


sibility that electrical wiring may have caused the fire but there would be no way of knowing until an investigation was made. He said the State Fire Marshall was expected to arrive Tuesday.

the necessary 60 per cent approval the city could have begun moving toward construction of a city complex to house the fire department, city citer and the police department. The complex would have been built by adding to and remodeling the existing fire hall at Second and Pearl. aded to the \$30,000 obtained in a bond election which voters approved last year. That proposal was to permit the city to build an addition to the fire hall to house the fire department equipment. The city did not follow through with that construction after the first bids from contractors ran over the engineer's estimate and a Chamber of Commerce committee asked that no action be taken until it could review the city's needs and come up with recommendations. Its recommendation was to build a city complex.

This makes the second time voters in the city have rejected a city complex. In 1967 voters rejected a proposal which would have allowed the city to issue up to \$72,000 in bonds to construct a similar but smaller city complex. That vote was much closer, with about 56 per cent of the voters approving of the idea and about 44 rejecting it. Sixty per cent was also needed to pass that issue.

City council men gave no definite indication at the council meeting Tuesday night about what their next steps would be. The city must now wait six months before it can hold another election on the proposal. a bond election which voters as

You, as a reeder, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Before Blasting Off on Your Bike

Riding a bike can be a lot of fun. A young lad may hop onto his bleycle and become a jet flyer or space explorer. Some 25 million such adventurers are on the streets and roads throughout the linted States each day.

Wait just a minute though, young man, before you do any more pedaling. Wheeling a bike around is fun, but it can be dangerous. Smart pilots are going to try to avoid having an accident by keeping their bicycles in top shape, and by always obeying the "rules of the road."

School will begin in just a few weeks. Will you ride your bike to school? If so, is your bicycle in good repair? Do you know the route you will use in reaching your school? Are you famillar with the intersections and traffic signals?

Just remember, as a bike pilot you must

Just remember, as a bike pilot you must obey the same laws as motorlsts, so learn them

Maybe the following safety rules will help serve as a guideline when you go riding. Though you do not have rockets to slow your pace, as did the astronauts landing on the moon, you do have brakes. Are your bleycle's brakes in good working order? Stop at all stop signs, yield signs and red or amber traffic lights. Stop before entering a street from a sidewalk, driveway or alley.

Ride on the right side of the street, close to the curb. Watch for parked cars turning out or car doors suddenly opening. Avoid busy streets whenever possible. Travel in single file when riding with others.

Be sure to signal all turns even as is required when driving a car. In that your bike does not have automatic turn signals, use your left arm to let other people on the street know your intentions. Do you know all of the arm signals?

Now check your blke's equipment, it should have a horn or bell; a headlight; a tail light or reflector; a rear view mirror; a kick stand; a carrier; a chain guard and a safety-conscious

er.

Even as a good pilot checks out his plane re taking off, so you should do with your cle. With proper care your bike will give you.

Even as a good pilot cheens with your before taking off, so you should do with your bleycle. With proper care your bike will give you years of fun.

It would be a good idea to re-check your bike to see if if fits you. The saddle should be adjusted at a height which allows your feet to rest on the pedals (not just tiptoe). Steering is much the easier when the handle grips are level with your hands, rather than slanted up or down.

We recognize the problem of agricultural safety by annually designating Farm Safety Week. However, the prevention of accidents requires the agricultural worker to practice safety 365 days a year.

The successful farmer, realizing that safety is more than knowing the rules for safe operation of a machine, devotes attention to three general areas:

1. Development of safe working procedures—by reading instruction manuals on machines and following their safety suggestions; periodically conducting a bazard hunt of the farmstead and machinery; and taking appropriate preventive measures such as checking that safety shields are in place, work places are well lighted and personal protective equipment is available.

2. Supervision of the work

protective equipment able.

2. Supervision of the work force (may include hired labor, exchange help and family labor)—by Instructing them how to use equipment.

3. Purchase of safer equipment—by equipping tractors with scenarior protective frames; spe-

ment—by equipping tractors with operator protective frames; specifying fully shielded power take-off drive lines; carefully examining each new machine for adequate guards over V-belt drives, chains and sprockets and open gear drives.

Farm Safety Week points out the importance of safety, but the individual farm operator needs a year-round safety program. Lack of such a program may cause his business to fail and his family to be left with an unmanageable work load and a financial burden.

Control Household Pests

Control Household Pests
For the homemakers, it means keeping a constant vigil in controlling household pests such as ants, moths and weevils during the sum mer monts when temperatures and humidity are favorable to their activity.

It is easier to prevent pests from infesting your home than it is to get rid of them after they are established. Household pests seek available food, and places where they may hide and breed. If you eliminate these attractions from your home, the pests can be controlled.

Spilled food that has not been completely cleaned up invites these pests so practice sanitation. Promptly dispose of garlage, bits of food, crumbs, scraps of fabric, lint and other waste materials that pests may eat or in which they may breed. Keep all foods in tightly closed containness. Food may be containness with the composition of the best of the processing. If the opened package is left on the shelf, the insects escape and intest the whole cupboard.

Clean out corners of base cupwhole cupboard.

Clean out corners of base cup-boards and around water pipe en-tries frequently with hot soapy

tries frequently with hot soapy water.

Caution needs to be used when spraying to control pests. Use a residual type insecticide containing such chemicals as chlordane, diazinon or malthion. Insecticides are sold under many trade names, so be sure to buy only those designated to control household pests. Read labels carefully for use and knowing what safety precautions to follow. Avoid breathing the dusts or sprays. Also, keep insecticides out of reach of children and pets, preferably in a locked cabinet. Apply with a paint brush when possible and use the coarse droplet sprays rather than the fine mists.



quirement that any increase over the governor's budget recommendations needs at least 33 votes, the validity of LB 1425 was doubtful. So the senators brought it back and gave the budget committee the assignment of re-evaluating all the appropriations and offering a recommendation which might attract the necessary 33 votes. The committee spent its noon hour and some late-afternoon time one day last week going over the provisions of the bill. After making adjustments changing the total to about \$17 million, the committee voted 5-3 to send the reworked bill back to the floor — where it is bound to spark some instant replays of the amendments battles which occurred on its first trip. One of the big switches recommended by the committee was the substitution of a \$4.8 million expansion project for Love Library on the University of Nebraska's 60 wintown Lincoln campus for a \$2.2 million east campus home economics building and a \$1.9 million fine arts building for the Omaha campus. All three projects had been in the bill when the committee got earlier verdict and passed the measure over the governor's veto. Last week, Sen. Henry F. Pedersen Jr. of Ornaha gave his colleagues a third opportunity — by proposing amendments to another bill which included language repealing LB 925. Pedersen said it would be sufficient merely to insert into the lawbooks a general statement that someone charged with a crime in Nebraska could use the principal of self defense in his court case. LB 925 permits the use of any necessary force in the defense of life or property and makes the state responsible for paying the legal expenses of someone who succeeds in proving himself innocent of an alleged crime by using self defense as an argument. In other words, If a person completed.
