Only 3 Wayne Teachers Resign

There will be at least three new faces among the Wayne City School faculty when the 1969-70 school year begins next fall, according to Superintendent Francis Blain.

Superintendent Blain reported Tuesday that three teachers, Vern Mills, Mrs. Sandra Metz and Don Schumacher, did not sign their contracts by the Monday deadline and will have to be replaced next year.

Noting that he was disappointed to be losing the three because they are good teachers, he said the school should consider itself lucky for just losing three from a teaching force of 68. More teachers may ask to be released from their contracts later in the year, he noted, but this is not too common.

Winside Man Is Wounded During Vietnam Combat

A Winside couple, Mr. and Mrs. Don Wacker, have received word that their son, Pfc. Reed J. Wacker, was wounded in action Mar. 13 during combat operations in Vietnam, and underwent surgery Mar. 19 for wounds received.

Fragments from a Viet Cong booby trap inflicted wounds on both feet, legs and on his right hand. After being hospitalized at Cu Chi in Vietnam, Wacker was flown to a hospital in Yokohama, Japan.

Wacker was sent to Vietnam in December, 1968 and had been wounded earlier when receiving powder burns to his eyes during a combat operation in February. He was serving with the 25th Division infantry outside Saigon prior to being wounded.

Although probably not to the satisfaction of all involved, the city council, sitting as a board of adjustment Tuesday night finally disposed of the sticky subject of assessments against property owners in storm sewer district #72.

The board decided to accept an adjusted assessment schedule, which lowered the assessments against 15 parcels of land and raised them against five others, on the condition that owners who would have to pay more would accept the schedule. If they do not accept the new assessments they will be void.

The new schedule raises the amount of the assessment against Wayne school district 17 from \$1,020 to \$1,520 on two different parcels of land.

Bird Borshoff, attorney for the school district, said he would present the new assessments to the school board at its next regular meeting early in April and it will have to decide whether it will accept them.

About 15 people attended Tuesday night meeting concerning the touchy subject. First meeting on the subject was about the middle of February. The board postponed action at that meeting and at one following.

The storm sewer district covers an area in the west end of town, roughly on either side of Sherman St. from just north of Seventh St. to Third St.

Property owners again complained to the board that it was assessing the school district too small a share of the cost of the district.

As at the previous meetings, City Engineer Sid Magdanz told the group that the school district was being assessed in the same way as the other property owners, according to benefits received, proximity and so on.

City Attorney John Addison advised the board that it could not legally raise any of the as-

essments without the consent of the property owners because the assessment schedule has already been adopted by the board. As it stands, the property owners SEWER ASSESSMENT, page 8

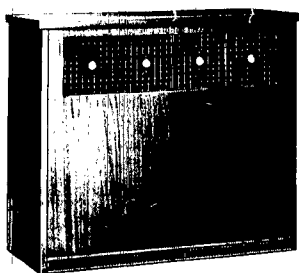

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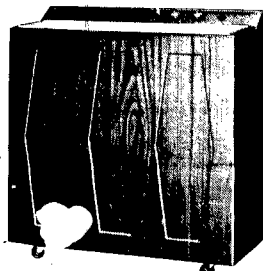

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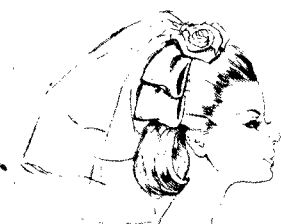
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Lyle Strunk Weds Jennie R. Baird

