

# Research Will Highlight Station Field Day

The Northeast Station Field Day, scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 26, will feature a cross-section of current research at the Station near Concord.

Tours will begin at 10 a.m. and will continue throughout the day. Robert Kleis, associate director of the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station, will speak at 12:30.

Visitors will have an opportunity to tour the following areas of work:

**Soil fertility** - rates of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium on corn and sorghum, both broadcast and applied as a starter; rates of nitrogen and phosphorus on corn planted at eight to 32 thousand plants per acre, and phosphorus, potassium and sulfur on alfalfa.

**Crop varieties** - corn, soybeans, grain sorghum and forage sorghum trials.

**Weed control** - pre-emergence and post-emergence chemical treatments on corn, soybeans and sorghum and cultural practices on soybeans.

**Beef feeding** - antibiotics at continuous low level and inter-

mittent high dosages compared with no antibiotic in low-roughage fattening rations.

New terraces for large machinery and underground tile waterways compared with conventional terraces and with no conservation structures. Devices will measure water runoff and soil loss.

**Swine housing and management** - 480 head of swine are being used to test open sided and enclosed buildings and different proportions of slats in the floor area.

Stanley Matzke Jr., assistant director of resident instruction at the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture and Home Economics will be on hand to answer any questions prospective students or their parents may have.

Other special interest areas that will be included on the tours are corn insect control, minimum tillage and farmstead windbreaks.

## Fire Damages Grocery At Wakefield Monday

Fire broke out in the back room of Baker's Super Saver, a Wakefield grocery store at 202 Main, around 5:30 a.m. Monday, causing extensive damage. Clarence Baker, who owns the firm, said the total damage had not as yet been determined, as the insurance representative had not yet arrived to make an estimate, however, the loss was expected to run into many thousands of dollars.

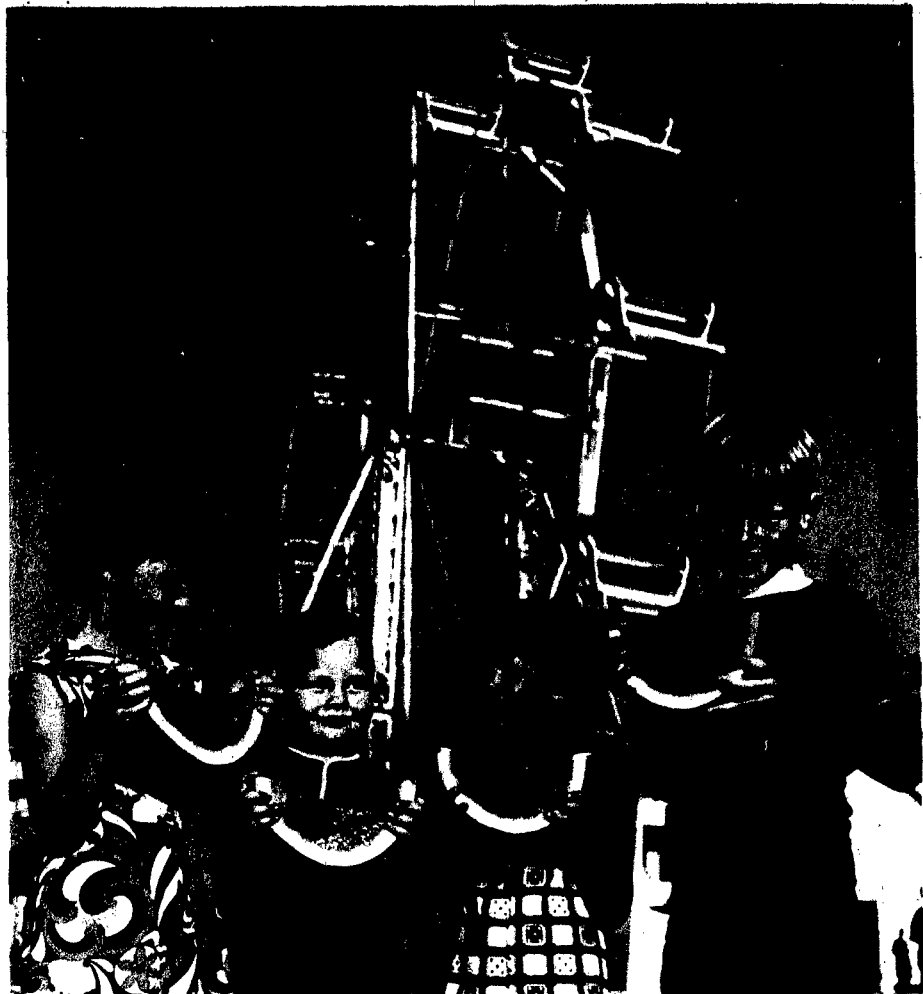
Mrs. Tom Sherlock said she was on her way to work Monday morning, and as she passed by the building, noticed smoke coming out of the back room on the west end of the structure. She said she went immediately to a local hotel and phoned the fire department.

