

## Farm Management Course for Adults; School Board OK's Tutoring, Easement

An adult education class in farm management sponsored by the Wayne schools will begin Jan. 7. The class was approved Monday night by the Wayne Board of Education.

Teaching the 10-meeting course will be Lee Foote, a former vocational agriculture instructor. Fees for the course will be nominal, Supt. Francis Haun said. Persons wishing to enroll in the course should contact the Wayne High office for details.

A tutoring service for students having academic difficulties was approved also. The service would be furnished free of charge by members of the Wayne Student Education Association of Nebraska for their experience and under the supervision of the school. About 20 members have volunteered their services, mostly for work on the elementary level.

In other actions the board:

- Gave final approval for an easement for a sewer line across school property to serve six lots at the north end of Oak Drive.
- Were told rates for commercial users of natural gas on Peoples Natural Gas company lines would be increased five per cent effective Jan. 1.
- Discussed taking legal action against the contractor supplying doors for the high school which the board believes are unsatisfactory. An inspector from the company checked the doors three weeks ago, Haun said, and indicated that two of the five doors would be replaced, but nothing has been heard from him since. The school board is still withholding payment on the doors awaiting satisfactory installation.
- Mrs. Dorothy Ley and Morris Sandahl were appointed to meet with the teachers' salary committee as the committee plans for 1969 salaries.
- Heard a report that the Nebraska State School Boards Association is planning a meeting in Wayne Dec. 19, and will be served lunch in the school cafeteria.
- Agreed to work with the district's teachers and administrators in the self-evaluation project currently in progress.

## Set Free Ticket Guides For School Lunch Plan

A set of guidelines for serving free or reduced price meals to children of District 17 was adopted Monday night by the district's board of education.

Schools participating in the National School Lunch program are required by federal regulations to serve lunches free of charge or at reduced prices to all children who are determined to be in need of them. The guidelines will fulfill this requirement. Determination of need is made by local school authorities.

Supt. Francis Haun pointed out, however, that there is actually no such thing as a free lunch—it must be paid for by someone. He further pointed out that regulations require the program be operated on a non-profit basis.

Every meal served, he said, actually costs about 55 cents and is sold to children at the regular charge of 35 cents. This is possible because federal subsidies in cash and commodities, local donations and the hard work and good management of a dedicated school lunch staff make it so, he added.

Parents who believe their children should receive lunches free or at reduced prices should contact the school, telephone 375-3150, or by writing to Supt. F. R. Haun, 611 West Seventh, Wayne.

A form which requests a minimum of information for making determination will be sent to the parents. Those parents requesting free or reduced price meals were assured by Haun that the information supplied would be treated in confidence and every effort made to prevent other children and parents from learning who receives such lunches.

Students receiving meal tickets for such lunches will be given the same meal ticket as other students. The tickets will be issued in privacy to further protect the anonymity of the student.

A set of federal ratios has been established between family income and the number of children in the family to help determine who will be eligible for the free or reduced price meals. A board of three members of the school administration will determine each case.

## Peru's 'All-American' Is New WSC Grid Mentor

Del Stoltenberg will be the new head football coach at Wayne State College, President W. A. Brandenburg announced Monday after approval by the State Normal Board.

Stoltenberg, head coach of football at Grand Island High School the past three years, will join the Wayne faculty June 1, 1969, with the rank of assistant professor of health and physical education.

He will succeed John Jermier, who resigned last month effective at the end of the present school year.

Stoltenberg, 33, is native of Nebraska City, graduated from high school there. At Peru State College he twice rated All-Nebraska College Conference as a halfback and quarterback and was a Little All-American as a senior.

After graduating from Peru in 1957, Stoltenberg was assistant football coach at South Sioux City High School, then head coach of football and track at Scribner High School seven years. He took a year for master's degree study at Wayne State and received his degree in 1966, then moved to Grand Island.

He is married to the former Dolores Smith of Nebraska City. They have four children—Jay, 7, Tracy, 5, Melissa, 4, and Jon, 5 months.

## Council Talks Annexations; OK's Police Training School

A proposal to annex various parcels of land in and around Wayne was approved by the city council Monday night. An additional 16 or 17 blocks of paving was also recommended; a get-tough attitude on unpaid utilities bills was adopted and police were granted permission to apply for admission to a police training school sponsored by the state highway patrol.

