 proposal which would have housed city offices and a new fire hall.

This year the voters approved a \$30,000 addition to the fire hall but bids at the first letting failed to come within the engineer's estimate.

A rehashing of the plans brought acceptable bids at a second letting, but task force members asked the council to postpone awarding the bids to give the force time to seek a possible alternative solution that might include new quarters for an overcrowded city clerk's office and staff.

Firemen did not arrive at any firm decision Tuesday night but appointed a committee to meet later with task force members.

Power District officials say they also are in need of more space and are hoping to find a new site for their offices, equipment

This marked the first year of the new summer session schedule involving two five and one-half week sections. In previous years the primary summer session was nine weeks.

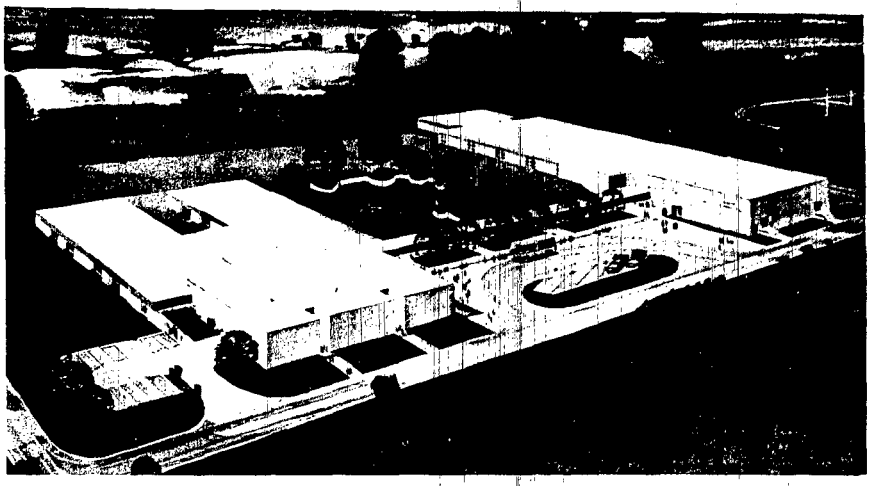

Winside-95R District Votes 424-70 To Approve New School Bond Issue

Voters in Winside's school district 95R Tuesday gave overwhelming support to the \$495,000 bond issue to build a new elementary school. The issue passed by a vote of 424 to 70.

Joe Masten, superintendent at Winside, said the vote was "very elated" about the results of the

vote. He said the vote shows that the people realized the drastic need for a new school building. "The building which will be built is a very sound one with no extras or frills but it will meet our needs," he pointed out.

Masten said bids will be let for the proposed building as soon

as possible and he hopes construction can begin in the spring.

Total cost for the construction program, which includes a new elementary building and a small addition to the present high school, will be \$523,000. The difference between the total cost and the total of the bond election

will be made up by the money being taken in from a mill levy which has been in effect for about two years, Masten noted. By next fall, he pointed out, the money will total about \$30,000.

Preliminary plans for the elementary building provide for 30,550 square feet of space. Additions and alterations to the present high school would involve about 4,000 square feet.

Chest Drive Needs Nudge To Reach Quota for '68

The Red Feather sign of Wayne's Community Chest shows a 90 per cent Tuesday. In dollars, that means about \$7,500 has been given or pledged toward the goal of \$8,400, Campaign Chairman Darrel Fuelberth reported.

While a few gifts come in daily, most of the potential donors have already given. Thus, it seems that reaching the goal will be unlikely unless Chest directors adopt additional fund-raising efforts, Fuelberth said.

The \$8,400 goal represented what the directors considered a minimum and reasonable sum to raise for the seven agencies

participating. A year earlier Wayne fell a little short of a \$9,300 goal, after 14 years of exceeding the goals.

Citizens who already have made their gift might consider giving more, Fuelberth suggested.

Wayne State Foundation Recipient Of Sizable Gifts Totaling \$7,500

Wayne State Foundation, a non-profit organization formed by alumni and friends of Wayne State College, has announced recent receipt of several sizable contributions.

A gift of \$2,000 was received from the Reynolds Metals Co., through the cooperation of vice president Jim Reynolds, who is a native of Bloomfield and received his BA degree from Wayne State in 1928. The vice president also received his LL.B. from the National University Law School in 1932 and his LLM and MPL degrees from that same school in 1933. This is the second consecutive year that the Reynolds Co. has contributed a \$2,000 gift.

