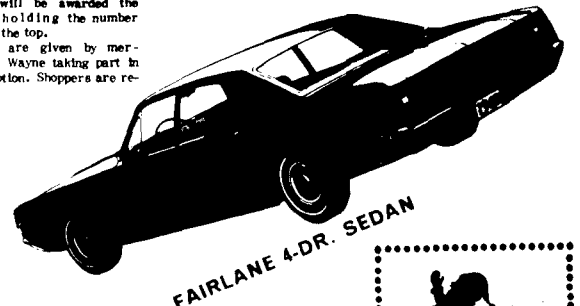
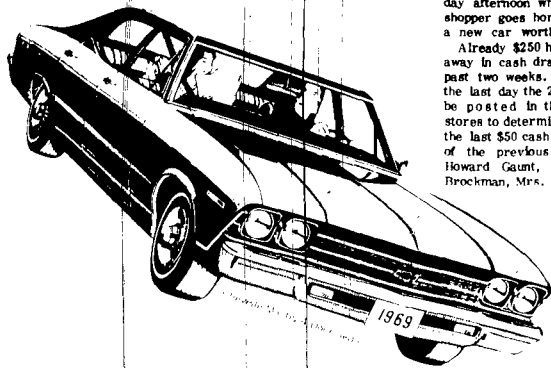

Rowland Is Now Semi-conscious

Philis Rowland, 34, was critically injured Oct. 19 when struck by a car as he was walking along the side of the new paving about a mile south of Wayne. Rowland was walking home from town where he was employed by McNatt's Hardware as a television repairman.

He was transferred to the Veterans' Hospital in Omaha Oct. 22 where he continues to remain a patient.

Mrs. Rowland and the seven children moved to 2214 Hamilton Blvd. in Sioux City where she will have some help with the children.

In response to an inquiry concerning her husband's condition, Mrs. Rowland said, "He is no longer critical but in very serious condition. He is semi-conscious to the extent that he can see, hear and talk. He does not know who he is, however, where he is or why he is there. Also he doesn't seem to recognize anyone. He is able to move his head, but otherwise appears to be completely paralyzed," she stated.

Continuing she remarked, "He is still not receiving anything by mouth but is fed through a tube and receives a daily intravenous feeding."

Ice-coated streets Thursday and Friday increased driving risks and were a direct factor in nine vehicles being damaged in two accidents.

Wayne police were called to investigate when a 1965 Chevrolet station wagon, attempting to stop at the stop sign at 7th and Lincoln, slid through into the intersection, into the path of a 1963 Chevrolet eastbound on 7th. The collision occurred Thursday around 3 p.m.

Then another accident Thursday at East 10th and Window streets involved a fender-bending pile up, in which seven vehicles took part. A 1965 Ford was driving south on Window and struck two unknown cars that had collided earlier. The two

unknown vehicles left the scene and shortly four additional cars banged together, striking the 1965 Ford again. The intersection was ice-coated from the storm.

Friday the 13th police investigated when a 1968 Chevrolet was anticipating pulling out of Arnie's parking lot and had stopped prior to entering the street. Meanwhile a 1968 Ford, backing out of a parking stall, failed to see the Chevrolet and collided.

Around 4:40 p.m. Friday a 1965 Chevrolet was backing up in the Super Valu parking lot and struck the left rear corner of a parked 1967 Pontiac and then drove away.

Wayne's police also impounded a dog; checked out a business firm with an unlocked door; and towed in two autos during the past few days.

Dutch Elm Spray Set for Wayne

Wayne trees will be sprayed for Dutch Elm disease the week of Dec. 22, according to an announcement by City Clerk Dan Sherry.

Toys, children, pets and cars should be under cover while the spray helicopter is overhead. The helicopter will make several passes over the city before actual spraying begins and warnings will be given by radio and loud speaker.

In case of adverse weather the spraying will be postponed until a more favorable time.

