

Methodist Pastor For Allen Parish Assumes Duties

The new Methodist minister for Allen, Ponca, Maskell and Wynot arrived in Ponca earlier this month. A native of Tennessee, Rev. J. H. Chaste replaces Rev. Dwight Hamling, who had lived in Allen during his year as pastor of the northeast Nebraska communities.

Married and the father of four children, Rev. Chaste came to this area from Mullen, Neb., where he had served the Mullen-

Whitman parish for five years. He was ordained and received into full connection in the Methodist ministry in 1960 and held pastorates in the Tennessee conference of the former Methodist Church around Nashville from 1951 to 1960 when he and his family moved to Hillsville, Neb. Rev. and Mrs. Chaste's four children are Jerry, 15, Wanda, 14, David, six, and Yolanda, four.

Rev. Chaste will continue as an associate pastor, with duties primarily at Maskell and Wynot.

Schools Share \$56,817.51

Wayne County's 34 school districts have received \$43,796.16 from state school funds, county fines and license fees, according to Mrs. Gladys Porter, county superintendent of schools. With insurance premiums of \$13,021.35 added, the total distribution was \$56,817.51.

The state apportionment in 1968 was \$27,439.62 compared to \$33,796.16 this year. Fines and license fees received from the county jumped from \$8,000 in 1968 to \$10,000 this year. Total increase for the schools in monies from these two sources over last year amounted to \$8,356.54.

School districts also received \$13,021.35 from insurance premium taxes for distribution on the basis of average daily attendance, according to Supt. Porter. The \$33,796.16 in state funds allocated to Wayne County were

divided as follows: amount allocated to each eligible school district was \$513.26; amount allocable equally to all school districts (one-fourth) was \$17,450.84; amount allocated for each census child was \$6.42; number of eligible school districts was 34 and the number of eligible census children in Wayne County was 2,546; and the amount allocable to all districts according to census (three-fourths) was \$16,345.34.

The county fines and license fees were distributed to all school districts.

Masons Will Honor Carl Wright Tuesday

A long-time Wayne area resident will be honored by Wayne Masonic Lodge 129 Tuesday night for his long membership in the Masons.

Carl Wright of Wayne will receive a 50-year pin Tuesday night in a ceremony open to the public. Also a Shrine member, he finished his Masonic work in April of 1913.

Wright at one time worked in a lumber yard in California, then homesteaded in Montana in the early 1900's before moving to Wayne. He farmed here and then became a partner in the Fisher-Wright Lumber yard. He became the owner of the lumber yard and later sold it to Fullerton Lumber Co.

Illegal 'Bang!' Could Cost \$100

Anybody shooting off larger firecrackers than are being sold at the stands in the city are leaving themselves open to a fine ranging up to \$100, according to County Judge Laverna Hilton.

Police Chief Vern Fairchild said the firecrackers being sold at the stands are legal in the state. But he warned that they should not be thrown at cars, exploded near the firecracker stands, thrown in the city pool or handled in any other dangerous manner.

Complaints about mishandling firecrackers in the city are running about average, Fairchild said.

Lightning Strikes Allen Farmhouse

The farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Norris Emry of rural Allen suffered between \$200 and \$300 damage when struck by lightning about 3:30 Wednesday morning.

Most curious thing about the incident, Emry said, was that there were about five rapid cracks when the lightning struck. The cracks were about as loud as shotgun blasts and occurred within a second or two.

The lightning apparently struck the antenna for Emry's citizen's band radio, traveled from there to a kitchen cabinet containing the radio. Rusted completely were the radio, an electric motor on a well and several fuse boxes, plugs and wires.

A small fire started in the kitchen cabinet, which had a door blown open when the lightning struck, but this was quickly doused with baking soda. The family was up at the time closing windows and doors because of the rain.

Emry, who farms two miles east and one-quarter south of Allen, said a fluorescent desk lamp in the parsonage of Friends Church just north of his home was turned on by the lightning strike.

The Duane Troth home in Allen was struck by lightning about three weeks ago, burning out several electrical plugs and doing similar damage as at the Emry home.

Author-traveler visits WSC - - - African Life 'Out of Whack'

"Life is all out of whack in Africa."

That's the opinion of an American lady who has traveled to the remotest parts of Africa, knows its primitive peoples and its animals, and loves them passionately.

Carol Morse Perkins, speaking to the Wayne State College workshop on language arts, took a number of slides at civilization. Mostly her three talks were warm, witty descriptions of people, animals, places, customs in Africa—making everybody want to go there with her next safari.

A recurrent theme, however,

was Mrs. Perkins' belief that civilized man is responsible for Africa's being "out of whack"—both its people and its animals. Animals that once roamed most of sub-Saharan Africa now live freely only in a limited area, mainly Kenya and Tanzania, she said. Some species are all but extinct and survive only by government protection.

