ris Sandahl. To give the voters a better understand-ing of those candidates, The Wayne lierald asked them to respond to several questions about school issues currently gaining at-tention.

Q.—What steps could the Wayne-Carroll school board take in order to better edu-cate the students in the system?

cate the students in the tyremit
* Sturm - I feel that we are presently receiving a very high level of quality education within our present system and do not foresee any necessary major changes at this time.
Glose - I do not know of any drastic changes that need to be made in the Wayne-Carroll system. I feel it is basically a good district and the board should continue with hiring top quality teachers, having a practical euriculum and offering proper administration. Each of us probably has some individual ideas on these things, but is the state of the st



it would be hard to both state these ideas and substantiate them in a few words. Mrs. Morchant - We should offer more specific guidance and opportunities in the field of vocations. This should en-courage the student who is not academical-ly superior to cultivate his own talents in other fields. Braunger - We should strive to have the best qualified teachers as possible and sufficient classroom material for all students.

Opposition to consolidation is not all in the pocketbook — Giese.

Sandahl - The Wayne-Carroll board of education has been attempting and should continue their efforts to provide better instruction for the individual child. This means that every curriculum should con-stantly be under study's flaschers must show a genuine concern for each studer but they also need to be given enoughtim to work with individual students.

Q.---What are your feelings about the so-called "blanket raises" which come about when school boards and teachers slick rather strictly to a satary schedule?

Sturm - There should be a study made by the school board in conjunction with a representative committee from the teachers to determine" If another means could be used in justifying teachers' in-

teachers to determine il another means could be used in justifying teachers' in-creases in salary. Giese - Blanket raises probably re-suft in some inequities as far as deserved compensation is con cer ne d. However, raises are, generally considered to be cost-of-living increases and this cost in creases for everyone. Salary schedules are not foolproof for either the teacher or the taxpaver. They do give everybody concerned an understanding and a base for negotiations, and they help to control charges of preferential treatmont salary whee which might otherwise be suggested. There has to be real good judgment exercised in drawing up a salary sched ule; if the teachers could agree on a merit system type of compensation it would certainly be worthy of consideration. Mrs, Merchant - I believe the dif-forential pay idea should be explored,

If a teacher could be given specific as-signments that were geared to his specific talents and interests, there would be more enthusiasm which would prove ad-vantageous to both the student and teach-er. The student would benefit by the extra effort of the teacher and the teacher could be rewarded in a monetary way. School spending should be same as in home or business --- Mrs. Merchant.

Mrs. Robert Merchant

Braunger - I am in favor of teachers being pold as individuals, rather than using the across-the-board method. Sandaht- Blanket ralises, such as ratising the base salary, are more of a cost-of-living raise than anything else. The real raises are given to the feachers who continue to get advanced college hours and who take on additional respon-sibilities.

Nebraska homeowners must not dispose of the chemical DDT by dumping into drains or gutters. DDT is not completely removed by water treatment and is there-fore released into the environ-All registrations for use of DDT in or around homes were cancelled last December, in-voking no hardships because other insecticides more rapidly broken down are available for nearly all uses, Roselle con-tinued.

by water treatment and is there-fore released into the environ-ment. This warning comes from Uni-versity of Ne bras ska Extension Entomologist Robert Roselle, who noted that three reports of DDT dumping into drains have already been received - the act due to fear developed from scare reports of the dangers of DDT. Roselle explained that the safest method of discarding in-wanted DDT liquid concentrates and wetable powders is to use the materials in a careful man-ner for insect control as listed on labels. When exposed to sun-light, moisture and bacterial activity, DDT does break down







Through the criminal negligence of someone.they. were unarmed, excepting one revolver be-longing to one of the party. The Indians took their team, killed two, and wounded four. The rest of the party succeeded in getting to the nearest station, about four miles. One wounded man was scalped alive. He lost his hair but saved his life by playing possum. He must have had strong nerves to have kept still while hard awerk, for the indian had a dull kinfe and worked slow. "I learn today that the party sent out have overtaken the indians who proved to be a band of Pawnees, who pretend to be "very friendly; are living on a resumers, and have been fed all winter by the Govern-ment. Q. My youngest child will be 18 soon and expects to go on to school. He will be attending a local college and living at home. Will my 50-year-old wife continue

since she will still have a child at home? A. When a young person reaches 18, he is no longer con-sidered a child by the social security law except in certain childhood disability cases. This would mean that your wile's pay-ments would have to stop until she reaches age 62. Q. I am 55 years old and my husband recently died. He had very little insurance and I am

to receive social security checks since she will still have a child

unable to work because of cripping arthritis. How am I going to live between now and the time I am old enoughtoguall-fy for reduced widow's social security benefits at age 60? A. The Social Security Law provides for reduced widow's benefits to widows who are severely disabled and are be-tween ages 50 and 60. For com-plete information and assistance in filing a claim, contact your social security office. Q. If I am hospitalized, do I have to file a claim for the Medicare payments?
A. If the hospital participates in Medicare, the people at the hospital will do this for you: They will receive the payment from Medicare directly.
Q. My social security check has always arrived on time. However, what should I do it it does not show up on the third of the month as it usually does?
A. If your check doesn't come

on the day it normally does, we recommend that you wait about four more days. Occasionally something may happen which will delay normal deliver; of a check for a few days. However, if after walking four days, the check still has not come, you should contact your social security office im-mediately.
