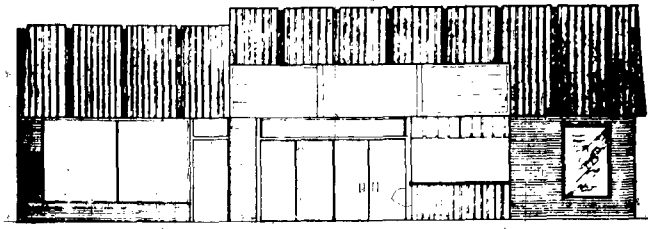


New Look to Gay Theatre

County Sales Tax Contributes \$163,000

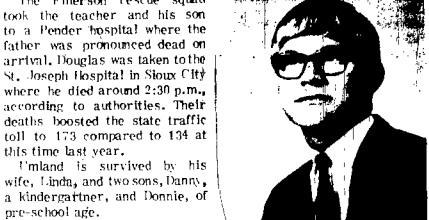

Memorial Day was one of happiness in the Walter Carlson home in Wakefield as their son, Ted, arrived home following an absence of six years during which time he has worked as a missionary on various foreign fields. Carlson flew from Tokyo to Lincoln, stopping for six days in San Francisco where he visited his sister, Mrs. Dwan Scott and family.

Carlson left for Asia in the summer of 1963 traveling by ship to Hawaii, Yokohama and Kobe, Japan, Hong Kong, Manila, Philippines and Singapore with other members of a literature crusade team. In November of 1964, when some of the team went on to other locations and some returned to the States, Ted remained in Tokyo where he commenced studying the Japanese language. He has continued living there for the past five years.

During that time Carlson has been associated with Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Presson, directors of the Emmaus Bible Correspondence courses in Tokyo. Much of his time has been spent in difficult language study as well as using various means of becoming acquainted with the culture, customs and thinking of the people. He has been teaching English conversation classes at a large trading company, also at the National Police Institute of Scientific Research and at a large boys' high school. Besides this Ted has been teaching privately and working with young people in classes at a Bible Chapel in Tokyo.

Prior to returning to the States the missionary has been assisting in a new work established in Urawa, a rapidly developing area north of Tokyo.

Carlson plans to visit in Wakefield a few weeks after which he will make a trip to Chicago for a reunion with his sponsoring church, the Beverly Bible Chapel. During July and August he says he will be visiting churches in Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota, telling of his work in Japan. Upon completing a tour of churches located in approximately 12 states this fall and early winter, Carlson plans to return to Japan early in 1970 to resume his work.

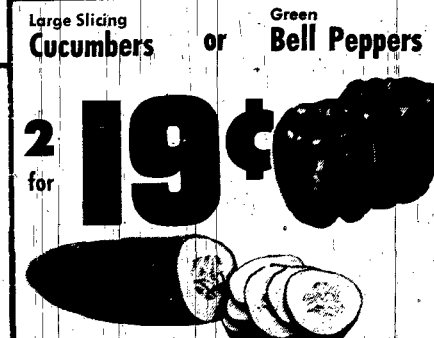

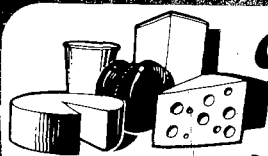

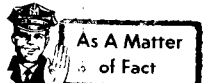

Capital News

After nearly two months of suspense since Education Commissioner Floyd A. Miller's "execution" was forecast in the famous Lunday Letter, the board has made the prediction come true.

On a 5-3 vote last week, Miller was fired. By the same vote count, he was ordered to turn over the keys to his office by five o'clock that evening. The action came at a dramatic special meeting in the crowded Supreme Court hearing room at the Capitol. The session was sparked by vigorous demands by Miller's three supporters that the charges which would justify his dismissal be made public.

These demands from Robert G. Simmons Jr. of Scottsbluff, Frank E. Landis of Lincoln and Norman Otto of Millard were sidestepped by Miller's foes, Board President Allen P. Burkhardt of Norfolk, Mrs. Deborah Shepherd of Lexington, John K. Lunday of Omaha, John A. Wagoner of Grand Island and Lloyd Wright of Reynolds.

But after the meeting was adjourned, Burkhardt distributed to newsmen a statement which gave the reasons he said convinced him the best interests of Nebraska education would be served by Miller's dismissal. Burkhardt, who said the four members who voted with him and against Miller endorsed the statement, said the commissioner had failed to cooperate with the board.