Some primitive peoples have difficulty surviving after being introduced to the ways of civilization, Mrs. Perkins said.

Yet in some respects, some of the primitives "are more civilized than we." The Bushmen who live in the forbidding Kalahari Desert illustrated this point.

In one talk she described her travels with husband Marlin Perkins to film his television "Wild Kingdom" series on the Bushmen. They found the Bushmen utterly primitive, with no established settlements in an area twice the size of Nebraska, no written language.

But the Bushmen, she said, are a delightful people, gentle, good-natured, resourceful. Unlike most primitives who can be unbelievably cruel, even to their own people, the Bushmen are

loving especially to their babies. She spoke of asking an old man how old he was. He didn't know because the Bushmen have no time, but he answered this: "I am young as the most beautiful wish in my heart, old as all the unfulfilled desires of my life." Whether this was his own poetry or another's, said Mrs. Perkins, it expressed his life.

Fortunately, the South African government protects the Bushmen from intruders, Mrs. Perkins said, and leaves them alone to survive in the hardy way they know.

Unfortunately for many other native tribes, the civilizing efforts of Europeans and Americans has upset ancient ways of life, the explorer-author-photographer said. Even such beneficial factors as medicine and modern science have brought disastrous changes in the balance of nature, simply by prolonging life of both humans and animals and so increasing population. **AFRICAN LIFE, page 2.**

WSC Personnel To Conference

Stanley F. Willis, assistant dean of instruction at Wayne State College and Laura Franklin, chairman of WSC division of languages were among 70 representatives of colleges in Nebraska, South Dakota, Colorado, Kansas and Wyoming attending a three-day conference in Curriculum Development in Teacher Education, Wednesday through Friday, at the Chadron State College.

The conference was an informational session featuring reports on a two-year study of curriculum conducted by the four State Colleges of Nebraska.

Dr. Eugene Hughes, dean of administration at Chadron State College was director of the project. The conference is supported by a grant from the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education.

Studies of the curriculum of several colleges were made the first year. The second year was concerned with assisting the four state colleges on implementation of the studies in their curriculums where feasible.

In addition, a committee of general education specialists was formed to study the specific areas of general education at the four state colleges. Deans of Instruction from each college and a faculty member from each college were members of the committee.

The conference held Wednesday through Friday was to share the information and recommendations of the two-year study with other institutions in the six-state area.

lations. Mrs. Perkins quoted one African as saying, "The Lord created nature in balance, and he doesn't need all the help we try to give him."

Primitive tribes of Africa always have fought each other. In the era of slave trade, they captured people of other tribes to sell to traders, sometimes even sold their own people. Yet these primitives lived for centuries in their own way. Mrs. Perkins noted, until civilized man tried to teach them his own ways, including government.

They are not ready for it, she said, citing the Congo as an example of natives, after gaining independence, reverting to tribal savagery.

Mrs. Perkins spoke eloquently of animal life and showed dozens of slides she had taken of animals, many of them close-ups. Among them were some of lions.

"Lions seldom eat people," she said. "They would much rather eat a juicy antelope. I doubt if they like people. In fact, I recall one wise African saying, 'The only reason people have survived in such staggering numbers is that nobody wants us.'"

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Once the corn borer gets into the stalk of the corn plant (left) it is almost impossible to control. Diazinon granules should be applied when 75 percent of the plants show feeding (right).

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has registered the use of Diazinon 14G insecticide for aerial application in controlling European Corn Borer.

The new label calls for application of Diazinon 14G by air when 75 percent of the corn plants show first generation borers feeding. Diazinon should be broadcast at a rate of from 7 to 14 pounds per acre over the corn so granules fall into the whorls. A second application can be made 7 days later if needed.

To control second generation corn borers, the new label recommends application of from 7 to 14 pounds of Diazinon per acre when field counts show 100 egg masses per 100 plants. Corn may be picked immediately following application, however treated fodder should not be fed to livestock for 10 days following treatment.