Another Wayne State graduate, Mrs. Vera Kalal Falconer of New York City, has given the Foundation 244 shares of stock valued in excess of \$5,000.

Julian Torgerson, Sioux City, received his AB degree from Wayne State in 1946, and is instituting an annual \$500 industrial arts scholarship in honor of his mother, Ora Cummins. Torgerson owns and operates several nursing homes and has been a substantial contributor to the Foundation from the time of its inception.

Wayne State Foundation has a major function of assisting needy and worthy students through scholarships, assisting faculty members doing research, and purchasing items for the college not usually provided by state funds. Examples are the purchases of equipment needed for the television and radio rooms and noted art pieces.

American Bullfrog Has Varied Diet

The American bullfrog varies its insect diet with small fishes, turtles, mice and even birds. Powerful jumping legs stretching nearly two-thirds of the frog's length launch the amphibian at its prey. A large female may reach 10 inches and weigh 3½ pounds.

Amphibians such as frogs represent an intermediate state of development between fishes and reptiles. Though the creatures

emerged from the sea millions of years ago, most types still reproduce in the water.

Bullfrog tadpoles hatch from a translucent egg mass laid among water plants. Repeating the evolution of their ancestors, the fishlike creatures eventually exchange swim bladders for lungs and fins for legs.

Later, a male frog uses his voice to find a suitable mate. Each of the goggle-eyed amphibians has a distinctive call to attract females of its own species.

Electoral College Pros, Cons Given To Wayne Jaycees

Pros and cons of the present electoral college system were presented to the Wayne Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening by Dr. T. H. Stevenson of the Wayne State College history department.

Dr. Stevenson talked for about 40 minutes on the history of the electoral college, why it was formed and three instances in history when the system failed to function as intended. In 1824 the House of Representatives had to decide who would occupy the White House. In 1876 an electoral commission had to decide between two men and in 1888 Benjamin Harrison received fewer popular votes than Grover Cleveland but he received the needed number of electoral votes.

He also explained two alternatives which have been proposed - the popular method and the district method. Senator Karl Mundt of South Dakota has been a strong advocate of the district method, which would provide one elector from each Congressional district in the nation plus two at large to represent the senators from each state.

About 12 Jaycees and about 12 young Democrats and young Republicans from the college attended the meeting. Jaycee members voiced disappointment over the lack of public interest in hearing more about the electoral system.

Jaycee chapters all across the nation are presently hearing arguments for and against the electoral college. As a national organization, the Jaycees occasionally take a stand on major legislation or problems facing the nation. When the voting from each local chapter is tabulated concerning the electoral system and the alternatives, the national organization will release the results and go on record either for or against the system.

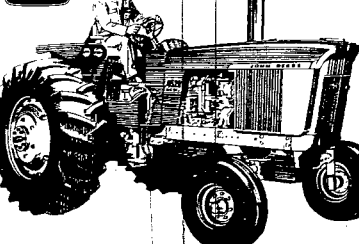

November's Moisture, Temperatures Near Long-Time Average for Area

Average temperature during the month of November was 36 degrees, only .9 degree cooler than the long-time November average for this part of Nebraska as determined by the temperatures recorded at Wakefield over several years.

Average low during the month, as recorded by Peoples Natural Gas in Wayne, was 26 degrees; average high was 46. The warmest day was the first day of the month when the thermometer climbed to 74 degrees, 44 degrees warmer than the coolest high, which was recorded on Nov. 8, 9, 10 and 11. The coolest day of the month was on Nov. 11 when the thermometer dipped to eight degrees, 32 degrees cooler than the warmest low, which was recorded on Nov. 1 and 5.

In 1967 the average temperature recorded at Wakefield during November was 35.3 degrees, slightly cooler than the average for November this year.

Precipitation recorded during last month at State National Bank amounted to 1.14 inches. Average precipitation during November, also determined by readings over several years at Wakefield, is .94 inches. In 1967 there was only .25 inches of precipitation at Wakefield. Moisture was recorded on three days last month: Nov. 5, trace; Nov. 9, .63; and Nov. 30, .61.

Will Survey Hired Farm Labor Here

The annual Bureau of the Census national survey of hired farm workers will include households in this area, according to Director Guy A. Lutz of the Bureau's regional office in St. Paul. The director said that the bureau's interviewers will call on local households during the week of Dec. 8.

