WS's Dave Gunther Is 'Coach of Year'

Wayne State's basketball coach, Dave Gunther, gained another coach-of-the-year honor last week, this time as NAIA area coach of the year. A year ago fellow mentors chose him as NAIA District II (Nebraska) coach of the year. In the NAIA organization, an area includes several districts. The award was made at the annual NAIA Hall of Fame banquet during the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Mo. Wayne State represented District II in the tourney for the second straight year.

Area Newsmen Highlight WSC Confab

College newspapers got both praise and caution Saturday from a veteran newsmen who now is director of the University of Nebraska Journalism School. Neale Coppel told about 60 students from seven colleges attending Wayne State's area college newspaper conference that they could be proud of their journalistic product because they frequently deal with real issues. Not many years ago, he said, college papers concerned themselves largely with gossip about who was dating whom and who was observed kissing whom behind the gym. About the worst that got printed then might be an off-color joke. Nowadays college newspaper sponsors live an uneasy life, Coppel acknowledged, knowing their phones will ring immediately after the paper comes out and an irate voice will protest some story. "But I am delighted that you are writing about important matters now," Coppel declared. He reminded the collegians, however, that responsibility, truth and good taste remain fundamental guidelines of journalism. Coppel shared a discussion of "Law and the Newspaper" with

Michael Myers, Slou City attorney formerly a reporter for the Slou City Journal. Myers explained the American Bar Association's new rules limiting information that judges, attorneys and police may tell reporters about criminal suspects. The purpose, Myers said, is to protect the accused from adverse trial resulting from what might be prejudicial news. Coppel replied that he fears rules standing in the way of free access to facts by newsmen may be more adverse to the public than beneficial to accused criminals. Turning to the complex matter of libel, Myers and Coppel explained that college newspapers, like the commercial press, can be charged with libel. A college editor cannot escape the risk of libel by attributing a statement to its source. Who would the victim of libel be? Not only the editors, Coppel and Myers said, but possibly the sponsor, the publications committee and officials of the college. Should faculty sponsors then censor the news to protect themselves? No, Coppel declared forcefully. Other conference speakers included newsmen from the Omaha World-Herald, Slou City Journal, Des Moines Register and Tribune, The Wayne Herald and Wayne State faculty. They ranged over such topics as news-writing, features, editorials, advertising and photography.

Bomb Hoax Ties Up WS Monday

A bomb threat telephoned into the Wayne State College campus switchboard Monday morning caused the immediate cancellation of all classes for the rest of the day in two buildings on the campus, according to Dr. Dale Johansen, dean of administration. Dr. Johansen said the call came in about 9 a.m. from somewhere off campus. The caller, a male, said a bomb had been placed in 14th and in the science building. It was set to go off sometime between 10:15 a.m. and 7:45 p.m., the caller said. Classes were dismissed in both buildings and officials of the construction company working on the new science building were told of the threat. They pulled their workers off the science building and had them go to work on the addition being built to the library. The buildings were sealed until 6:30 Tuesday morning and then the campus police made a search of both buildings. Nothing was found, Dr. Johansen said. "The hoax was an unfortunate incident since it is affecting 3,000 students," Dr. Johansen went on. "It is especially bad this time of the year with final tests coming up soon and graduation only about one month off." Classes which were missed Monday because of the threat will have to be made up this Saturday, Dr. Johansen said.

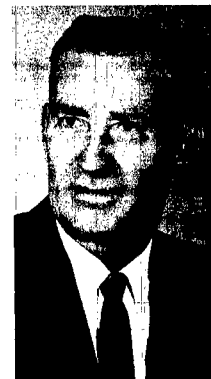
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Wiltse, Bressler Named Chairmen

Willard R. Wiltse of Wayne and Warren Bressler of Wakefield have been named chairmen of the Lewis and Clark District camp capital campaign. New Bill Passed By Legislature Effective Now