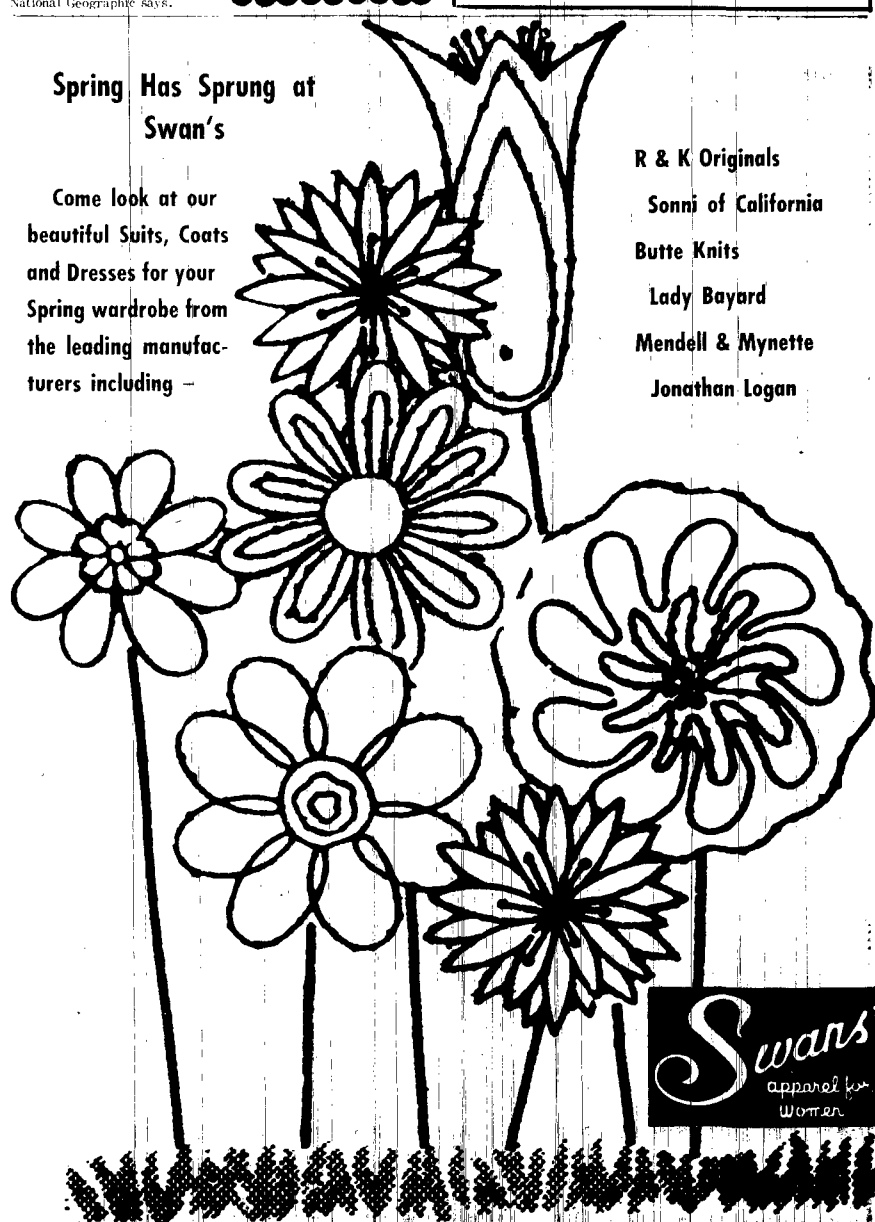

Tietgen Leading Scorer, Rebounder For Blue Devils During '68-69 Season

Dave Tietgen, a 6-2 senior, was leading scorer and leading rebounder for the 1968-69 Blue Devil squad, according to the season's statistics released last week by head basketball coach Dick Nelson.

Tietgen pumped in 101 field goals in 261 attempts for an average of 38.7 per cent and made 62 out of 92 free throw shots for an average of 67.4 per cent. He also came off the bench with 172 rebounds, just under 10 per game.

Close behind him in the scoring category was Randy Helgren with a total of 291 points, the only other Blue Devil to top 200 points in the season's action. Helgren hit 68 of 143 field goals (47.6 per cent) and 65 of 97 free throws (67.0 per cent). He grabbed off 70 rebounds during the season.

Also making his presence felt both offensively and defensively was Harry Lindner, who shot 43.4 per cent from the field (53 of 122) and 54.8 per cent from the charity line (23 of 42). He

was second high in the rebounding department, snaring 102 caroms during the year's action. Only other Blue Devil scoring over 100 points during the season was Joedy Hoogner. He tallied 119 points, 90 from the field (48 of 128 for 35.2 per cent) and 29 from the free throw line (29 of 56 for 51.8 per cent).

The Blue Devils racked up a total of 1,071 points this season, only six short of the opponents' total.

In field goal shooting, Wayne maintained a better percentage than their foes, hitting 37 per cent of their 35 per cent.

From the charity line, Wayne also hit consistently better than their opponents. The Blue Devils hit 62 per cent of their free shots, their opponents hit 57 per cent.

