University of Nebrasks re-search has shown that minimum levels of roughage give more con-sistent performance than all-con-centrate rations, Dr. Walter Woods told livestock feeders at-tending the Nebrasks Livestock Feeders Association convention at York Wednesday. "Placing emphasis on low roughage rations for finishing

"Placing emphasis on low roughage rations for finishing cattle has increased efficiency of gain. Thus, in most cases, it gives increased economy of gain as compared to higher levels of roughage," the NI"s livestock nutritionist told feeders. "The level shown to be most consistent in rate of gain and near optimum in efficiency of feed conversion was five to 15 per cent (hay equivalent) of the total ration," Dr. Woods con-tinued.

total ratio," Dr. Woods con-tinued. As to silage versus hay, Uni-versity experiments have shown them to be equally effective in supplying the roughage required in finishing rations, he said. However, "the data to date would suggest liver condemna-tion due to absecsses is in creased with minimum levels of rough-age," he warned. Woods reported that urea in liquid or dry supplements has been shown to be utilized similar. Also







The commission said the Ne-braska rules do not go as far as regulations adopted by other states. They are not expected, at least by the commissioners, to place an "undo burden" on any of the companies and, thus, result in requests for rate in-creases. Among the new regulations is a regulation that telephone companies provide for each in-corporated municipality in their service areas a lighted, prominently located public toil station (telephone booth). The booth is to be available to the public on 24-hour basis. The commission, how ever, took note of the times and in-cluded a provision for waiving this requirement if the company could prove "abusive vandalism" made the booth impractical. With the new rules, which take effect Dec. 31, companies will be required to have sufficient equipment to handle emer-gencies. Emergencies could include bower failures or operator fill-nesses. In case of power break-downs, the companies will each be prequired to have available within ay ear adequate emergen-cy electric generating facilities. The rules also cover such things as billing statements to customers, records to help the commission keep track of a com-pany and regulations f. Mun-nelly of Omaha saidthe new rules would form the base for future commission action in the area of service standards.
