Pork Producers Attempting to Close Gap

A group of pork producers concerned about the problem of locating feeder pigs locally met this week to discuss what might be done. About forty people, representing several segments of the industry, attended the meeting held at the Northeast Station.

It was generally agreed that with the current price conditions those producers selling feeder pigs were not experiencing any problem in selling pigs. It was also understood that current conditions could not be expected to continue indefinitely. Several producers indicated they would sell feeder pigs out, but had difficulty in locating feeder pigs. The general consensus was that many feeder pigs are available but the location unknown.

In an attempt to locate the feeder pigs a letter will be sent to all pork producers in northeast Nebraska. Anyone selling feeder pigs will be asked to send information concerning the pigs to Rob Fritschen at the Northeast Station at Concord. Each month a list of feeder pig information will be mailed out. This information will include owner's name, address, farrowing date, approximate weight and date for sale and treatment such as vaccination, iron shots and castration.

Dick Sorenson, Wayne, president of the Northeast Swine Association told the group the success of the endeavor will depend upon feeder pig producers getting the information in on time.

Dates and timetable will be arranged and announced in the near future. The Northeast Swine Association in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Extension Service is sponsoring the effort.

MS Drive Will End Sunday

The 1969 Multiple Sclerosis fund drive campaign started Monday throughout Wayne County and will end Sunday. Volunteer workers are busy canvassing this week to raise funds for combating MS. There is no known cure for the disease as the cause is yet to be found.

Multiple Sclerosis, or MS, strikes most frequently in persons in their prime years, usually from 20 to 40, and presents complex problems in psychological, social and economic areas.

Mrs. Jerry Malcom, assisted by Mrs. Dick Powers, is heading up the 1969 campaign. She, along with several other area residents, are afflicted with MS. It is hoped that contributions throughout the nation will pave the way toward research in scientists being able to find the cause and cure of the disease.

MS is usually progressive, proceeding in a series of unpredictable attacks, each attack usually causing further disability. It is a neurological disease which disables the central nervous system.

State National Bank is acting in the capacity of treasurer for the drive funds.

Each contribution will help hasten the day when perhaps the cause and cure of MS may be found. The annual MS Hope Chest campaign is the single most important source of funds for the MS Society's research and patient service programs.

Mrs. Malcom said Wednesday morning, since there were not enough canvassers for each block in Wayne, it is possible some residents may not be contacted during the fund campaign. Attorney Explains Funds Available For Crime Control in Wayne County

"As larger Nebraska towns toughen up, the criminal element will likely head for the smaller communities where there are fewer law enforcement officers," commented Richard F. Mueting, Norfolk attorney, as he spoke before the Wayne County commissioners and guests Tuesday afternoon at the Wayne County courthouse.

Attorney Mueting is consultant to the Regional Crime Commission made up of two representatives from each of the following eight counties: Pierce, Antelope, Wayne, Madison, Stanton, Knox, Cedar and Dixon.

Also attending the 3 p.m. meeting in the commissioner's office were Alfred Koplin, mayor of Wayne; Vernon Hill, mayor of Winside; Wayne City councilmen Marty Willers, Ed Smith and Dick Panister; Vern Fairchild, Wayne chief of police; Norris Welbe,

county clerk; Carl Scheel, WSC campus police; John Addison, city attorney; Hutch Welbe, county sheriff; and Dr. N. L. Dittman, former mayor of Winside.

Purpose of the Regional Crime Commission was explained by Mueting, as being to "improve law enforcement throughout northeast Nebraska." He told the group, "What happened in Zap, S. D. could happen here."

Each of the eight counties forming the Regional Crime Commission district has two representatives on the commission. Police Chief Vern Fairchild and county clerk Norris Welbe are the two persons on the crime commission representing Wayne County. They work with 14 men from seven other counties, plus one member at large, composing a northeast Nebraska committee working in cooperation with Gov-

ernor Tlemann's Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice. Norris Welbe serves as regional secretary.

Tlemann's Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice was established to be a state agency dispensing

federal funds under the National Omnibus Crime Bill.

(Consultant Mueting informed the area men at the Tuesday meeting that the Regional Crime Commission had established three main priorities: (1) communi-

Over \$4,000 Collected

For March of Dimes

In Cedar County Drive

As a result of the 1969 March of Dimes campaign, a total of \$1,501.91 will remain in Cedar County to provide help and assistance to infants and young people with birth defects.

Rev. J. Keith Cook of Laurel, county chairman for the March of Dimes and director of the county campaign, reported last week that the drive brought in a total of \$4,366.06, a slight increase over the total collected in 1968 and nearly a 100 per cent increase over six years ago.

Twenty-five per cent of the amount collected (\$1,091.27) has been assigned to medical and scientific research for the purpose of discovering solutions to the problems of birth defects. Rev. Cook reported. Fifty per cent of the amount collected (\$1,501.91) has been given to the National Foundation for conducting the national work of the organization in providing help for the few remaining cases of polio and providing help for the thousands of infants and young people afflicted by major birth defects.

Laurel contributed the largest share in the drive, \$1,123.07, reports the director of the drive in that town, Mrs. Jess Teubel. Helden contributed \$289.39, according to director Mrs. James Kavanaugh, and Randolph contributed \$598.68, according to director Marvin Weber.

 - Your car is burning oil and engine damage is imminent.