The survey is being done in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture in order to gather information about the nation's farm labor force. The questions about hired farm labor will be in addition to the regular monthly questions bureau interviewers ask to obtain information about employment for the Bureau of Labor Statistics in the U.S. Department of Labor.

Questions in the hired farm labor survey will be aimed at determining the number of hired farm workers, the number of days worked during the year, wages, nonfarm work performed by farm workers, numbers of migrant and seasonal workers, kinds of work performed, fringe benefits received by workers and average number of hours worked daily.

Households in the survey are part of a scientifically designed sample throughout the U.S., from which the Bureau collect data. All answers given by householders are confidential, and the information obtained may be used only to obtain statistical totals.

Interviewers who will visit households in this area during the survey week are: Ruth Koehler, Norfolk, and Catherine V. Moeller, Wisner.

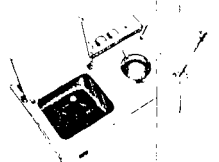

Statistics of Agribusiness Show High Dollar Values

For those who think agribusiness (agriculture and related businesses) is small potatoes, a look at these facts presented by Gov. Norbert Tiemann Friday in connection with Farm-City day may bring a change of mind.

Governor Tiemann listed these staggering statistics:

Total investment in Nebraska farms and ranches is \$9.5 billion.

Farm and ranch land and buildings were valued at \$5.2 billion.

Farm holdings of crops and livestock on Jan. 1, 1968 were worth \$1.9 billion.

Farm and ranch machinery, including irrigation equipment, is figured at \$1.4 billion.

Equipment for producing Nebraska's agricultural output includes 193,000 tractors; 106,000 automobiles; 97,000 motor trucks; 57,000 corn pickers and picker-shellers; 50,000 combines; 14,000 forage harvesters; 31,000 irrigation pumps; 20,000 grain driers and 22,000 pickup balers.

Ranking sixth in the nation, Nebraska total cash receipts from farming and ranching in 1967 amounted to \$1.7 billion. Receipts for livestock totaled around \$1,163 million, and crops \$573 million. Government payments were \$135 million.

Gross farm income in 1967 averaged nearly \$25,000 per farm for the 78,000 farms and ranches in the State—tenth highest gross

return per farm in the country. Expenditures for production amounted to \$1.4 billion.

Farms and ranches spent over \$227 million for feed in 1967. Commercial mixed feeds included in this outlay cost Nebraska livestock and poultry products \$124 million. Petroleum products cost \$67 million and repairs and service of farm equipment cost \$66 million.

Outlay for fertilizer and lime was \$77 million. Nearly 800 thousand tons of commercial fertilizers were sold for application on over 8 million acres.

Producers spent \$303 million dollars for feeding and breeding livestock, and nearly \$16 million for seeds. They paid \$108 million for taxes on farm and ranch property; \$84 million in net rent to landlords and \$33 million in interest on farm property.

Meat packers produced 2.8 billion pounds of red meat valued at over \$1.3 billion, including value of by-products worth nearly \$135 million. Poultry plants processed 32 million pounds of poultry meat valued at \$9 million. About 12,500 people are employed by meat packers and poultry processors.

The flour milling industry produced about 7 million hundred-weight of flour valued at \$40 million. Mill feeds—bran, shorts and middlings—add another \$5.5 million to this industry.

Capacity of commercial grain storage is nearly 500 million bushels. Farms had 943 million bushels of grain storage capacity. Over 30 per cent of these farm structures were made of metal.

Nebraska leads all states in manufacture of dehydrated alfalfa. The 88 alfalfa mills produced 653 thousand tons of alfalfa meal valued at \$33 million.

The 76 Nebraska hatcheries produced 11 million chicks and over 700 thousand turkey poults valued at \$3.8 million in 1967.

Dairy products manufactured in 1967 had a wholesale value of nearly \$84 million. Dairy plants employed 3,000 people with a payroll of \$18 million.

10,500 persons in 1967 with a payroll of around \$40 million. Wholesale trade associated mainly with food had 3,100 employees with a payroll of around \$20 million.

The transportation bill for marketing food products originating on Nebraska farms can be estimated at \$210 million. Nearly 25,000 persons are engaged in transporting farm products, processed food and merchandise needed on the farms and ranches.

Farm employment during 1967 averaged 97,000 family workers and 17,000 hired workers who were paid about \$39 million.

