# **County Rural Schools** Get Second State Aid

Get Second State Aid

Wayne County rural schools will be receiving sometime this week their second payment from the state under the state aid to Nebrasha schools law passed by the 1967 Legislature, according to County Superintendent Mrs. Gladys Porter.

She said Friday that she has received warrants totaling \$18,474,24\$ from the state and will mail them out to the 25 rural school districts this week. Three rural school districts, 55, 77 and 83, did not apply for the funds.

Schools in the state became eligible for staje aid after passage of LB 448, it made state aid available to schools in order to help following loss of revenue after repealing of the intangible property tax, to provide incentive to improve tacilities and to help ensure minimum opportunities for pupils in w.luntion-poor districts.

The latest opinion on the sub-ject was issued last week in reference to LB 1022, the bill before the education committee, in that opinion, Deputy Arty, Gen, Gerald Vitamvas said the "ob-vious and stated purpose" of LB 1022 "its to avoid" the re-strictions in the state constitu-tion.

strictions in the state constitu-tion.

Vitamvas said the State Su-preme Court has ruled that the legislature "cannot circumvent an express provision of the con-stitution by doing indirectly what it may not do directly."

LB 1022, Vitamvas said, "is a violation of this principle which has been so clearly expressed by our Supreme Court."

The sponsors of the bill, how-ever, said the conclusions of the

The sponsors of the bill, how-ever, said the conclusions of the justice department amount to "only one attorney's opinion." Sen. Bill K. Bloom of Omaha said if attorney general opinions were law "and simply taken on face value there would be no need for the courts."

An Omaha attorney represen-ting the Roman Catholic diodesan schools in Nebraska told the committee his research indicated the bill would be constitutional, and that the attorney general's office was wrong.

William J. Hotz said the federal money involved was allocated to Nebrasia as trust funds for the children and shouldn't be considered public funds.
Hotz said only Nebrasia and Oklahoma have ruled their state constitutions prohibit distribu-

constitutions prohibit distribu-tion of this federal money to parochial and other private

schools. Hotz placed his emphasis on the constitutional language which says "all lands, money or other property granted, or bequeathed, or in any manner conveyed to this state for educational purposes, shall be used and expended in accordance with the terms of such grant, bequest or conveyance."

He said the federal law spe-fically permits the use of the he said the federal law specifically permits the use of the funds for non-public school programs and, therefore, the state should use the money "in accordance with the terms of such grant."

grant."

Vitamvas, on the other hand, emphasized another section of the constitution. This one prohibits the state "from accepting any the state 'Trom accepting any grant, conveyance, or bequest of money, lands or other property to be used for sectarian purposes.' It also prohibits 'the legislature, any county, any city, or other proble corporation from ever making any appropriation from any public fund, in aid of any sectarian or denominational school or college, or any educational institution, which is not exclusively owned and controlled by the state or governments.'

This was the constitutional controversy the committee members

This was the constitutional con-troversy the committee members took home with them. They had to decide whether to advance the measure to the floor and let the full legislature determine whe-ther it should be passed, despite the constitutional questions, or whether to kill it in committee.

Harold T. Moylan of Sen. J. W. Burbach of

Crofton and Sen. Richard F. Proud of Omaha each urged the committee to send the bill to the floor for a decision, Proud said he hadn't decided whether to support the bill, but he thought the question was too important to be determined on the committee level.

More than any other issue before the 1980 legislature so far, LB 1022 has sparked a massive letter-writing campaign. Nearly all senators have received heavy amounts of mall-generally from persons supporting the legislation.

schools. Prodd read one from a
little girl who said she would
have her parents vote for him
"if you can get our school some
money from the government."

When the Rev. Charles Stephen,
