Wayne moved a step closer Tuesday night to having an organized city center for the elderly.

The city council, after listening to VISTA workers Chuck Smith and Frank Hinkalo explain the weekly program they and several other people in Wayne have



organized, decided to have the building committee look into the possibility of the city getting state aid in setting up a recreation center for the elderly.

County Rural Schools Get Second State Aid

Wayne County rural schools will be receiving sometime this week their second payment from the state under the state aid to Nebraska schools law passed by the 1967 legislature, according to County Superintendent Mrs. Gladys Porter.

She said Friday that she has requested warrants totaling \$18,474.24 from the state and will mail them out to the 25 rural school districts this week.

Three rural school districts, 55, 77 and 89, did not apply for the funds.

Schools in the state became eligible for state aid after passage of LB 448. It made state aid available to schools in order to help following loss of revenue after repealing of the intangible property tax, to provide incentive to improve facilities and to help ensure minimum opportunities for pupils in valuation-poor districts.

The first payment the county rural schools received totaled \$9,277.87. It was received in September of last year.

School Board Says No To Higher Assessments

The board of education of Wayne City Schools decided at its regular monthly meeting Monday night not to pay the increased assessments levied against two parcels of its land by the city.

The increased assessments, amounting to \$500, were arrived at after several public hearings on the assessments against property owners in storm sewer district 67-2, the district in the west part of town along Sherman St.

The board's legal advisor, Budd Bornhoff, advised it that it would be spending the school district's money illegally if it went ahead and paid the increased assessments. The city council had already accepted the assessment schedule and could not force anyone to pay more than the original assessments, he told the board members.

At a recent city council meeting the council decided to lower the assessments against 15 parcels of land and raise them against five others. Those property owners who had their assessments raised could refuse to pay them.

At two hearings on the assessments several property owners in the district complained to the council that the school was not paying its full share of the storm sewer. The school, according to the city engineer, was being assessed in the same manner as all other property owners, on a benefits derived basis.

In other action the school board heard a report by Francis Haun concerning the response to questionnaires.

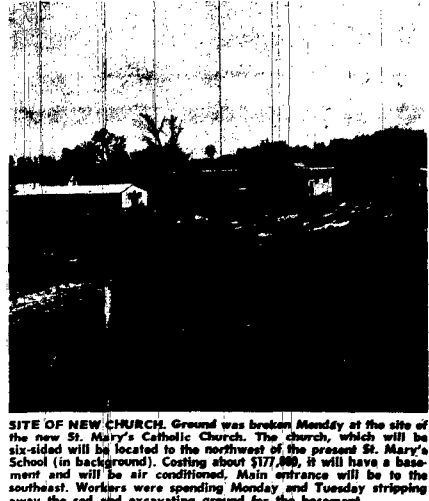
Weather

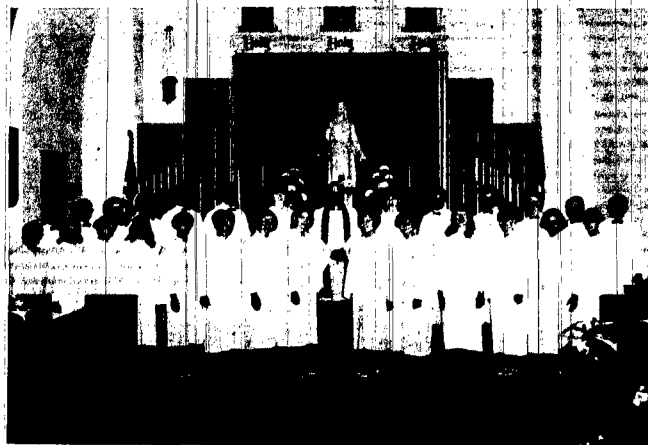

Wayne State College has been selected as one of the two training sites for athletes chosen to take part in the state's first all-star high school basketball game on August 22.

Wally McNaught, Lincoln Southeast basketball coach and chairman of the Nebraska Coaches Association (NCA) committee in charge of the game, announced Monday that the North squad will headquarter at Wayne State and the South squad will headquarter at Kearney State College.

Johnson has coached at Lincoln Northeast for 20 years and has compiled 277 wins and 100 losses. Eliminated in the semifinals of this year's state tourney, Johnson's Northeast Rockets were bidding for an unprecedented third straight class A state championship.

Bauer is no stranger to the state basketball tournament, either. Beginning in 1958, Bauer's teams made three consecutive trips to Lincoln and then repeated the appearances in 1962 and 1967. Holdrege captured the class B crown in 1967. Prior to coaching at Holdrege, Bauer coached at Bertrand and Terrell.

In addition to the all-star basketball game, the NCA will conduct a three-day clinic during the same week in August. High school coaches from throughout the state will be able to attend sessions on football, basketball, track, and wrestling.

The all-star game, as well as the clinic, will be at Lincoln's Pershing Municipal Auditorium the night before the Shrine bowl football game.

What's going to be the fate of LB 1022—the bill which would permit the use of federal funds given Nebraska to finance services for children in private as well as public schools?

