Holiday Concert Is Tuesday Silage Meet Set Tonight



The music department from the Wayne-Carroll school system will present its annual Christmas Concert on Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the high school lecture hall.

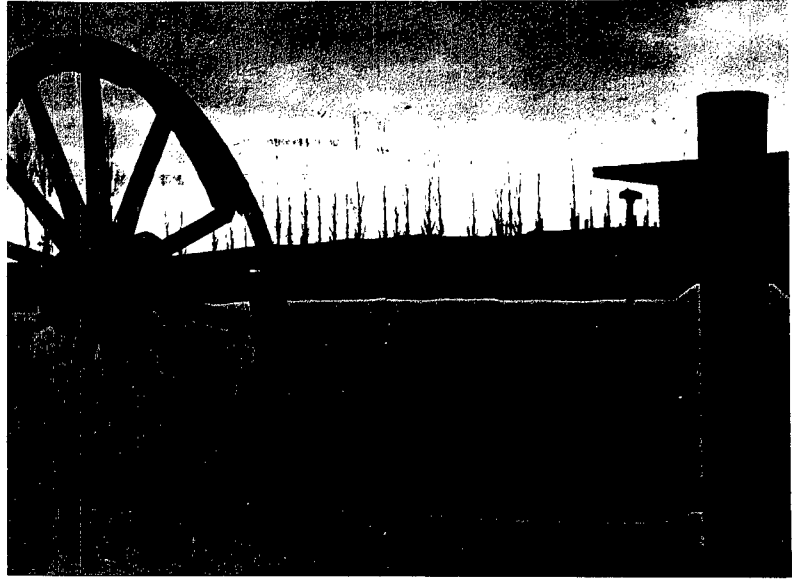
There will be no admission charge for the concert and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Farmers in the Wayne area are being given the chance to benefit from half of the hay-pasture-silage workshop scheduled for this month at the Northeast Station near Concord.

The first of the two workshops for December was snowed out last Thursday night by the season's first winter storm. The second workshop, dealing with management and production of corn and sorghum silage, is slated for 7:30 tonight (Thursday). The workshop which was postponed last week, dealing with forage resources in the state and fertilization of forage crops, will be rescheduled for a time in January.

The workshops are being sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Nebraska and are open to all area farmers. They are designed to help farmers increase income from forage acres.

The NU research facility is located a mile east of Concord.

Carroll youngsters will get a chance to see Santa Claus if they are at the Carroll auditorium Saturday night at 8 p.m.

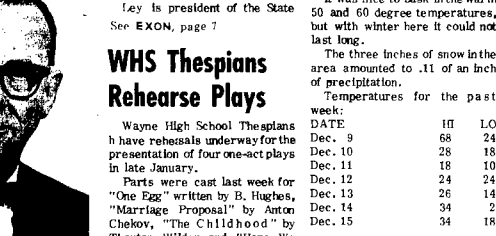

Northeast Extension Notes

Having lots of guests in your home for Christmas dinner? Buffet style service will accommodate more guests and will be a bit less strenuous on you.

Place the buffet near the kitchen so you can serve it quickly. There is less confusion when movement is from end to end rather than around the buffet setting, and we tend to move more gracefully from left to right or counter clockwise. Guests should finish at the end of the table nearest the door.

The starting point should be obvious since one should never need to be served. Self-service of food must be easy and beverages and appointments (silver and napkins) must be easy to remove and easy to handle if they are on the buffet.

If we take cues from the behavior of people at a buffet, the starting point is a pile of stacked plates. Almost without thinking we proceed to the stacked plates and take one from the pile.

Every dish on the buffet ought to be servable with one serving tool. Two-in-one serving tools, tongs and large spoons can generally replace two tools. Place serving tools beside the dish when setting the buffet. Open places to set plates should be arranged if the guests need to use both hands for serving.

The dishes that make up the meal can be clustered or aligned on the buffet. They ought to appear in decreasing order of importance to prevent the filling of the plate before the main parts of the meal are taken. Reset the buffet for the dessert course.

Decide what serving dishes will be used beforehand, then make a trial buffet setting. This will help you to use your space more efficiently and hopefully eliminate overcrowding. A side table for appointments, beverage and trays may also be used to eliminate overcrowding the main table. If guests will be seated at a table, appointments should be on the table.

Make your Christmas dinner the high point of a best-loved holiday with a table as pretty and festive as the menu is delicious.

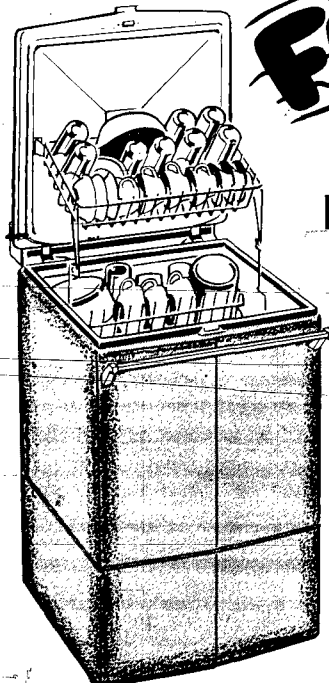

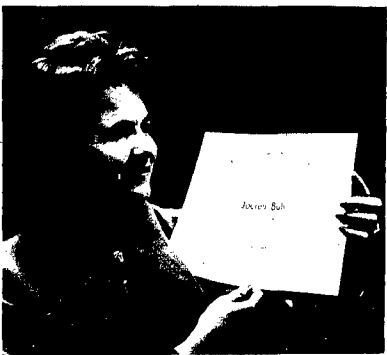

USDA to Issue New \$5 Coupons In Food Stamps

A new \$5 food coupon will soon be issued to participants in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program. The new coupon, maroon in color, will be used along with the present 50-cent and \$2 coupons.

A spokesman in the Wayne

County Division of Welfare said the \$20 books made up of \$2 coupons will continue to be sold until the new \$50 books with \$5 coupons are available early next year.

The \$5 coupon is being introduced to improve the operating efficiency of the Food Stamp Program, which has been greatly expanded during the past year. A family of four, for example, now gets \$15 worth of food coupons each month. Food buying bonuses paid to the 8,800,000 people taking part in the program in October totaled \$125,800,000—five times the bonus payment in November, 1969, before the program was improved.

The new, larger denomination coupon will reduce the number of coupons needed to operate the program. It will also make handling of food stamp coupons more practical and convenient for the participants in the program, for the officers which issue the coupons to participants, for the retail food stores that take the coupons in trade, and for the banks which redeem them.

Under the Food Stamp Program, administered by the Food and Nutrition Service, the low-income families can exchange the amount of money they normally spend on food for food coupons that are worth more. The new \$5 coupons will be bound into books with a total value of \$30, and the present \$20 books of \$2 coupons will be discontinued. Books valued at \$10—made up of the blue \$2 coupons and books worth \$2 and \$3, containing the orange-colored 50-cent coupons, will be continued, conforming with the policy for \$2 coupons, grocery stores may not accept loose (detached from book) \$5 food stamps. This may, however, continue to accept loose 50-cent coupons.