But in the rebounding department, Wayne was out-hustled during the year, gaining only 715 caroms to their opponents' 790.

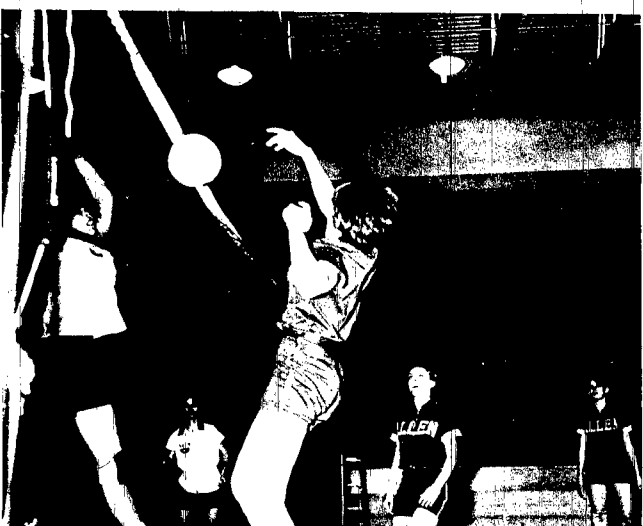

Hunters Find Missing Plane West of Anselmo

Wreckage of a six-passenger aircraft and the bodies of four students and two instructors from Augustana College, Sioux Falls, S. D., were found Tuesday by two coyote hunters.

Leonard Christian and Marvin Baynes, both of rural Anselmo, were coyote hunting when coming upon the wreckage 10 miles west of Anselmo, in Custer County. The plane had been missing

since Jan. 11 when it was last heard from at 8:15 p.m. when the pilot was in radio contact with the Flight Service Station at North Platte.

Aboard the plane piloted by Frayne D. Anderson, one time resident of Wayne, was fellow instructor, R. Don Tibbets, 34, forensics director at Augustana, and four Augustana students.

Frayne Anderson served as assistant librarian at Wayne State College from September, 1959 until August, 1961. He was head librarian at Augustana College at the time of the accident. He was married and the father of four daughters.

Debate team members killed in the crash were Al Jensen, 18, Pipestone, Minn., a nephew of Mrs. Kenneth Olds, Wayne; Linda Heldmann, 20, Rapid City, S.D.; Joyce Estwick, 21, Milan, Minn.; and James Houshe, 18, Shawnee Mission, Kan.

The debate team had competed in the Pike's Peak Invitational Forensics Tournament, sponsored by Colorado College, and then were flying home from Colorado Springs when the accident occurred. Anderson was not an instrument rated pilot and last reported he was "running out of

daylight" while flying at an altitude of 7,500 feet. Mike McCurdy of the Omaha Civil Air Patrol said four days following the aircraft's disappearance that the pilot would have lost daylight while in the area of Anselmo.

Many aircraft had been involved in the search for the missing plane in January and February. Two hundred and forty-five volunteer pilots, coordinated by the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics, had planned a two-day search next Saturday and Sunday.

Wayne Air Service operator, Don Johnson, had helped in earlier search missions along with several area pilots who are members of the Pilot's Improvement Association, headquartered at the Wayne municipal field. Johnson said that he and several other local pilots had planned to join the search this weekend.

(Continued from page 1) ers are going to have to pay the amounts listed on the original assessment schedule unless they were one of the 15 who had their assessments lowered. Those who had theirs raised can refuse to pay the new assessments.

But if they are still unsatisfied they have one other recourse. City Attorney John Addison said that if they feel they have been damaged by the school's water they can take legal action against the school district.

The new assessment schedule, as handed out at the meeting Tuesday night, lowers assessments on 15 parcels of land by \$680 and raises five parcels by \$680, a difference of \$241.

Two members of the Planning Commission, A. J. O'Neil and Harold Kambel, presented the city council with the final draft of the Capital Improvement Program which the planners have adopted and now recommended to the council for its adoption.

The program is a six-year plan which is meant to guide the city in any of its capital improvements from now through 1974. The program includes suggested outlays of money for such projects as resurfacing streets, constructing storm sewers and sanitary sewers, acquiring land for park sites and building city facilities.