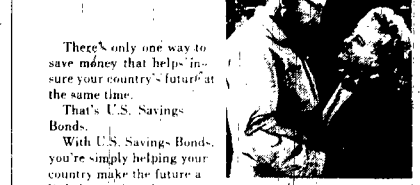
He said Miller hadn't allowed board members to participate in the preparation of the education department's budget and that he had taken a series of other steps without the board's knowledge or assent. Landis called the Burkhardt statement "poppycock" and Miller said none of the reasons listed justified his dismissal. Landis maintained the only reason Miller was fired was his promotion of "fringe school re-districting," which he said the board majority opposes because the present districts provide tax advantages.

Miller implied there had been a coalition of parochial school and rural interests which created the board majority which fired him. The commissioner described the board's action as "a violation of decency, courtesy, fair play and due process of law."

Although there had been plans earlier to fight a dismissal in court, Miller said after the meeting last week it was unlikely that legal action would follow. He said "nothing is to be gained for the cause of education in Nebraska by prolonged litigation."

When the news of the board's decision reached the legislature, Sen. Don Etrod of Grand Island asked that a resolution be introduced earlier be considered. The resolution, which censures the five members who voted against Miller, has been bottled in the education committee since early April. Chairman Lester Harsh of McCook said his committee would consider the resolution after the

getting higher on your farm you could be right. These weeds have increased significantly since the advent of 2,4-D and MCPA because these chemicals have eliminated a lot of the common broadleaf annual weeds that once provided weed competition to foxtails. Once these broadleaf weeds were reduced in population the foxtails multiplied rapidly. Foxtails are now considered to be one of the worst weeds in Nebraska. They compete with crops for water, light, nutrients and possibly carbon dioxide. They reduce moisture reserves on summerfallow, and controlling them is expensive. In addition the weed seeds in harvested grain boost dockage and lower quality.

Green foxtail produces an average of 34,000 seeds per plant and yellow foxtail an average of 60,000 per plant. Seeds can stay alive in the soil for periods of up to 30 years and a field can become saturated with foxtail seed in a short time. While these weeds are seldom troublesome in small grains they are a real problem in cultivated row crops. Aatrex, Londa and a Ramrod-Atrazine mixture can be used in corn. Aatrex, Herban 21A and Ramrod-Atrazine are suggested for use in sorghum, Amibon, Treflan, Planavin and Verriam are recommended for foxtail control in soybeans.

Don't Overcultivate All researchers caution against cultivating too much, too deep and too late. Farmers are warned about root pruning in soybeans, a plant which has a surprising quantity of roots in the upper three inches of the soil. A severe six-inch deep cultivation reduced yields three bushels per acre; a three-inch depth also caused some yield reduction. Even though herbicide use is growing, a 1967 survey indicates farmers are far from dumping their cultivators and relying just on herbicides. More than 90 percent of the more than 10 million acres of corn in Illinois was cultivated one or more times even though 79 percent of the farmers used pre-emergence and post-emergence herbicides. Herbicide does get better; cultivators may become less important for weed control, but as fruit-forming soils scientists agree the best row-crop program will still include at least one trip with a cultivator.

What are the advantages of hay? The chief advantage of hay is that everyone knows how to make it, and most people already have the necessary harvesting equipment and storage space. Ease of storage is one of hay's major advantages. Hay storage is cheap and easy to build and in some western areas no facilities are needed. Hay can be readily moved and is almost always available on the market. What about advantages for haylage? The two major advantages of haylage are: 1. Can harvest crop under a wider range of weather conditions and still put up a top quality feed. 2. Harvesting, storing and feeding can be completely mechanized with commonly available equipment. What's the major disadvantage of hay? Dependence on weather and excessive hand labor in storing and feeding. What are the chief drawbacks to haylage? Storage is expensive and it is quite subject to spoilage in storage.

fully ripe. A harmless coloring is added to make oranges more attractive. Then "color added" or a similar phrase must be stamped on the colored orange. This does not indicate inferior quality. It only gives the consumer more information. In 1961 the Color Additive Amendment established all colors for safety and set limits for amounts of color to be used. The law prohibits the use of color to cover a blemish, conceal inferiority or mislead the consumer. Colors used in the home are safe but the homemaker should use them in reasonable quantities. A cake which uses three bottles of food coloring would not be advisable. Edible waxes is sometimes applied to potatoes, yams and cucumbers to increase storage life span. If color has been added to the wax the consumer must be notified. Individually potatoes are not stamped with "color added," but a sign calling attention to added color must be near the produce or written on the label for the consumer to see.


