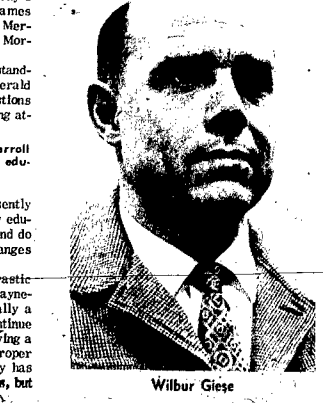

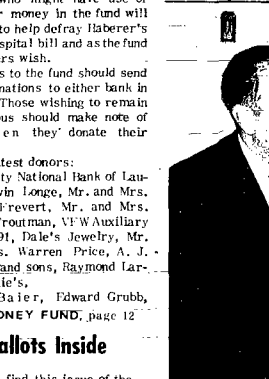

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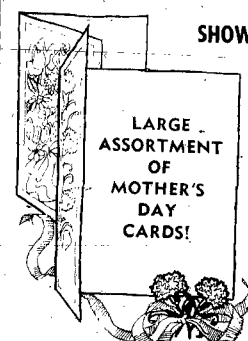
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Six Runs in 5th Frame Give Allen 6-4 Victory

For reasons unknown, the nerve fibers in the spinal cord are stripped of their protective sheaths much like an electrician removes insulation from an elec-

tric wire. The process is gradual and between attacks the body makes an effort to repair the damage. MS usually begins between the ages of 20 and 40. Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Malcom moved to Wayne in 1946. Deanna, and her husband who teaches at Wayne State College and has an accounting practice in Wayne, have two daughters, Shelly, 7, and Cathy, age 3; Deanna was diagnosed as having MS in late 1966.

She said recently that she is usually home from 60 to 75 days and then in the hospital for about three and a half weeks in Omaha. Having MS, Mrs. Malcom has volunteered to head up the MS drive now for the third consecutive year in Wayne. She notes that 40 per cent of the funds collected will go into further research in an attempt to discover what causes the disease.

No two sufferers have the same symptoms in that the disease cripples some but not others. There is no known medical treatment.

The MS drive is held annually on a national scale.

Keith Mosley, commission chairman, informed the group that restrictions of agricultural zoning covering the addition does not allow for mobile homes. The

petition stated opponents would encourage residential zoning at the time the tract is annexed to the city, but oppose any special-use zoning of the Janke tract which is adjacent to the Oak Ridge Addition on the west edge of Wayne. Mart Marshall, commission secretary, said it was decided to contact Janke asking him his wishes regarding rezoning.

Ralph Barclay presented a petition regarding one lot on the northeast corner of the city. Commissioners decided to recommend approval of the preliminary plat as submitted, providing a connecting street is desired on one side of Barclay's lot and a letter presented providing evidence of easement to extend a sewer west to Pine Heights Road until such time a city sewer is provided adjacent to the property.

A group of seven men attended the meeting and were heard in their opposing the new no-parking regulations being enforced in Wayne. Secretary Marshall noted that the commission members listened to the protests but advised the group they could take no formal action as a commission until the request for such is received from the city council.

Richard Wozniak, consultant from Powers and Associates of Fremont, assisted the commission in reviewing the five-year capital improvement program. Wozniak suggested to the group they hereafter require all plats ten days prior to a commission meeting, permitting adequate time to look them over.

In updating the comprehensive plan, the commission has asked the local Jaycees to make a land-use survey in Wayne. Chairman Mosley said no date has as yet been set for the survey, but it will be made soon. Members of the Jaycees are being invited to the next commission meeting in early June to work out details. A land-use survey shows how each lot of ground in town is used.

The planning group decided to post a checklist at the city clerk's office listing requirements for subdivision applications, preliminary and final plats.

'Don't Dump DDT,'

Warns NU Specialist

Nebraska homeowners must not dispose of the chemical DDT by dumping into drains or gutters. DDT is not completely removed by water treatment and is therefore released into the environment.

This warning comes from University of Nebraska Extension Entomologist Robert Roselle, who noted that three reports of DDT dumping into drains have already been received - the act due to fear developed from scare reports of the dangers of DDT.

Roselle explained that the safest method of discarding unwanted DDT liquid concentrates and wettable powders is to use the materials in a careful manner for insect control as listed on labels. When exposed to sunlight, moisture and bacterial activity, DDT does break down.