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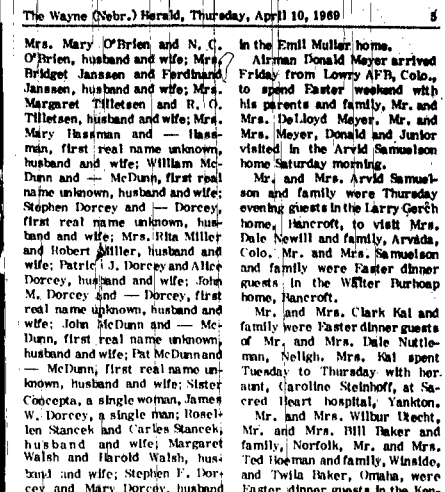

Warmest days during March were the 19th and 20th when the thermometer registered 50 degrees. Coolest high was recorded on two days, Mar. 8 and 29, when the temperature only reached 16 degrees.

tionnaires sent out to all parents of high school seniors asking for their opinions on whether the school or the church should hold baccalaureate services at commencement time.

The school board, at its meeting early in March, had decided it was not the function of the school to provide religious services at commencement time. Board members felt individual churches could do a better job of this than could the school.

The decision resulted in a few irate telephone calls to Superintendent Francis Haun. Haun later sent out the questionnaires home with the seniors.

Out of about 70 sent out, only 37 were returned. Of those returned, 11 expressed support of the board's decision and 26 expressed disapproval.

Board member Don Echtenkamp said he was surprised at the small number of questionnaires returned. "I thought about 80 per cent would return them on such a thing as this," he said.

Haun explained to the board that several students and parents were not angry over the decision but were disturbed because some students don't attend church in Wayne and therefore would find it difficult to attend a baccalaureate service.

The board instructed Haun to talk with the Wayne Ministerial Association about the possibility of its sponsoring a joint religious service for all graduating seniors regardless of where they go to church.

Haun also reported to the board that the president of the board of education of St. Mary's School had informed him about two weeks ago that the seventh and eighth grade classes at the Catholic school will be dropped next year.

The 26 pupils in these two grades will probably be enrolled in the Wayne public school system. Haun said he doubts if this will create any special problems as far as space and teacher loads are concerned.

In other action the school board: Heard Haun's report on his talk with the board of Educational Service Unit One. Haun had presented the board with a proposal for a program to deal with the gifted students in the Wayne school system.

Camp Capital Campaign Underway in 37 Counties for Boy Scout Camp.

Willard Witke, Wayne, and Warren Bressler, Wakefield, chairman of Lewis and Clark district, announced that the Mid-America Council has begun a capital campaign for the Boy Scouts of America, officially got underway in all communities Monday.

The Lewis and Clark district is divided into three zones which will be headed by Bernard Burton, Paul Smith and Willard Witke.

In turn, each zone chairman has enlisted neighborhood chairmen. Working in this group are Ken Carlson of Pilger, Gene Wilson of Winier, Al Wittig of Wayne, Roger Woody of Laurel, Darrell Holdorf of Winston, Bud Jensen of Concord and Lowell Saunders of Dixon.

Each unit has organized teams to contact school parents and other friends of scouting. Chairmen Witke and Bressler explained that throughout the 37-County Mid-America Council Area more than 5,000 adult volunteers will be working to achieve the goals of the campaign.

The Camp Capital Campaign has an overall goal of \$1,415,000. A large portion of the money has been pledged in the preliminary phases of the campaign through large corporations, foundations and other sources.

Camp Capital Campaign Funds will be used in a two-part program to upgrade existing camp facilities and to build a new 2000-acre Scout Reservation at Monona County, Ia.

Over the last five years, enrollment in the scout program has increased from 25,740 to 36,401 boys. Approximately 12,000 adults now volunteer their time throughout the years as scout leaders to make certain the boys have the benefit of a quality program. All of the Council's efforts, including this critical capital campaign, are directed toward the single important objective of serving more boys.

The Mid-America Council now maintains three long-term camps plus two short-term camps and Explorer Base. The present capacity of the long-term camps is 3,500 boys, but last year more than 4,000 were crowded into these three camps. By 1972, facilities will be needed for an estimated attendance of 5,200.

Funds needed for the capital improvement program is \$1,718,000; distributed \$401,141 for improvements and modernization at Camp Cedar, Camp Eagle, Camp Wakonda, Ia., Camp Wa-Kon-Da, Bellevue, Ia. and the Explorer Base and \$716,859 for constructing and equipping the new camp.

Also included in the overall objective is \$297,000 operating funds. Inclusion of this item is necessary because there will be no sustaining membership enrollment, or campaign for operating funds in Non Check/Fund towns during the year 1969.

Fledges can be made payable quarterly, semi-annually, or annually, as desired by the contributor. All gifts are tax deductible to the extent provided by law.

The total Campaign is slated to conclude with a Final Report Meeting Apr. 27.