Other action the city council:

—Approved a bingo permit for the St. Mary's Mens Club;

—Heard a representative of Blue Cross-Blue Shield explain his company's insurance program for groups;

—Approved Cecil Wriedt's request for a zoning change for use for an area west of Valley Drive where it connects with 56th St.;

—Considered but took no action on Wriedt's inquiry about whether the city would permit a zoning change for another area in the east end of town if he decided to put pre-built houses on the land;

—Heard a report by City Engineer Sid Maganz which outlined briefly the space which will probably be needed by the city clerk and the police if the city decides to build additions to the present fire hall with the idea of making it into a city complex. Maganz had drawn no preliminary plans and was directed by the council to take some preliminary plans and come up with some rough estimates about the possible cost of such a building.

Needy Persons in Wayne Co. Being Urged to Inquire About Food Stamps

Needy persons in Wayne County are being urged to apply at the Wayne County Welfare Office for food assistance under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program for low-income families.

The new food stamp program is scheduled to get underway in Wayne County on April 5.

The food stamp program is administered jointly in Nebraska by the Nebraska State Agency and USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Elmer Martello, Wayne County Welfare Director, points out that families do not have to be receiving welfare assistance to be eligible for food stamp help.

Food coupons will be issued to families determined by the welfare department to be in need of food assistance. This includes a number of persons in the "Senior Citizen" group.

Many persons who, after retirement, are forced to live on reduced incomes, are often eligible to take part in the food stamp program.

Other low-income families also may receive food coupons provided their family income does not exceed specified amounts. The amount of income permitted to such families is worked out by

the Nebraska State Welfare Agency with the Consumer and Marketing Service.

The Wayne County welfare office is responsible for interviews and certification of eligible needy families in the county and for issuing the coupons to participating families. Authorization of food merchants is handled by the Consumer and Marketing Service.

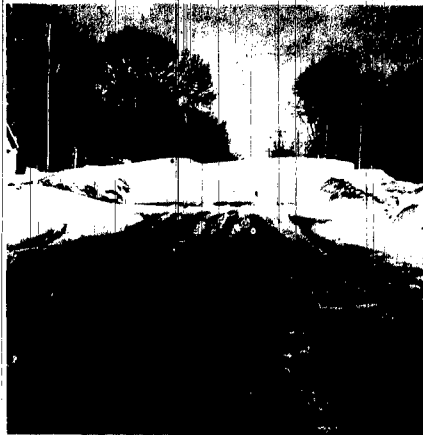

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

A Simple Solution To the County Road Problem

After one of the worst winters in several years, taxpayers in Wayne County are faced with a large problem—the condition of the county roads. In one way, the winter was beneficial in that it has emphasized how important it is that we do something and do it quickly in order to improve our county roads.

Several times this winter angry farmers met with the county commissioners demanding that the roads be cleared of ice and snow so that the farmer could travel on them in order to carry on his business. The reason most often given for the commissioners' not being able to keep the roads clear was lack of money, men and equipment.

It's fairly clear to assume that many farmers are now angry over the extremely muddy conditions of many of the county roads, roads that are almost impassable except in vehicles equipped with chains or four-wheel drive.

And the farmers have every right to be angry. They, and others in the county, pay tax money in order to be provided with good county roads. About the only way we are going to get better county roads is by paying higher taxes. But, faced with more state and federal taxes, few of us would be willing to have our taxes increased in order to solve this problem.

There is another solution, simpler, cheaper, easier.

The people in Wayne County should make a determined effort to have some of the county roads abandoned. That would result in large savings in labor, material, equipment and maintenance. The savings could then be used on the other roads in the county, keeping them open in a harsh winter and passable in a wet spring.

That solution will probably shock many farm-

ers in the county, but it shouldn't. There is no reason to maintain the numerous county roads which nobody lives on and which are not absolutely necessary for the farmer to go about his business.

Like most of those across the state, our county roads were meant to serve a different population base in a different time. We no longer have the large population of farmers in Wayne County that we once had. It seems wasteful and silly to attempt to maintain the criss-cross of county roads for a dwindling population. It's not necessary.

Let's look at some figures. The county commissioners spend about \$500 per gravel mile and about \$200 per non-gravel mile each year to keep the county roads open and maintained. If we were, for example, able to abandon two miles of gravelled and two miles of non-gravelled roads in each of the 13 precincts in the county we would be able to save approximately \$18,200. Although not a huge sum spread over the rest of the county that \$18,200 would have an appreciable effect on the condition of the roads. And it's probably not going too far to say that more than four miles in each precinct could be abandoned once all the people got behind the idea and tried to make it successful.

