'68 Construction Totals \$431,000

The sounds of hammers and saws resounded through the city of Wayne during 1968 to the tune of just under one-half million dollars.

Twenty-six new building permits were issued by the city during the past year, totaling just over \$431,000. The total construction in dollars done during the past year was probably considerably higher than that since the building permits on file at the city clerk's office usually give only a conservative estimate of the cost of construction.

Building permits were issued for 18 new homes in 1968. That construction accounted for about \$350,000 of the \$431,000 started in the past year.

Voters nearest to Wayne can cast their ballots at the Cooperative Christian Ministry house at Wayne State College from 10 a.m. to noon, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. Voters nearest Winside or Carroll can cast their ballots at the First United Methodist Church in those towns.

An agency funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity, the council deals with the problems of low-income people. Its board of directors makes funding and policy decisions and approves programs of the council that apply to the county.

Voters must certify at the polling place that they lie within the low-income guidelines set by OEO. These guidelines will be posted at the polling places. Programs already established by the council in Thurston County include Neighborhood Youth Corps, Head Start and Operation Mainstream.

Vehicle Inspection Plans Suspended

Legislators suspended the mandatory inspection program Monday, consequently the following will replace the intended feature concluding the series. In a 39-1 vote Nebraska's Legislature suspended the mandatory motor vehicle inspection which was to have started Mar. 1. Legislators heard Sen. J. James Waldron of Callaway introduce a resolution Feb. 12 by which the legislature would cancel the motor vehicle department's rule 9 which has to do with glass coverage. The resolution would force the department to come up with a new ruling on the coverage.

Waldron's resolution brought to attention that the legislature could reject the administrative rules of the motor vehicle department.

Sen. Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff and Harold Simpson of Lincoln later made amendments to the resolution expanding its coverage. Monday's voting on the resolution rejected the rules set forth by the State Motor Vehicle Department that covered the inspection of vehicles.

The entire inspection program has now been suspended until the legislature approves new rules and regulations. Effects of the legislature's vote Monday requires the motor vehicle department to come up with a rewritten set of regulations which is acceptable to the governing body.

Claude Harder, operator of Claude's Standard service station, one of the two licensed inspection stations in Wayne at this time, said Tuesday morning that some inspection stations in

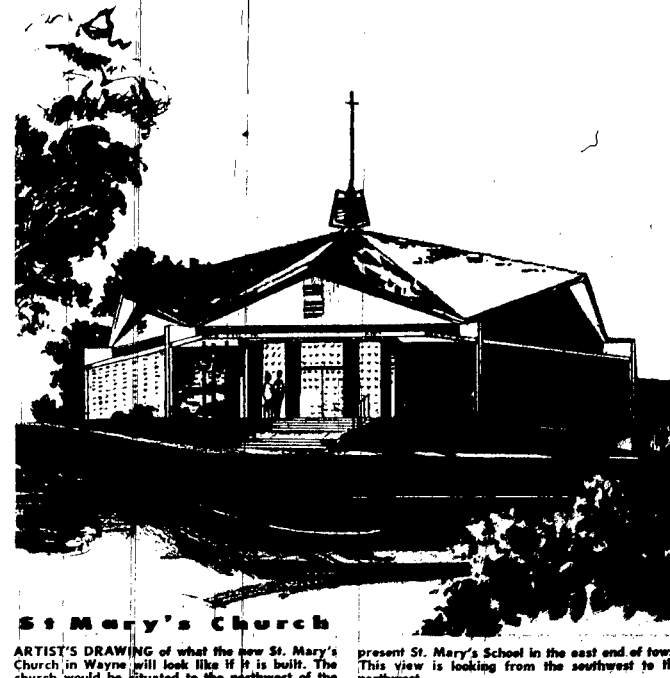
Nebraska have spent as little as \$250 and as much as \$2,500 in getting adequate equipment on hand for licensing as an inspection station. He pointed out a decelerometer with a price tag of \$50 for an example of one of the lesser pieces of required equipment. "Some of the necessary equipment will be usable anyway," Harder stated, "as we have been doing the same thing (vehicle inspection) for the past five years anyway called 'security car care' at no cost to the customer." He explained that a number of different firms have practiced similar policies.

Carl Haas, operator of Carl's Conoco station, also a licensed inspection station in Wayne, said upon hearing of the Nebraska legislature's decision, that he will

be left with between \$300 and \$400 worth of equipment. "We have already purchased \$41 worth of windshield stickers," Carl said Tuesday, "and as yet we still do not know as to whether or not the money will be refunded." Carl noted that he hadn't started inspections as yet but was licensed and ready to go. Now, he, along with all the other many firms preparing for the vehicle inspection program to commence, must wait for the legislature to take further action.