All registrations for use of DDT in or around homes were cancelled last December, invoking no hardships because other insecticides more rapidly broken down are available for nearly all uses, Roselle continued.

When registrations were cancelled, he said, provisions were made for using DDT remaining at the retail level, according to previous registrations. This was done, in part, to make it possible to dispose of the chemical orderly, rather than to create a need for mass disposal, which might result in heavy local contamination due to the fear which has been created.

Tiemann-Batchelder Race Gets Most Attention in Homestretch

LINCOLN — The election campaign is in the homestretch. By next Tuesday night, Nebraskans will have the answers to political puzzles which have been tantalizing them all spring.

The race which has captured the most attention has been the scrap for the Republican nomination for governor.

Incumbent Norbert T. Tiemann, the Wausa banker who surprised the state four years ago by emerging from relative

obscurity, has been locked in a close struggle with State Sen. Clifton B. Batchelder of Omaha.

The polls show Tiemann has a slight lead, but many Republicans were delaying a decision. With something like 40 percent of the voters still undecided, both candidates rolled up their sleeves for a whirlwind finish.

Circumstances placed Tiemann in a defensive position. Batchelder, attacking the governor's spending record, has capitalized on what the senator calls a "tax revolt."

Tiemann has said the state services requiring the additional expenditures have been demanded by the people. He includes a stepped-up highway construction program, state aid to schools, new emphasis on mental retardation programs, improvements at the University of Nebraska (including the merger with the University of Omaha) and a police training academy.

Batchelder has said he doesn't oppose progress, but he thinks too much has been done too fast and a lot of it is being done only because government employees — not the people — have demanded it.

Just as Batchelder has been tacking off programs Tiemann proposed to the legislature, the governor has been listing legislative proposals Batchelder voted against on the floor.

Democrats Also in Dogfight
On the other ballot, the Democrats are staging a neck-and-neck battle.

State Sen. J. W. Burchard of Crofton and J. J. Exon of Lincoln are the main contenders for the gubernatorial nod. As with the GOP voters, the polls show many Democrats are waiting until the last minute to make up their minds about whom to vote for.

Burchard's slogan is "Sense in the Seventies"; his opponent is campaigning under an "Exon Means Business" banner. Both are promising a retrenchment of spending and, if possible, a reduction in taxes.

The biggest campaign issue between them has been over the natural resource district bill. Exon has been highly critical of it and Burchard has defended the concept and particularly the provision, added by the legislature at his insistence, that a series of public hearings be held to test acceptance before the redistricting becomes effective.

Other Gubernatorial Candidates
Although Tiemann-Batchelder and Burchard-Exon are the headliners in each of the two gubernatorial battles, there is a third candidate in each party.

Harvey Gratzky, a retired paperhanger and painter, is challenging the Big Two on the Republican ballot.

Q.—Occasionally you hear the argument that schools are spending too much money. What is your response to this question? If you decided some cutting back in spending were necessary, in what area would you begin shaving costs?

Sturm—This is an old argument that schools are spending too much money. My feeling is that we should maintain a high-level, quality educational program at the most reasonable or feasible and economic

expense to the taxpayers in the district.

Gliese—I will hold off on answering this question, since it and the last question can be consolidated and answered at the same time.

Mrs. Merchant—Our school spending should be the same as handling the finances in the home or business. It is never wise to cut essentials or quality, but neither is it wise to close your eyes to unnecessary spending. Each department should be reviewed carefully before the money is allocated in the budget.

Money spent on education is our best investment — Sandahl.

Braunger—I don't feel I am qualified to say whether schools are spending too much money. If there were cutbacks needed, we would have to take a realistic view on expenditures since the taxpayer must cover the costs. I myself do not believe in taking a somewhat "blank check" attitude.

Sandahl—Some people would argue that schools spend too much, no matter how much they spend. Research shows that money spent on education is the best investment that a community can make for itself. I've noticed that communities with poor schools are usually poor in all other aspects, too.

Q.—Reorganization is currently a controversial subject. What are your feelings about reorganization or redistricting in the school systems in our area of the state?

Sturm—I am for redistricting of schools if the majority of residents in the districts concerned agree that it is to their advantage to consolidate.

Gliese—in order to intelligently talk about reorganization we have to know some facts. Reorganization is a big thing, especially once it has drawn on as long as it has in the Wayne area.

