

Plans for a new 200,000 ratton elevated water tank which will stand on 100 foot lees, with a total height of 130 feet, were approved and adopted by the Wakefield Cits Council at a special meeting held in the City Bull May 12.

When constructed, the new landmark will stand one-half block east of Main Street and approximately 100 feet north of Third Street. when questioned as to the need for replacing the tank.

Mayor Ed Schnasse commented, "We needed more emmented, "We needed more water storage as the town's needs are growing, it should increase water pressure "all over Wakefield."

Ile also expressed hope that the project could be finished and in operation by the summer of 1970. block east of Main Street and approximately 100 feet north of Third Street.

According to the resolution adopted by the Council, the new water tower project is estimated to cost nearly \$55,000. A Lincoln firm, Clark and Fhersen Olsson Burroughs and Thomsen Architects and Engineers designed the steel water storage structure and associated improvements.

John Olsson, from the Lincoln firm, appeared before the Council and explained design details. Unlike Wasefield's present tower which is calindrical, the new tank's storage space is clevated on top of a tower, a hundred feet high.







### State School Board Drops Bomb, Fires Floyd Miller

LINCOLN - The State Board Education has dropped the

of reducation as oropped the other shoe.

After nearly two months of suspense since Education Commissioner Floyd A. Miller's "execution" was forecast in the famous Londy Letter, the board has made the prediction come

has made the prediction come true.

On a 5-3 vote last week, Miller was fired. By the same vote count, he was ordered to turn over the keys the his office by five o'clock that evening.

The action came at a dramatic special meeting in the crowded Supreme Court hearing room at the Capitol. The session was sparked by vigorous demands by Millen's three supporters that the charges which would justify his dismissal be made public.

These demands from Robert G. Stammons Jr. of Scottsbulf, Frank, E. Landls of Lincoln and Norman

E. Landis of Lincoln and Norman E. Landis of Lincoln and Norman Otto of Willard were sidestepped by Miller's foes, Board President Allen P. Burkhardt of Norfolk, Mrs. Deborah Shepherd of Lex-ington, John K. Londay of Oma-ha, John A. Wagoner of Grand Island and Lloyd Wright of Reynolds.

Island and Lloyd Wright of Reynolds.

But after the meeting was adjourned, Burkhardt distributed to newsmen a statement which have the reasons he said convinced him the best interests of Nebraska education would be served by Miller's dismissal. Burkhardt, who said the four members who voted with him and against Miller endorset the state.

against Miller endorsed the state

agains: Miller endorsed the state-ment, said the commissioner had failed to cooperate with the board. He said Miller hadn't allowed board members to participate in the preparation of the education department's budget and that he had taken a series of other steps without the board the said the said

without the board's knowledge or assent.

Landis called the Burkhardt statement "poppycock" and Miller said none of the reasons listed justified his dismissal.

Landis maintained the only reason Miller was fired was his promotion of "prompt school redistricting," which he said the board majority opposes because the present districts provide tax advantages.

the present understanding advantages.

Miller implied there had been a coalition of parochial school and rural interests which created the board majority which fired

and rural interests which created the board majority which fired him.

The commissioner described the board's action as "a violation of decency, courtesy, fair play and due process of law."

Although there had been plans earlier to right a dismissal in court, Miller said after the meeting last week it was unlikely that legal action would follow.

He said "nothing is to be gained for the cause of education in Nebraska by prolonged litigation."

When the news of the board's decision reached the legislature, Sen. Don Elrod of Grand Island asked that a resolution be had introduced earlier be considered. The resolution, which censures the five members who voted against Miller, has been bottled in the education committee, since early Aprili.

trati such action might be beyond the authority of the board in a special meeting. The nixt regular imeeting is this Friday and an interim commissioner is expected to be named then to serve until a permanent successor to Miller is selected.

Most phservers said the caretaker commissioner probably would be named from among the key members of the education department staff.

The Nebraska Association of School Administrators has a sked its members to boycott the board and refuse to consider appointment as commissioner, Landis and others have commented that it would be difficult for the board to find an administrator willing to go to work with the unsettled conditions which exist in Nebraska.

Miller has been a target for many months of the Nebraska School Improvement Association and its secretary, S. H. ("Zeke") Brauer Jr. Several of the complaints listed in Burknardt's statement about Miller covered polints first raised in statements Brauer delivered to the board.

Miller has received support from more than 100 educational organizations, including many school boards, throughout the state. landis described this as the "most spontaneous and overshelming support" he has ever

the "mist spontaneous and over-whelming support" he has ever known a public official to receive. Most of the talking at the spe-cial meeting was done by Miller's supporters. Simmons, especially, insisted throughout the session that the chargesi against Miller be made

public. He complained of a "con-spiracy of silence" when he failed to get a response to his ques-

tions.
He and Otto implied that the anti-Miller board members had met privately to arrange the procedures for the special meet-

procedures for the special meeting.

Last week's action was first predicted in a letter written by Londay to the other four board members who joined him in voting against Miller. Londay's letter fell into the hands of Miller early in April and he released it to the press, causing a constitution. sensation.

Now that spring is here and new hay crop is in sight a lot of people are asking! Should I make hay or haylage?

Unless you have already decided to make a change; it is go ahead and put up the criop as you have in the past. You already have the know-how and equipment. These are both important factors. If you make a change it will probably take some new equipment and this takes time to get ready.

Seeds can remain alive in the soil for periods of up to 30 years and a field can become saturated with foxtall seed in a short time.


