### Common Sense Key to Night Driving

Two-thirds of our traffic fatalities occur after dark. Night driving doubles traffic danger. The average 57 year-old driver with 20/20 vision needs twice as much light as a 29 year-old with the same vision rating.

Knowledge of these and other facts from the National Safety Council could help to make you a "night driving expert" if you are willing to learn the tricks of the trade, says the Nebraska Department of Roads.

Night and day driving are as different as winter and summer. Using the same driving habits night and day makes as much sense as wearing winter clothing in summer.

Some of the most common mistakes made in night driving are wearing sunglasses, using parking lights in motion, overriding the field of vision provided by headlights and refusing to dim headlights.

Your vision is your most important weapon in night driving. Periodic eye tests are a must, since vision defects are exaggerated at night. If you wear corrective glasses, they are of ut-

most importance to you at night, while sunglasses are one of your worst enemies. To avoid glare from oncoming headlights, keep your eyes on the shoulder or lane marking.

Never drive with parking lights, even at twilight, which is the most dangerous time on the road. If conditions warrant lights, use your headlights.

If you are victimized by an obstinate driver who won't dim his bright lights, keeping your lights on bright will not help. On the contrary, it may produce two drivers blinded by glare, which could lead to fatal results.

When faced with oncoming brights, experts suggest slowing down, keeping your eyes on the right-hand edge of the road and flashing your own lights several times, in the hope that the other driver will get the idea.

Keeping important safety aids in good condition, too, is a night-driving must. Of three million cars checked in one year, 50 per cent had defective headlights. Check to make sure that yours are clean, properly aligned, and

that you are using the correct bulb or regulation sealed beam.

One of the most common mistakes made by night drivers is overriding the field of vision provided by headlights. A good night driver knows the relationship between his lights and his stopping distance at highway speed. If road conditions are normal and your brakes are in good condition it will take about 243 feet to stop from a speed of 50 m.p.h. If you can only see 200 feet, it's like driving blindfolded. You can't possibly stop in time.

Driving experts offer one sure-fire answer to the night driving problem—slow down. Speeds at least 10 m.p.h. slower than normal are recommended for night driving, and any unusual circumstances call for slowing down even more.

(Continued from page 1) said, Maintenance of quantity means that CCC loan collateral is not moved without first redeeming that collateral, by repayment of the loan or by obtaining prior approval of the county ASCS of-

ice. Failure to accept this responsibility could result in a charge of "unauthorized removal" and have serious consequences, he said.

Heinemann also stated that inspections of grain under CCC loan are made by ASC loan inspectors in accordance with CCC policy. These inspectors, however, do not relieve the producer of his basic responsibilities for quantity and quality of the corn.

SHRIMP SPREAD BY CANDLELIGHT

Here is an eye-stopper for your holiday party... a molded shrimp and cheese spread with a built-in lighting system. What fun for guests to dig in and spread their own canapes by the light of a flickering candle!

And dig they will. This is a delicious mixture of three popular cheese types and shrimp—savored shrimp for easy blending—with a flavor best described as baffling and beautiful. The best blends are usually hardest to define and as always, mystery lends enchantment.

Just mold it big and display it up high. All you need for this is a plain quart mixing bowl and an ordinary cake stand turned upside down. Could there be a prettier way to say 'Merry Christmas'!

**FESTIVE SHRIMP AND CHEESE MOLD**

1 can (4 1/2 ounces each) shrimp  
 1/2 pound mild cheddar cheese, grated  
 1/2 pound Roquefort or Blue cheese, chopped fine  
 1 Boursin package cream cheese  
 1 garlic clove, chopped very fine  
 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish  
 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper  
 1/2 cup minced fresh parsley

Drain and rinse shrimp. Reserve about 1/8 for garnish and chop the rest. Combine chopped shrimp with cheese and all remaining ingredients except parsley. Blend thoroughly. Press firmly into a quart mixing bowl. Let "ripen" in the refrigerator overnight or longer. I mould on the base of a cake stand or any other suitable high-stemmed dish and press the minced parsley over the surface. Garnish with whole shrimp, using toothpicks to hold them in place. Cut a round circle of aluminum foil and fit it on top. Place the candle on the foil and gently press it into the mold until it will stand secure. Flatten foil edges to protect against dripping. Garnish candle base with lemon leaves or other greenery. Makes enough spread for 100 or more canapes.