Let's be fair in our reasoning. If I owned a large plot of ground and had no children of my own, would I be willing to voluntarily put this land in a higher mill levy district? Now, let's be fair on the other side. As the population has shifted from the rural areas to the city or urban areas, the city has taken the responsibility of educating the additional children without having a corresponding

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We need a good understanding of all the reasons some rural districts are reluctant to join. I feel that just believing it is all in the pocketbook is erroneous, although money is important. Especially with 90 cent corn and sometimes no crop.

A big help to consolidation would be a broadening of the tax base to support local education. This would put taxation on an ability to pay, rather than on an ownership base. Because I might own 200 acres

or 200 steers does not mean I made any income or profit from them. Maybe they actually lost me several thousand dollars, yet I have to pay a tax. This is unfair. The same situation is true of the merchant who pays a high tax on merchandise in stock. There are other taxes which are much more fair, much more sensible. People for the most part are a freedom loving, independent lot. The one big thing they hate is to be gobbled up by a large organization where they tend to

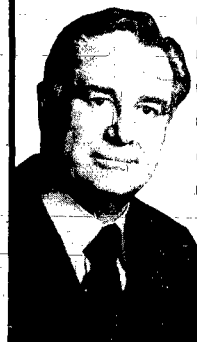



Good Morning Feeders & Hi Mom

Had not the Surgeon General in Washington advised against eating saturated fat? They had read that in an old 1952 paper left by tourists.

The summer was delightful. Nuptial bliss reigned in their valley. Occasionally the two ring-bearing bears met their bachelor relatives, but they no longer share the same type of life so

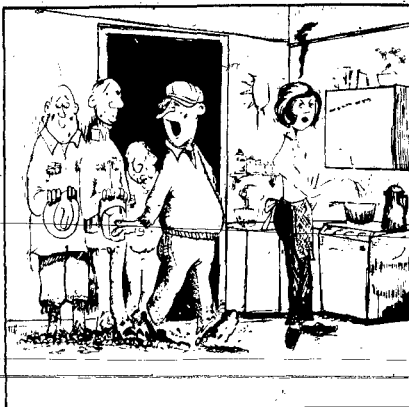
they merely grunted and snorted salutations. The wives discouraged all contact. Rumors were the bachelors led a wild life... even eating an occasional fat steer they would strike down at night in the meadows.

By late autumn Malcolm and Homer were a picture of health, although the latter did occasionally complain of an upset stomach. Not once all year had they touched fat, nor cigarettes, nor cyclamates. Unfortunately, the bachelors were like walking grease barrels.

In this shape, all went to bed to hibernate for four months in caves. While the weather outside often fell to minus 30 degrees.

Next spring the Park Rangers found the two ring-bearing Grizzlies: famished remains of skin and bones and dehydrated muscle. The Federal Veterinarian admired both sets of arteries which were completely devoid of cholesterol and saturated fat. No trace. Healthy, but dead.

The two fat, sassy bachelors survived the winter.

But in May, a TV network sponsored an all-pro quarter-back on a film-covered bear hunt. After Sidney had watched the film crew with curiosity for three days, the guide finally spotted him. Sidney was bathing in a splashing creek. A scoped elephant gun finished him. (On audio tape, his huge head did look overdone.)

Then poor Cassius, traveling at night in July to his favorite wild raspberry bushes he stumbled into a camp of ecologists, junior grade, hippies. Wheeling for a delightfully smelling chocolate cookie in the napack of an ill-smelling human, Cassius unfortunately outcuffed even Mohammed Ali.

Next morning, the national news services had every litterbug tourist in a nervous tizzy. To protect the park entrance fee, the Rangers sought out and shot Cassius. Second human Cassius had ever seen. The Ranger report: the bear was fat.

In Washington, D. C., the Surgeon General reiterated his non-fat warning, referring to the incident of ill tempers in the west.

It takes only a few minutes to read the label. And these few minutes are always time well spent. They can mean the difference between increased yields of a high quality crop or staggering field losses, even condemnation and seizure of foodstuffs in the marketing channels. No pesticide is safe if it is carelessly handled or improperly used. For his own protection and for the protection of the crop, the person who applies the pesticide must stop and read the label.

The agricultural chemicals industry has developed a safety code for safe and profitable application of pesticide formulations.

