

Place the buffet near the kitch-

Thace the buffet near the kitchen so sou can serve it quickly. There is less confusion when movement is from end to end rather than around the buffet setting, and we tend to move more gracefully from left to right or counter-clockwise. Cuests should finish at the end of the table nearest the door. The starting point should be obvious since one should never need to Backtrak's Self-selvice of food must be easy and beverages and appointments (silver and mapkins) must be easy to remove and easy to have the case to handle if they

Evers dish on the buffet ought to be servable with one serving tool. Two-in-one serving tools, tongs and large spoons can gen-erally replace two tools. Place serving tools beside the dish when

The dishes that make up the meal can be clustered or aligned on the buffet. They ought to appear in decreasing order of importance to prevent the fitting of the plate before the main parts of the meal are taken, lesse the buffet for the dessert course.

Food Stamp Sales Set **New Record**

Food stamp sales at the Wayne County Assistance Office continue to soar with a new sales record likely to be set this month. A spokesman for the local welfare division said it is likely that a total of nearly 300 people will buy food stamps during December. When the food stamp program first went into effect in the county during April 1969 there were 17 households, a total that includes both assistant and non-assistant households, which purchased food stamps. There was a total of .45 people living in the 17 households. A growth chart prepared by the local welfare office shows the growth pattern of the stamp sales and after the first 12 months of the program there were 44 households representing 129 people buying stamps. With 103 house hold s representing 1251 persons: buying stamps in November, it is thought that the December sales will reach as high as 120 households representing 300 individuals. Effective Jan. 1, food stamps will be sold in the Wayne office every Wednesday. Applications and re-certifications will be made by apportument only. Sales of food stamps in Winside and Carroll will continue as before on the Wednesday of the Irist week in the month to have a Sunday.

Dr. Bill Ahlschwede, University of Nebraska Extension livestock specialist, said a reduction in average shaghter weight by 10 to 15 pounds would be a supported to the specialists.

weight by the total special statement with the passe the ghut on the market Although slaughter weights have started to decline, the laverage for barrows and glits remains near 240 pounds.

The November hog slaughter was up more than 20 per cent from a year earlier. The fall is a period of seasonally high numbers of pigs on the market, but this year the numbers have been higher and the heavy runs have lasted later into the year than usual, Altschwede said.

"Thus, a reduction in slaughter weight can be expected to speed

"Thus, a reduction in slaughter weight can be expected to speed the arrival of more favorable prices," he added.

The price spread on slaughter hogs has increased with the increase in slaughter numbers. Dr. Ahlachwede noted that a spread of \$1.50 per hundred is being pald between the lighter hogs and the heavy hogs.







Wayne County Law Enforcement

Wayne County Li

Do you realize there are more than 10,000 people living in Wayne County and about half of thein are living in the City of Wayne? Do you know that only Wayne and Winside have law onforcement officers of their own?

Wayne has six men on the police staff and there are five men working on the Wayne State College police force. Two State Safety Patrolimen live in Wayne and two men staff the county sheriff's office. Winside has one full-time officer. Adding them up there are 16 law enforcement men in Wayne County but they are not all on duty at the same time.

The WSC police serve a restricted area, the college campus. That leaves 11 to serve the rest of the residents in the county. The two highway patrolimen alternate shifts and are not always working in Wayne County. Wayne's six city policemen are not all on duty at the same time and work only in Wayne. The only two remaining law officers to work throughout the entire county are the sheriff and his deputy. Those two men are on call 2-thours a day but, beliep human, must have some time off to rest and eat.

The communities of Carroll, Sholes, Altona and Hoskins have no full-time mar-

shalls, if we count all 16 lawman, it still means only one police officer to about ever 825 people. A more realistic figure is that of about one law enforcement officer to each 1,000 residents. Is that number sufficient in a time when crime is on the increase.

Those Tax Dollars

The source of the tax dollar is of course the taxpayer, but where does a single tax dollar come from and where does a single tax dollar come from and where does it go. Some interesting charts answering those questions about various tax districts in Wayne County, both in town and rural, were compiled and posted in the county courthouse, earlier this year. Credit for the charts goes to the personnel in the assessor's office.

Charts with figures for Tax District 617, which is Wayne, show, where the tax dollar comes from and where it zoes.

Total valuation in the district for real estate, personal, business, public utilities and motor vehicles is \$7,681,500. This amount broken down is \$5,999,040 for real estate; \$237,925 on public utilities and schedules; \$722,535 on public utilities.

One tax dollar then is made up as follows: 77, cents from real estate; three cents from public utilities; nine cents from personal schedules and 10 cents from byersonal schedules. That is where a single



IRS Form for Elderly Available

The form for retired people and others to request withholding of federal income tax on pension and annuity payments is now available at Internal Revenue Service offices, Richard Vinal, IIIS district director for Nebraska, announced recently.

New IRS regulations permit retirees to request withholding on annuities and pension payments made on or after Jan. 1, 1971. The withholding provisions do not apply to annuities that are wholly exempt from federal taxation, such as Social Security benefits and Veterans Administration pensions, Vinal said. Form W-Pt, Annuitant's liequest for I'ederal Income Tax Withholding, should be filled out by the retiree and sent to the bank, insurance company or

The findings indicated that those cattle selected for conformation only were at least as inferior in weaning weight and rate of gain in the feedlot as those animals which were selected for low gain ability. Apparently, the show ring has done an excellent job in past years of selecting the wrong animals. The economic trait which best fills the bill of being high in economic importance, easy to measure and high in heritability is yearling weight per day of age.





Q-How can one identify fungus in the lawn and can you use Zineb for it?

A-You can use Zineb, but it hasn't been as effective in recent years as Manch. The characteristics of fungus... and when I speak of fungus. I mean melting-out... are brown spots that may be round or elongated on the lead blade. The leaf blade is usually at an angle, it has a shaft and it is here that the litter is accumulating. The shaft area will look and be entirely dead, but more than the list weeker it is incapable of bringing moisture up and the blade will just collagate wither and die. Use Maneb or Palonil 2-7-8-7 or Dyrene.
