

## NU Regent Will Be Speaker During Dedication of Swine Research Center

An open house, brief speaking program and free barbecue will feature the dedication of the newly-completed swine research center at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, Nebraska, near Concord, Neb., July 1.

This year comes from Robert Erttschen, area swine specialist, and Cal Ward, station superintendent, following a planning meeting which included representatives of area swine producers groups, the Northeast Experimental Farm Association and the NU Animal Science Department.

Richard Adkins of Osmond, University of Nebraska Regent and an active force in bringing the project to reality, will be the main speaker at a short pro-

gram following a free pork barbecue at 6 p.m.

Dick Sorenson of Wayne, vice president of the Nebraska Pork Producers Association and president of the Northeast Nebraska Pork Producers Association, will represent the various groups behind the drive to secure the facilities in their preliminary remarks.

Early arrivals at the station a short distance east of Concord may inspect the facilities prior to the barbecue. Tours also will be available before dark following the speaking program.

The research center consists of six growing-finishing houses being used in studies on confinement rearing of swine and

a small office-headquarters structure. Three units are enclosed, environment-controlled, the other three are open front units.

The construction project was an inter-disciplinary effort within the University, according to Erttschen, with the agricultural engineering department being responsible for plans involving tilt-up construction, various combinations of insulated walls, See **NU REGENT**, page 6

## Memorial Day Ceremonies Include Colorful Parade

A Memorial Day parade is scheduled to get under way tomorrow (Friday) at 10 a.m. beginning at the Wayne city auditorium, according to Chris Dargholz, parade chairman. He suggests to all participating parade units they meet at the auditorium at 9:30 a.m.

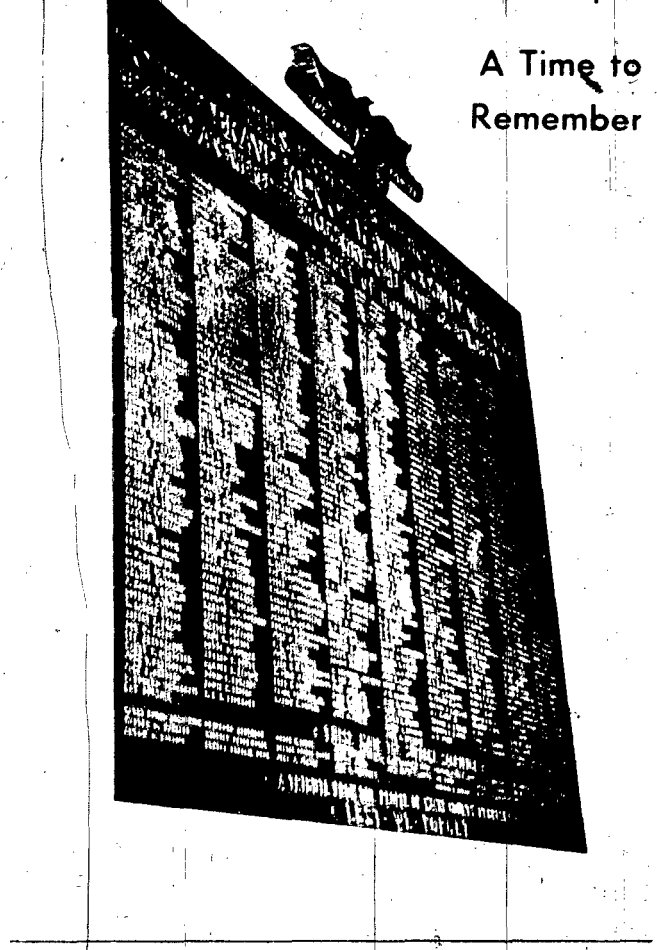
### School Dates Noted

## Council Told City Complex Plans Should Be Here Soon

Residents in Wayne should get an idea of what the proposed city complex will look like within the next week or so if the city engineer is right in his predictions.

He told the city council Tuesday night that the floor plans for the complex were to have been in Wayne Wednesday and the artist's drawing of the building should be here by Friday, June 6.