Land in the annexation recommendation includes the two-acre tract of land at the south end of Nebraska street designated as Scout Park, a triangular land on the east end of town bounded by Highway 35, the railroad track and Valley Drive which includes McRight's First Addition and the land west to the present city limits; an area north of Fairgrounds avenue to the railroad track which includes property on which Feeders Elevator, Flung Ready Mix and Golden

Approval for the planning of Farran's First Addition on the east side of Wayne was given Monday night by the city planning commission, with the stipulation that sewer and water lines be run across the property to the east line to provide access to utilities for subsequent developments.

Harlan Farran has been contemplating the site for a steak house.

In the same meeting the commission approved Cecil Wretted's plan for an addition to his trailer court on condition that Wretted allot the prescribed 3,000 square feet of space to each trailer and that he screen the trailer court from the highway by fence or shrubbery.

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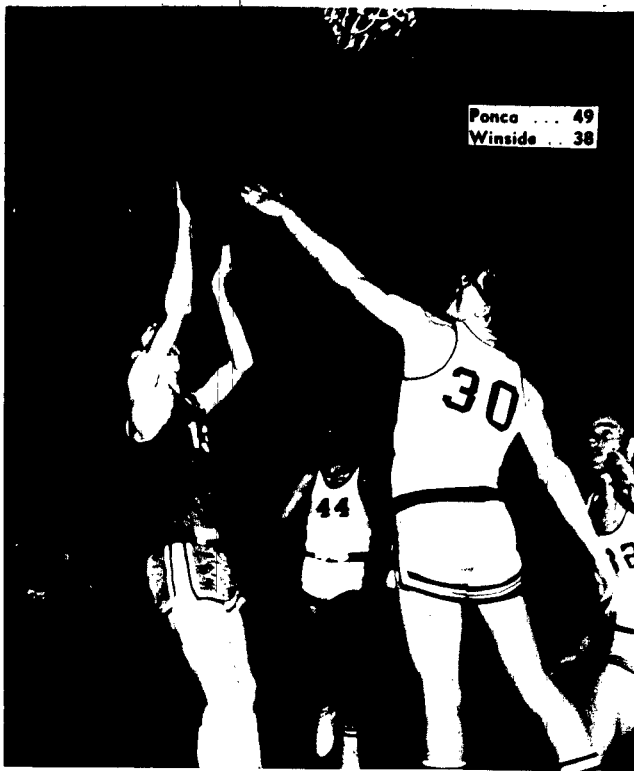
# Winside Wildcats Drop Conference Opener to Ponca Indians, 49-38

Winside Wildcats suffered a 49-38 defeat at the hands of the Ponca Indians Saturday night in the first Lewis and Clark Conference tilt for the Wildcats. Ponca upped its record to two wins and no losses after whipping Allen 44-31 Friday night.

The Indians broke lose for a 10-point lead early in the first quarter before the visitors were able to tally their first point. It finally came on a gift shot by

Hob Wacker. Ponca's Aubrey Voss and Kelly Hasmmussen led the Ponca attack in the opening stanza with shots from the outside as the hosts built up an 18-6 lead going into the second quarter.

Winside closed the gap slightly in the second quarter as the Wildcats concentrated on fast breaks and waiting for good openings. Ponca took a 25-17 lead into

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# At Home This Week

With six players averaging 10 or more points, Wayne State's basketball team plays two home games this week, against Northwestern College of Iowa Thursday night, Concordia College of Nebraska Saturday night, both at 7:30 in Hlee Gymnasium.

Junior center Paul Emanuel of North Bend is the point leader on Wayne's 3-1 team. He has 59 points, followed closely by second center, Junior Dave Schneider of Blair with 57. Junior forward Bill Goodwin of Lawton, later, and Dean Flotson of Wayne have 53 and 51, respectively; senior guard Bill Kruse of Sutherland, Ia., 50, and junior guard Marc Sommerfeld of Odebolt, Ia., 40 points.

The Wildcats have averaged 86.7 points, their opponents 75.5. In field goal accuracy Wayne has a terrific 48.8 per cent, its opponents almost as high at 47.4. Residents in ten northeast Nebraska towns are reminded that Saturday is the day Boy Scout troops will start their newspaper collecting project in Wayne, Windele, Wakefield, Carroll, Allen, Dixon, Concord, Hoskins, Laurel and Belden.

Scouts will start their pickups shortly after 9 a.m. according to project chairman Rowan Wiltsie.

Slick paper publications and magazines should not be included in the papers as only newsprint is wanted and can be sold.