Neither Haas nor Harder had been officially notified by the State as of Tuesday morning that the mandatory inspection program had been suspended.

Hearing on Depot Closing Set for Tuesday Morning

A public hearing will be held Tuesday at 10 a.m. in the district court room in the Wayne County courthouse so interested people in this area can have a chance to voice their favor or opposition to the proposed closing of the Wayne depot.

The Chicago and North Western Railway Company has applied for authority from the State Railway Commission to close some depots in northern Nebraska, Wayne being one of them. If the Wayne

depot is closed, the town would be served by Wakefield. A representative of the State Railway Commission will be present at the hearing to listen to any arguments either for or against the closing. Other hearings have been set for Winsler, Pierce, Tekamah, Geneva and Lincoln. Wayne is currently a central agency serving Winside and Holdrege. If the depot is closed Wayne would become an associate town and Wakefield would be its central agency town.

Under the proposed plan the

Chicago and North Western shippers in associate towns would be served by the depot agent in a central agency town or his traveling representatives. All present associate stations are closed to less than carload service. Central agencies are served to interstate less than carload service but presently remain open to such Nebraska service.

The railway proposes as a part of this plan that all central and associate stations will be open to both interstate and Nebraska less than carload service subject to these limitations:

- Minimum weights of 6,000 pounds both inbound and outbound.
- All shipments shall be from one shipper to one consignee with no loading, unloading or warehousing provided by the railway company.

The railway company contends that there will be no need for station buildings at the associate stations in the proposed plan since there is no passenger service; under the railway's proposal less carload service provided at associate stations will not require the use of a station building.

UN-O Wrestlers Drop WS, 23-5, Monday

The Wayne (Nebr.) Herald, Thursday, February 20, 1969

National ratings apparently were correct for Wayne State and University of Nebraska at Omaha wrestling teams. Omaha, rated second nationally in the NIAA, defeated Wayne, rated sixth, Tuesday night in a dual that featured no less than three national champions.

Omaha's 23-5 victory proved gloomy for some 400 Wayne fans among an overflow crowd — more than 3,000 — in the UN-O fieldhouse. They watched the first five Wayne matmen defeated by decisions until the 160-pound match brought the meet's prime attraction.

This one matched two national champions from 1968, Wayne's Larry Michelson and Omaha's Wendell Hakanson, NIAA winners at 152 and 160 pounds respectively. Result: Michelson dealt Hakanson, a junior, in what an Omaha newsman called the "worst humiliation of his career," a 15-2 decision. Michelson, a senior from Jackson, Minn., gained near-pine twice and dominated nearly all the way.

Afterwards, Wayne's Bill Schwartz, a fourth-place winner in the nationals last year, said of Michelson: "He's the greatest!" Wayne's only other chance for rejoining came when heavyweight Tom Firestack, a 240-pounder from Canon City, Colo., decisively 340-pound freshman Gary Kipf Miller, 4-2. Despite the weight disadvantage, Firestack twice forced his foe close to pins.

The Wayne score would have been six points had not Referee Ron Call of Council Bluffs, Ia., penalized Coach Don Pate one point for protesting official decisions.

Wayne labored under the loss of John Yoder, the regular at 152 or 160, who suffered hyper-ventilation in Monday practice and was not allowed to compete Tuesday. As a result, Pate moved three wrestlers up one weight—Max Brannum, Bill Cartwright and Steve Hanson — and inserted Cal Johnson, an infrequent performer, at 130.

The meet, possibly the best publicized in Nebraska mat history, produced these results:

1969 Accident Rate Soars

Department having charge over sixteen counties in northeast Nebraska, could not be reached for comment.

Francke had said during a visit to Wayne several weeks ago that he thought Wayne would have a total of probably ten inspection stations when they were all licensed.

The action taken Monday by the legislature has left business firms, not only in Wayne, but all over the State, having costly equipment on hand, as they were seeking approval to operate as inspection stations.

Unless Nebraska does eventually enter the vehicle inspection program, firms that were in readiness to operate as inspection stations are more or less left "holding the bag," except for the equipment they could use anyway.

Even with the suspension of the program for six months or a year thousands of dollars spent by the State on stickers, wages for inspectors and implementation of the inspection program will have been invested with no return.

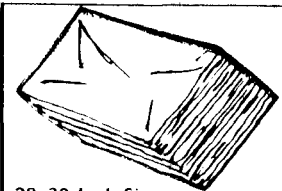
Providing another snowstorm doesn't hit again, Winside's pancake day will be held in the Winside auditorium from 4 p.m. until 8 p.m. Friday.