Wakefield firemen fought the blaze for nearly two hours and were able to confine the flames to the back room. Baker said Monday afternoon there is a pos-

sibility that electrical wiring may have caused the fire but there would be no way of knowing until an investigation was made. He said the State Fire Marshall was expected to arrive Tuesday.

The fire-gutted room had been used by the firm to store canned goods and other merchandise. Intense heat generated by the fire caused some of the canned goods to explode and paint to blister in and around the doorway leading into the shopping area.

Baker said he believes the furnace, air-conditioner and freezers located in the back room are likely all ruined. Electrical wiring entering the building from the alley burned and dropped to the ground putting the store's refrigeration units out of operation. The owner said he thought the freezer's contents would be lost.

## All-Star Cagers Begin Practice Friday at WS

Twelve of the best basketball players from last year's high school graduating classes will begin arriving in Wayne tonight (Thursday) to begin a week of practice sessions at Wayne State College in preparation for the first Nebraska All-Star Basketball Game.

Selected from the cage stars across the state, the athletes will be welcomed by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce at a breakfast press conference Friday morning at eight o'clock at Les' Steak House.

The all-star game - a unique sporting event for Nebraska - will pit these 12 North Squad players with the 12 South Squad players who will be training at Kearney State College. The contest will be played at Lincoln's Pershing Auditorium Friday night, Aug. 22, the night before the annual Shrine Bowl.

Northeast Nebraska is amply represented on the North Squad - among the athletes voted to the coveted berths on the squad are Laurel's Brent Fahnestock, Norfolk's Larry Chapman, Wausa's Dave Holmquist, Hartington Cedar Catholic's Steve Becker and South Sioux City's Tom Zimmerman.

The 12 athletes will also be treated to a steak dinner next Wednesday night. Time and place for the dinner have not been decided upon yet.

Tickets for the Friday breakfast and the Wednesday steak fry are available at the Chamber office or from members of the Chamber special events committee, which has been mapping plans to welcome and host the athletes and their coaches while they are at Wayne. Members of the committee are Sid Hillier, Wayne Wessell, Ray Murray, Roy Coryell, Jim Marsh,

Wayne Tietgen, Norvin Hansen, Bob Wilson and Ken Dahl.

The \$5 tickets will pay for one person at both events or for one person and one of the athletes or guests at either the breakfast or dinner.

Also attending the breakfast press conference Friday morning will be several parents of the athletes, about 10 newsmen, representatives of the Nebraska Coaches Association, which is sponsoring the basketball game, and the two coaches of the North Squad, Ed Johnson and Tom Bronshtan.

Tickets for the all-star game are also available from the Chamber office or from members of the special events committee.

Head Coach Ed Johnson has said that some of the practice sessions at Wayne State's Rice Auditorium will be open to the public.

And those practice sessions should state almost any basketball buff's thirst. The squad, which will average 6-2, should have both good offensive and good defensive balance, according to Johnson.

"Offensively we have good outside shooters and our forwards and guards are good drivers," Johnson notes. "Our centers have good movement and are good scorers."

Says Johnson: "If we have a weakness, it could be in rebounding as our inside boys are matched with taller opponents. We will have to play for good position by keeping ourselves on the move and not get caught standing still."

Joining the northeast Nebraska cagers will be Vernon Banks of Gothenburg, Gary Carbaugh of Lincoln High, Dan Cook of Lincoln Northeast, Dave Hahn of Elkhorn St. John, Jerry Sorenson of Omaha

North and Mark Langer and Bob Matthews, both of Creighton Prep.

Brent Fahnestock, a 6-4, 180-pound forward, averaged 20.1 points and 10 rebounds per game as a junior on the Laurel squad. He upped both averages as a senior, to 24.3 points and 11 rebounds. During his varsity career under Coach Larry Moore, he tallied 968 points.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. William Fahnestock of Laurel, he was named to The Wayne Herald All-Star Team, the Norfolk Daily News Top 20, the Lincoln Journal-Star Class C all-state team, the Northeast Nebraska Athletic Conference all-conference team and the KCAU TV all-area team.

During his career at Laurel High, the Laurel Bears were first in the NENAC tournament in 1968 and 1969, first in the Wayne State Invitational in 1969, NENAC champions in 1968 and 1969, Husker Conference (West) champions for two years and district tournament runner-up in both 1968 and 1969.