Each troop will get \$8 per ton credit for the paper it collects. Papers need not be handled and tied. They may be in boxes, bags or just piled loose, however, if the weather is windy, piles should be weighted in some way to prevent them from blowing away.

The price of \$8 a ton is guaranteed to Scout units for the next two years Wiltsie said. The paper is shipped to a plant for reprocessing into usable newsprint.

In all towns, except Carroll, residents are asked to place their papers on porches or steps where they will be visible from the street. In Carroll, residents are asked to take paper to the city auditorium where the Scouts from Windele will pick up the paper about 1 p.m.

Each ton of newspaper will yield the equivalent of 17 pulp trees, thus the drive serves as a conservation measure as well as a fund-raising project for the Boy Scouts, and provides a community service in removing the newspapers.

Wiltsie said pickups are planned for each six weeks. Residents can, therefore, by continuing to save newsprint, get rid of their old papers and also help the Scouts raise funds for their projects.

### Tests Show Beef Cattle Gain More When Fed on Low Roughage Ration

University of Nebraska research has shown that minimum levels of roughage give more consistent performance than all-concentrate rations, Dr. Walter Woods told livestock feeders attending the Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association convention at York Wednesday.

"Placing emphasis on low roughage rations for finishing cattle has increased efficiency of gain. Thus, in most cases, it gives increased economy of gain as compared to higher levels of roughage," the NU's livestock nutritionist told feeders.

"The level shown to be most consistent in rate of gain and near optimum in efficiency of feed conversion was five to 15 per cent (hay equivalent) of the total ration," Dr. Woods continued.

As to silage versus hay, University experiments have shown them to be equally effective in supplying the roughage required in finishing rations, he said. However, "the data to date would suggest liver condemnation due to abcesses is increased with minimum levels of roughage," he warned.

Woods reported that urea in liquid or dry supplements has been shown to be utilized similarly in beef cattle rations. Also "In finishing rations, urea-based supplements have tended to give similar performance patterns as has soybean meal supplements," he added.

"However, in growing rations based on corn silage the use of all urea supplement has not supported maximum rate and efficiency of gain," Dr. Woods said. "Soybeans supplements consistently supported increased performance over urea in these growing experiments," he added.

gains," he said. He told the feeders that other research presently being carried out at that University includes: The optimum level of corn silage in finishing programs and the comparative value of silage and hay in finishing rations.

New methods to enhance the utilization of liquid and dry supplements based primarily upon urea, plus the comparative value of certain protein and non-protein nitrogen sources.

Factors which influence grain utilization. Processing treatments of forages to enhance their feeding value. The influence of forage quality in beef cattle rations.

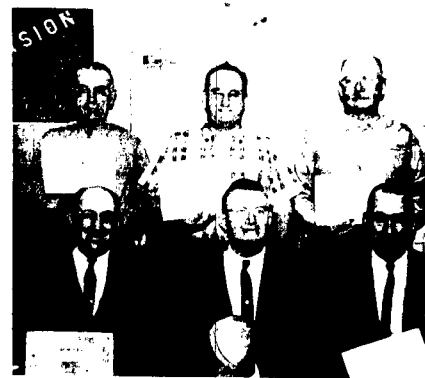
The special Christmas party being planned by the 1,500 students of Harper, Schramm and Smith Residents halls will be held Saturday and Sunday.

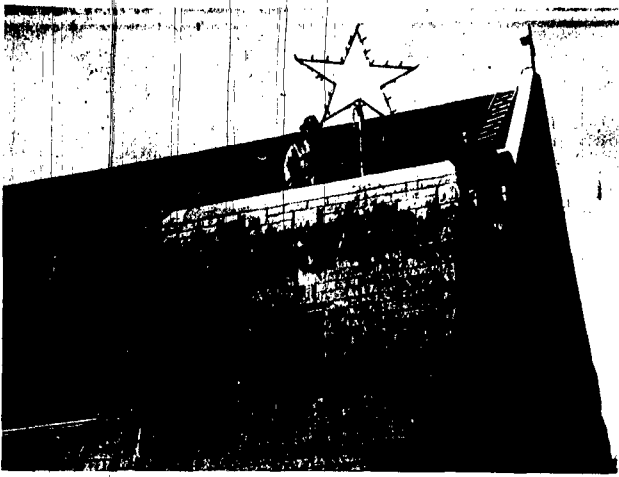