Allen went into the third quarter trailing the Pirates by only two points, 25-23. Sophomore Bob Mitchell, 6-1 forward who ended up high point man for the Eagles, tied the game up at 25-all with 30 seconds gone in the quarter when he tipped in a lay-up missed by one of his teammates. But that was the last the Eagles were to see of the Pirates for some time. Allen went scoreless the next four minutes while the Pirates pumped in 11 straight points, six of them by Carper. Mitchell hit another one to make it 36 to 27 but then Carper came right back with two more buckets to stretch his team's lead to 42, 39-27, with 2:43 left in the third stanza.

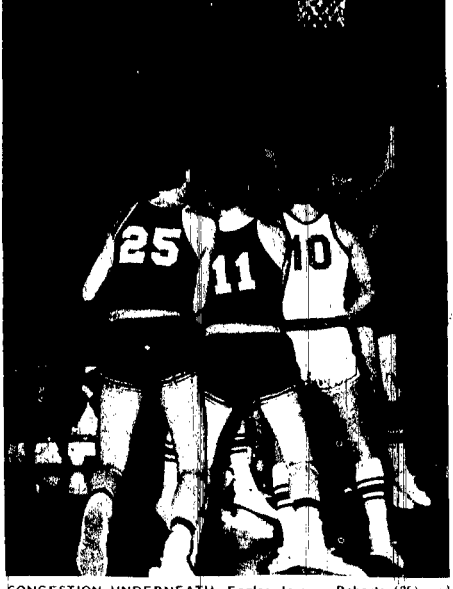

Although it didn't look that way during the game, Emerson-Hubbard had more turnovers than Allen. Emerson-Hubbard gave up the ball 31 times during the action, Allen 24. Emerson-Hubbard grabbed off considerably more rebounds than Allen, 49 to 32, leading the action for the winners under the boards was Carper with 16. Bill Brown had 11. Allen's Dennis Gelger led his team in rebounding with 10. Mitchell came up with eight. Carper's 29-point effort earned him high point honors during the night. Winside School Building Plan Changed; Sub-Soil Is Spongy on Building Site

The Wayne (Nebr.) Herald, Thursday, February 20, 1969

Winside's school board and administrators met with a representative from Dana-Larson-Roubal and Associates Feb. 3 concerning a change to be made in the building plans for Winside's new elementary school. The proposed structure was designed by the Omaha firm.

Soil tests on the site where the new half-million dollar building is to be erected revealed an area of sub-soil which was spongy. The soil testing was completed in January by Woodward and Clyde & Associates of Omaha. Architects of Dana-Larson-Roubal and Associates told the school board that the area was likely an old creek bed at one time. Com-

... pacting the dirt in the spongy area would have to be done before foundations could be put in.

Board members want to avoid repeating the experience encountered upon completion of the present high school structure in Winside when severe cracks appeared. Cracks are visible in the building's interior as a result of shifting soil beneath the structure.

Superintendent of the Winside Schools, J. Masten, said Thursday, "Rather than take a chance of having the same problem with the new building as we've had with the present one, we are going

to take all precautions."

Continuing Masten explained, "Locker rooms will be shifted from the main floor in the new building to a half-basement under the multi-purpose area. This is where the spongy soil condition existed and the dirt had to be removed out of the poor soil area anyway."

"Consequently, the high school class addition will have to be bid on an alternate basis," Masten said, "due to the cost of constructing the basement area. There is still a possibility we may get the new high school class addition. Changing the lockers from the main floor to the basement area will run \$8,000 less than the cost of the high school's class addition. If bids come in properly we can also build the class addition, however, if bids are high, then the high school addition will have to wait."

The Superintendent pointed out, "The public restroom facilities will still be constructed. Opening bids on the building will be let in March. Construction will begin as soon as possible. We are still hopeful for a completion date near mid-term next year."

Voters in Winside's school district 95th voted 424 to 70 early last December in support of a bond issue to build the new elementary building. Total cost of

the construction program is anticipated being about \$524,000.

Winside Pupils Take Examinations

The guidance department at Winside High School has announced that a complete testing program started Feb. 18 for grades seven through eleven.

Grades seven, nine and eleven participated in scholastic aptitude tests. Grades seven through eleven began taking an occupational aptitude test; and students in all grades, seven through twelve, were encouraged to take the self-administered, self-scored interest inventories.

Yesterday the Flanagan Aptitude Classification Test (FACT) were administered to the sophomore class. This test measures an individual's aptitude for 19 skills essential to success in 37 broad occupational areas. Scores are received for each skill, and the results help the counselor guide high school students in their choice of subjects, selection of post-high school stu-

dy and pursuit of job training. Skills evaluated by FACT are: inspection, mechanics, tables, reasoning, vocabulary, assembly, judgment and comprehension, components, planning, arithmetic, ingenuity, scales, expression, precision, alertness, coordination, pattern, coding and memory.

With the return of the scores, the student will receive a simple explanation about the scores and occupational information about jobs which he may wish to explore because of proficiency in skills related to them.