This is the simplest and most logical solution that we can see to this problem. Why there has been no determined effort to put it into effect we do not know. It should at least be tried.

We have talked to the county commissioners concerning this idea and they have given initial approval to it. In an editorial in the next issue of the newspaper, we will outline the first steps which need to be taken in order to put this idea into effect.—N.L.L.

Interesting Legislative Bills

The Nebraska Legislature's Eightieth session will likely not be one deserving such a term as "dullsville". Legislators have introduced a record number of bills, over 1,350 of them, a number of which should probably cause more interest than raised eyebrows.

Following are sketches of seven legislative bills already introduced, read for the first time and referred to a committee. You may be affected by one or more of them and desire to seek further information from your district legislator.

LB is an abbreviation for Legislative Bill, followed by an identifying number.

LB 683 — Introduced by Terry Carpenter, 48th District, read the first time Jan. 30, and referred to Committee on Judiciary. It provides for convict labor by prisoners of cities and villages. Whenever an able-bodied male physically able to work is confined in a county, city, or village jail for punishment, the sheriff, under the direction of the county board of commissioners, would be able to compel such a person to work at hard labor eight hours of every working day. When no other work is available the sheriff could compel a prisoner to work on the public roads or highways. Prisoners so employed would work out the fine and costs imposed upon him at the rate of \$2 per day. The bill also provides a penalty of not more than \$500 of a punishment of not less than one year in the Nebraska Penal and Correctional Complex, should a prisoner attempt to escape from the place he was employed or while going to and from his work.

Objectors: The bill discriminates between prisoners who are and who are not physically able to work. Someone other than the prisoner would have to make the decision as to who was or was not physically able. Prisoners would not be skilled in the work which would likely result in poor workmanship. Two dollars a day for eight hours of hard labor is not sufficient. Each group of prisoners working would necessitate a guard which will increase costs out of proportion of benefits gained. Prisoners would have to be transported to and from work providing opportunity to escape. If a prisoner did escape then more money would have to be spent to capture him again. Once back in custody the prisoner would not likely be able to pay a fine, so would end up in the already overcrowded penitentiary where he would likely lead the ways of hard core criminals.

LB 737 — Introduced by Edward R. Danner, 11th District and Robert L. Clark, 47th District, read Jan. 31, referred to Committee on Miscellaneous Subjects. It relates to the selling of liquor, providing that ten per cent of the taxes on liquor shall be used for the rehabilitation of alcoholics, and the remaining 90 per cent

be credited to the state General Fund.

LB 743 — Introduced by Herb Nore, 22nd District, read Jan. 31, referred to Committee on Miscellaneous Subjects. This bill would prevent certain sales on Sundays and holidays, providing penalties. Selling of cameras, musical instruments, radios, television sets, jewelry, clocks, watches, furniture, appliances, power driven machinery, paint, wallpaper, lumber, etc. would be prohibited on a Sunday or holiday.

Objector: The bill is discriminatory in that it allows sales at state and county fairs, private sales, advertisements for sale of any merchandise by press, TV and radio sale for recreational purposes, and would permit sales at a place of business which is regularly closed on Saturday but open on Sunday. If the bill passed, a homeowner would not be able to purchase additional paint, tools, lumber, should he run out while working on his property on a holiday, which is often done.

LB 1274 — Introduced by William R. Sharda, Jr., 7th District, read Feb. 20, referred to Committee on Revenue. It relates to county government; to authorize counties to levy a sales tax for road construction and maintenance.

LB 1275 — Introduced by Eugene Mahoney, 5th District, read Feb. 20 and referred to Committee on Revenue. This bill relates to county government; to authorize counties to levy a wheel tax for road construction and maintenance.

LB 1284 — Introduced by Harold D. Simpson, 46th District, read Feb. 21, referred to Committee on Revenue. Another bill relating to county government; to authorize counties to levy an income tax for road construction and maintenance.

LB 1342 — Introduced by the Committee on Education at the request of the Governor, read Mar. 11, referred to the Committee on Education. This bill relates to schools; to require reorganization of school districts so that all territory in the state is included in districts providing instruction in kindergarten through grade twelve; to provide procedures; and to repeal original sections dealing with the subject.

