



Wildcat Firestack Takes Heavyweight Crown in National NAIA Meet, Omaha

Tom Firestack and Larry Michelson of Wayne State traded places among national elite of collegiate wrestling Saturday night at Omaha. Bill Schwarz moved up a notch, and John Yoder joined the select. The Wildcat team placed fourth.

Firestack won the heavyweight championship of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, moving up from his second-place finish last year. He dethroned Mike Carr of Whitworth College, 3-0, in the national meet's finale at the University of Nebraska at Omaha Fieldhouse. For Firestack it was a return to the throne. In 1968 he was national junior college champion at Northeastern Junior College, Sterling, Colo. He's a junior from Canon City, Colo.

Michelson, defending champion at 152 pounds, suffered a 19-7 loss to Ieland Tresner of Fort Hays State, who was said, before the match, to be injured and did show pain during the match and after. However, his wrestling showed no indication of

Scribner '5' Seeded Third in State Meet

The Scribner Trojans, who upended Laurel 68 to 66 to top the class B district basketball tournament at Norfolk Friday night, was seeded number three among the eight schools in its class for the state basketball tournament which starts in Lincoln today (Thursday).

Seeding was done in all four classes on the basis of season records. Scribner has a record of 18 wins, three defeats. Seeded first in class B is Schuyler, defending champion, with a record of 19 wins, one defeat. Cozad (14-4) was seeded second, Crete (14-4) third.

Had Laurel gone to state there would have been two undefeated teams among the 32 seeding action. Defending champion Lincoln Northeast is the only team with a perfect record (18-0) which made it to state. It was seeded first in class A. Likewise, Laurel would have been seeded No. 1 in class B.

Seeded first in class C was Cambridge (24-1); seeded first in class D was Sterling (23-2).

Wausa, powerhouse from this area in class C play, received third place seeding.

Officials of the Nebraska School Activities Association seeded the teams Sunday.

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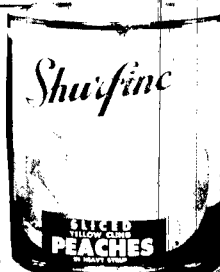


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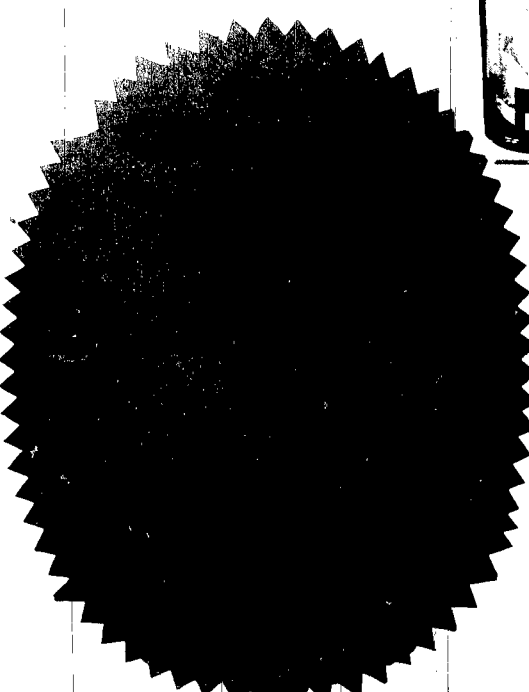

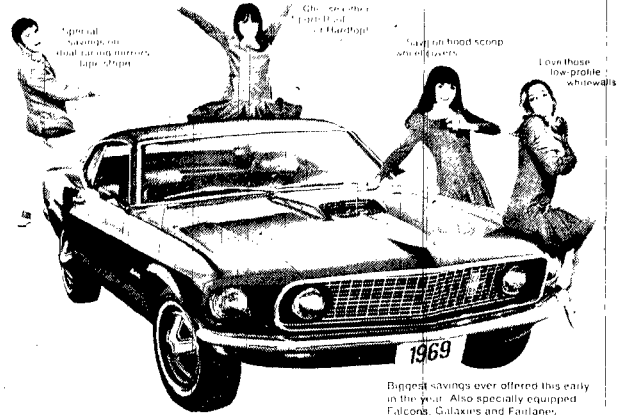

## Pioneer Farmers Being Honored

The Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben and the Nebraska Association of Fair Managers announced last week that for the fourteenth straight year they will continue their program to honor and recognize Nebraska pioneer farm families whose land has been owned by the same family for 100 years or more.

## Music Institute Is Being Offered at KS

An eight-week EDPA summer Institute for music specialists in elementary-junior high music is being offered this summer by Kearney State.

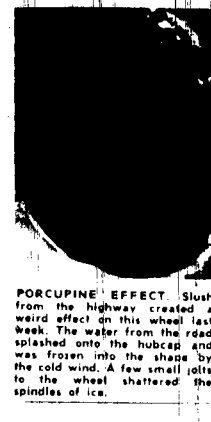



**Bell Telephone Adds 163,400 Phones in '68**  
Northwestern Bell Telephone Company added a record number of telephones in 1968, and the company's plant construction expenditures of \$184 million produced a new high, according to the firm's Annual Report.  
The 163,400 phones gained last year was the largest increase ever, bringing the total to 3.6 million in the five states served by Northwestern Bell— Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota.  
Total Bell System expenditures in the five states reached an estimated \$495 million during the year, including the completed Western Electric and AT&T spending of \$100 million for such things as wages, purchases, taxes and construction.  
Underground cable is cited in the Report as one example of many developments which are helping keep costs in line while providing better telephone service. The company added 51,000 miles of buried cable and micro-wave circuits last year.  
Revenues for 1968 are up 6.6 per cent and totaled \$501.7 mil-

lion. Expenses were a record \$285.2 million. These expenses, together with operating taxes of \$123 million and almost \$24 million in interest and other charges, netted out to earnings of \$2.39 per share of company stock, exactly matching the 1967 figure.  
The Report states that \$140 million—more than three-fourths of the year's entire construction expenditures—went to improve service and expand it.  
Among the many improvements made possible: larger local calling areas for about one-fourth of all the company's telephones; use of telephone facilities to communicate with computers for educational, medical and business purposes; completion of 90 new telephone buildings and building additions, and a big increase in the number of the sophisticated new electronic switching systems.  
Northwestern Bell thinks 1969 will be another record-breaking year. The company estimates that it will add more than 170,000 telephones. It expects that the 1969 construction expenditures will pass the \$200 million mark and that total plant investment will stand at nearly \$1.8 billion by the end of the year.
