

#### Good Luck, Governor

We hope that Governor Norbert Tlemann is successful in his drive to have the "self-defense" bill repealed.

The bill, which was passed over the governor's veto, would allow a person to use "any means necessary" when protecting himself, his family or his real or personal property or when helping another person in danger of being assaulted, robbed, raped or murdered. That person would not be placed in any legal jeopardy for doing so.

One of the reasons Governor Tlemann objected to the bill was because it did not contain some qualifying phrase about the use of reasonable force. He said it is a "dangerous and absolutely unnecessary bill" which would promote "vigilante law enforcement".

unnecessary bill" which would promote viginate law enforcement".

It is dangerous because it does not stipulate that the person defending himself must use reasonable force and must be held accountable if he exceeds that reasonable force. It is unnecessary

because under existing law a citizen of this state already has the right to defend himself, his family or his property if he uses reasonable force.

or his property if he uses reasonable force. It is fearful to imagine what could happen if this bill is not repealed: A man is knocked down by two young hoodlums. They steal a few dollars from his coat and kills both youths. That man would apparently not be held accountable for his actions under the "self-defense" bill. But did that man use reasonable or unreasonable force? Should he not be held accountable for his actions? Should he not be held accountable for his actions? Should he not face punishment by the courts in the state for having taken two lives unnecessarily? Should not the laws of this state say that a person has a right to use only reasonable force in protecting himself? We feel they should. We hope enough citizens in this state will object to their senators, demanding that the bill be repealed. — N.I.I.



#### Sanity Peeks Through

Figally, Draft Director Lewis B. Hershey has had his knuckles rapped. We were beginning to think he had become a power unto himself, strong enough to decide the fate of thousands of young people across the nation.

The U. S. Court of Appeals ruled last week that "a registrant's protest activities are not to be [considered in determining his Selective Service classification," Hershey had advised local draft boards in late 1967 they had he right to reclassify registrants when they take part in "Illegal" demonstrations. There was little doubt at that time that Hershey was referring to those young people who were demonstrating against the war in Viet Nam. This was Hershey's way of stlencing those people. If they shout and march in opposition to the nation's conduct in the war, reclassify them to A-1, draft them and ship them straight to Viet Nam.

Thank God there are still some people sane enough to see where such a course could lead this country. If this kind of thinking were allowed

enough to see where such a course could lead this country. If this kind of thinking were allowed

to grow and influence those its government, this mation would slowly see a stifling of one of its most important principals—the right to speak one's mind, the right to differ with those in power, the right to object to policies one feels are wrong. If liershey had his way, thousands of college students would first have to decide if they wanted to put their college careers on the line before they could stand up and be counted when opposing the government. Thousands of other citizens would also be putting their careers on the line before they could publicly say the government is headed in the wrong direction.

Hershey overstepped the bounds of his authority as draft director when telling the local draft boards they could reclassify young men who demonstrated against the government. He was assuming the power relegated to the courts of this land—the meting out of justice and punishment. We think be should step down or be removed from his job for having done so. — NLH,

## **Governor, Senators Differ On Government Price Tag**

LINCOLN—The price of running state government was the overriding issue in the legislature last week — and probably will be until the session ends. The hard decisions about how many of the taxpayers' dollars should be allocated for each of the many functions the state carries on must now be made. No matter whose opinion of the budget problems you listen to, a lot of dollars are involved, lundreds of millions of dollars. But just how many dollars totally, and how should the total be divided? Those are the big questions now being pondered. Late last year, the state agencies began submitting their estimates of what they would need to do what they would need to do what they think ought to be done during the fiscal years of 1989 and 1970 — or during the 1989-71 blennium.

1999-71 blennium.
Their requests totaled nearly a half-billion dollars.
The governor thought that was too much and the executive budget he submitted to the legislature called for a total of about \$314 million.

The budget committee thought

that was too much and it Intro-duced a budget bill with a state tax price tag of \$297 million.

At least one member of the budget committee thought that was too much. Sen. Cliffton B. Batchelder of Omaha said the total ought to be closer to \$230 million – at least it ought to be a total which wouldn't require an increase in the sales or hoome increase in the sales or income

increase in the sales of income taxes.

Meanwhile, agency reaction to the committee's recommendations began. One after another, complaints were heard that this program or that service would be crippled if an agency is forced to live within the financial limits reacceed by the committee.

to live within the financial limits proposed by the committee. Many of the agencies found Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann had a sympathetic ear. Reminding the taxpayers, the senators and the agencies that the budget he had recommended carried, in his opinion, "no fat" and was severely written there was no way to cut it without destroying the state's progress, Flemann

began a campaign to have re-stored some of the funds lopped

began a campaign to have restored some of the funds lopped by the committee.

Ile began sending letters to the legislature listing areas he thought needed financial reinforcement and explaining why.

Time after time, as the senators go through the budget proposals, they will have to decide whether the taxpayers can afford new parks and recreations areas, continued state cooperation with community better ment programs, expansion of the institutions of higher learning to handle predicted enrollment increases, new vocational-technical schools and countless other expensive issues.

Scottsbluff Sen. Terry Carpenter suggested that the problem be handed over—politically—to Tiemann. He said the legislature ought to substitute the governor's budget proposals for the commit-

ought to substitute the governor's budget proposals for the committee recommendations and go home.

He said he didn't think even the He said he didn't think even the governor's budget was large enough to operate state government in the coming biennium, If it turns out it isn't, Carpenter said, the legislature could return in a special session and make up the difference.

His plan of delegation of the senatorial responsibility to the governor, however, wasn't popu-lar with his colleagues.





#### Allen Lady Adds Unusual Find to Rock Collection

A short trip out to a gravel pit near Allen turned out better than Mrs. Irene Armour ever tmaguied.

A rock hound ever since she was a child, Mrs. Armour ended up the day owning what rock specialists say is a very rare possession — a petrified turtle in almost perfect condition.

Mrs. Armour went to the pit to look through some of the rocks for anything she doesn't already have in her collection. While digging around, a truck driver came sover and a sked if she wanted a rick which had fouled up one of the augers. He gave it to her, dumined in his truck and drove off before she could thank him. The rock turned out the shaped exactly like a turtle with less and head drawn into the shell.

She showed it to some of the members of the Gemand Mineral Club in Stoux City, which she joined only recently, and they "went wild." They told her it was not too unusual to find living things turned into stone, but it is very ususal to find them in such perfect condition in Ne-brasia, especially in gravel pits where machines often crush or break rocks.

The rock, about six inches long and quite heavy, has creases on the top where the turtle's shell would be and on the bottom where the hard belly would be. The creases are too perfect to have been formed by erosion by wind or water. Slight portions of the shell area have been chipped away, possibly by a machine at the gravel pit or by erosion. David lanner of Wayne, another rock hound, said that the rock was probably pushed into Nebrasia during the time of the glaclers, He said it could be anywhere from 60 to 120 million years old.

Miss. Armour, who has lived in the Allen area all her life, admitted that all the credit for the find belonged to that truck driver. "But he took off before I could even thank him," she said.

She wasn't the only one who thought she was a will lucky to add the rock to her collection only a short time after joining the rock club. "One club member just looked at the rock and walked away muttering to himself that some poople have all the luck" she said.