Page three of LB 1342, beginning line 12, section 2: "Effective July 1, 1973, all school districts in this state shall provide instruction to pupils in kindergarten through grade twelve, and shall (1) have an enrollment of at least one thousand four hundred pupils, or (2) embrace a territory of at least five hundred fifty square miles. All of the territory in this state shall be included in a school district meeting the requirements of this section."

Capital News — 'If You Don't Send It to Ord, Send It Somewhere'

LINCOLN — "If you don't send it to Ord, send it somewhere. Lincoln's loaded."

That was a comment by Dr. Glenn Auble of Ord as he testified last week before the Legislature's Agriculture Committee on a bill calling for the transfer of the State Game Commission headquarters from Lincoln to Ord.

The committee made no immediate decision about the bill, but its sponsor, Sen. Rudolph Kokes of Ord, said he hoped it would be reported to the floor in the form he introduced it.

Kokes meant he hoped the committee wouldn't recommend any of the several amendments it received at the public hearing. There were amendments to erase Ord and insert Alliance, Holdrege, Minden and Neligh.

And nearly a score more state communities are also after the commission as "a new industry." Auble's claim that "Lincoln's loaded" referred to the argument that the Capital City is the site of all state government headquarters, the penitentiary, the reformatory, a state hospital, two University of Nebraska campuses and the state fairgrounds.

Although Ord still faces plenty of competition, one former opponent joined the Ord cause. Grand Island, which had made a hard pitch before the Game Commission not long ago, submitted testimony urging the legislature to select a Central Nebraska location and Kokes said that meant Ord.

The new trend is to bring government as close as possible to the people," the Grand Island statement said. "One would think that the State of Nebraska might well benefit by having key locations in the state. It might, in fact, help make taxes more palatable to a greater number of our citizens."

Roy W. Pearson, president of the Holdrege Industrial and Development Corp., pleaded for a transfer to Phelps County. "Facilities for headquarters of the Game Commission," he said, "should be constructed where preferred instead of where there is no acceptance."

This was another barb aimed at Lincoln, which gathered its community leaders together to make a renewed bid to keep the department after Kokes' original suggestion that it be transferred to Grand Island from all over the state.

Abolish the Commission
 At the same hearing in which several cities were scrambling to attract the commission staff and its \$1.25 million payroll, testimony was taken on two bills designed to reconstruct the department's administration.

The bills were both introduced by Sen. J. James Waldron of Callaway. Both bills would place the executive authority over the game, parks and tourism programs in the hands of a director and take it away from the seven-member commission.

One would abolish the commission and the other would let it continue, but only as an advisory body. Waldron told the committee he didn't care which it advanced to the floor.

His personal preference, he said, was the bill eliminating the commission completely.

Waldron listed a series of complaints about commission activities last year, with specific refer-

Many such beverages make an excellent media for the growth of microorganisms which multiply in the stagnant trapped liquid. When the cap is opened in an inverted position, microorganisms can easily contaminate the inside of the cup.

Wash water can also enter the air space of the thermos through outside cracks or through an outside seam. The water could not enter the inside of the mug, but it could seep out and contaminate the rim.

Consumers Report suggests homemakers discard any insulated cup or tumbler if water can be heard splashing in the air space, or if the cup or tumbler leaves a wet ring when placed in an inverted position after having been dried properly.

for seed companies and cooperating growers.

Nebraska has a Crop Improvement Association which is the supervising agency for the production of certified seed. Most other states have similar organizations performing like functions.

Various classes of seeds are recognized depending on the number of generations from development. In Nebraska we have three: The first generation (registered seed), the second generation (foundation seed) and the third generation (certified seed).

The rules and regulations governing each class of seed are aimed at maintaining the purity and quality of the crop.

Buyers of seed labeled or tagged with approval of the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association are assured of quality products. Some more evidence supporting the importance of seed selection comes from an agronomy news letter put out by Russell Moomaw at the Northeast Experiment Station.

This newsletter deals with choosing corn hybrids for planting. The five highest yielding hybrids in counties irrigated test yielded 28 bushels more per acre than the average of the 35 different entries tested. The difference in yields between the

five performing hybrids and the lowest yielding five was 52 bushel per acre. Applying these figures to 100 acres of corn we come up with 2,800 bushel more corn if planted to the best five hybrid over the average of all hybrids tested. If compared to the poorest five we would have had 5,200 bushel more corn. This leads to some interesting calculations on the difference in actual worth of the hybrids we choose to plant.