The city complex would be built out of the present fire hall. Additions would be built to the west side to house the fire department vehicles and to the north to provide space for the city clerk and police department. Council and Chamber of Commerce Task Force approval have already been given to a rough floor plan drawn up by the city engineer.

Assuming the final draft of the floor plans meet the two groups' approval, the city council and Task Force will attempt to convince the voters of the need for the complex in preparation for the bond election.

A rough timetable drawn up by the city engineer calls for the bond election to be held July 24, giving the two groups just over six weeks to sell the idea to the voters. Bids would be let August 26, construction would begin October 1 and the project would be completed by December 1, according to the timetable.

The council denied the request by James Coan, owner of the Dairy Sweet on East Seventh St., to rezone his place of business from R1 (residential district) to B1 (highway business district) so he would be able to provide more parking space for his customers.

The council noted that this would be "spot zoning" and if approved would open all other R1 areas in the city to businesses such as garages, filling stations, shops and the like. The planning commission had recommended to the council that the request be denied.

A petition signed by 33 property owners in the area had been sent to the council expressing concern about the increased noise and traffic congestion if the council approved the request and Coan went ahead with his plan.

Coan, noting that he was also against "spot zoning," said that he would rather the council "strip zone" the area so he could expand his business.

First step toward applying for federal and state funds to help with construction of parks in the city also was taken Tuesday evening.

John Addison, city attorney, explained to the council that the city should begin preparing a See **COUNCIL TOLD**, page 6

## Wayne Vets To Place Flags

Memorial Day is always a special occasion for Frank Heine, who has, for the past 40 years, placed small American flags, purchased by the City of Wayne, on the graves of veterans in the cemeteries at LaPorte, Altona and Wayne.

"I know just about where everyone is buried," remarked 75-year-old Heine, who previously worked for 19 years as caretaker of the Greenwood cemetery.

Frank and his wife have always decorated about 36 firemen's graves for which they have received a small remuneration, but his decorating the veterans' graves with flags has been simply out of personal interest and satisfaction.

He has never been sick so as not to be able to put the flags out. "No, not one time in 40 years" "This will be the first year that I haven't done it alone," he explained, "but this year I'm turning it over to other Legion members." One of those "other" Legion men helping this year is Chris Bargholz who has worked in helping arrange for Memorial Day services for 22 years.

"There are a total of nearly 300 veterans' graves," Heine pointed out, "with one 1812 grave at LaPorte." What assistance Frank has had in placing the flags, preceding each Memorial Day, has come from his children and grandchildren. "They always enjoyed helping me," he said.

Has the weather ever interfered with putting out the colors of "Old Glory"? "No," Heine said, "I have always gotten them out, however, there have been times when it has rained afterwards."

When asked if he had noted any particular change in Memorial Day services through the years, he replied, "Yes, attendance on Memorial Day seems to be less every year."

Frank usually goes to Altona and LaPorte cemeteries a day or two before Memorial Day for erecting the flags. He said there are three veterans' graves at LaPorte, one marked 1812 and the other two are Civil War veterans. "Altona has five veterans' graves, all from World War I," he explained.

Frank Heine is still going strong at 75 years of age, 50 years of which he has been a member of Legion Post 43, and his wife has four children and ten grandchildren.

Besides working each day, the energetic veteran and his wife enjoy working in their yard at 503 Nebraska Street in the evening.

As you see the small American flags waving in the breeze over the many veterans' graves at Wayne, LaPorte and Altona, tomorrow, you'll know of the dedication that has put them there.

heating and ventilation systems. The dedication culminates a three-year effort in which the swine industry and agribusiness interests in northeast Nebraska have contributed substantial funds, supplementing available University capital construction allocations.

Officials announced plans in the spring of 1966 to initiate a swine confinement-management project at the Northeast Station. It marked the first systematic swine research to be conducted by the University in the area, long the host of swine production in the state.

Following the initial announcement, directors of the Northeast Experimental Farm Association kicked off a fund drive to support the project and speed up construction of the facilities so that urgently-needed answers on raising hogs in confinement could be obtained.