Norfolk's Larry Chapman will bring a 13.9 career scoring average to the all-star game. He averaged 9.4 points per game in 1968, nearly doubled that to 18.3 points per game in 1969. His rebounding average jumped from 10.5 as a junior to 15.0 as a senior. Tapped as Norfolk's most valuable player as a senior, the 170-pound center and forward was named to the Omaha World-Herald's Class A all-state team and to the first team All-Big Ten Conference.

One player who won't be a stranger to Lincoln's Pershing Auditorium will be Wausa's Dave Holmquist. Holmquist and his teammates appeared at Pershing the

## 'Farmer gets 40c of food dollar' - Marketing Ups Food Costs

When the consumer spends a dollar on food at the grocery store, he buys 40 cents worth of products and 60 cents worth of marketing services, according to John H. Mohr, chairman of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

That's just the average, the chairman said. He explained that the farmer's share depends both on prices he gets for his commodity and the costs of marketing that commodity. In general, the more marketing services, the greater the cost, Mohr noted.

So for a product such as bread, which requires considerable processing and servicing from the unmilled wheat to the packaged loaf Mrs. Consumer brings home, the farmer's share of each dollar spent is 14 cents. For eggs, where the packaging is done by the hen, the farmer receives 65

cents of each dollar spent at the store, according to Mohr.

The ASC committee chairman cited the farmer's share of each dollar spent for various other products: Choice beef, 61 cents; butter, 72 cents; corn flakes, 8 cents; apples, 39 cents; potatoes, 31 cents; canned corn, 12 cents; canned peaches, 17 cents.

The money the farmer gets from the food dollar isn't net profit, according to Mohr. Gross income of U. S. farmer's right now is about \$51 billion annually. Realized net farm income is about \$15 billion. So it figures out that of the average 40 cents that comes to the farmer from the consumer's food dollar the farmer in turn spends about 31 cents of that for production costs. In other words, he has about nine cents for his profit.

David Rees, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Rees, Wayne, left Wayne in mid-June to spend a summer in Europe. He is working in Czechoslovakia and Hungary as a volunteer sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee.

Volunteers for such projects receive little subsistence money, and are instructed to travel light - in fact, taking only what they can pack on their back and carry in a small bag.

Following are excerpts from letters he has written thus far to his parents:

July 5 - "Prague is really a nice city and there are no Russians in Prague. They are only in various parts of the countryside or so they tell me. I start work on Monday in Bratislava and am really looking forward to it. Prague is interesting but it really takes a Czech to show it to you. We visited Jan Palach's grave - the student who burned himself to death in protest of the invasion of the Russians.

"We also saw Wenceslas Square where most of the Russian tanks



David Rees once were and where they fired on the Czech National Museum, leaving thousands of bullet holes and marks on the stones, hoping to make the Czechs never forget - and they won't. They don't like Russians.

"I think I'm going to be working on hospital grounds and not building a playground but I won't find out for sure for another day. Am feeling fine and everybody is treating me well."

July 10 - "I am now digging

holes to water mains near a hospital. At present our group of 13 is not working together. We are in small groups of two and three, yet doing the work of one person. For instance, the hole Philip, a 46-year-old British man, and I are digging, is large enough only for one person to be working at a time so the other must sit. It should get better when we are given different work. We work only eight hours a day (7 a.m. to 3 p.m.) and have meals at 10 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. besides breakfast (hard bread and salami, green peppers) and supper. There are only four girls—two French—one Swede and one Finnish; ten boys—two Italians, one Norwegian, one Hollander, one Swiss, one French, two Bulgarians, one British and one U.S.A.—me. We have two Slovak leaders and they both speak German, so I'm learning.

"At night our group usually goes to the local 'Restaurant'. We live in dormitories of a college, but the classrooms are in Bratislava's center and we are on the outskirts. The whole setup is really nice and we have lots of time to do with as we wish.

July 12 - "One day when we were digging the big hole, I asked the 'Melster' for a shorter shovel and he said that he would make it shorter, so he sawed off about one and a half to two feet of it. The Slovaks have a weird efficiency—more like expediency.

"Today we are going to the Castle or Palace of Bratislava. It might be interesting. I think then I'll do a little shopping.

July 23 - "The work is not especially hard and we have to do only as much as we want. There is a great amount of freedom for us. But the work has no goal and all our work clean-

ing streets, raking grass, etc.) could be done as well by the people on the grounds crew at the hospital. I have several good friends here in camp now so it is at least interesting in that respect.

"My clothes are holding out well and I'm gradually getting my supply down to just what I need. Blue jeans are very popular here but also expensive and hard to get.

"Right now I am trying to get my visa for CSSR extended. I met some other Americans last night and we went to the local 'Restaurant'."

Q: Are there any changes in the hospital part of Medicare in 1969?