For example, if we estimate that it takes 15 bushel of seed to plant 100 acres and the resulting crop is worth only \$1.00 per bushel we find that we could have paid \$348 more for each bushel of the best seed as compared to the poorest five hybrids.

This information, as well as the results of comparative tests from all areas of the state, both dryland and irrigated, are available in a circular titled Nebraska Corn Performance tests which is available in all County Extension offices.

Another important factor in selecting planting stock of all kinds is adaptation for climatic and soil type differences. This information is also available as a result of testing programs over many years. The kind of seed you plant does make a difference so choose it carefully.

Choose Seed With Care

The cost of seed is but a small part of growing a crop. The kind of planting material you use or whatever the kind of planting material you use to be made. No matter how much you invest in working the soil, applying fertilizer, controlling weeds, irrigating and harvesting you can never produce better than the kind of seed you plant. All seeds offered for sale by dealers must be labeled plainly showing the kind of seed, variety name, per cent germination and purity and whether it contains weed seed of any kind. Seeds which have been treated with pesticides must be so labeled.

There are many sources of seed but the buyer is more apt to find the new and improved varieties at volume seed dealers. A deal generally to be avoided with farm crop seed is the traveling salesman who offers some contract deal. This is generally associated with some new or little known variety priced far above the common market. The contracts are written to benefit the salesman only.

It does not mean that new varieties should be avoided. Plant breeders are constantly developing and testing new varieties which are better.

From these trials with flowers and vegetables some selections are made each year which are given all-American ratings. Seed of these varieties are usually available from reputable volume dealers. A similar breeding and testing program with plants of all kinds is carried on by agricultural experiment stations, ma-

Dear Editor: When I first read that Wayne's baccalaureate services had been cancelled, my first reaction was, "That's one thing that will get a rise from the patrons of the district." Imagine, my dismay to find only one lone letter to the editor, in complaint, and an editorial supporting the action.

I have attended commencement in a large city that had discarded baccalaureate services, and the depersonalization of the commencement made it merely an additional bit of red tape that had to be endured in order to obtain the diploma. Such a commencement stands in stark contrast to our local baccalaureate and commencement events, which have so much importance that they are treasured in the hearts of every senior and of every relative and friend who can crowd into the auditorium.

No one is asking that religious teaching be propagated by tax dollars, and this argument is scarcely relevant to baccalaureate services. The small additional expense for auditorial services would not be great, and most schools spend other tax dollars more questionably. Most baccalaureate services that I have attended represent a composite of

the religious denominations of the community, and certainly there is no community center in most communities other than the school auditorium large enough to accommodate all of these people. People whose children attend parochial schools also pay tax dollars for support of public school, and the people of the churches whose children attend public school also are taxpayers. Their rights should be respected, too, and not ignored in favor of what is usually only a very small vocal minority of atheists, agnostics and the disenchanted in the community, who are unwilling to respect the religious views of the believers in the community. If some family cannot tolerate having their child attend baccalaureate, I would think that school officials would be willing to excuse that child.

I am very suspicious that the school which considers baccalaureate services a threat to religious freedom, could also be the kind of school which expects its students to accept every attitude and idea that the teachers expound as absolute gospel. If we really believe in religious freedom, there will be respect for the religious as well as the irreligious. There will be no in-

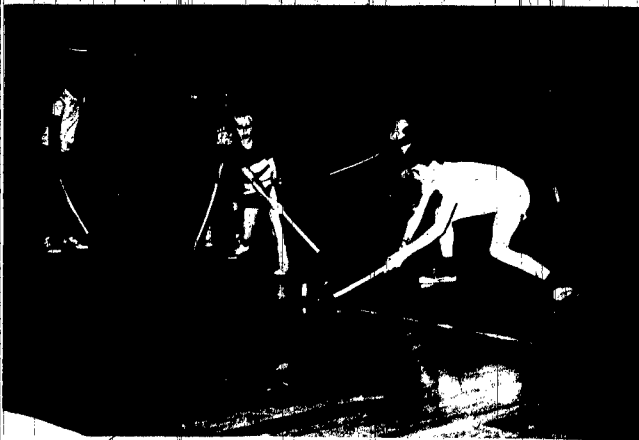