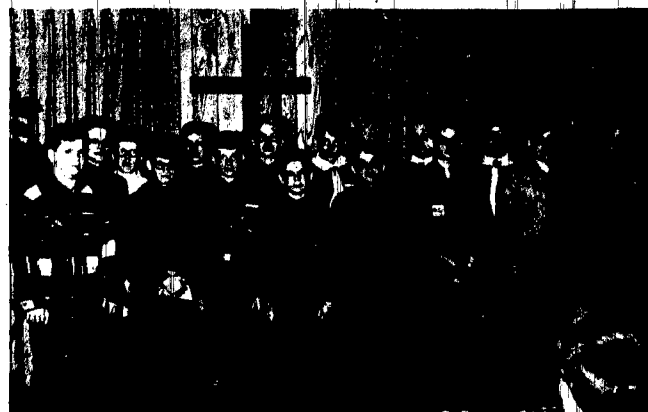

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Taxes and Inflation

It is time for someone to denounce in no uncertain terms the falsehood that a tax increase will restrain inflation. Taxes of all kinds have been going up and up even faster than inflation, which has also been going up and up and up. This ought to prove to any fair-minded person that an increase in taxes will not restrain inflation.

Now let's look at the reasons behind the trend. If government increased taxes and used the money to retire the public debt, that would indeed decrease spending, and tend to retard inflation. But that is not what government does with the tax money it takes from the public. On the contrary, it spends the money and it is just as inflationary when government spends money as it is when the people spend it. The only difference is that the people end by spending their money and are thereby able to have better homes, more education, more cultural advantages and a higher standard of living.

But when government spends the money, the people do not profit by these advantages but only the bureaucrats can live in bigger houses, employ more house servants, take more expensive hunts,

ride in bigger cars, and vote themselves salary increases.

To be a good chef, a man cannot be a "sandwich man", appearing before others with signs in front and behind, advertising nutritious and delicious food, but never eating any of it himself. Likewise, government cannot seriously ask taxpayers to curb spending nor take more taxes away from the people to "curb inflation" while continuing its own spending binge. Government spenders should first set the example.

Higher taxes will siphon off more money from the public so that the people cannot spend it, and it will siphon it directly into the hands of the government, who will spend it as they see fit. Inflation will go merrily on.

What we need are lower taxes, less public spending, less welfareism, and more private spending. We need more private enterprise that doesn't have to compete with government programs.

Inflation is a dragon not about to be slain by the taxpayer as government continues its spending spree. MMW

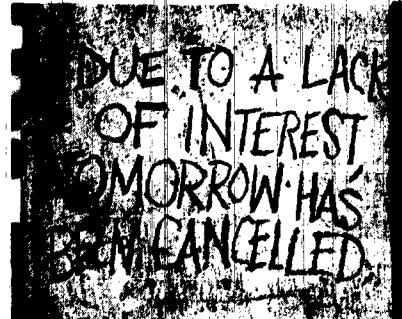

tape measure showed the depth to be two feet! How in the world was I ever going to photograph not only the impossible and impassable mass of mud, but how can you capture on film the sickening feeling as personal pride for your state begins to leave and you think, "This is a State Highway in 20th Century Nebraska!"

Having opened and shut the shutters several times we made our retreat before the army of mud and arrived back in the Nelson kitchen for a cup of delicious coffee and homemade brownies which really hit the spot.
As we touched, Russ Hall was wading home and Harry went to

the kitchen door to holler him in. Joining us around the table, Hall said there were five days in mid-March when the maintainer didn't get the snow pushed off of the road, which in his mind was very much a contributing factor to the present situation. Someone else commented that the maintainers were working getting the shoulders clear of snow on Highway 35 while snow blocked 57.

Nelson told of one neighbor who has butchered hogs that he can't get to market. He had them on a complete feed, but not being able to get anymore to the farm, due to the roads, he went to the elevator and got a grind and mix which he pulled out on a tractor. Not being able to get more of that he went to the crib

and put the hogs on straight ear corn.

I want to explain to my fellow townsmen what we're talking about here. We're talking about money. We're not talking about a few dollars but many hundreds of dollars. When the milk trucks can't get through, the milk may have to be poured out. That is pouring out money, which, if the farmer would have been able to pocket, a lot of it would have been spent in Carroll and Wayne. Anytime the man on the farm loses money, the surrounding towns and their business firms lose it too.

State Highway 57 is a road that several farmers wanted the state government men to look at while they were in this area April 2. Had they visited them, I'm sure they would have had the same surprise I had. You can't believe it until you see it! What a real shame it is that our tax dollars can go to the moon but there are not enough dollars available to build roads so we can get the children to school without their having to walk.

Highway 57, believe it or not, is a mail route. How can the mailman get through with the mail? Simple. He doesn't. This highway is a fire road. If a farm house should catch fire, how could fire-fighting equipment get there in time? Simple. It couldn't. Suppose a farmer, his wife or child had an accident, fell, got burned, had a heart attack or needed to get to the hospital for childbirth, how would they be able to get through? Simple. They couldn't.

Most everyone agrees that the past winter has been a hard one, an old-fashioned one and unusual one. Why should northeast Nebraska farmers, however, have to put up with 15th century roads while paying 20th century taxes?

Phil Olson summed it up better than I can. He said, "With the heavy expenditure that the farmer makes which develops prosperity in the cities, it is surprising that the State Legislature tolerates such a condition on a state road."