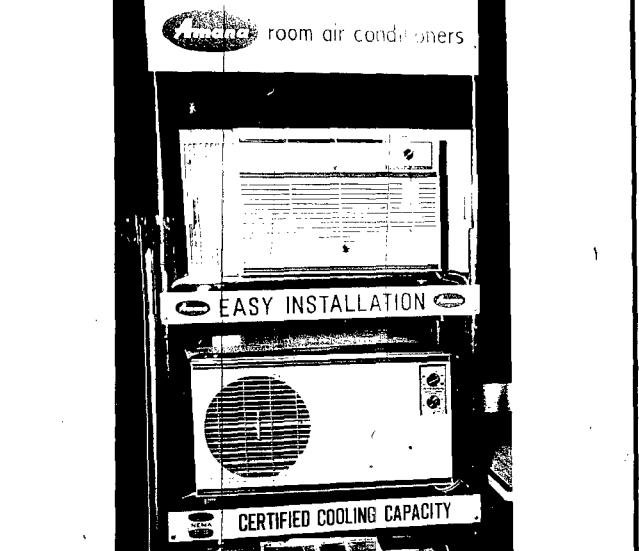
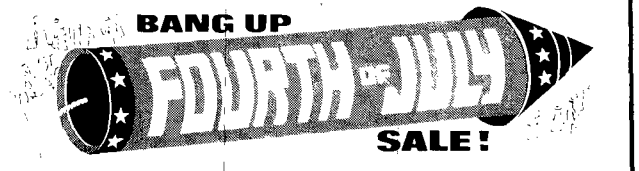

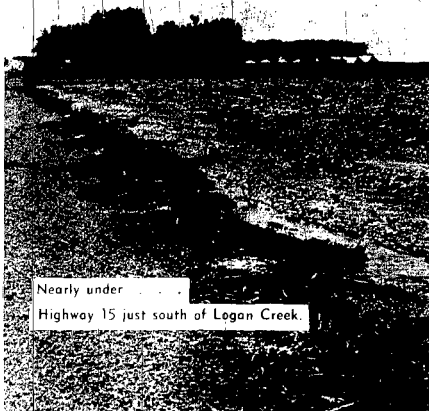


Helpless ... water in the basement of Merle Tietzort home on south edge of Wayne.

Logan Creek Goes on Rampage

It may have been fun for the kids, but for a while it looked like the Logan Creek was really going to do some damage Wednesday. And even though the creek dropped quickly after cresting, it proved costly to at least one Wayne businessman.

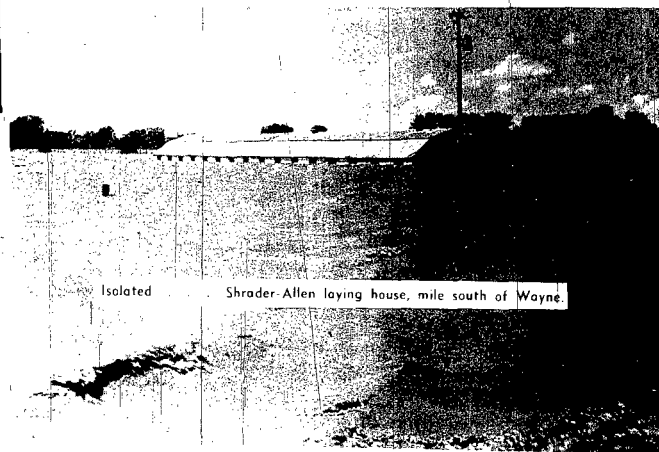
The Schrader A. Allen Hatchery lost about 400 laying hens when Logan Creek flooded a laying house a mile south of Wayne along Highway 15. About 450 of the hens were removed from the house before the water got too high, but some of these will probably be lost.

Although the flood waters crept almost completely around his home on the south edge of Wayne, Merle Tietzort said he had only about three inches of water in his basement — and that was all seepage. The fire department's new pump, which was kept going for about three hours, kept the water from doing any damage in the basement.

Little damage was done to the municipal airport east of Wayne by the high water although at its highest point the water almost completely covered the north half of the hard-surfaced runway and the east half of the sod runway.

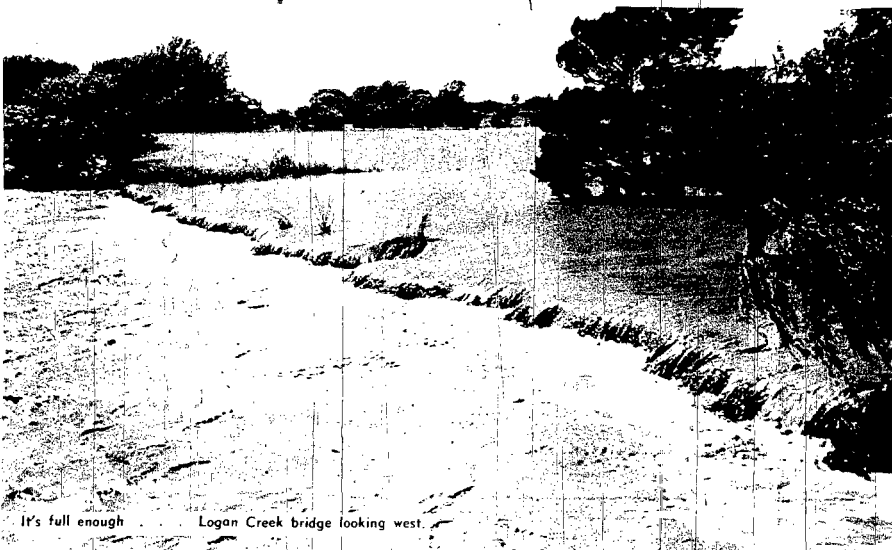
More damage was done in the Hoskins area, which suffered the brunt of the storm. About five inches of rain fell in that area, flooding the creek to the north of town and resulting in water in the basements of homes belonging to John Bohm and Fred Lorenz. A haystack on the Willis Falk farm was struck by lightning and destroyed. Several farmers reported loss of livestock from the severe electrical storm.