- It's a good idea to have your tires rotated:
 - Once a week.
 - Every six months.
 - Every year.
 - Just before trading the car in.
- Blue smoke coming from the tail pipe is an indication that:
 - You are using gasoline of too low an octane.
 - Your low oil, oil-antifreeze and need a refill.
 - Your car is burning oil and engine damage is imminent.
 - You need a new tail pipe.
- Mufflers and the rest of the exhaust system should be replaced at the first sign of damage because:
 - There's a danger of death from carbon monoxide entering the passenger compartment.
 - It is required by your new car warranty.
 - The exhaust system has a definite link to your steering linkage.
 - Your car will not be as cool in warm weather.
- A squealing or scraping sound heard when applying the brakes can be a sign that:
 - Your brake pedal needs adjustment.
 - Your brake linings are dangerously worn.
 - Your braking system is wet.
 - Your emergency brake is set.
- All but the following can cause your cooling system to overheat:
 - A leak in the radiator or the hoses.
 - Coolant level is low and of contaminated.
 - Battery cable near the radiator is frayed or loose.
 - There is a leak in the pressure cap.
- Abnormally rough ride on bumpy terrain should indicate to you that:
 - Your shock absorbers and/or springs may need replacement.
 - Your tire threads are too thin.
 - Your car is long overdue for a tune up.
 - Your transmission needs immediate attention.
- Your PCV (positive crankcase ventilating) valve should be replaced:
 - When sooty black smoke is coming from the exhaust.
 - Twice each summer, once each winter.
 - About every 12 months.
 - It should never be touched or your warranty is voided.
- By cleaning or replacing the air filter every four months you can:
 - Keep the dust level down inside the passenger compartment.
 - Keep dirt from entering the carburetor and other vital engine parts.
 - Make the car air conditioner more effective.
 - Keep the radiator just free.
- After 5,000 miles of driving it's a good idea to have the following done to the spark plugs:
 - Have them cleaned and re-gapped.
 - Replace half of them.
 - Have them lubricated with No. 10 oil.
 - Have them checked with a hydrometer.

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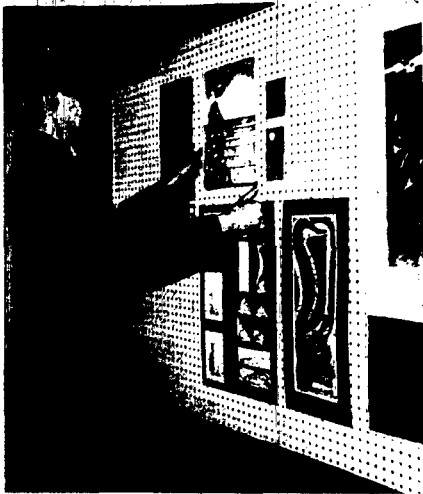

Evans: 'Agriculture Now Nebraska Economic Base'

Just how big agriculture really is in Nebraska is explained by Bert M. Evans, University of Nebraska Extension agricultural economist.
"Agriculture is Nebraska's economic base," Evans explains, which means that agriculture is to Nebraska like the automobile is to Detroit, Mich.
Although agriculture makes up a small part of Nebraska's population and receives an even smaller part of net family income, it is still by far the most important base of Nebraska's economy in terms of the state's export demand, or in its relationship to the national economy, says Evans.
He discusses agriculture in another state, Idaho, and makes several points:
Aggregate activity—Among

16 economic or industrial sectors, agriculture and food and kindred products taken together far outweighed all kinds manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade and other gross production figures.

Interdependence of economic activity—The most important suppliers of inputs to other industries by far were agriculture and food and kindred products.

Net exports (out of the state)—Exports were largest in agriculture and food and kindred products.

Gross exports—Far overstated any other sector of the economy.

The multiplier—Agriculture outranked all other industries in terms of having the greatest effect upon the generation of indirect economic activity.
Evans stresses that Nebraska's agriculture ranks well above Idaho's—and that, therefore, Nebraskans should take a more serious look at the public and private services provided in rural communities.

"They should in particular be sure that tax equity at the local level is pursued with vigor, provide completely comparable communications and educational services, and reform county government with an eye toward road systems consistent with the production, marketing and the farm supply needs of farm operators."

"The present inadequacy of school bus service; snow removal

and access roads maintenance are ready examples of our failure to recognize the prime economic role of agricultural production in Nebraska's agricultural production today," Evans concluded.

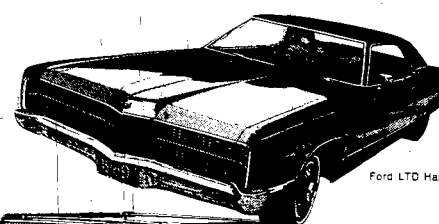

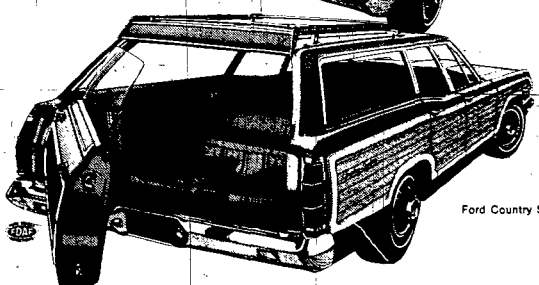
