What Kind of Fool?

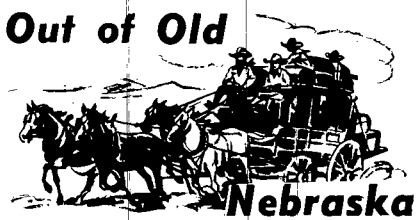

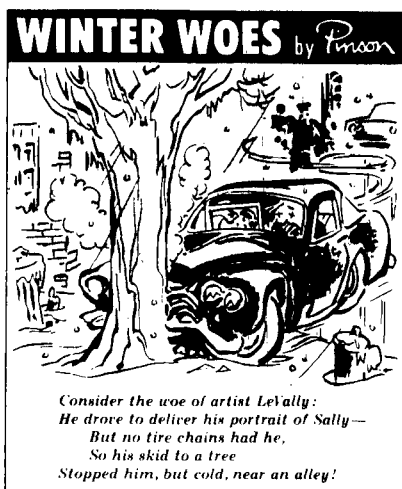

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of my friends in Wayne a VERY MERRY CHRISTMAS AND A HAPPY NEW YEAR.

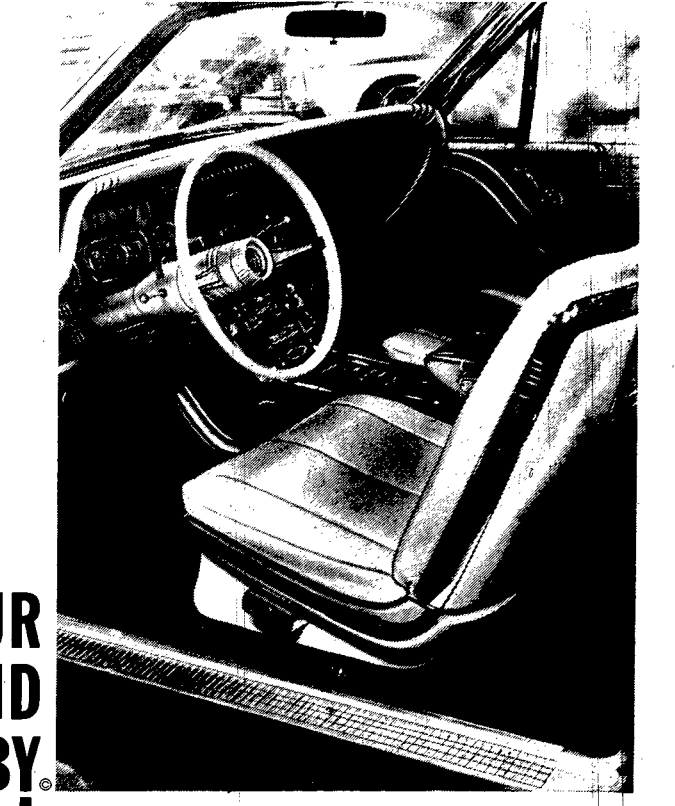

Echtenkamp led Wayne under the boards in the preliminary game with 14 rebounds. He was

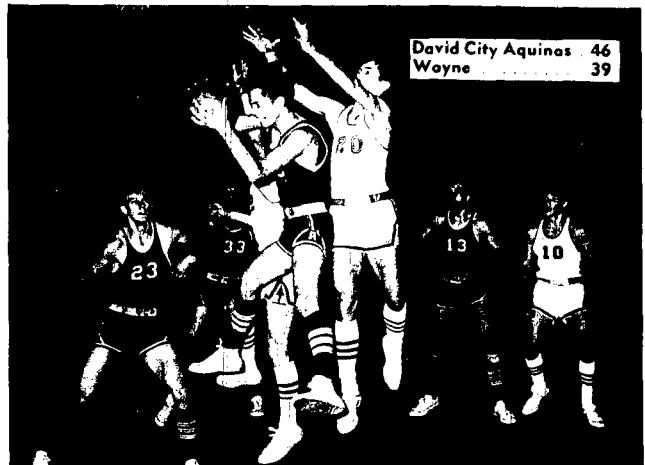
followed by Mike Birkoff with eight and Armbruster with four.