At least one bridge — about one-half mile south of Winside — collapsed Wednesday. The bridge went out about 4:30 in the afternoon, several hours after the crest passed Winside. The Logan Creek in that area was out of its banks in several places for as much as one-quarter mile.

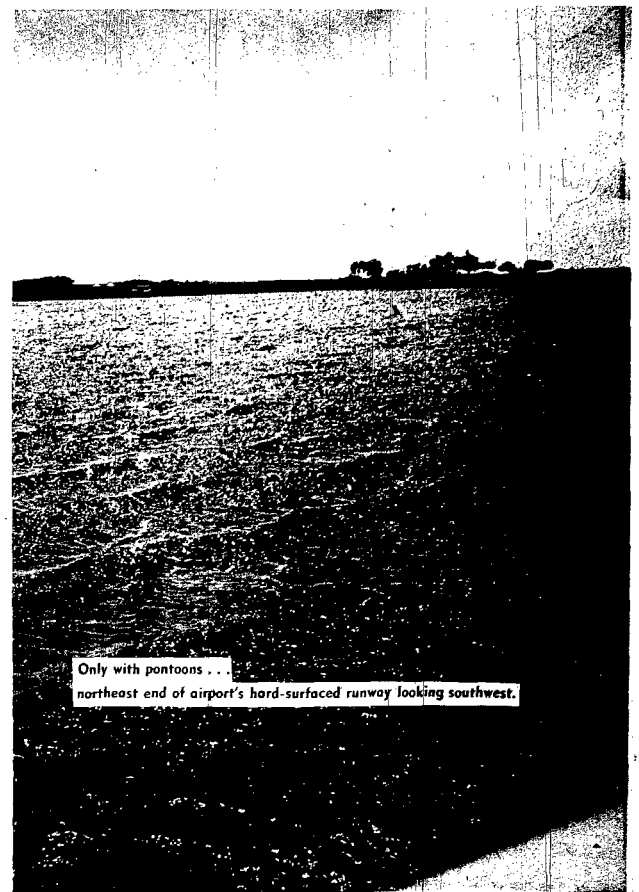


Isolated ... Schrader-Allen laying house, mile south of Wayne.

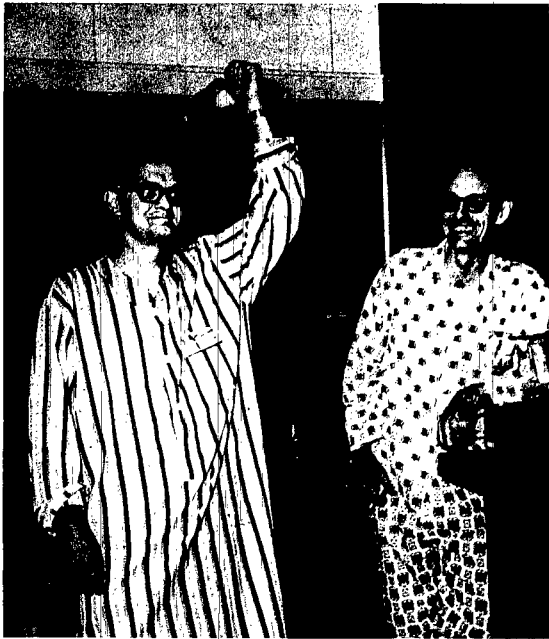

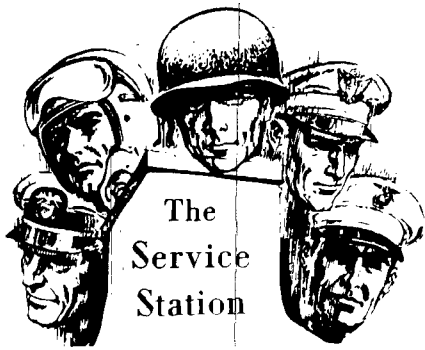