Preliminary results of research, including the possible effect of confinement on leg problems of swine, already have been reported by Fritschsen, who is coordinating work at the research center, in cooperation with Dr. Leo Lucas, swine extension and research staff member with the N.T. Department of Animal Science.

Other research goals, using the highly adaptable buildings with variable degrees of slotted floors, are to determine optimum pen size and shape, to evaluate ventilation systems, to establish manure disposal procedures and to determine the value of floor heat.

Pigs for research are obtained as feeder pigs, and present plans do not call for construction of farrowing facilities. It is expected that all six units will have pigs on test by the July 1 program date, Fritschsen said.

concerning success. Dr. Larsen reminded his audience that we live in a prosperous and affluent society. "And though we are living in good times, prepare also for some hard times," he admonished.

He challenged the graduates to "Love, protect and preserve freedom. I believe God gave it." Larsen continued, "It depends upon your generation to protect the freedom of speech, the freedom of the press and the freedom to worship. We must review these things each generation."

"We're moving into a generation of young people," the York College president noted. "There are more young people than ever before. It means you are entering a world of keen and stiff competition. There are more 'trained' young people and frustration may arise in the future as a person may have to restrain more than once."

"Continuing to be emphasized, 'You must never cease preparing if you are going to succeed. Quoting Horace Mann, who said, 'We should be ashamed to die until we have done something for a fellow man.' Dr. Larsen advised the graduates to "Find a job where you can serve your fellow man. Don't accept a job that is too small."

**Outstanding 4-H Youth Concentrating On Winning 1969 Achievement Award**

Again this year outstanding 4-H members will concentrate on summarizing their achievements and updating their project

records with the hope of competing for a 1969 4-H Achievement Award.

For the 18th straight year the Ford Motor Company Fund is sponsoring the national 4-H Achievement program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service. Awards consist of 62 national scholarships of \$600 each, one all-expense trip per state for a delegate to the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago and gold-plated medals for four county winners.

As the name suggests, this program is a wrap up of all phases of 4-H work ranging from animal science to home economics. In judging winners, particular attention is given to community and school activities, junior leadership, and civic awareness.

Excellent individual projects where initiative and steady progress are apparent puts the boy or girl in the lead, as does personal development, according to a 4-H spokesman. Last year nearly 8,800 young people across the country received an achievement honor medal.

To be eligible for a state or national award, the youth must be over 14 years of age, have completed at least three years of 4-H work and write a 2,000 word essay on 4-H experiences. The 12 scholarship recipients awarded to six boys and six girls. A survey of the 1968 recipients revealed that they ranged in age from 17 to 19 years and were 4-H members from seven to 10 years. Eight already were in college and the other four planned to attend. All the boys lived on farms and carried livestock and crops projects. Of the girls, three lived on farms and three in small towns. All excelled in home economics projects.

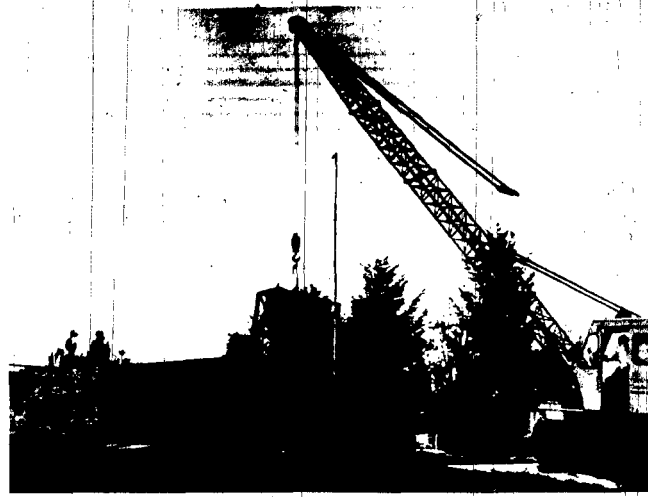