A: Yes. Beginning Jan. 1, 1969, a patient has to pay the first \$44.00 of his hospital expenses and Part A of Medicare will pay the balance up to sixty days. If the patient is hospitalized for more than sixty days, he will have to pay \$11.00 per day for all days over sixty up to ninety days.

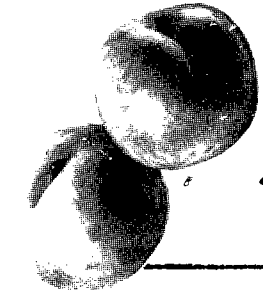

### Council Taps Netherda To Fill Council Vacancy

City council Tuesday night approved the appointment of Anton Netherda as councilman for the Second Ward.

A Wayne State College instructor, Netherda replaces Jack Kingston, who resigned from the council in July because he has been unable to attend many of the meetings. Netherda will have to resign from the planning commission before he can assume Kingston's duties. He will serve until next April when voters will choose four rather than the usual three councilmen.

The council also authorized City Attorney John Addison to begin negotiating a contract with Wayne State College officials for installation of electric light poles on the campus and supplying of electricity. The college has received authorization to spend funds for lighting of the campus and has probed the council about the possibility of receiving power from the city light plant.

Councilmen heard Earl Fuoss of Wayne Cablevision express his desire to attempt to clear up any reception problems his customers may be having. Councilmen in July discussed several complaints about poor reception they had received and decided to send a letter to the company saying there is a possibility of loss of franchise if the problems are not cured. Fuoss said that he has had only a few complaints and that he cannot improve the reception until those with problems call him. The councilmen

said they would refer any complaints they get directly to him.

In other action the council: Approved renewal of contract with Consolidated Engineers of Wayne and Omaha as city engineers.

Approved the planning commission's request that the city's comprehensive plan be updated to include all changes in ordinances since it was printed about three years ago.

Approved ordinances permitting the sale of land at the corner of 11th and Main to Dan Sherry and giving the city more control over what buildings are moved in and out of town and what taxable property in the city limits is torn down.

### Tuition Cards Will Be Mailed Friday

Wayne County's rural students who will receive free high school tuition will soon have their tuition cards in the mail, according to Mrs. Gladys Porter, Wayne County superintendent of schools.

Mrs. Porter said Tuesday that the free high school tuition cards will be mailed Friday. She said a number of parents had inquired concerning the cards and that many families should have them in the mail on Saturday, others on Monday.

Norris Welbie presented a report during the business meeting of the Ike's State Convention held at Grand Island July 26-27. He noted the convention passed a resolution to prohibit the further use of DDT and like persistent chemical pesticides.

Welbie said Tuesday that the Ike's are still waiting for the State Game Commission to check the lake in an attempt to find out what the winterkill did to the fish population.

## City Complex Idea Nixed, 445-198, in Tuesday Vote

Voters in Wayne overwhelmingly turned thumbs down on a proposal which would have allowed the city to issue up to \$138,000 in bonds to help construct a city complex out of the present fire hall.

Voters defeated the proposal 445 to 198 in a turnout which saw about one-third of the eligible voters going to the polls.

Biggest margin against the proposal came in the First Ward (south of Fifth St.) where 171 people voted to reject the proposal and only 59 voted to accept it. In the Second Ward (north of

Fifth and east of Main) 146 people voted against and 62 voted in favor. In the Third Ward (north of Fifth and west of Main) 128 cast "no" votes and 77 cast "yes" votes.

Total turnout in the election was 643, not counting about 17 absentee ballots. That number is about one-third of the eligible voters in the city who could have had a say on the proposal. City officials estimate that there are slightly over 600 voters in each ward.

If the proposal had received

the necessary 60 per cent approval the city could have begun moving toward construction of a city complex to house the fire department, city clerk and the police department. The complex would have been built by adding to and remodeling the existing fire hall at Second and Pearl.

The \$138,000 would have been added to the \$30,000 obtained in a bond election which voters approved last year. That proposal was to permit the city to build an addition to the fire hall to house the fire department equipment. The city did not follow through with that construction after the first bids from contractors ran over the engineer's estimate and a Chamber of Commerce committee asked that no more be taken until it could review the city's needs and come up with recommendations. Its recommendation was to build a city complex.

This makes the second time voters in the city have rejected a city complex plan. In 1967 voters rejected a proposal which would have allowed the city to issue up to \$72,000 in bonds to construct a similar but smaller city complex. That vote was much closer, with about 56 per cent of the voters approving of the idea and about 44 rejecting it. Sixty per cent was also needed to pass that issue.

City councilmen gave no definite indication at the council meeting Tuesday night about what their next steps would be. The city must now wait six months before it can hold another election on the proposal.