The code for spray and dust safety includes the following:

1. Always read the label before using any pesticide. Note warnings and cautions each time before opening a container.
2. Keep them out of the reach of children, pets and irresponsible persons. They should be stored outside of the home, away from food and feed, and under lock and key.
3. Always store materials in original containers and keep them tightly closed. Never keep them in anything but the original container.
4. Never smoke while applying pesticides.
5. Avoid inhaling fumes, sprays or dusts. When directed on the label, wear protective clothing and masks.
6. Do not spill pesticides on the skin or clothing. If they are spilled, remove contaminated clothing immediately and wash thoroughly.
7. Wash hands and face and change to clean clothing after spraying or dusting. Wear clothing that is clean.
8. Cover food and water containers when treating around livestock or pet areas. Do not contaminate fish ponds.
9. Use separate equipment for applying hormone type herbicides

In order to avoid accidental injury to susceptible plants.

10. Always dispose of empty containers so that they pose no hazard to humans, animals or valuable plants.

11. Observe label directions and cautions to keep residues on edible portions of plants within the limits permitted by law.

12. If symptoms of illness occur during or shortly after application, call a physician or get the patient to a hospital immediately.

Minimum Tillage Saves Farmers Time and Labor

A late spring in northeast Nebraska is causing many long hours for farmers still using the conventional plow and disc to prepare the fields for corn planting, says William Yost, conservationist for the Soil Conservation office at Wakefield.

Because of labor shortages and the short time available to get the "corn ground" ready, many farmers are looking for ways to save time and labor. The end result of saved time and labor also means more profit per acre, he notes.

A minimum tillage system, says Yost, may provide that saved time and labor. This is a system of simplified tillage that reduces or combines field operations. The till-plant method can cut field time in half by combining tillage, seedbed preparation and planting. Costs may range from \$5 to \$15 per acre less than for the usual methods, Yost points out.

An important by-product of the minimum tillage system, according to Yost, is soil and water conservation. A mulch on the surface of the land during intense storm periods allows more water to be absorbed into the

soil, minimizing soil and water losses.

Farming methods are changing, Yost points out, and the minimum till system seems to be getting more attention each year by farmers who are interested in reducing time and costs while still maintaining or increasing per acre yields.

NE Nebraska Towns Being Offered Chance To Entice Physician

Forty-four small Nebraska communities, several of them in northeast Nebraska, will have an opportunity to interest young physicians in practicing medicine in their areas. The opportunity will come Thursday and Friday during a two-day program at Omaha.

The program is designed to bring representatives of small communities in direct contact with medical students, interns and residents at the University of Nebraska Medical Center and Creighton University, and to expose the students to a physician in family practice.

The Nebraska State Medical Association's rural medical service committee is sponsoring the event in cooperation with the two universities and the Nebraska Academy of General Practice. Dr. Robert Bentzack of Wayne, chairman of the rural medical service committee, said the communities invited to attend have been urged to provide pictures of their communities, statistics on housing availability and information on churches, availability of clinical facilities, hospitals and nearby community resources.

The list of towns maintaining a current community information form in the NSMA headquarters office and invited to attend includes Beemer, Coleridge, Homer, Laurel, Osmond and Ponca. Dr. J. Jerome Wildgen of Kalispell, Mont., will be the family physician-in-residence for the event. He will meet with the student family practice clubs on each campus, address the medical student body at each institution and make clinical and ward rounds with students. His activities will center on the Creighton campus on Thursday morning and on the Medical Center campus on Friday morning.

On Thursday afternoon, the communities in the program will have exhibits set up at St. Joseph Hospital. The exhibits will go up in the University Hospital cafeteria on the Nebraska campus Friday afternoon.

Social Security Q & A

Q. My youngest child will be 18 soon and expects to go on to school. He will be attending a local college and living at home. Will my 50-year-old wife continue to receive social security checks since she will still have a child at home?

unable to work because of crippling arthritis. How am I going to live between now and the time I am old enough to qualify for reduced widow's social security benefits at age 60?

A. The Social Security Law provides for reduced widow's benefits to widows who are severely disabled and are between ages 50 and 60. For complete information and assistance in filing a claim, contact your social security office.

Q. If I am hospitalized, do I have to file a claim for the Medicare payments?

A. If the hospital participates in Medicare, the people at the hospital will do this for you. They will receive the payment from Medicare directly.

Q. My social security check has always arrived on time. However, what should I do if it does not show up on the third of the month as it usually does?

A. If your check doesn't come on the day it normally does, we recommend that you wait about four more days. Occasionally something may happen which will delay normal delivery of a check for a few days. However, if after waiting four days, the check still has not come, you should contact your social security office immediately.
