Spring Runoff Brings About Problems with Dead Animal Disposal

Turbulent and destructive runoff waters in Nebraska farm areas this spring underline the importance of an unpleasant but necessary task to maintain the health of herds and flocks: the removal or proper disposal of dead animals.

That's the warning of Dr. Crosby Howe, University of Nebraska Extension Veterinarian.

Prompt and complete disposal of animal carcasses—including chickens—is important the year-round, Dr. Howe noted, to protect the well-being of not only the neighbor's animals, but also the health of the farmer's own livestock population, because it will help eliminate the spread of disease among livestock.

Disposal can be carried out by three accepted methods: burying the carcass a minimum of four feet underground (a requirement of Nebraska state law); complete consumption of the remains by fire; or disposal through a rendering plant.

Animal health authorities make it clear to farmers that it is their responsibility to dispose of dead stock. If carcasses are not disposed of in a "reasonable" time, a farmer may be subject to prosecution. If reported, generally, he would be given a chance to comply. Upon further refusal or inaction, the animal or animals could be disposed of by authorities at the farmer's expense.

The temptation to take the easy way out by dumping animals in ditches or dragging them to out-of-the-way areas of the farm leads to undesirable consequences. And this danger is increased by floods or high water that could carry these carcasses to streams, rivers and lakes creating pollution and health hazard problems, Dr. Howe said.

Flood waters which carry unburied dead animals from one location to another cause numerous complications, Dr. Howe pointed out. Identification of the animals as to origin or owner, even when they carry a brand,

is difficult if not impossible. The owner of property on which the carcasses lodge may be forced by law, or for his own protection and security, to remove them at considerable expense, while his careless neighbor upstream gets off "scot-free," Dr. Howe commented.

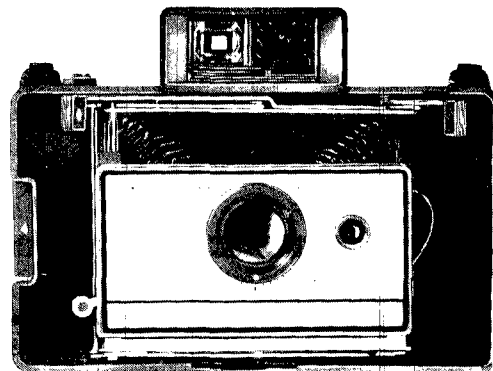

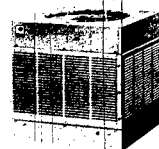

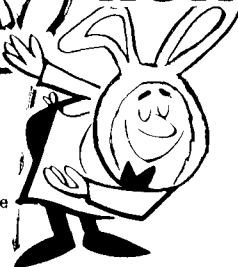

1 can (15 oz.) blueberries in heavy syrup or 1 cup blueberries  
1 package (17 oz.) Pillsbury Lemon Batter Cake Mix  
1 carton (8 oz.) plain yogurt or dairy sour cream  
4 eggs  
Powdered sugar  
OVEN 350  
Drain blueberries, reserve 1 cup syrup for sauce. Rinse blueberries and drain well.

It doesn't matter how many county roads are abandoned; if we don't get rid of the core of the problem, we still won't have anything solved. We know what our problem is, and we know how we want to solve it. We don't need the editor of The Wayne Herald sitting at his desk giving us his simple solution to the problem. You have talked to the county commissioners about the problem. I'm personally inviting you to come out in the country and talk to the farmers. Drive around in Wayne Co., and don't stop just a couple miles out of Wayne. Look

over the whole county; talk to the rural mail carriers, the Winside school bus drivers, the milk truck drivers, feed truck drivers, etc. They'll tell you that miles and miles of Wayne Co. already have been abandoned.

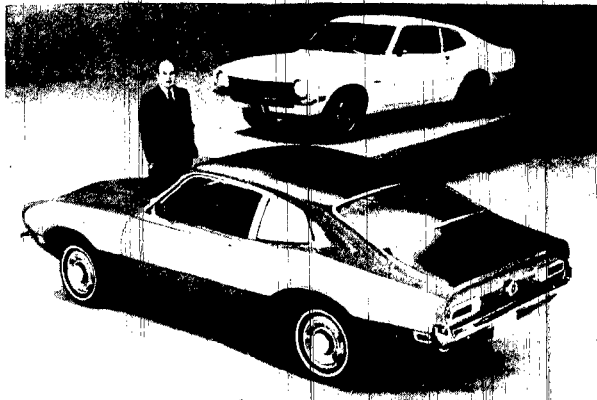

It might interest you and others in Wayne to learn that quite a large group of farmers have been doing some investigating into the situation we face, why it has been allowed to get this bad, how other counties get along so well, etc. We have also come up with a simple solution, which to us makes more sense than your solution. We are sick and tired of hearing that there is no money when we continually dish it out every year. We are intelligent enough to see that it is not being spent on road maintenance, bridges, oiled

roads, machinery or gravel. Now we want to know who is pocketing it. We are going to find out even if it takes Gov. Tiemann himself to look into the situation!

Are you really so ignorant of the real situation that you think the problems we face aren't as bad as we're saying? Or is it that you're personally working against all the farmers? I, for one, am drastically curtailing the business I do in Wayne. I don't need a town which doesn't need the farmers.

### 14,500 Conservation Trees, Shrubs Ordered

Orders are still rolling in for the Clarke-McNary trees available to Dixon County farmers. Mrs. Anna Jansson, who assumed many of the duties of Dixon County agricultural agent following the retirement of Howard Gillespie, reported last week that she has received over 14,500 orders for the trees and shrubs from farmers in Dixon County.

from a farmer near Concord, Rodney Johnson, who ordered 1,600 of the trees.

The trees, used by farmers to plant new windbreaks or replace losses suffered during the year, are available from the Northeast Station near Concord or can be ordered from the Wakefield Soil Conservation Service office. Tree planting services are available through the Dixon County Soil District.

The trees can be ordered either potted, which are shipped to Mrs. Jansson, or bare root, which are shipped directly to the farmer. A farmer must order at least

30 trees or shrubs when ordering the potted ones. The others must be ordered at least 100 at a time.

Kind of potted trees available are Eastern Redcedar, Austrian Pine, Scotch Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce and Ponderosa Pine. Kinds of trees and shrubs available bare root include broadleaf trees (such as Honeylocust, Cottonwood and Black Walnut), medium and short trees (such as Green Ash, Golden Willow and Bur Oak), evergreens (such as Austrian Pine, Scotch Pine and Redcedar) and shrubs (such as Cotoneaster, Lilac, Honeysuckle and Sand Cher-

ry). Experts advise that farmers consider such variables as available moisture, soil types and width of cultivation equipment when spacing the trees or shrubs. On favorable sites in this part of the state, the rows should be planted 12 to 16 feet apart. Information available at either Wakefield or the Northeast Station explains how to plant the windbreaks and how the windbreak works during a strong wind.