Farm and ranch families are big customers for retail goods and services. They spent \$275 million during 1967 for family living.

Calling Vietnam? Better Plan Ahead

Wayne residents who have relatives stationed in Vietnam were advised by the telephone company recently to plan ahead if they wish to talk with them during the approaching holiday season:

"In most instances it is easier for a serviceman to call home than for his family to try reaching him in Vietnam," said M. D. Smith, manager, Northwestern Bell.

"That is why servicemen are encouraged to notify their families in advance if they expect to telephone home, particularly around the holidays."

Smith said that more than 38,000 calls were completed between the US and Vietnam last year, four and one-half times as many as in 1965.

But most of the calls, he added, were completed from the Vietnam end, rather than from the US, because of the difficulty of locating servicemen when calls come in from the states.

"Every effort is made to locate the serviceman when a call is received in Saigon but it is

much more practical for the serviceman to place the call on his own when he is able to do so," Smith said.

Travel restrictions and curfews imposed in Saigon in the past have complicated the task of locating servicemen, he explained.

For this reason it is important for the caller to have the serviceman's unit, his APO number and, if possible, a telephone number where he can be reached.

The speed of handling a call to Vietnam depends on the volume of calls pending at the time and availability of the serviceman on the Vietnam end, Smith said.

Calls originating in Vietnam, he added, are handled on a "first come, first served" basis at the various telephone centers established for servicemen.

"But when a serviceman does get to a telephone, it is usually just a matter of minutes before his call is completed to the states," he noted.

Calls between the US and Vietnam have been averaging about 160 a day but this figure is expected to increase during the holiday season. Saigon is 14 hours ahead of central time.

"The heavy concentration of so many troops in a small country at war created some real communications problems," Smith said.

"Surplus is still not what we would like it to be but it has been improved over the past several years."

Until 1967, servicemen could call home only from Saigon. Calls can now be placed from hospitals and bases in Ton Son Nhut, Long Binh, Cam Ranh Bay, Nha Trang and Qui Nhon. After Dec. 1, calls also can be made to the US from Da Nang.

However, US callers may still reach only telephones in Saigon and the immediate vicinity.