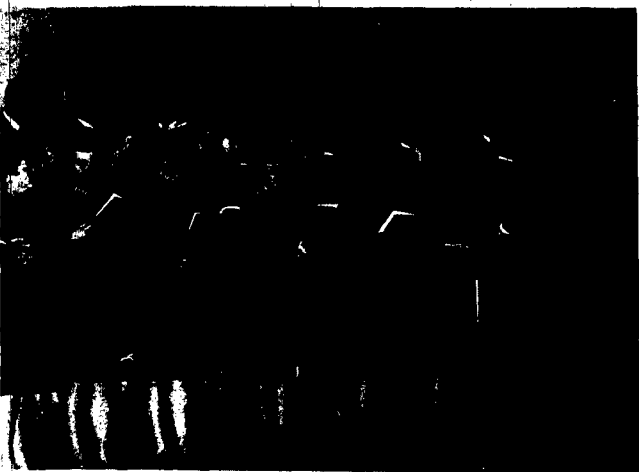

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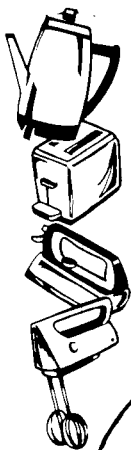
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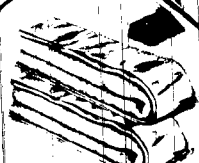


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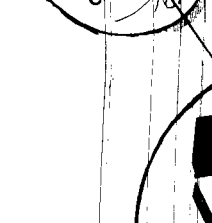
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Laurel Sets Grueling Pace Tuesday Demolishes Wayne Quintet, 88-46

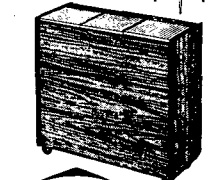

Wayne's A team came off second best in the 111, losing to Fremont 31-21. In the B meet Wayne wrestlers trounced Fremont 34-20.

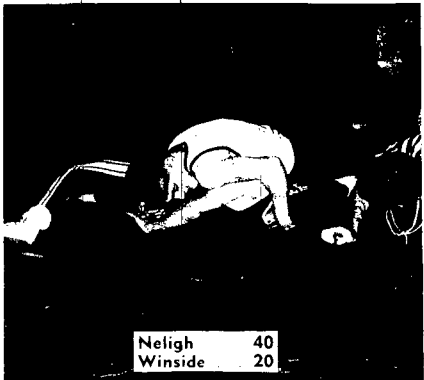

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF WINSIDE, WAYNE COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article IV, Chapter 5 of the Ordinances of the Village of Winside is hereby repealed and is hereby amended as follows: (a) FIREWORKS, PYROTECHNICS, SPARKlers, TORCHES, COLOR FIREWORKS, SPRAY FOUNTAINS, TORCHES, COLOR FIREWORKS, STAR AND COMET TYPE COLOR AERIAL SHOTS WITHOUT explosive charge for the purpose of making a noise, color effects, toy cap pistols, and toy caps each of which does not contain more than twenty-five hundredths of a gram of explosive material. Such fireworks shall be sold at retail only on such dates as may be permitted by the laws of the State of Nebraska, provided, such toy cap pistols and toy caps may be sold, given away, used, discharged or caused to be discharged at any time, and provided further, fireworks of any description are authorized for purpose of (a) exhibitions or displays on public grounds, (b) for the purpose of public exhibitions or displays under the auspices of any governmental subdivision of this state.

(b) FIREWORKS, EXCEPTING: (1) fireworks of any description which are sold, given away, used, discharged or caused to be discharged at any time, and provided further, fireworks of any description are authorized for purpose of (a) exhibitions or displays on public grounds, (b) for the purpose of public exhibitions or displays under the auspices of any governmental subdivision of this state.