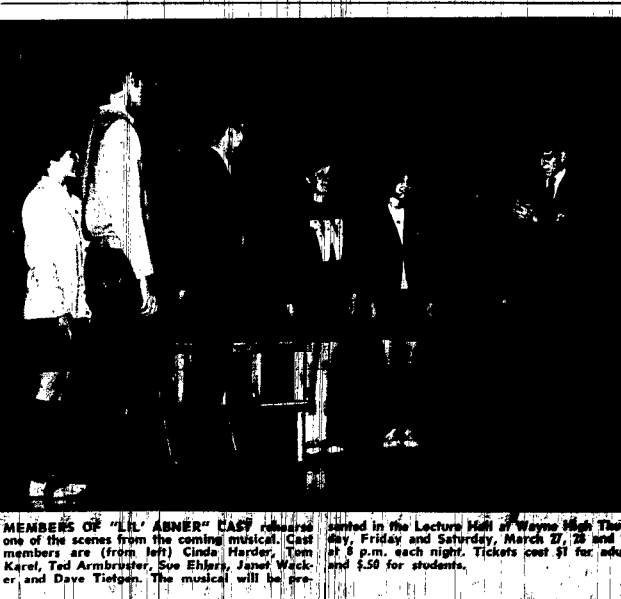
Wayne County's assessor, Henry Arrp, was recently notified by Murrell B. McNeill, Nebraska State tax commissioner, of the Nebraska Legislature's passing L. B. 42 on March 6 with an emergency clause. The bill provides that an informational statement shall be filed with the county assessor before a new building is erected or an old building altered or repaired when the amount of repair is one thousand dollars or more with certain exceptions. A form to be used in administering the new law has been prepared by the tax commissioner's office. According to McNeill, this law should enable county assessors to have a better knowledge of improvements being placed on real property in the county. Prosecution for failure to comply with the law will rest with the county attorney.

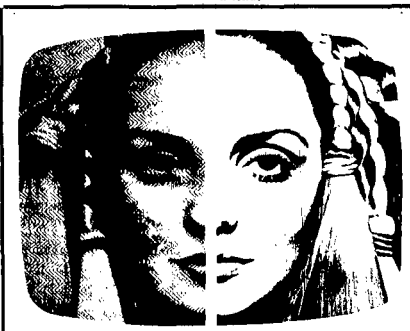

'Mind-Stretching' Highlight of WSC Semantics Meet

Considerable mind-stretching occurred Friday and Saturday among students attending Wayne State's Conference on General Semantics. The mind-stretching began promptly with a talk by one of the nation's authorities on general semantics, Dr. Elwood Murray, who since retirement from the Denver University faculty has devoted his efforts to the Institute of General Semantics. The conference expanded through several demonstrations of verbal and non-verbal communication, a second talk by Dr. Murray and a performance of improvisational theater Friday night. To bring the conference purpose into focus, the term "general semantics" should be defined briefly as the study of relationships of language, thought and behavior. Obviously, that covers a considerable field. Dr. Murray expressed his intent by noting the

need for people to learn facts and more facts in order to solve the growing problems of our time. One fact plus one fact, he said, adds up to four facts. Facts spur ideas, and they grow geometrically. "Freedom thives on facts, and in our society there will be both good and evil," said Dr. Murray. "We need constant feedback of ideas if we are to evaluate human problems." He predicted that colleges "are going to have to have new curriculums - clear across the board and heavy on the sciences in order to get at facts. You could start such a college with about \$50 million," he said. "I don't know where you can get that sum, but maybe you young people will find it." The improvisational theater provoked two hours discussion after one hour of presentation on the provocative title of "The Attack of the Frog People, the Plague, Mother and Other Social Essentials." Written and produced by WSC students, it satirized many institutions, customs and clichés of American life. When finished, the cast perched on the front of Ramsey

4-H Club in Search for IFYE Hosts

"We are interested in families who like people, who respect a visitor from another country as a human being - because these are the ingredients that make the International Farm Youth Exchange program click," says John Orr, Associate State 4-H and YMW Club leader. The Nebraska state 4-H Club office, in launching this year's search for IFYE host families, suggests that interested families apply through their local county extension office. "So far more than 700 families in Nebraska have served as host to 138 IFYE exchanges from more than 40 countries who have visited this state," observes the 4-H leader. "We usually can tell when the relationship has been a success. That's when the host family asks when they can participate in another exchange," says John Orr. "Participation means involvement," he explained, but "it also means a wonderful opportunity to learn about tolerance, understanding, different religions, foods and customs."

Keep Tax Records If Claiming Relations Not Living with You

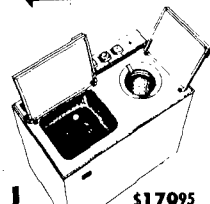
A person who does not live with you can still be claimed as a dependent on Federal income tax returns if he is closely related, Richard Vnal, district director of Internal Revenue for Nebraska, said last week. The taxpayer's own child, his grandchild, stepchild or adopted child is covered under this provision, Vnal said. Other relatives of the taxpayer who do not live with him have to be a member of his household to be considered dependents are brothers, sisters and their children, parents and grandparents, and aunts and uncles. In-laws can also be claimed as dependents. These include father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law or sister-in-law. Children by a former marriage are also covered. Vnal said that taxpayers claiming dependents who are not members of their households should be sure to keep good records of the support they provide. Proving support in these situations usually requires more records than when the dependent is a member of the taxpayer's household. For further details on dependency requirements send a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Omaha, Nebr., and request Publication 501, "Your Exemptions and Exemptions for Dependents."