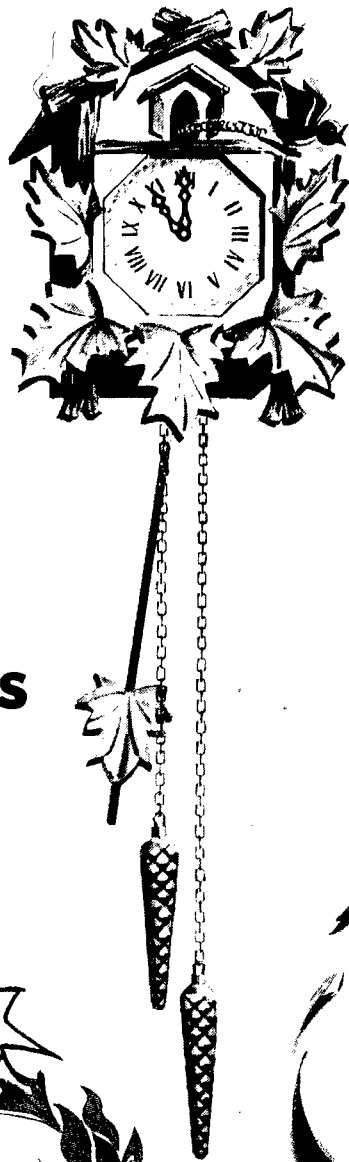

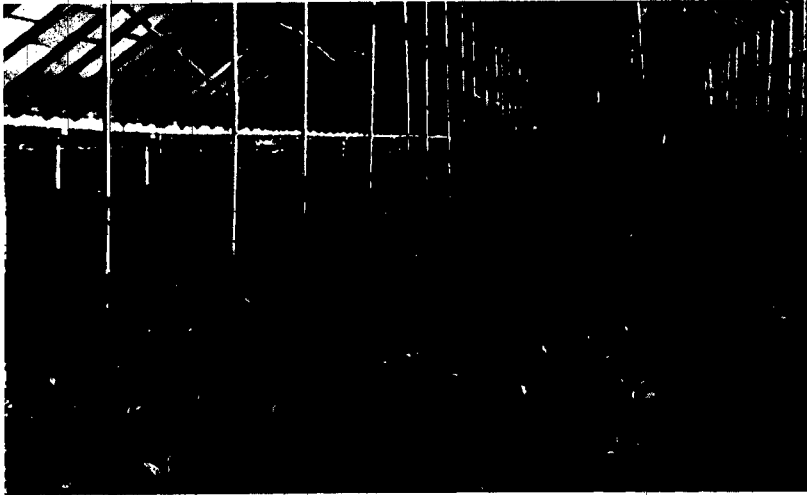

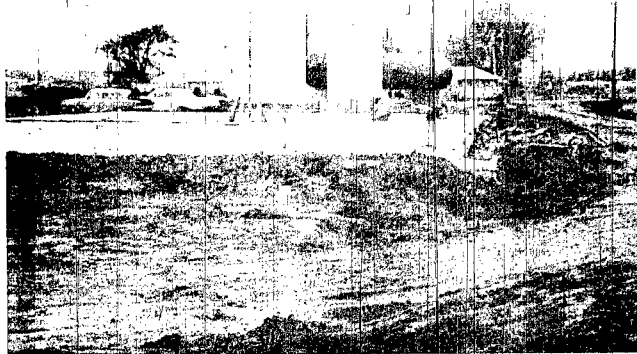

STANDARD OIL FARM SERVICE CENTER, located one mile east of Wayne on Highway 35, is about 30 per cent complete, according to Robert Vakoc of Vakoc Construction Co., general contractor. The photo was taken from east of the dry plant looking southwest. The large storage tanks were just recently installed. The dark tank, 61 feet long, will hold 30,000 gallons of LP gas. The three standing tanks are each about 10 1/2

feet in diameter and will hold about 20,000 gallons. Vakoc noted that about 60 per cent of the underground work is complete. When finished the service center will employ from 10 to 14 people at peak periods. Included on the four-acre site will be a large combination room available free of charge for training classes and meetings. Other farm service centers have been constructed by Standard Oil in Beatrice, York and Fremont.

VA Education Assistance Available to Vets' Widows Beginning December 1

An estimated 985 widows in Nebraska of veterans who died as the result of military service will be eligible for up to 36 months of educational assistance from the Veterans Administration beginning Dec. 1.

C. W. Nixon, manager, VA Regional Office, Lincoln, also said that starting at that time, the wives of approximately 760 totally and permanently disabled veterans in Nebraska will also be entitled to VA educational assistance payments of \$130 a month—up to a maximum of 36 months—for full-time institutional

training. The allowance for three-quarter time training is \$95 a month, with \$60 being paid for half-time training under the new law granting these widows and wives VA educational help for the first time in the history of veterans' benefits in the United States, Nixon said.

Widows and wives now eligible for this benefit will have until Dec. 1, 1976 to complete their training under this new program, he said. Women who become eligible in the future for VA edu-

cation assistance due to the service-connected death or permanent and total disability of their husbands will have eight years to complete their training.

Nixon said eligibility of widows and wives does not depend on when their husbands served in the Armed Forces; however, he added, if a widow remarries or a wife divorces her disabled husband she loses her entitlement. It will not be necessary for eligible widows and wives to contact the VA for detailed information on this new program.

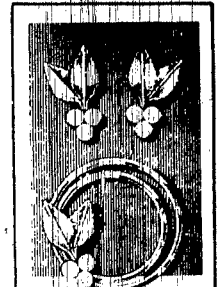
He said that in the near future the Veterans Administration will mail explanatory material with widows' dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) checks

and with compensation checks for totally and permanently disabled veterans.

SS Q & A

Q: If a person receives disability benefits when he is a young man does this raise his benefit (or be lower) when he reaches retirement age?

A: No, the only effect it could have would be to make the benefit higher at retirement age. This is so because we would exclude the years you could not work when we figure your benefit. This is true only if you establish a period of disability.

Seventh & Main

As too often happens, the correction of one problem leads to another problem. It has happened at the intersection of Seventh and Main.

The construction of the wider intersection was designed to make the intersection safer to both pedestrians and vehicles. It has partially fulfilled that goal, but at the same time has created other problems.

Drivers, used to the intersection as it was, are no longer sure about where they are to stop at the intersection because there are no painted pedestrian lanes. Pedestrians find that the wider lanes take even longer to cross and as yet are not really safer than before.