(c) FIREWORKS, EXCEPTING: (1) fireworks of any description which are sold, given away, used, discharged or caused to be discharged at any time, and provided further, fireworks of any description are authorized for purpose of (a) exhibitions or displays on public grounds, (b) for the purpose of public exhibitions or displays under the auspices of any governmental subdivision of this state.

for such license shall be the sum of \$4.00.

(c) LOCATION OF FIREWORKS STANDS. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm, partnership or corporation to sell any fireworks at retail, possess for sale at retail, store or keep any fireworks of any description except from a stand or building used solely for the purpose of selling such fireworks. Such stand or structure shall not be located on Main Street of the Village of Winside, Wayne County, Nebraska and such building shall not be located within 20 feet from any other building structure.

(d) This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after 30 days after approval and publication as provided by law. PASSED and approved this 19th day of December, 1968.

Art Scholarships Entries Wanted By January 23

High school students in this area will again have the opportunity to receive public recognition for their achievement in art through the Nebraska Scholastic Art Awards Exhibition to be held in Omaha and Lincoln, J. L. Brandels & Sons will serve as regional sponsor of the 1969 Scholastic Art Awards program, conducted nationally by Scholastic Magazines, Inc.

This year's book announces that work may be entered in 17 classifications in the fields of painting, drawing, printmaking, design, sculpture, crafts and photography. Work selected by the judges will go on display at the Brandels

National judges will select winners of about 420 gold medals mounted on plaques with winner's name engraved, 80 scholarships to art schools and colleges, and over 500 honor certificates. Special cash awards will be the Hallmark Honor Prizes of \$100 each for the best painting or drawing from each region, and the Strathmore Awards of \$50 each for the best piece in each of the two-dimensional art classifications. In addition, the photography division offers 275 cash

awards in black-and-white and color photography, as well as the two scholarship grants.

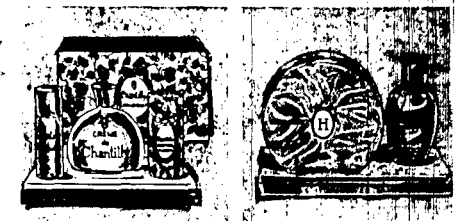
The Zachs recently completed a three-month training session in Hawaii and had to pass a week's survival test during their final tests.

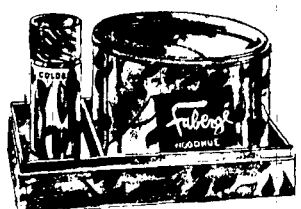

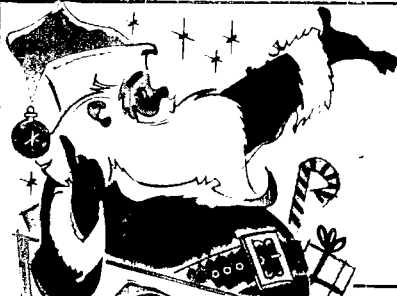

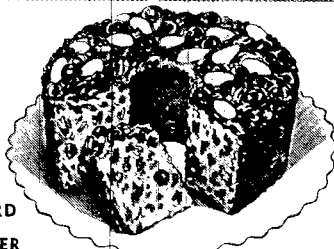

Worst Time of Year for Drivers

"This is the danger season when drivers need to be on the alert for pedestrians," according to Hillel H. Yampol, executive director, Metropolitan Chicago Nursing Home Association. He pointed out that longer hours of darkness, fog, snow, sleet and rain make it harder for drivers to see and stop in time.

"When you walk, you should try to avoid the hours between 4 p.m. and midnight, and you should remember that Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays are the worst accident days."

Drivers must see to avoid collisions with other cars or pedestrians. They should keep their headlights clean as well as their windshields. It is especially important during inclement weather to have five windshield wiper blades to insure best possible visibility. Anything less than good visibility may cause a fatal accident.

"Pedestrian-motor vehicle accidents reach their peak frequency in December and remain high throughout the winter, according to the National Safety Council," Mr. Yampol concluded.