The problem will be with us for a while before it can be corrected. It cannot be corrected at the present because of unavoidable circumstances.

Capital News — New Federal Roads Ruling Slows State's Roads Work

LINCOLN—The state is asking the federal government to take another look at a recent ruling.

First Sen. Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff, then the State Highway Advisory Commission requested Nebraska's congressional delegation to put on some pressure in Washington to have the ruling reversed—at least as far as Nebraska is concerned.

The controversial ruling was issued recently by the Bureau of the Budget. It says the practice of states paying the entire cost of highway construction, then accepting after-the-fact matching payments from the federal government, must be halted during the rest of this fiscal year.

Nebraska has never used this "advancing" method, officials say, because it has never had the available money to build roads on its own. But the constitutional amendment approved by the voters this fall would permit revenue bonds to be issued for highway financing—and this would permit the state to move ahead with construction without waiting for federal allotment.

Carpenter said it was ironic the federal rules were changed at the same time Nebraska was in a position to take advantage of the system. The highway commission agreed. Both wrote the congressmen.

Carpenter and Commissioner Dan Ramsey, also of Scottsbluff, said the bond money could be used to complete the Interstate Highway through downtown Omaha and across the Panhandle. Ramsey said it was "terribly important" these projects be finished quickly.

The highway commissioner also said it was wise to use bond money for this type of work because the bonds could be paid off with the federal allocations as they are released in Washington.

Construction Moves Along Statistics issued by the Federal Department of Transportation show Nebraska is doing a little

ers in the budget it has requested for the coming biennium. Inflation, Duncan said, will require a budget increase of 13 per cent just to "go on as we are."

Enrollments Zooming Nebraska's four state colleges are growing rapidly. In fact, State College Coordinator John Gustad says the total enrollment has tripled in the past decade.

Led by a 339 per cent increase at Kearney, Gustad said, the total enrollment at all four schools has spiraled from 3,394 in 1958 to 11,706 this year.

Kearney had 1,607 students 10 years ago and has 5,362 now. Chadron has grown from 712 to 2,032, Wayne from 1,144 to 3,068 and Peru from 521 to 1,244.

Nebraska's "DA" Resigns The U.S. District Attorney for Nebraska has submitted his resignation.

Theodore Richling, whose offices are at Omaha, said the resignation is effective Jan. 20—the day Richard Nixon will be inaugurated as president.

It is customary for district attorneys to resign when the presidency changes parties. Richling has not announced his plans.

Give Breeding Advice The University of Nebraska Animal Science Department has decided to make information on beef cattle cross-breeding available through its extension office.

Frank Baker, chief of the department, said the University had been receiving repeated questions on the subject and decided to make its test data available to stockmen.

Universities have traditionally avoided recommending breeding procedures and programs, Baker said. He said there will be no attempt to convince anyone to crossbreed, but assistance will

While state and local governments are searching for ways to improve crime prevention and criminal justice, the State Institutions Department is looking for money to raise penal officers' salaries.

Director Donald Duncan said it was difficult to keep enough security officers on the Penal Complex payroll because the state salaries are about \$100 per month lower than police and sheriff's departments pay comparable officers.

The Institutions Department has included raises for its off-

County Agent's Column

Northeast Extension Notes

Portable dishwashers are the models you hook up to your kitchen sinks, disconnect after use and roll out of the way. They are available in top-loader or front-loader models and require no special plumbing.

Where kitchens lack space for permanent dishwashers, the portable model may fit conveniently. Another advantage is being able to take it with you without any fuss should you be moving.

In testing some front-loader and top-loader models the Consumer Union found the two types about equal in performance. Your choice then would be based on other factors—price, your kitchen layout, convertibility and special features.

As a group front-loaders are more convenient than top-loaders because top and bottom loading racks are equally accessible. However this type takes more floor space due to its pullout design. The top also can serve as a loading platform, a convenience sacrificed in the top-loading model. Most front-loaders are convertible for permanent installation should that ever be desired.

All models come with a three-prong grounding plug so you should use a corresponding grounded outlet. Don't use an adapter to convert a two-prong outlet. An electrician should install the correct grounded outlet.

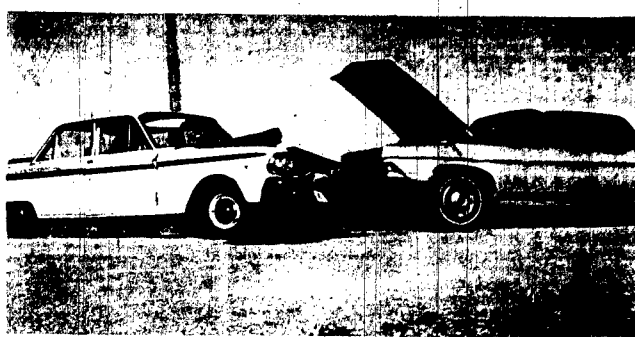

In another accident Sunday afternoon a car and a stock truck were in collision at a corner three miles south of Wayne on Highway 15.

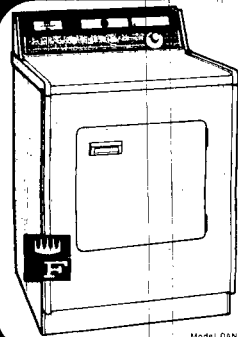

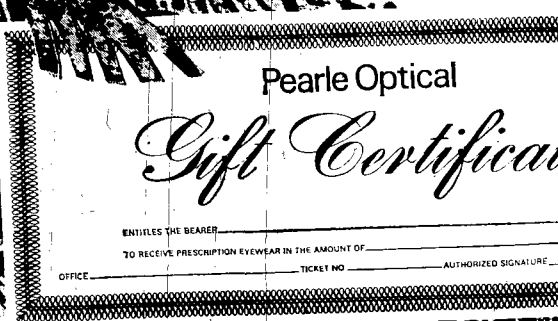

Stalks Important Cattle Feed Now

Corn stalks are important cattle feed this year. With hay scarce and high priced, feeding stalks can save money. Fortunately the stalks from corn that produced little grain seem to be very attractive to cattle.

Drought-damaged stalk fields look bad, but according to reports received by Walt Tolman, Northeast Station cattleman, cattle are eating them with relish. "These stalks are staying high in moisture, and probably contain a little more protein and sugar and less indigestible fiber than stalks usually do when a good grain crop has been harvested," Tolman said.

To get the best returns from feeding stalks, additional mineral and protein should be fed, according to Tolman. In tests at Northeast Station a protein supplement fed to calves running in stalk fields added about 50 per cent to their gain. Three pounds of supplement produced a pound of beef in this test. Two methods of feeding supplement were tried, blocks and pellets. The blocks were easy to handle but the amount consumed was hard to control and experimenters thought some calves ate more than others. Calves soon learned to come to the pick-up horn when pellets were fed in banks. This source of supplement was cheaper than block and less was wasted in mud.

Alfalfa hay can be used to add protein and mineral to stalks. Only five or six pounds daily will be needed to balance the ration. It probably can be fed every other day or even every third day with about equal results and a saving of labor.

Stock cows are best to clean up corn or sorghum fields real well so there will be no volunteer crop next spring. Young stock should not be forced to feed fields too close or stay out in extreme weather.

dence of record. If you have been receiving VA outpatient treatment, VA's own records may be used as evidence.

Q: My wife and I are both veterans with full GI loan eligibility. The home we want to purchase will require a loan of \$50,000. Our lender says he won't make us a GI loan in this amount unless the VA will guarantee \$25,000 of the loan amount. Can we combine our entitlement of \$12,500 each to do this?

A: Yes, provided the VA determines the reasonable value of the home is at least \$50,000. It would also be necessary, of course, that the family income be sufficient to handle the mortgage payments and other family expenses.

VA Q & A

Q: I am a veteran attending college under the GI Bill and plan to be married in the near future. Can I claim my wife as a dependent for an increased educational allowance from the Veterans Administration even though she will be working? What documents do I have to submit to the VA?

A: Yes, you may claim your wife as a dependent regardless of whether she is working. As a full-time student, your VA educational assistance allowance under the GI Bill will be increased from \$130 to \$155 a month. You should tell the VA immediately when you are married, since your increased educational allowance will be dated from the time VA is notified of your marriage. Then as soon as possible you should furnish VA with a copy of the public record of your marriage. VA must have a copy of this record before it can pay you the increased allowance.

Q: How do I reopen my disability claim? My service-connected condition has become worse.

A: Submit a statement from your doctor indicating his findings as to your condition, his treatment and his opinion of the future progress of the disability. VA will give you a physical examination if the evidence is adequate. A change in rating is based upon the report of the physical examination and all other evi-


